JAM JAR FUNDRAISER

It is that time of year that your Social Ministry Committee is launching the Jam Jar Fundraiser. This year we have chosen **Gifts From the Heart** Program from CLWR (Canadian Lutheran World Relief). This is an exceptional program that assists families which in turn leads to self sufficiency. It also helps their local economy.

Depending on the monies raised will determine how we will help. For example last year \$75.00 would purchase a pair of goats for a family. These goats would provide milk to help feed their families. The goats would also breed in time to promote long term growth. A pair of oxen and plough was \$500.00. With a pair of oxen more soil can be tilled more quickly allowing time for other activities such as attending school. Some gifts are matched 3x (the oxen and plough) or 4x (Emergency food) thanks to Canadian Foodgrains and the Canadian Government. Our money has the potential to go far.

You may pick up a jar at the registration table to fill with change or other. Cheques are always welcome. If you wish to have a tax receipt, we will need your name and address or envelope number if there is cash only in the jar. This campaign will run until the first

week of Advent - November 29, 2020. Thank you for your generous support.

⁹After this I looked, and there was a great multitude that no one could count, from every nation, from all tribes and peoples and languages, standing before the throne and before the Lamb, robed in white, with palm branches in their hands. ¹⁰They cried out in a loud voice, saying, “Salvation belongs to our God who is seated on the throne, and to the Lamb!” ¹¹And all the angels stood around the throne and around the elders and the four living creatures, and they fell on their faces before the throne and worshiped God, ¹²singing, “Amen! Blessing and glory and wisdom and thanksgiving and honor and power and might be to our God forever and ever! Amen.” ¹³Then one of the elders addressed me, saying, “Who are these, robed in white, and where have they come from?” ¹⁴I said to him, “Sir, you are the one that knows.” Then he said to me, “These are they who have come out

of the great ordeal; they have washed their robes and made them white in the blood of the Lamb. ¹⁵For this reason they are before the throne of God, and worship him day and night within his temple, and the one who is seated on the throne will shelter them. ¹⁶They will hunger no more, and thirst no more; the sun will not strike them, nor any scorching heat; ¹⁷for the Lamb at the center of the throne will be their shepherd, and he will guide them to springs of the water of life, and God will wipe away every tear from their eyes.”

Gospel: Matthew 5:1 - 12

The holy gospel according to Matthew. **Glory to you, O Lord.**

and taught them, saying:

³“Blessed are the poor in spirit, for theirs is the kingdom of heaven.

⁴“Blessed are those who mourn, for they will be comforted.

⁵“Blessed are the meek, for they will inherit the earth.

⁶“Blessed are those who hunger and thirst for righteousness, for they will be filled.

⁷“Blessed are the merciful, for they will receive mercy.

⁸“Blessed are the pure in heart, for they will see God.

⁹“Blessed are the peacemakers, for they will be called children of God.

¹⁰“Blessed are those who are persecuted for righteousness’ sake, for theirs is the kingdom of heaven.

¹¹“Blessed are you when people revile you and persecute you and utter all kinds of evil against you falsely on my account. ¹²Rejoice and be glad, for your reward is great in heaven, for in the same way they persecuted the prophets who were before you.”

The gospel of our Lord. **Praise to you, O Christ.**

Homily: Some of the most beautiful scriptures that Christians have, like today’s first reading, come from the Book of Revelation. They speak of the hope that is ours as we live by faith and the victory of Christ our Lord over death and the power of evil. They bring comfort and courage to the faithful.

The only problem is that when you share a reading from Revelation that you cherish in public, many people will roll their eyes at the oddness of it all and you will probably be branded a fanatic.

Many of the incredibly bizarre images in the Book of Revelation have double meanings. Most of them are a portrayal of the

Emperor, who insisted that Christians worship him as a God, or a culture or country that was hostile to Christians. If something is really weird in the Book of Revelation, there is a good chance that only early Christians knew what it meant and chances are it was about someone or something who was making their life miserable. The good news in the Book of Revelation for persecuted Christians is that the persecutors and all that troubles them will have their time and then they will come to an end. The final victory belongs to Christ and those who bear his name.

Some of the meanings of the images in Revelation is now lost to us. We should remember that not all scripture is about us and not all scripture is for us in our time and place, but that it was helpful to someone, in some time, and in some place. Not everything has to always be about us to be edifying. If it helped some Christians get through their darker days than that alone makes it worth cherishing, even if we do not have a clue what it means.

The other problem is that Revelation has been used by some as a predictor of the future, a book that can be made to foresee and promote a wide range of strange beliefs, most of which have very little to do with the Gospel of Christ.

What is more likely is that the Book of Revelation is a collection of circular writings all saying similar things, just in different times and sometimes to different groups. Revelation is more a collection of writings to bring encouragement and comfort than prophesy.

Almost everything that was written in the Book of Revelation was for Christians living under terrible persecution, struggling to be hopeful and faithful. Reading Revelation, their persecutors really had no idea what the writer was saying to his faithful ones - that God would deliver them from their oppressors and from the hands of all who sought to do them harm. Those words also spoke of

the hope that was theirs in spite of everything this world could throw at them - even death and the often brutal treatment they experienced at the hands of those who persecute the faithful ones.

What the Book of Revelation is about, mostly, is our trust and our hope that is in God. It gives us a beautiful image of God coming down to greet and welcome the beloved ones with tender-hearted grace, wiping away our tears, freeing us from our fears...and the Lord taking us to himself, so that where he is, we may be also.

As the Book of Revelation brings the Bible to a close, it does so by saying that our story with God will never be over, because our life goes on forever. The God we see creating us in the first book of the Bible and placing us in Eden (the Garden of God's Delight) in the last book of the Bible now tells us we will be taken to paradise, to the Garden of the New Jerusalem in the Holy City of God.

If you do not know the stories of our faith this will sound like a bunch of nonsense; but those who have been raised in the faith and in the stories of our faith know that God has always wanted nothing more for us than to live in paradise. In the end that, by God's tender-hearted kindness and grace alone, is our destination. Nothing and no one can take that away from us.

And so we gather on this All Saints' Sunday proclaiming and celebrating that the final victory will always be Christ's, and that even now we share his victory over sin and death with our beloved ones who have gone to paradise before us. We shall see them again, and then our hearts will be filled with joy. That is more than enough reason to rejoice and good cause to celebrate, this day and forevermore. Amen.
