Finance Report: Gerry Vandersleen brought attention to the following items from the comparative income statement and balance statement:

- The annual budget (2020) was discussed and agreed upon by council. The budget will be presented at the annual general meeting.
- The church ended up in a surplus situation at year end. Gerry is recommending the creation of a general reserve account on the balance sheet in order to have a back-up fund. Discussion amongst council members ensued. Motion reads: "We so move to create a general reserve account on the balance sheet. Funds can be used where needed and can be donated to and be free of any designations. Some or all surplus funds from year end will go to this account." Moved by: Wilmer Verch. Seconded by: Dan Dole.Approved unanimously by council.
 - Endowment constitution requires a financial review to be performed every 5 years. This year a review is required. To this end, a motion to was presented by Gerry, which reads: "We so move to direct authorization to the treasurer to have a financial review completed for the endowment fund. Costs to be paid from the 2019 interest from the endowment. Work to be done by Kathy Hoffman and the firm of Dean Sinclair." Moved by: Rick Gerundin. Secondedby: Cheryl Sack. Approved unanimously by council. Draft endowment ballot needs identified, and internal and external needs were discussed.

Pastor's Report: Pastor Stephen Scheidt gave the Pastors Report as follows:

- The Eucharist was celebrated at Heritage Manor and Pinewood, as part of the rotation for Anglican and Lutheran clergy.
- Visits, with communion, were made to homebound and palliative parishioners, and to the hospital.
- Funerals were held for Ralph Baynham, Audrey Lehman, and Grant Klawitter.
- Worship planning with Blaine.

- Assisted with December's youth/children's activities.
- Attended Ottawa Valley clergy meeting in Eganville and Petawawa, attended by Lutheran and Anglican clergy.
- Presided at our three Christmas Eve services.
- Helped out with morning preparations for the Community Christmas Dinner at Zion on Christmas day.
- Started bible study on Monday, January 13.
- Experimented with a simple Baptismal liturgythat replaces spoken text with music and lets the mages speak for themselves. It had been presented at the National Worship event last summer for Anglicans and Lutherans.
- Worked with confirmands on a few activities. Second year confirmands served as readers on the December 15 service; some first-year students served as processional acolytes on Christmas Eve at all celebrations.
- Pastor Stephen adds: "I battled a cold this past month, so I was probably not always at my best. It is a pesky, persistent little bug."

Correspondence:

- A thank you note was received from Kevin and JeanRutz, expressing appreciation for the Christmas bonus.
- A thank you note was also received from Pastor Stephen and Jan for their Christmas gift.

Committee Reports:

- Propertyreport was given by Wilmer Verch: the ceiling has been repaired; the snow removal contract is going fine; boilers are working well; and the new custodian is working out well.
- Social ministry held a soup and sandwich luncheon on January 12; despite the lower attendance due to the snowstorm, \$220 was raised for the Renfrew Hospice. Tuesday January 21 is the next boys and girls club dinner; a sign-up sheet it outside of the kitchen.

Welcome and Opening Devotions: Gayle welcomed everyone. Pastor Stephen opened the meeting with a prayer.

Approval of Previous Month's Minutes: Completed online

Approval of Agenda: An additional item added (Projection of songs)

Committee Reports:

Pastor Stephen's report:

- Pastor Stephen reviewed past practices of Zion's Lenten Services.
- This Lenten season he would like to focus on Lenten hymns for his services looking at the texts and the images projected in them.
- The Night Prayer liturgy will be used.
- Pastor Stephen and Blaine will meet next week to plan the services.
- Gayle will contact Debbie Wegner to let her know that worship assistants are needed for Wednesday evening services.

Blaine's Report:

- Blaine spoke with an employee at Ottawa Pianos and confirmed the grand piano will be in the church by Easter.
- Since sufficient funds have been raised for the grand piano, the Lenten group has generously offered to donate the \$5,000 they originally earmarked for the grand piano to the organ fund. Approximately \$40,000 is needed to do the second phase of refurbishing the organ.
- Blaine continues to sort through old music keeping pieces that can be used again, archiving

some and discarding anything that can no longer be used.

• Blaine purchased some new anthems for the choir using funds that were donated for this purpose.

Altar Care:

- The committee discussed the need to purchase new candle holders for the Altar since the crystal ones are chipping. After some discussion it was agreed that the brass ones currently on the Altar suit the space and can be used for now.
- Carol will continue to look for new candle holders that would be appropriate for the church
- Since the middle-sized flagon is broken, the large flagon is being used and placed on the credence table.
- Ushers are reminded to add the guides to the candles to prevent them from burning down too quickly.
- Portable communion sets are needed for Pastoral Care and Pastor Stephen. Pastor Stephen found information that indicated several sets had been purchased in 2013. Gayle will speak with Suzanne Schultz to see if she has any information on where the sets can be found.

Miscellaneous

- Once Blaine starts playing, "Lamb of God", ushers should start getting people up for communion. The choirs will go first and the congregation will join in line behind them.
- When new or unfamiliar hymns are included in worship, the Pastor will make an announcement suggesting members use the hymn books. This will also be included in the bulletin. Since many people do not read music, having the words projected as well is helpful. The choirs can help lead the congregation when singing new pieces.
- During the children homily the Pastor will use the portable microphone.
- The Children's Song Books will be used again in the future, either biweekly or monthly before the children go to Sunday school.

Did You Know

In this issue of the Guiding Light and in future issues I will be sharing information with you regarding various institutions and groups that touch our lives in Renfrew County. I hope to provide an awareness of what they do. If you or someone you know is in a position to use the services they offer this article may be a starting point for you. Almost all of these groups need financial support as well as volunteer support, so you may want to consider that as well.

I have chosen Hospice Renfrew for my first report. My family has recently used the services offered by this wonderful facility and I want to share some information about them. If you would like more detail please talk to me. Susan Dupuis

Hospice care is a type of health care that focuses on the <u>palliation</u> of a <u>terminally ill</u> patient's pain and symptoms and attending to their emotional and spiritual needs. Hospice care has a palliative focus without curative intent. Usually, it is used for people with no further options for curing their disease or in people who have decided not to pursue further options that are arduous, likely to cause more symptoms, and not likely to succeed.



Hospice Renfrew is a six bed palliative care provides residence providing full time 24/7 nursing care. Our expert palliative team physical, emotional and spiritual comfort, free of charge, to all residents of Renfrew County and the nearby area.

In the home-like and tranquil environment at Hospice, families are part of a compassionate end-of-life care that celebrates life. We help our residents and families come home for final closure and as fully as possible live remaining precious moments without suffering. Hospice is a vital community hub for palliative and bereavement services. We are dedicated to improving the quality of living and dying.

Mission and Objectives

To assist terminally ill persons to live as fully as possible while maintaining their dignity and comfort, as well as providing support to family and friends.

- To provide pain and symptom management
- To improve the quality of life for people with advanced disease, and their families through the relief of concerns, whether physical, emotional, social or spiritual
- To preserve the quality of life, dignity and independence of the person
- To support family wellness and community involvement
- To affirm life and regard death as a normal process, and neither hasten or postpone death

- To assist the bereaved in dealing with grief
- To respect the work with all other disciplines and agencies, encouraging through education and good communication a wider knowledge base of palliative care

Funding Partners

Providing residential hospice care and support to individuals and their families is financially demanding. It takes many partners to make it all work and come together.

We gratefully acknowledge annual financial contributions by the Ontario Ministry of Health and Long-Term Care through the Champlain Local Health Integration Network (LHIN). These contributions partially fund our nursing salaries.

Additionally, each year Hospice must **fundraise approximately** 60% of its annual operational budget. That means about **\$600,000** must come from local donors, community groups and volunteers in our community.

Eastern Synod News

Your congregation might be eligible for a grant from a charitable foundation or government program, but there's an art to writing a successful grant application.

The Eastern Synod and Anglican Diocese of Ottawa are jointly sponsoring a grant-writing workshop in Ottawa on Saturday, May 2. The presenter will be Jody Orr, a skilled facilitator who has decades of experience as a grant-writer. She will explain where to look for grants, what funders expect in an application, and how to present your case in the most effective way.

Participants in 2019 rated the program very highly; 98% said they would "definitely" or "probably" recommend it to a colleague. A typical comment on the evaluation form said, "Content and presenter were fantastic -- I feel like I have come away with a good amount of info that is extremely helpful."

Participants at previous events have included pastors, council chairs, treasurers and other congregational leaders with an interest in finding funding for ministry projects.

In a few weeks we will send a flyer with details of time and place and a link to the registration form. In the meantime, why not mark the date in your calendar and pass this information along to anyone else you think might be interested?

I hope to see you on May 2 in Ottawa.


