1882 - Arthur Duray is Born in

Ixelles, Brussels, Belgium, on February 9th. Duray, who was one of Belgium's first pilots (license number 3), is probably most famous for breaking the world's land speed record three times in the period 1903-4. He also finished in second place in the 1914 Indianapolis 500.



1964 - The Song 'Fun, Fun, Fun'

by the Beach Boys is released on their Shut Down Volume 2 album on February 3rd. The song, which is about a teenage girl who deceives her father so that she can take out his Ford Thunderbird, reached number 5 on the US Billboard Hot 100. The album peaked at number 13 on Billboard's Top LPs.



2008 - The Dodge Challenger third generation debuts on February 6th. The body style was very reminiscent of the 1970 Challenger R/T. The car was sold through the 2023 model year. The 2023 SRT Demon produces 1,025hp, with a 0-60mph acceleration of 1.66 seconds.



1922 - The Lincoln Motor Company

is purchased by Ford on February 4th. The company, which was named after President Abraham Lincoln, was formed by Henry Leland and his son in 1917 to build Liberty V12 aircraft engines during WWI. After the war, it was reorganized as an automobile manufacturer and released its Model L in 1920.



1981 - John DeLorean Files For

a US patent for the DeLorean gullwing doors on February 4th. While earlier cars had incorporated such a door design, DeLorean improved upon the design by adding a stainless steel torsion bar.

s most of you know, I return to Germany at least twice a year to visit family. I am originally from Bamberg in Franconia, a region in Northern Bavaria, and I grew up in Buttenheim, hometown of Levi Strauss. His birthplace and the house I grew up in are 650 yards apart from each other. Buttenheim is also called "The Gateway to Franconian Switzerland" because of its hills, creeks, and castle ruins. Which means that this is the perfect backdrop to drive your historic cars on a nice afternoon.

istoric cars in Germany are called "Oldtimer," which means anything 30 years and older. There is a second class, which is anything 20 years but not yet 30, called you probably guessed it - "Youngtimer." Last September, I attended two shows, and I took our last remaining vehicle in Germany, a 2003 Subaru Justy G3X 1.3, to drive to the locations (I sold this "Youngtimer" in September after a rusted













out fuel tank left me stranded because I could no longer refill the car and spilled a few liters of expensive German gas all over the ground of the gas station).

he first show I visited was called the "15. ADAC - Oldtimerfahrt MSC Fränkische Schweiz 2024" which translates into "15th German Automobilclub Historic Vehicle Tour by Motorsports Club Franconian Switzerland." If you are wondering, the ADAC is Germany's equivalent to AAA, nicknamed "The Yellow Angels" due to their yellow service vehicles, and the MSC Franconian Switzerland has been around since 1958, which makes it seven years older than the Corvallis Historic Auto Club. Old World.

decided to head to the location where the tour would break for lunch time to have the opportunity to see the cars. The organizers teamed up with a soccer club from Lichteneiche, one Bamberg's suburbs. I wanted to get there before the first cars arrived so I could have lunch. When I drove up, looking for the parking area for visitors, one of the volunteers waved me down, visibly puzzled. I lowered my window, and he asked me why I was not displaying my start number plague on the car, and how I made it there so fast, well before the others. We both laughed when I told him that I was there to see the show and that was not participating with "Youngtimer." He pointed me towards the parking area, and within a few minutes, I was in line for Bratwurst and beer, a tasty lunch (my wife Jenny would disagree

here) that cost me the equivalent of six bucks.

Since it was a gorgeous day, no clouds in the sky and the thermometer showing about 80 degrees Fahrenheit, I walked over to a shady area until the first cars would arrive. The ADAC had set up a blow-up gate to mark the finish line for timekeeping (if you are curious, head to http://tiny.cc/adacgate online to see what such a gate looks like), which is important because you score points when participating in a historic car event such as this, and I decided that this would be the perfect spot to observe the vehicles coming in.

had looked up the list of participants and their vehicles online in advance, since the outing required preregistration to allow for the planning of snacks and lunch, along with tracking and scorekeeping. I was anxious to see ten motorcycles and more than sixty vehicles roll in, among them a rare 1964 Westfield Eleven Sports (1), a 1941 DKW F8 Pritschenwagen (2), a lovely 1968 Volkswagen AHK Bugatti Kit-Car (3), a 1960 Sunbeam Rapier (4), and of course a couple of models I used to drive myself, among them the iconic 1986 Citroën 2CV (5) - there's the story of me driving one inside of my old school building the night of our graduation, when we pushed it up five flights of stairs, using beer benches, to have it in the commons area as part of our graduation prank; the 1974 Opel











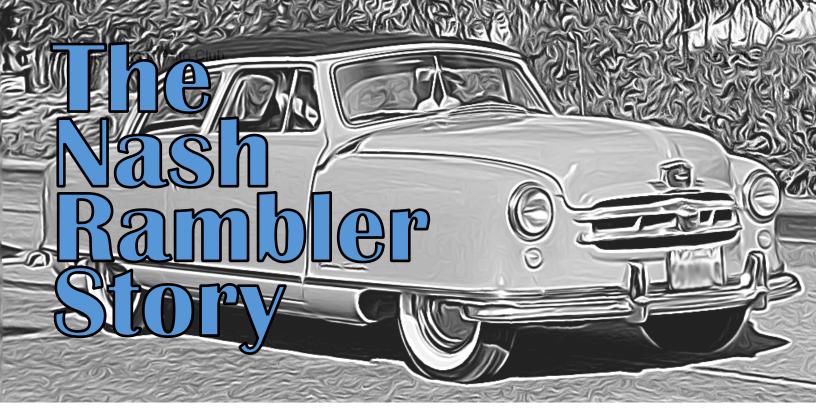


Kadett (6), and two that I would love to own, the 1938 Mercedes Benz 170V (7) and the Diesel monster, a 1989 Mercedes Benz 190D (8).

Strangely enough, I am not a BMW person, but I saw the stunning 1938 BMW 327/28 (9). Some of our fellow CHAC members would have appreciated for sure the 1933 Alvis Speed 20 (10), the 1929 Ford (11), the 1927 Buick Six (12), and the 1992 RAM Cobra (13).

artin Harding and I were exchanging stories about the Nash Rambler (early '50 model). I remember these stories.

When I was in the 2nd, 3rd and 4th grades my parents had a 2-door Nash Rambler. It had a dark green top and a gray body. Dad was in the Navy and we made several trips from Oregon to San Diego and back again.

remember one story my mom told about coasting down the Grapevine, using the engine to slow the car. By the time we got to the bottom, the Nash had blown a head gasket. She had us 3 kids, a boxer dog, a tortoise, a parakeet and a bowl of gold fish and all our worldly goods in, and on top of, the Nash.

She said she had very little money and drove to the first garage she saw. The mechanic must have

felt pity for my mom. He agreed to replace the head gasket in exchange for mom's most valued possession, her Singer sewing machine. Then we were back on the road to Oregon, as Mom always said. "Off like a herd of turtles."

When Dad went overseas, mom would pack up everything in the Nash and drive back to Oregon

where her parents lived. It was like the "Old woman who lived in a shoe." Only this shoe was a Nash Rambler!!

remember in the 3rd grade, Dad and I were the only ones in the car when the hood blew up over the windshield. We could see out (just over the dash) enough

so Dad got the Nash to the shoulder of the road. After that, the Nash had a dent across the hood where it had folded over the top of the car. That will make your heart beat faster.



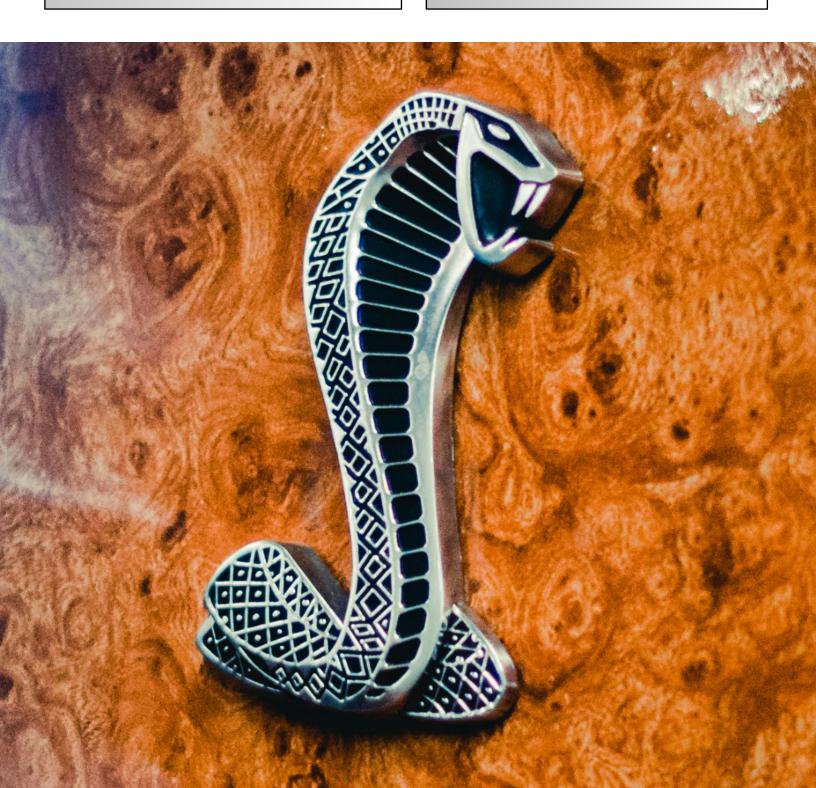

The 1967 **Chevrolet Impala**

eneral Motors introduced _ the Chevy Impala in 1958 as the top model of the Bel Air. The Impala became a standalone model with the release of the second generation in 1959.

The fourth generation ran from the 1965 model year through 1970. The 1965 model set an industry sales record of over 1 million units. 1967 saw the introduction of what was referred to as Coke bottle styling, with the body design bearing a general resemblance to a classic glass Coca Cola bottle.

In response to federal regulations, 1967 was also the first year for a collapsible steering column, side marker lights and shoulder belts in non-covertible models.

s this ad makes clear, 1967 offered the L₃6 Turbo-Jet 427ci V8 as an option, which was rated at 385hp. The fourth generation came in various 2- and 4-door body styles, engine sizes that ranged from 250ci to 454ci, and 2-, 3- and 4-speed transmissions.

Impala production saw an eight year gap after 1985 and another three year gap after 1996. Production came to a close at the end of the 10th generation with the 2020 model year.
