Something we've noticed at the last two meetings is that the attendance sign-in sheet is not making it around to everyone. It would be wonderful if everyone would make a mental note to mark their X each time. We really appreciate the large attendance we are having at our meetings and the great input we are getting. And thanks to Barbie Powell for her help in getting updated info for the upcoming roster. If you've not done so, please give her any new/updated info: name, address, phone(s), email, cars owned, etc.

nd now for the hard news ... We talked about the budget shortfall due to the lower attendance at

both the Swap and the Car Show. We are down nearly \$4,000. The Board has discussed this at some length and we've come up with options. We don't like either of the finalists and want to give everyone a head's up for further discussion at the meeting on June 24.

Adjust the Budget. That can be accomplished by:

Option 1: Raise Dues. We are far under what most clubs charge yearly. Yes, we request participation in either the Swap or the Show, but that doesn't save us money. We would hope that members would volunteer anyway. We have heard clubs charging up to \$100 per year. We don't want to go there! \$25 has been discussed at prior meetings; again that won't cover the shortage. \$5.00/month (\$60/year) was discussed. Think about it this way: \$5.00 is about one gallon of high grade gas. Less than your morning Starbucks. Less than a Big Mac. I could go on.

Option 2: Delete activities. This would have to be major. We spent \$2,000 on our overnighter. We spent \$2,000 on our Holiday dinner. There's our \$4,000. Do we want to give those up? Or a combination of smaller events? Please put your thinking caps on and give us ideas. Raising dues is a Board decision according to our Constitution but we truly want your suggestions.

Option 2B: Pay as you go. Instead of the club paying for everything, the club pays a percentage and the member pays the rest. Non-members pay in full. That might include non-member spouses/significant others.



This Month in Automotive History

1906-The Kissel Motor Car Company

Is founded on June 4 by Louis Kissel. A "KisselKar" won the 1910 Los Angeles to Phoenix "Cactus Derby" road race. The Kissel Gold Bug speedster was popular among celebrities of the 1920s. The company was forced into receivership in the early years of the Great Depression, and was bankrupt in 1931.



1962 - The Beach Boys Song 409

is released on June 4. The song, about a car equipped with a 409ci engine, was first released on the B-side of their song Surfin' Safari. The song was number 76 for one week on the Billboard Hot 100. The Chevrolet 409 engine was first offered in Chevy's 1962 model year Impala SS, Bel Air and Biscayne.



1996 - The Final Ford Bronco

fifth generation rolls off the assembly line. The Bronco, first offered in 1965, was originally Ford's answer to the Jeep CJ-5 and the International Harvester Scout. The Bronco was re-launched with the sixth generation in 2021, as both a mid-size two-door and full-size four-door SUV.



1949 - Preston Tucker is Granted

a U.S. design patent for the Tucker 48 on June 14. Tucker's patent was separate from the patent that his former designer, George Lawson, had been awarded a year earlier for the Tucker Torpedo prototype. Preston Tucker also held a patent for a collapsible steering column design, and multiple patents on a motorized gun turret.



1972 - The National Institute for

Automotive Service Excellence (ASE) is founded on June 12. The non-profit group certifies professionals and shops in the automotive repair and service industry. Certification is offered in the United States and parts of Canada. As of 2018, over 247,000 professionals have been certified.

The 1929 Peerless Six-61



It's often said that in business, timing is everything. A perfect, if unfortunate, example of that adage is the Peerless Six-61.

The Peerless Motor Car Corporation was founded in Cleveland, Ohio in 1900. With its first car in 1902, the company pioneered what eventually became the standard vehicle configuration of a front-mounted engine driving the rear wheels via a driveshaft.


As the company grew, Peerless successfully focused more and more on luxury models. The company was first to equip its vehicles with electric lights in 1911 and electric starters in 1913. It produced its first V8 in 1915 in a move to compete with Cadillac.

The entire Peerless line was redesigned in 1929, which included the introduction of the Six-61. It also coincided with the beginning of the Great Depression. The company attempted to focus on those who remained wealthy, but ultimately ceased production in 1931. The company was inactive until it began brewing Carling Black Label beer after the end of Prohibition.

On The Cover: 1932 Austin 7

The Austin Motor Car Company was founded in England in 1905. Initially focusing on large cars, the smaller "Baby Austin" was produced from 1923 to 1939 and became one of the most popular cars that were produced for the British market. The car was sold with a 747cc, 10.5hp thermosiphoncooled four-cylinder engine.
