As you read this newsletter, our parish council and some of our committees will be reviewing guidelines from Public health, our governments, and the Eastern Synod, and making plans for our Church as we come out of closure in September. Our life together will look, feel and even sound different than it did before. For a time we may still have to delay some activities that we dearly loved and are so much a part of the life of our parish. Others will simply require a modified approach and some creativity. We are faithful and resilient and we will adapt to the new normal.

I am thankful for all who have worked so diligently these last few months to see that our recorded worship is shared with as many as possible, and in printed form for any without internet access. You might be surprised at how many have been involved in this ongoing project and how creative and resourceful they have been as well.

I have been in our parish for nine months now, half of that time during the Covid restrictions – a rather unusual start for my parish ministry here with situations I never would have dreamed possible in normal parish work. My greatest regret is that we cannot celebrate, in our Church, the lives of our faithful beloved ones who have died, although we have done our best to say farewell to them at the graveside, while commending them to God's care and celebrating the faith that gives us such great hope.

At the time of my writing this note, my visits at the hospital are restricted to palliative visits, though, recently, I may visit you in the hospital if you request a pastoral visit. However, I will be the only visitor you will be allowed that day in hospital and family will not be able to visit that day, which would prove difficult for many.

I look forward to seeing many of you again in September as we once again begin gathering for worship at Zion. Until then, I welcome your phone calls and emails, and pray for the time when we can gather again.

### When Will We Be Worshiping Together Again?

Last month I advised the members that we will not be holding in-person services until September 1<sup>st</sup>, at the earliest. This was the advice of Bishop Pryce and as your council we agreed. The safety of our members comes first.

A synod task force has been created to help us to prepare for holding our inperson services. There are so very many things to consider and have in place. We need to make sure we are complying with our government directives as well.

We are presently at what is called the Red stage. No in-person worship, weddings or funerals. Very limited pastoral care and visits. Small meetings allowed (our taping of our worship services or council meetings). The church building remains closed to the public.

We will be advising when we are able to move to the Amber stage. At this stage we will have in-person worship. Masks will be required, Holy Communion with bread only, no singing or sharing of the peace.

This stage will also include many changes such as posting of signs regarding self-assessment, handwashing and wearing of masks, physical distancing and limited number of members in the sanctuary at one time, movement into and

and out of our spaces ie: 1 door in 1 door out, additional cleaning and disinfecting the areas used, no worship books or other materials in the pews, no coffee hour and many more.

The council will be meeting to discuss these items with our Worship and Music committee so that we can be prepared to open safely.

The last stage is Green. We will then be back to our old normal with a few changes still in place.

So, when will that be? We do not have a firm date but it will remain after September  $1^{st}$ .

I felt it was important to let you know that we are continually looking to the future. A day when we will be back together. A day we are all longing for.

# We Are Excited!

On Sunday May 10<sup>th</sup> we posted our first on-line service. These can be accessed through our church website, our church Facebook page or our church webpage on YouTube. On average we have had 140 views of our weekly services (each view may have more than 1 person watching). This is great! Reaching out is so important right now when we are not able to be together. We also produce 11 DVDs that are dropped off to member's homes. Our method of taping is very creative. We use a personally owned IPad as well as the DVD recorder in the bakony. We project the words of the hymns on the wall and then tape them. We only have the microphone on the IPad so the sound may be a little weak at times. We have had a few technical issues as we bump along but all in all we are able to create something that is not too bad from a technical stand point. The messages we received are always wonderful.

We have decided that we will continue to tape and post on line, create the DVDs for delivery and be on Cogeco as well oncewe are able to be back together again. We can't, however, continue taping using the equipment we presently have. With the new equipment we will be able to edit, add, and delete. We won't have to tape the words being projected onto the wall but have them inserted properly. We have reached out for quotations on upgrading our present video equipment. Once these are in and we have had time to make a decision on what will best suit our needs we will be having it installed. It will then take 1 videographer instead of the "group" that now makes this happen.

This equipment will come at a cost. We are opening an account for the upgrade of our video equipment for all who feel this is something that they would like to support.

This is an important part of our ministry. If a member is unable to attend worship on a Sunday morning, they will still be able to participate by viewing the taped service. If you are a Cogeco customer you will be able to find us on your TV on Sunday mornings. Our past members who now live out of town can join us for a Sunday morning service. Imagine if someone happened to be looking for a new church family and finds us on-line. They can get to know us a little before taking the brave step to join us in person. Or maybe someone sees our service on line or on the TV and it brings comfort to them. You no longer have to be in the building to hear Gods' word.

We received a note from Waveny Kenney. Here is what she said. "Just a note to say thanks for your Sunday services on line. I have no Lutheran church where I live so I worship in an Anglican church. To see my home church and all the familiar faces helping with the services is a blessing to me. I especially appreciate the hymns projected on the wall which allows me to join in the service. Again, many thanks, Waveny Kenney

Pastor Stephen and Jan Scheidt received a phone call on July 12<sup>th</sup> from Lyna Kiviste from New Westminster, British Columbia. She said she appreciated Pastor Stephen's homily, was happy to see the inside of the church, and that we had a good organist. Jan also received an email from a former ELW member who commented that she enjoyed having the words projected on the wall so she could sing along and participate in the service.

We are excited! Knowing that we are reaching out to so many more people, both near and far.
