


What is a scam?

- A scam is a way of tricking people into handing over money, valuable items, or personal information.
- Scams can happen both offline and online.
- Online scams can be seen on websites, in games, emails, on social media and in text messages.
- If you have been the victim of an online scam, it is not your fault.



'Seems too good to be true' Some scams seem to offer something amazing. For example, winning a prize for just going on a website.



'Contact you did not expect'

Some scams involve getting a message or something appearing on your screen that you did not expect.



'Asked for personal information'

Some scams ask you to fill in personal information that is normally kept private, such as your name, age, address or password.



'Money or trade being asked for'

Some scams ask you to spend money or trade something valuable.

You see an advert online.

It says: "You are a WINNER! CLICK HERE to claim your free gaming set worth over £1000! You only have 15 minutes to claim!"

You get a text message from an unknown mobile number.

It says: "Your package cannot be delivered because of lost address. Pls deal with this immediately. Click on linkpostbo.xabcde.co.m and update your address and phone number."

One says: "Click this link! <u>fr.ee.bucks.co</u> You can get free bucks! Just gotta give your username and phone number!"

You are playing an online fantasy game. You receive a message from someone you do not know.



One day, you receive a message from @gamemasterzuk saying that you've won!






We are going to talk about phishing


What do you think this word means?




Phishing is when a scammer 'hooks' in somebody by pretending to be a company or organisation. A little bit like fishing!





Often, personal information is collected - such as passwords, phone numbers, email addresses and bank details.



Phishing could happen through phone calls, emails, texts, links in games, social media messages or fake websites.







Public profile means anyone can see Jake's information

Profile picture shows what Jake looks like

Lots of personal information visible:

- Full name
- Age
- School
- A place Jake visits often - his football club
- Jake also has a lot of 'friends'
