From The Other Pastor

A new year is now ahead of us. This is another wonderful chance to start over or change direction. We are still in the Christmas season looking towards Epiphany. The three wise men - Magi - are on the path to discovering Jesus.

Our Christmas nativity scenes often include the magi who patiently followed a star, recognizing that it would lead them to something profound and life-changing. What we sometimes forget is that this journey took a *long time*. The magi didn't make it for the birth. But they did make it. They weren't always sure of the path they were to take, but they trusted that if they followed the star, the path would become clear.

That's the way it is for us as well. As we follow Jesus, the path may not always seem clear, but we have a star to follow – a map of sorts, given to us for our journey. That map is Scripture. The star wasn't the destination for the wise men, but it did guide them to where they needed to go. In the same way, Scripture isn't our destination, but it does map the path toward the purpose and future God has created for each one of us.

Scripture isn't the destination, however; and it may not always feel complete as we try to use it to move toward the destination God has created for us. In fact, we're told that there were many things that Jesus did and many God-events that people saw and experienced that aren't even written down. But we are also told that there is enough written down, the map is detailed enough, to be able to come to believe in Jesus Christ as God's means of salvation and restoration (John 20). As we come to believe, as our faith is strengthened, we become more able to move God closer and closer to the center of our lives, trusting that God's Word will provide the instructions we need to reach our destination.

Even in the best of circumstances, there will be times when the path God has laid before us seems unclear. We may be uncertain about where God is leading us. We may feel insecure about our future and God's purpose for us. Yet, even amid uncertainty we must remind ourselves that everything we need to know has been given to us in the context of God's Word.

Just as the magi trusted that the star would lead them to something life-changing, we trust that the clues that have guided us thus far will continue to lead us toward God's future. With that trust, we can step out in faith, confident that as we commit ourselves more and more to living out God's Word, a path will appear that will lead us in the right direction.

God spoke through the prophet Jeremiah, saying, "I know the plans I have for you...They are plans for good and not for disaster, to give you a future and a hope." (29:11, NLT) As you pray and fast in this first month of 2023, I pray you will keep this passage in your mind, remembering that God uses God's Word to reveal God's path to you. And I pray as well, that you would be a light in the lives of others, enabling them to see God's path as well.

Worship and Music: 'Further' Update on the Organ Restoration -

In the December Guiding Light, an update was given by our Chair of Worship and Music, Gayle Seegmiller, on Phase II of the organ's restoration. Please refer to last month's newsletter for the 'numbers', in terms of the money currently in the organ fund, and cost of the project. Remember that Phase I of the organ's restoration was completed back in 2017, which involved a full maintenance of pretty much everything that you can 'see' as part of the organ when you look up to the balcony, along with repairs to the wind chests and main organ console. This second and FINAL part of the restoration will involve the releathering of all original internal parts that one cannot 'see', such as the wind chest actions (pouch boards, stop actions, primaries, offset actions) of all the divisions of the pipe organ. Zion's Casavant organ has 3 keyboards, also known as manuals, referred to as the Great, Swell, and Positiv, along with a 32-note pedal board which is played with the feet. This 'releathering' phase, or Part 2 of 2 of the organ's restoration, does not refer to the installation of new leather belts or leather straps, but rather involves the replacing of all, now old, small leather pieces under all pipes, as well as leather pieces and stripping used to hold together stop control switches, that over time can develop tears, rendering an entire 'stop' or sound dead, such as all notes producing the sound of an oboe, viola, or flute, just to name a few. Zion's organ has over 30 different stops, each with 61 keys that play 61 individual pipes. One dead note could affect one entire stop, which could have a ripple effect on affecting other mechanisms associated with one entire section or division of the organ, making things unplayable, and very costly\$ to fix.

Each pipe in the organ has a small leather pouch under it, which can vary in size between that of a quarter and a loonie! Each pouch controls the air to the one pipe. The releathering of pipe valve actions and pressure regulating bellows, like that of an accordion, are necessary in the long term. Generally, after 50 years these leather pouches and other leather parts can start to fail, and Zion's organ turned 50 years old in 2019. So far the organ has been holding together well, but Casavant's technicians have noticed over the last year some of the leather is starting to harden and become wrinkled. Zion's organ has over 2100 pipes, meaning that over 2100 of these small, thin leather pouches have to be replaced, and most times these leather pouches are punched and formed by hand, not by a machine! Presently Casavant, the builder of Zion's organ, has releathered most of their organs installed from 1963 to 1965, and are working their way up the years. Once restored Zion's organ will be given another 50 plus years of new life!

The rate of leather deterioration is dependent upon air pollutants and tanning procedures, or quality of the leather used by the organ builder. Over time combination actions and switching systems can become unreliable, due to 'leaks' from cracks in the leather, allowing air to escape and compromising the supposed 'enclosed' wind system. Climate changes, in and outside of the church, can also affect the different materials and metal used in pipe making, along with compromising the leather, high quality canvas, rubber cloth and wood, used to construct the wind chests or 'lungs' of the organ, and other internal components of the instrument.

Work on this final phase of the organ's restoration would commence in the spring of 2024. Removal of all parts on site would start after Easter of next year, which is March 31; therefore, dismantling of the organ could happen as early as April 2, 2024. The organ will be out of commission and not playable for several months, post Easter and into Pentecost. The releathering process could take up to 3 months in the Builder's workshops. The re-installation of all removed parts would happen in August of next year, followed by an extensive tuning. Payments to the Builder, being Casavant Freres, are required upon: (1) signing of the contract or 'memo of agreement', which happened on November 30th, 2023; (2) dismantling of the organ and removal of all parts from the church; (3) when all parts have been repaired, worked on and are ready for shipment from the Builder's workshops back to Zion; and (4) after the re-installation and a full tuning are completed.

In the New Year an Organ Restoration Committee will be formed, and fund-raising initiatives will be planned, possibly including an organ recital, and hopefully a Spring Fling Festival of Music, much like the special Festival of Music concert held in November, that celebrated Zion's 140th Anniversary. Please feel free to ask whatever questions you have, or if I can better explain any of the technical details and restoration work that will be performed. Anyone and everyone is always welcome to join me up at the organ. Have you ever sat upstairs or wondered what it's like to hear or feel the organs presence in the balcony? You might even see some funky socks at the organ bench. Thank you to the people of Zion for your continued support of the organ, and our Music Ministry.
