

President's Notes

I mentioned at April's General Membership Meeting that I had restarted a discussion with the Linn Benton Community College. I shared on the screen, some talking points I was planning to have with the powers that be. The heading of "proposal" on the screen has led to misinterpretation by a few. I wish to confirm that I was only having discussions with the college. "I'm just looking at options here."

We are not leaving the Fairgrounds any time soon. The Fairgrounds will allow us to lock in the current pricing with a three-year deposit. After considerable review of our financing abilities, the CHAC Board of Directors believes that we can cough-up the money.

By placing a deposit (albeit considerable) we lock in the price for the next three years.

The college by the way has yet to respond to my talking points (proposal). Because of the need to make timely decisions for planning the 2023 Swap and Show, we are moving ahead with the Fairgrounds.

At the May Board of Directors Meeting we decided to increase the fees for both the Swap and Show spaces. Thirty dollars (for a 10x20 footprint) and \$20.00 to



show a vehicle in the "Dust 'em Off ". That's up from \$20 and \$10 respectively.

We have additionally decided to levy a Name Tag fee to any new member joining the CHAC. The past policy of the club outlaying thirty dollars for two badges in response to a ten dollar commitment did not

make fiscal sense. This new policy does not affect any current members, only new folks. Membership application forms and the web site will receive updates shortly.

Now, let's look forward to getting out with our vehicles! I believe those weather gods will again be kind to us.

All the spots are taken at the LBCC Dyno Days dynamometer, but we can still watch the pulls and visit the facility on May 20-21. Prestige Senior Living is having a "Sock Hop" celebration on the 21st. DJ Freeman is heading up the CHAC display, along with running this May's general meeting for me. (Patty and I will be in Washington State, celebrating our anniversary.) I hope to see a whole bunch of you at our first 2022 *Corvallis Cars and Coffee* event on Saturday, June 4th.

I ask that club members consider displaying at the Corvallis Manor on June 11th. We are showin' our stuff for the residents there just in time to make some guys father's day. My first Model A Ford

I still own and drive my first Model A, a 1929 Tudor. But let me begin at the beginning.

I was born on October 20, 1948, exactly 21 years after Henry Ford stamped engine #1 for the new improved Ford, the Model A. I was a Ford guy from day one and came home in a bright red 1947 Ford panel truck according to my Dad. Not long after I was born, my Dad bought a \$100 U.S. Savings Bond in my name. None of this mattered to me until 1959.

My Dad & Mom dated in a 1928 Tudor and Dad had found a '29 for sale in 1959. He decided my \$100 bond would be wisely spent to help buy this car. So, at age eleven, I was financially broke and had become a silent partner in a car I wasn't old enough to drive. The car was in white primer, had good tires and ran just fine for a 30-year-old car with 91,000 miles on it. He didn't drive it much but just enjoyed having it and I played in it with friends from time to time. We moved 18 miles to a new place in North Albany in 1961 and this was when I got my first memorable ride in the car. Dad had a friend along for a ride and showed him how the car would hit 65 miles per hour! I was witnessing my future while holding on to the back of the driver's seat like kids used to do.

The car found a new home in the barn, waiting for Dad to retire in 1978. When that time finally came and with more time to play, he evicted the mice and got the car running and driving again. I inherited the car in 1984 after Dad died and my wife and I finished the body work and did a driveway paint job.

The national meet for the Model A Ford Club of America was in Portland in 1984. Our car was still in red primer, but we drove it to the meet. We were the only car there that was not in paint of some color but we were there among 500 others. This was a totally new & incredible experience and everywhere we

turned, there were more Model A's. And it was the start of many miles of traveling to more regional and national meets where we have met so many new friends. In the years since 1984, we have only missed one year not leaving home in our Tudor for at least a week.
