This Month in Automotive History

1905 - The Office of Public Road

Queries becomes the Office of Public Roads on July 1. That became the Office of Public Roads and Rural Engineering in 1915, the Bureau of Public Roads in 1918, the Public Roads Administration in 1939 and back to the Bureau of Public Roads in 1949, also all on July 1. It's now the Federal Highway Administration.



1971 - The Movie Two-Lane Blacktop

is released on July 7. Starring James Taylor, Warren Oates, Laurie Bird and Dennis Wilson, the movie was well-received by critics but did poorly at the box-office, apparently due to an utter lack of promotion because the head of the studio hated the movie. It has since become a cult classic and was selected by the Library of Congress for preservation in the United States National Film Registry.



2005 - Ford Produces the Final

Thunderbird on July 1. The eleventh-gen Thunderbird was produced from 2002-2005 and used the same platform as the Jaguar S-Type. The carwas equipped with a Jaguar DOHC 3.9 Lengine, which peaked in 2003 at 280hp.



1937 - Richard Petty is Born on

July 2. Petty was the first race car driver to win the NASCAR Winston Cup Series seven times. He had a career 200 race wins and set many racing records, including winning the Daytona 500 seven times, winning 27 races in one year (in 1967), and earning a total of 1,184 starts. Petty was inducted into the inaugural class of the NASCAR Hall of Fame in 2010.



1979 - Auto Shack Opens in Forrest

City, Arkansas on July 5. The company changed its name to AutoZone in 1987 in response to an infringement lawsuit that was brought by Radio Shack. By 2014, the company had become the largest retailer of automotive parts in North America, with over 5000 locations in the United States, and over 6000 worldwide.






Chris Hagler's Mighty Sprite Roars at LBCC's 2024 Dyno Days and Open House

LBCC had their annual 2024 Dyno Days and Open House event on May 17 - a celebration of their Automotive and Heavy Equipment Diesel Programs and students. The event spanned two days and offered dyno sessions for both large and small vehicles on a half-hour cadence. Murphy Gleske (a

Given the invitation, I thought now is the time to see what my mighty 1959 Austin-Healey Sprite

could produce. I had a blast at the event - the facility was spotless, the students were engaged, energized and friendly, and nothing but smiles (and loud engine noise!) everywhere.

efore beginning any test runs I had to pass a Tech Inspection. The students were intrigued by the Sprite and were getting coached by Mike LeBlanc, Department Chair. Electronic Ignition? Nope. Sport Mode? Nope. ABS?

Nope. Computer? Nope. "What's that pool of oil over there? Oh, I said, that's OK, after all this is a British Car and they had a different idea on seals." Luckily for me they recorded the volume of fluid as small and passed me on to the dyno queue.

What I didn't realize was that I should have made an appointment way in advance of the date - all the test slots were taken by the time I arrived Friday morning. This is a very popular event! However, because of my affiliation

with the CHAC, they agreed to squeeze me in after the fire-breathing BMW M3 and before the Hyundai Veloster.

The actual test was three runs of either "power curve" or "¼ mile pulls." Needless to say there






CHAC Members Entertain Residents With Impressive Turnout

The 1905 Winton

The Winton Motor Carriage Company was founded by Alexander Winton in Cleveland, Ohio, in 1897. The company sold its first car in 1898 through an ad that was placed in Scientific American magazine. The company became the largest manufacturer of gas-powered cars in the US when it sold 100 in 1899.

In 1903, a used 20hp, two-cylinder Winton was the first vehicle to be driven across the United States, not without considerable difficulty and more than occasional assistance, at a time when the total of paved roads in the US was 150 miles.

The company later branched out to diesel engines with the Winton Engine Company in 1912, as car sales declined. Car production ended in 1924.

The Winton Engine Company became a large supplier of railcarengines in the 1920s, and was sold to General Motors in 1930, to become the Winton Engine Corporation, a GM subsidiary.

The 1970 Dodge Challenger was Chrysler's answer to the Ford Mustang. It was positioned to compete with higher-end pony cars like the Pontiac Firebird and the Mercury Cougar. The highest horsepower-rated engine that could be ordered in the R/T performance model was a 426ci Hemi, rated at 425hp.
