JAM JAR FUNDRAISER - It is that time of year that your Social Ministry Committee is launching the Jam Jar Fundraiser. This year we have chosen **Gifts From the Heart** Program from CLWR (Canadian Lutheran World Relief). This is an exceptional program that assists families which in turn leads to self sufficiency. It also helps their local economy. Depending on the monies raised will determine how we will help.

For example last year \$75.00 would purchase a pair of goats for a family. These goats would provide milk to help feed their families. The goats would also breed in time to promote long term growth. A pair of oxen and plough was \$500.00. With a pair of oxen more soil can be tilled more quickly allowing time for other activities such as attending school. Some gifts are matched 3x (the oxen and plough) or 4x (Emergency food) thanks to Canadian Foodgrains and the Canadian Government. Our money has the potential to go far.

You may pick up a jar at the registration table to fill with change or other. Cheques are always welcome. If you wish to have a tax receipt, we will need your name and address or envelope number if there is cash only in the jar. This campaign will run until the first week of Advent; November 29, 2020. The gospel of our Lord. **Praise to you, O Christ.**

Homily: If you ever had the opportunity to read the Book of Lamentations, you will quickly notice that it is very aptly named. Almost of all this little book in Hebrew Scripture is a litany of complaint, misery and sorrow. It is, for the most part, certainly not a book of comfort. But, if you want to know that someone shares your misery in life, or you are feeling all alone in your sadness, the Book of Lamentations is definitely the place to go.

Tradition says the book was written by the prophet Jeremiah; though some of it references events that happened after Jeremiah's life, so it may be a compilation of laments – some of them Jeremiah's, perhaps. We may never know for sure who wrote the Book of Lamentations or who may have compiled it. The problem is, back then, you could write or collect something in someone's honour and say it came from them. These days, that would probably get you into a lot of trouble. Personally, I would rather not meet someone who spends their time writing or collecting laments because I doubt they would be the life of the party.

Laments do serve a purpose, because they remind us that God will listen to our sorrows, our soul's complaint, our struggles, and that God has compassion on us. They also allow us to be completely honest with God, and truthful. God does not expect us to be endlessly cheerful and suffering is a part of our life, even as the blessed children of God, even as faithful Christians. God

does not expect us to pretend that everything is always fine. Our Lord certainly never did and he also spoke words of lament in times of struggle, suffering or sorrow.

Yet, in the midst of this somewhat depressing Book of the Hebrew scriptures, filled with lamenting, we find one of the most beautiful expressions of the hope and joy that we have in the tender-hearted loving-kindness of God we call Grace: “The steadfast love of the Lord never ends. Great is Thy Faithfulness.” It is an expression of our deep faith even in the midst of the world’s suffering, sorrow and pain...and maybe even growing out of deep sadness because it is the source of all true hope.

Our life in Christ, our living in God’s Grace, does not depend on how we feel. It does not even depend on our faithfulness. What it depends on, entirely, is God’s faithfulness towards us and God’s refusal to let us go and God’s desire to hold us in mercy and love. Whether we are frolicking in the fields as God’s little lambs or denying Christ in the courtyard like Apostle Peter, we still belong to our gracious God because that is God’s choice for us and for our lives. God’s mercy will be new for us each day as we live in the gift of Grace.

Faith is a gift of the Spirit, not a work on our part. Some of us are really going to struggle to live with that gift, and for others it will be a breeze. In the end, none of that really matters, because all that does matter is that God loves us and we shall forever share the life of his Son, the Risen One as a precious gift that no one and no thing can take away from us. We live every day in the gift of our Baptism and in the peace that comes from knowing we belong to God and we are cherished by God as the beloved ones.

It is good to say how much that means to us, to affirm it and confirm it...and I am sure it warms the heart of God and makes

the angels sing for joy. And so we celebrate today in the best way we can, bringing our praise and thanksgiving to God, forever rejoicing in the tender-hearted kindness of God in our lives and especially in the lives of our confirmands on this holy day. **Amen.**
