

## Please Note: Changes to Meat Goat Divisions for 2025!



#### South Dakota 4-H **Meat Goat Divisions**





- **Registered Breeding Does** Registered breeding does must have registration papers either fullblood or percentage. Papers must be in the 4-H members name and/or family name or have appropriate lease forms. All purebred, fullblood, and percentage will be shown together in one show.
  - These does will be shown by age and must fit in one of these age groups.
  - Junior Does
    - 3 to under 6 months 6

    - to under 9 months 9to under 12 months
  - O Yearling Does
    - ▶ 12 to under 24 months
    - 16 to under 20 months

  - Senior Doe▶ 20 to under 24 months

    - 24 to under 36 months36 months and over
  - Tattoos will be checked at check-in time. If tattoos are not legible, animals will be moved to the Commercial Division.
  - Does can be trimmed to enhance their individual qualities. Does can be shown with collar, halter, and no rules will be enforced on bracing but all four feet must be on the ground at all times and no excessive slapping of the animal.

#### Commercial/Haired Breeding Does

- · · Commercial breeding does are not required to be registered.
- Commercial breeding does will be shown with hair and trimmed to enhance their individual qualities.

  Commercial breeding does will be shown by weight with a minimum declared weight of 45 pounds and maximum declared weight of 125 pounds and never have kidded before.
- Weigh-backs: The top 3 purple ribbons in each class will be weighed back immediately after class. They must weigh within 5% of their declared weight or they will be immediately excused from the show and will not be
- Commercial breeding does do not have registration papers but will be required to have USDA Official Scrapie
- Does can be shown with collar, halter, and no rules will be enforced on bracing, but all four feet must be on the ground at all times and no excessive slapping of the animal.

#### Wether Dam/Slicked Does

- •• A wether dam is a doe that has a wether style breeding and will be raised as a market style goat. Does must be slick shorn with a 3/8 inch of hair or less. Hair may be left on the legs up to the hocks and knees only.
- These does shall not be kidded and must be under 1 year of age.
- · Wether dams will be shown by weight with a minimum declared weight of 45 pounds and maximum declared weight of 125 pounds and never kidded before.



- Animals will not need registration papers but will be required to have USDA Official Scrapie Tag ID.
   Weigh-backs: The top 3 purple ribbons in each class will be weighed back immediately after class. They must weigh within 5% of their declared weight or they will be immediately excused from the show and will not be eligible for awards.
- Does can be shown with collar, halter, and no rules will be enforced on bracing, but all four feet must be on the ground at all times and no excessive slapping of the animal.

#### Market Wethers

- . Market castrated wethers will be shown in the market wether division. DNA will be required by June 1st.
- Wethers will be shown by weight with a minimum declared weight of 45 pounds.
  Wethers must be slick shorn with a 3/8 inch of hair or less. Hair may be left on the legs up to the hocks and
- Weigh-backs: The top 3 purple ribbons in each class will be weighed back immediately after class. They must
  weigh within 5% of their declared weight or they will be immediately excused from the show and will not be eligible for awards.
- Wethers can be shown with collar, halter, and no rules will be enforced on bracing, but all four feet must be on the ground at all times and no excessive slapping of the animal.

- Showmanship will be split into two separate contests: Breeding Showmanship and Market/Wether Dam Showmanship.
- Breeding Showmanship consists of: Registered Breeding Does and Commercial/Haired Breeding Does.
- Market/Wether Dam Showmanship consists of: Market Wethers and Slicked/Wether Dam Showmanship.
   Youth may compete in one showmanship contest not both.
- Youth may show their goat at their best ability if that is consisting of bracing, no bracing, showing on a collar or

# Feed to Carcass Making the Grade



#### **About**

Congratulations, you have chosen to raise a market animal for meat! A market project can take a lot of time, energy, and finances, but it is an important part of agriculture and feeding the world, and the life skills you will learn along the way are well worth it.

As a 4-H producer, it is your responsibility to follow ethical and safe practices when handling and safe practices when handling and feeding your meat animal to ensure that the buyer/consumer receives a nutritious and high quality meat for their dinner table. Providing safe and quality food for consumers builds trusts and support from customers, and keep agricultural producers like you in business!

Feed to Carcass 4-H program will guide 4-H youth interested in the process of feeding your market animal to the show ring to harvesting. This program is designed to encourage decision-making, a trait that is beneficial throughout life.

### **Expectations and Responsibilities**

Youth interested in participating in the Feed to Carcass program, must:

- Be enrolled as an active 4-H member as of January 1 of the current 4-H year.
- · Have the financial ability to purchase a market steer or access a home raised market steer.
- Provide adequate facilities and adhere to the youth livestock literacy practices to ensure proper management and well-being of the animal.
- Actively participate in online and face-to-face educational programming resources.
  - Links will be sent directly to participates a week prior to the educational webinar.
- · Exhibit steer at county 4-H Achievement Days.
- Maintain accurate production records related to raising the animal.
- Develop and present a county public presentation or exhibit an educational display highlighting their project and knowledge.





#### **Calendar of Events**

We understand schedules can be demanding and limited. Effort is key. As long as youth can make an effort to attend the following dates. Educational webinars will be recorded and an evaluation will be distributed to youth the following day to be completed.

#### For sure dates will be sent out soon!

#### January - Animal acquired

 Helpful selection tip: a market steer should weigh more than 500 pounds at 7 months. Typically a market animal is born February-April months of the previous year.

#### February- Animal Weigh-In

 Animals will be weighed. We will determine the beginning weight for rate-of-gain.

#### February- Educational Webinar

 A health program is important to a successful market animal project. Learn best practices for ensuring your animal stays healthy by a local veterinarian.

#### April- Educational Webinar

 A balanced ration, plenty of clean, fresh water, and regular feedings are essential to produce top quality market steers. Learn proper nutrition by an SDSU Extension Beef Nutrition Field Specialist.



#### May- Educational Webinar

 Showmanship starts in the barn- working with the animal hair, proper feet position, and patience. Learn the fundamentals of getting your animal ready for the showring from a 4-H alumni.

#### July- Ultrasound Hands-On Workshop

 Youth will bring their market animal to your local butcher shop of your choosing. Ultrasound is an evaluation tool for market animals to determine marbling and animals' ribeye area and backfat thickness.



Farm Service Agency Youth Loan



#### **Youth Loans**



#### Overview

The U.S. Department of Agriculture's Farm Service Agency (FSA) makes operating loans of up to \$10,000 to eligible individual youths ages 10 to 20 to finance income-producing, agriculture-related projects. The project must be of modest size, educational, and initiated, developed, and carried out by youths participating in 4-H clubs, FFA, tribal youth organizations, or similar agricultural-affiliated groups.

The project must be an organized and supervised program of work. It must be planned and operated with the assistance of the organization advisor, produce sufficient income to repay the loan, and provide the youth with practical business and educational experience in agriculture-related skills.

#### Who May Borrow

To qualify for a loan, the applicant must:

- Comply with FSA's general eligibility requirements; and
- Conduct a modest income-producing project in a supervised program of work

#### How Loan Funds May Be

These loans can finance many kinds of income-producing agricultural projects. The loan funds may be used to:

- Buy livestock, seed, equipment, and supplies;
- Buy, rent, or repair needed tools and equipment; and
- Pay operating expenses for the project.

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#### **How It Works**

To apply, the applicant must submit completed plans and budgets signed by the project advisor and parent or guardian along with the FSA application for loan assistance.

#### These loans

- Have a maximum loan amount of \$10,000 (total principal balance owed at any one time cannot exceed this amount);
- Have an interest rate that is determined based on the cost of money to the federal government (after the loan is made, the interest rate for that loan will not change);
- Will be secured, in addition to promissory notes, by liens on the products produced for sale and on chattel property, including livestock, equipment, and fixtures purchased with loan funds; and
- Have a repayment schedule that varies depending on the type of project for which the loan is made. For example, if it involves raising livestock or crops, the loan is paid when the animals or

#### **Applying for Youth Loans**

The Farm Service Agency (FSA) makes loans to youth to establish and operate agricultural income-producing projects in connection with 4-H clubs, FFA and other agricultural groups. Projects must be planned and operated with the help of the organization advisor, produce sufficient income to repay the loan and provide the youth with practical business and educational experience. The maximum loan amount is \$10,000.

#### Youth Loan Eligibility Requirements:

- · Be a citizen of the United States (which includes Puerto Rico, the Virgin Islands, Guam, American Samoa, the Commonwealth of the Northern Mariana Islands) or a legal resident alien
- · Be 10 years to 20 years of age
- · Comply with FSA's general eligibility requirements
- · Conduct a modest income-producing project in a supervised program of work as outlined above
- · Demonstrate capability of planning, managing and operating the project under guidance and assistance from a project advisor. The project supervisor must recommend the youth loan applicant, along with providing adequate supervision.

Volunteers will not be considered approved to work with youth without completing these activities:

#### **Annual Volunteer Renewal Process**

South Dakota 4-H volunteers are essential to the mission of our program. These caring adult mentors bring forth many skills and hours of dedicated service each year to help strengthen the lives of young people. If you were a volunteer in the 2023-24 4-H program year, thank you so much! South Dakota 4-H volunteers serve one-year terms, renewable indefinitely so long as both parties (i.e., typically the volunteer and lead county 4-H professional) wish to continue the relationship. The returning volunteer indicates this interest by re-enrolling in 4-HOnline after October 1st. At this point, the returning volunteer's status is "pending." In most cases, the lead local 4-H professional will quickly approve and the 4-HOnline status will then say "active." This signifies the renewal of the relationship for the 4-H year ahead.

If the lead local 4-H professional does not wish to continue the relationship or wishes to discuss role restrictions or alterations, they will communicate this to the volunteer. Each year, a few 4-H volunteers are not renewed for service.

Reminder: All returning volunteers need to indicate their interest in returning. The preferred renewal date is before December 3 but required before volunteers are allowed to do any 4-H programming or events and before September 1st. Otherwise, should they wish to return at a future time, they will have to re-start the volunteer process from scratch and pay a \$75 lapsed background check fee.

Interested in becoming a <u>new</u> volunteer this 4-H year? Contact Hamlin County 4-H Advisor, Abbi Steeke, at the office anytime, preferably before April 1, to learn more.

### **Hamlin County 4-H Committees**

Starting in the new 4-H year, October 2024, Hamlin County 4-H will be taking on an up to date committee protocol. On these committees, a minimum of two youth and a minimum of 3 adult members with a maximum of 9 adults will serve on the committees. On this committee, representatives will help assist with planning, conducting, and recommending educational experiences for the certain committee topic. Adults do not have to be certified volunteers. A committee list of members must be approved by 4-H Advisor yearly before December 31. Removal of committee members can occur at any point by the county 4-H Advisor.
