From Our Pastor Remember...

At the 11th hour of the 11th day of the 11th month one hundred years ago the guns went silent. It was time of the armistice that concluded the First World War. There are very few alive today who remember. We are called upon to remember this day and all who have served along with those who gave the sacrifice of their lives as the ultimate cost of our freedom. I am fortunate enough to have known both my grand fathers who served in that war. Grandpa Pfohl was a flyer who received his wings at Camp Borden just days before the armistice was signed, my Grandpa McNatty was an infantry man for the famous Rainbow division of the U. S. Army.

What about those of us who don't remember or are not old enough to remember? Perhaps we can take a lesson from the Hebrew people of the old testament. The festival of Passover was the festival of festivals for the people to observe. It was held in remembrance of the liberation of God's people from their slavery in Egypt. This remembrance was not in a linear or straight line remembering but in a circle which allows the people to remember this event as if it happened to them. They begin

the festival with words that say “We were slaves in Egypt...” not their relatives or ancestors. In this way the reality of the event of God's intervention is real and personal.

Along with my oldest son, I have had the privilege to visit the Vimy memorial. It is inspiring and humbling at the same time. Rising up over the French country side the spire reaches to heaven in a plea to hear the cries of those who fought and died there and in every battle before or since. You see the names of those who died carved into the memorial, and in the trenches and bunkers where soldiers waited for their call to battle you witness their names carved into the chalky stone walls as remembrance that young men were ready to sacrifice all. They were prepared to do what Jesus calls as Christians to do “No one has greater love than this, to lay down one's life for one's friends.” John 15:13

This year of milestone remembrance let us remember as if we are a part of the original story of war, sacrifice and courage. In so doing perhaps we will work harder to find peaceful solutions to conflict, seek ways to counter oppression with compassion and be courageous in proclaiming God's freedom from sin, death, and Satan through the death and resurrection of Jesus Our Lord and Saviour.

Opening: The meeting was opened by council chair Susan Dupuis. Opening devotions were given by Susan Dupuis.

Agenda: The agenda was reviewed. Additions: Social ministry committee. Octoberfest.
Motion to approve agenda: Wilmer Verch

Minutes from the previous council meeting of June 12, 2018 were reviewed.
Motion to approve minutes: Jill Kellough
Seconded: Rick Gerundin

Finance Report: Gerry Vandersleen brought attention to the following items from the comparative income statement and balance statement:

- Current assets are approximately \$150 000. They are down from previous year due to repair of heating system/hot water boilers and the purchase of the lot(447 Darcy) at a cost of approx. \$100 000.00 (Gerry reviewed that the previous heating system had been used to its limit and that many cracks were evident in the heat exchanger pipes).
- Octoberfest is (-\$700.00) to cover expenses required prior to the event
- Kitchen fund has a balance of \$10 231.25
- Building fund has a balance of \$2 605.59
- Organ restoration fund, rental properties, and stained glass window repair fund balances were noted
- Miscellaneous fund balance is lower than previous as \$7 000.00 was used in the purchase of the Darcy Street lot
- Property reserve has a present balance of \$0.00 as these funds were used in the repairs on the boilers
- Regular offerings are currently the same as previous year

- Memorial income, parish hall/room rental income, and solar panel income are all slightly higher than previous year
- Total revenue is up slightly compared to previous year.
- There was a recent \$5000 donation made by a donor who indicated that the funds were to be used wherever they are required; this money was left in general fund at present
- Benevolence expenses are approximately the same as the previous year
- Payroll expenses are down and benefits expenses are up
- Net income is currently \$1 792.55, which is improved compared to previous year

Property Report: Gerry Vandersleen reported that the last meeting was held on September 10, 2018.

- Lot purchase is complete at 447 Darcy Street. Insurance and liability have been added. Fence will be put up along Darcy Street to prevent misuse of the property. Discussion around putting up fencing to connect the properties and block passage through the back parking lot entrance by installation of either a gate or a chain to prevent drive throughs. There are numerous repairs/changes to be done, but for now the fencing will be done and further work done at a later date.
- Stained glass repairs- 3 windows remain to be done. The cost of each is \$10 500 + HST per window. One window will be repaired next year and the remaining windows repaired as funds come in.
- Repairs to the front steps will cost minimum \$10 000; repairs will have to wait till funds and a solution are found.
- Air conditioner for the lounge is out of commission. To replace would cost \$17 000.00; other options would be to price a wall unit. Other quotes will be asked for.
- New boilers have been installed; waiting on heating season to go through trials and adjustments.
- Repairs to quilters storage room will be done at a later date when property members available.
- There is damage at the corner of Darcy and Miller; damage is occurring to the pavement and the gravel structure underneath. The city will be contacted again on this matter
- Next meeting of property committee is October 15, 2018.

Pastor's Report: Pastor Paul reported September 2018 activities as follows:

- Blaine Sack, Debbie Wegner and Pastor Paul attended the Synod assembly in Toronto June 21-24. The Pastor noted that some parishes are 'aging out' and are closing their doors as a result; this leads to the selling of church properties, which in some cases can be very lucrative. This means that more money may be available for functioning parishes.
- Rebecca Brum & Kevin Pearce were married at Zion June 30th.
- Jodi Lehman & Andrew Sylvestre were married at Zion July 7.
- July 2-July 6 Pastor Paul served as camp pastor for staff training at Lutherlyn camp and conference center.
- Wednesday evening worship numbers are down, with the exception of the second

last service (celebrated 2 baptisms that evening).

- Funerals are occurring at a greater number than last year; there have been 30 burials so far this year.
- Confirmation will begin by the end of September. The junior class has the potential of 14-15 members. Those who will probably commit will be about 7-9. This year's senior class has 2 members.
- Pastor Paul will be away at the end of September. Pastor Jim Goos will lead the Saturday worship. Pastor Paul will be back for Sunday the 30th.
- Pastor Paul has resigned as dean of the area ministry team. Pastor Bruce Thompson of St. Timothy's is the new dean.
- As noted in the September newsletter, Pastor Paul will be retiring September 2019. Before that happens, Council should consider forming groups to help the revisioning of Zion's ministry and a call committee.

Correspondence: There were no pieces of correspondence received.

Committee Reports:

- **Social Ministry:** Thanksgiving will begin the jam jar collection start date (October 7). The program will conclude on All Saints Sunday. Proceeds this year will be directed to the residents at Carefor. Social ministry funds have been utilized as follows: \$700 was directed to mission development, \$750 to Salvation Army, \$200.00 to clergy association, \$150 to We Care bags. The soup and sandwich luncheon will be held January 6, 2019. Synod grant report for \$1350 is being prepared for various Social Ministry initiatives (Boys and Girls Club meals, batch cooking for members, etc.). 25 food bags have been given out this year. We Care kit drive will be starting soon. 31 members on shut in list (fluctuates). Cheryl suggested putting the initiatives of the Social Ministry committee in the Guiding Light.

On-going Business:

- Council profile- Susan has established a profile of council which establishes the purpose of council; outlines how effective decisions are made and communicated to church members; the importance of council members supporting one another in decision making; how to deal with grievances/complaints; how to direct complaints to the appropriate committees; and how committees have the right to make decisions under their authority (council does not need to make every decision for every committee). Questions/comments on the profile are to be directed to Susan.
- Review of request by Chris Blackstock for banner- an email request was received for permission to use the church's name on a banner for Music Healing Veterans Canada, along with other sponsor names. Council approved this request.
- Review of meeting for purchase of property- motion taken to purchase the property on Darcy Street was put to the congregation on July 8. The motion was approved by the congregation. The motion was moved by Wayne Bucholtz and seconded by Dan Dole. Secondary discussion by Susan regarding future uses of property and the potential for future funds through the wider church.
- Review of family picnic at Huglies- we were the only church who had set up with a

banner. A thank you letter was received from the organizers.

- Review of community living request- Susan has been coming in and opening the doors to enable visitation between a member of community living and their worker, with a family member. These visits have happened over the summer and Susan has noted no concerns to date.
- Thank you to non-members for donations: Susan indicated that Jean has been sending a card of thanks along with a receipt for some time now.
- 135th anniversary plans: November 4, 2018. The afternoon service will have communion with both choirs performing. All members will be invited along with other churches in the area. A sample bulletin announcement will be created and sent to other churches. Invites have been and will be sent to previous Pastors along with a request to share remembrances. An invitation will be extended to some members from the various age groups to share memories as well. Hall decorating will be done. Zion members will supply food for pot luck but do not expect invited guests to do so. The logistics need to be worked out yet.
- Stewardship committee- suggestions for establishing a stewardship committee to establish regular giving and donations, and to make the options for doing so more accessible (i.e PAR).
- Privacy committee/person: Pastor Paul is presently the church's privacy person. JP Quintal was the previous legal counsel when complaints arise; Susan will contact him to inquire if he is still interested in doing so. The main privacy issues center around vulnerable persons and ensuring the required interviews and paper work are completed in this regard. Pastor Paul suggested it may be best for someone to fulfill this role from the personnel committee? Does this role establish the need for another staff member in order to ensure that procedures are completed or will a volunteer suffice? No suggestions were offered for who might best fulfill this role at present. Sunday school, youth group, pastoral care would be primarily involved. Susan will discuss this with Diane Hammel, Personnel
- Call committee: Five-six members are needed for the call committee. Pastor Paul recommends that Blaine Sack be part of the call committee, as he will be working closely with new pastor. Scott Lange volunteered. Susan will reach out to individuals to inquire re their interest. A note will be placed in the bulletin to indicate that a call committee is being established.
- Envisioning- prior to the call committee, there is a need to establish a committee to develop the vision of the church. Pastor Paul suggests a meeting of some members of the congregation to answer questions which will direct the church's mission/vision statement. Susan may ask some of the suggested names (as noted above for the call committee) if they are interested in this committee alternatively. Pastor Paul will provide direction/clarification as needed.
- Octoberfest- October 14 is the date. Volunteers are needed. (Apple pie day is September 29...volunteers are needed as well).

Adjournment:

The meeting adjourned at 9:25pm and closed with the Lord's Prayer.

The next Church Council Meeting is scheduled for October 9, 2018 at 7pm.

Pastor Paul

- Junior Confirmation students meet the 1st Monday and the 3rd Sunday of the month
- Senior Confirmation students meet the 1st and 2nd Sunday of the month
- June 9, 2019 - Confirmation date
- November 4 - Anniversary celebration
- November 11 - Remembrance day. The service will include lessons and prayers designated for special occasions. At 11:00 we will observe 2 minutes of silence. Blaine will play the last post. To commemorate the 100th Anniversary of the end of the war, the Legion is requesting churches ring their bells 100 times at 5 second intervals beginning at sundown. Pastor Paul will contact other congregations to invite them to participate as well.
- December 15 @ 2:00 pm - Zion will host the Remembrance Service for Malcolm, Deavitt & Binhammer Funeral Home . A reception in the Parish Hall will follow this service. Staff from the funeral home will take care of ushering, set up and clean up. Blaine and the choirs have been asked to provide the music for this service.
- December 16 - Sunday School Program in the Parish Hall followed by a potluck lunch.
- December 2, 9, 16, 23 - Advent Services
- December 24 - Christmas Eve Services - Pastor Paul's grandchild will be baptized at one of the services.

Blaine Sack: Church Musician

- The organ was repaired and tuned on September 13, 2018.
- Blaine will follow up with Robert from Cassavant to clarify cost and get details/cost of a pre-Christmas organ tuning.
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Other Business:

Old Choir Music

Blaine brought some copies of old choir music for the committee to review. Much of the music is not suitable for present day. The committee decided to keep one copy of each booklet for the archives. Some will be kept to display at the 50th Anniversary of the organ to show how our music has progress over the years. Gayle will contact the Champlain Trail

Museum to see if they are interested in any of the booklets since some date back to 1904. Some of the music will be used for craft projects. All booklets that are in poor conditioned and any photocopied material will be recycled.

Altar Care Manual

- Carol has been working on the Altar Care Manual. She has provided basic instructions and a diagram. Additional information about the responsibilities of the Altar Guild chair, such as where to order wafers, get linens, buy the juice, communion cups, etc. will also be included. Carol will have the manual completed by the October meeting.
- A few volunteers are no longer available to help with Altar care. No one responded to the request for new helpers. Presently, there are about 15 people on the Altar care volunteer list.

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Cogeco Broadcasts

Gayle contacted Michael Tharby at Cogeco. She was informed they are now using HD so our church services can no longer be broadcast in their current format. Mike Montaigne will be contacted for advice on what is needed so we can resume sharing our services. Until then, Gayle will contact Cogeco requesting they let viewers know the church services will be returning once this problem is resolved. Pastor Paul will ask Jean to place an announcement in the bulletins informing people that copies of the services are available in the library.

Copyright Licences

Licences will be paid in the coming weeks. Blaine will contact Deb Ludolph about Inshallah songs to see if we need to do anything different and if the words can be projected.

Church Listing in the Petawawa Post

- The Church listing needs to be updated to include current service times, Sunday school, youth group and church website. Gayle will email the correct information.
- Another platform to advertise the church services may be Pembys' pics

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Budget items

Committee members are to let Gayle know if they have any items they want included in the budget.

Choirs

- Scott would like to see more members join the choirs. Currently there are only 2 men in the mixed choir. Announcements will be placed in the bulletin and Guiding Light. Scott is willing to make an announcement in church inviting people to join either choir. It was noted that asking individuals personally has been the most successful way of getting people involved.
- Both Blaine and Scott are interested in having the choirs do some community sharing.

Saturday Services

Both Wednesday and Saturday services are poorly attended. Although there are a number of reasons for this, it is very concerning. On average, there are 13 – 20 people at these services and 5 are volunteers. Getting volunteers is a challenge and often one volunteer has to take on several roles. The committee agreed to continue the Saturday services for the month of October. After that, they will review the attendance, discuss options and decide how to proceed.




