Committee Reports:

- Property- no report.
- Worship & Music– Denise gave an update from worship and music. The offering is now being brought up to the alter. Mid-week services on the second Wednesday of the month, 10:30am, are resuming. Ash Wednesday service will be on March 2, followed by Lenten service every Wednesday. A service at Camp Lutherlyn in the fall is a possibility.
- Social Ministry-Denise discussed the endowment suggestions. Bulletins will be available on Monday with the printed sermon and ready for delivery. Coldest Night of The Year walk is on February 26, the proceeds of which go to The Grind. The team’s

goal is \$3000 and we are almost there. March 15 will be meal prep for shut ins. Coffee hour will resume February 27.

Ongoing business:

- Endowment ballot- Gerry indicates Doug Maliff is preparing the endowment ballot. Endowment recommendations have been made through the Social Ministry Group. Outside needs include: Cancer Care Campaign at PRH; First Step Options; Robbie Dean Center; Bernadette McCann House; Carefor. Inside needs: building fund, organ fund.
- Foodbank- legal counsel is preparing an agreement with details being worked out. This agreement is anticipated within the next week. The agreement will be discussed at a separate congregational meeting once it has been completed. The agreement will be up for congregational discussion and approval at this meeting.

New business:

- Committees needing members- new members are required for council as council is at the bare minimum numbers right now. Pastoral care requires a re-start along with some new members. Personnel committee requires a council member and a manager. Council is asked to make some calls to people who would be interested in recruiting members for these positions. Pastoral care works with the pastor and our shut ins and would be working closely with the Pastor to keep in touch with them. Karen volunteered to sit on the Pastoral Care Committee. Jill Kellough and Patty Wegner have volunteered to make calls for recruiting new council members.
- New pictorial directory- a new congregational pictorial directory will be published this year. Two weeks in March have been reserved for pictures, March 8-12 and March 15-19.
- Annual meeting- will be held Sunday, February 20 following the service in the sanctuary. The agenda is very brief. New business will include a report from the new Youth and Family Ministry Team.
- Motion from Council regarding staffing- council discussed a motion for hiring Blaine as a full-time staff member. The motion reads: "Council moves that Blaine Sack be hired as a salaried employee with benefits in the role of Church Musician". Moved by: Denise Schizkoske. Seconded: Jill Kellough.
- Covid- any decisions regarding worship regarding Covid guidelines will be left to the worship and music committee.

Committee Reports:

Pastor Scott:

- The choirs will assist with leading the evening Lenten Services.
- Sunday services will use Setting 4. There will be no Cantic of Praise.
- There are two upcoming baptisms.
- March 20th will be a healing service with holy communion. Further discussion will take place to determine if these services should be held monthly.
- During Pastor Scott's absence on March 27th, Ellen Vandersleen and Wayne Kirk will lead the service. There will not be communion that Sunday.
- The current practice of having the offering plates at the front and back doors will remain in place.

Blaine Sack: Church Musician

- Choirs have resumed and are busy with the Lenten Evening Services and preparing for Easter.
- Blaine followed up with Robert Hillier from Casavant for clarification about the increased cost for the 2nd phase of the organ restoration. Robert explained that several factors, including the effects of Covid, contributed to the price adjustment. At this time, there is no urgency for the repairs and we can wait until 2024 for the necessary work to be completed.
- Gayle will put an organ restoration update in the bulletin.

- Organ tuning should take place by the end of March or early in April.
- Blaine will contact Mitchell at Ottawa Pianos to arrange for the installation of the dolly for the piano in the Parish Hall and to have the grand pianos tuned.
- Blaine requested 10 more copies of the “Holden Evening Prayer” books. Pastor Scott will order them.
- Blaine plans and organizes his hymn selections weeks in advance and then shares his list with the Pastor.

Lenten and Easter Services:

- Services are scheduled for Maundy Thursday at 7:00 pm, Good Friday at 10:00 am and Easter Sunday at 8:00 am and 10:00 am.

“Living Stones” Worship Service:

- This casual worship service will take place on April 10th in the Parish Hall.
- It will be a second, informal service, held after the coffee hour at 12:30 pm.
- The service will include contemporary music, videos, communion on occasion, and non-traditional liturgy.

Updating Software:

- Diane Hammel explained copyright rules and regulations in regards to video usage. Currently we have a licensing agreement with *CCLI* and *One License*. Use of other videos are not covered by these agreements so permission from the copyright holder must be obtained. Diane would then add the information to the credits at the end of the video. Diane will share additional information and Pastor Scott will do some further investigation.
- The committee thanked Diane and expressed their appreciation for all her efforts.

Organ Restoration

In 2017 after the first phase of our organ restoration was completed, Casavant recommended that the second phase of the restoration which involves replacing the “leathers” in all the pipes should be completed in 5 years, which brings us to 2022. The estimated cost for this work has gone up substantially from the initial estimate of approximately \$45,000.00 to \$65,000.00. Since we only have \$35,809.00 in the organ restoration fund, we do not have the funds to complete the required work this year. As a result, Casavant was contacted to see if this second phase could be put off for a year or two. Their response was this: “At this point in time the organ is working well with the leathers not appearing to be a concern, so we could potentially push this phase back two years. Bear in mind, folks, that in two year’s time, the cost will also be higher. Right now the organ valuation is \$1,200,000.00.” The Worship & Music Committee will keep you updated re - the growth in the organ restoration fund.

Used postage stamps to support “On Eagles Wings” who are volunteer Bible Camp teams who fly north from Yellowknife, NWT to the far reaches of the Mackenzie Delta and teach the Inuvialuit people and children about Jesus. A Guide To Wearing Masks At Zion Lutheran Church

March 21st signified the beginning phases of re-opening the province of Ontario. You will no longer be required to wear masks in the church. We ask you to please consider wearing masks in densely populated areas of the church for the protection of yourself and others. Sunday mornings and other worship services are suggested dates. The worship leaders will continue to wear masks as they have close contact with people at Holy Communion.

What does it mean to be LIVING STONES?

The term living stones in 1 Peter 2:5 is used as a metaphor to illustrate the secure and intimate relationship believers have with Jesus, who is described in the previous verse as the “living Stone” (1 Peter 2:4). Together, these two verses picture how Christ and His followers are joined by God: “As you come to God, the living Stone—rejected by people but chosen by God and precious to God—you also, like living stones, are being built into a spiritual house to be a holy priesthood, offering spiritual sacrifices acceptable to God through

Jesus Christ” (1 Peter 2:4–5).

The foundation of God’s building is, Jesus Christ, the “living Stone.” The “living stones,” in turn, are believers who come to Jesus and place their lives upon this foundation. The living Stone is “precious” to those who believe (1 Peter 2:7), but some people reject the Living Stone in order to build their lives their own way, not God’s way (see Psalm 118:22 and Luke 6:46–49). Unbelievers cast this living Stone aside, not caring that Jesus is the only true foundation upon which they can build securely (1 Corinthians 3:11).

In a metaphor much like that of the living Stone, Jesus is described as the chief cornerstone in Ephesians 2:19–22. Peter references Jesus as the cornerstone in Acts 4:11–12, stating that “salvation is found in no one else, for there is no other name under heaven given to people by which we must be saved.” God accepts no one who refuses to become a part of God's building. And God is just like all builders—God has a foundation upon which all workers must build (Matthew 7:24–27).

Believers, then, are the “living stones” of the church that Jesus promised to build (Matthew 16:18). As living stones, we have new life in Christ (2 Corinthians 5:17). As integral parts of the building of God, we have security in Christ (John 6:37). As the Master Builder, God places living stones just where God wants us to be (1 Corinthians 12:18). As living stones, we are connected to one another in the body of Christ (Romans 12:5). Our Lord, the foundation Stone, is alive forevermore and will never crumble. We will be supported eternally.

Peter goes on to describe the function of the living stones: to “declare the praises” of Him who called us out of the darkness of sin into the light of life and glory (1 Peter 2:9). This is the “job description” of a living stone: a speaker of praise, a declarer of truth and love and light. The spiritual house God is building is designed for God's glory, and we, the living stones, glorify the God in all we do (1 Corinthians 10:31).

We will have a meeting of those who would like to help with music on Thursday, March 31st at 630pm in the LOUNGE by the elevator at church. Please bring your preferred instrument, a binder and a music stand if you have one. If you don't play an instrument but sing or have rhythm we need you too! If you are just curious and want to check things out, please come and find your place praising God. We will meet for approximately 1 hour and discuss our next meeting at that time.
