## **This Month in Automotive History**

#### 1927 - Volvo is founded on

April 14. The company's first car was the OV 4, an open carriage, 4-cylinder cabriolet. The automobile part of the company, Volvo Cars, was owned by Ford Motor Corp from 1999 to 2009, and today is owned by Geely Holding Group. The word Volvo is Latin for "I roll".



#### 1966 - The final episode of "My

Mother the Car" airs on NBC on April 5. The TV show was about was a man who buys a 1928 Porter touring car that turns out to be his reincarnated mother (voiced by Ann Sothern). The show, starring Jerry Van Dyke and Maggie Pierce, lasted one season over a total of 30 episodes.



### 2020-Stirling Moss dies on April

12 at age 90. Moss, who was born in London, England to racing parents, won his first international race at age 21 in an XK120, winning the 1950 RAC Tourist trophy in Northern Ireland. Active from 1951 to 1961, Moss had 16 wins in 66 starts. Moss retired from racing after a crash put him in a coma for a month, from which he felt he never fully recovered.



#### 1947 - Henry Ford dies on April

7 at age 83. Ford founded the Ford Motor Company in 1903, after having dissolved his first car company, the Detroit Automobile Company, in 1901. Ford pioneered the use of soybean-based plastics in his cars and over the course of his life was awarded a total of 161 US patents.



#### 1970 - AMC launches the Gremlin

on April 1. The car, which was produced in the US through the 1978 model year, could be ordered with engines ranging from 121ci to 304ci. The car's designer said that he originally sketched the car on an air-sickness bag while on an airline flight.

The Friday cruise is open to show participants and anyone else who wants to cruise. During the




















cruises, Ivy Street is closed off for cruisers, while Highway 99 traffic is diverted through side streets west of town.

## **Honda Hush Tech**

Honda has announced an option in its cars that will effectively quiet many annoying sounds.

The Honda Ultra Quiet Sonic Hub (HUSH) works in a similar way to noise-canceling headphone technology. It uses inverse sound waves to cancel out sounds that many drivers find to be irritating.

The system includes pre-programmed recognition of common distracting phrases, including "Are we there yet?" and "I would have gone the other way", rendering them inaudible. It can also mute your navigation system if it's telling you to turn around when you know better.

The system is a popular item on April Fool's Day.

## The 1910 Brush

uring the club's recent outing to Brownsville, I saw a 1909 Brush automobile in the Linn County Historical Museum, and decided to learn more about it.

old as the "Everyman's" Car," Brush cars used hardwoods for the frames, axles and wheels. Instead of employing a differential, the rear axle would disengage one wheel when making a turn. The engine was a single-cylinder, water cooled four-stroke, which drove the rear axle via a chain.

A Brush was the third car to ever make it to the top of Pikes Peak under its own power, in 1908. Another was the first to be driven across the Australian continent, in 1912.

This ad is from the Brush Runabout Company, the follow-on to the Brush Motor Car Company. which existed from 1909 to 1910. The company then merged with Maxwell-Briscoe, Stoddard-Dayton and others to form the United States Motor Company (USMC), which went out of business in 1913.
