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Lent: a Journey of Repentance, Forgiveness, and Healing

As he walked along, he saw a man blind from birth. ² His disciples asked him, “Rabbi, who sinned, this man or his parents, that he was born blind?” ³ Jesus answered, “Neither this man nor his parents sinned; he was born blind so that God’s works might be revealed in him. ⁴ We must work the works of him who sent me while it is day; night is coming when no one can work. ⁵ As long as I am in the world, I am the light of the world.” ⁶ When he had said this, he spat on the ground and made mud with the saliva and spread the mud on the man’s eyes, ⁷ saying to him, “Go, wash in the pool of Siloam”. Then he went and washed and came back able to see.

A Man born blind receives sight - John 9:1-7

During the month of March we are entering the 40 day journey from ashes to the cross. The discipline of Lent is one that has been practiced for centuries. We wander through the wilderness. Like the people who followed Moses for forty years, and Jesus who walked in the wilderness for forty days and nights, we set out on our path through the hills and valleys of life seeking time for reflection and healing. We do this together as both individuals and the body of Christ.

There are many members that make up the Body of Christ. We are to be one under Christ. To be a healthy communicator and healthy church we need to regularly take time to reflect on who we are as individuals. How do we conduct ourselves, how do we forgive, how do we act in love, how do we see ourselves as part of the body of Christ? What can we do to be the love of God manifest?

Journeying through Lent we may realize through prayer and self-reflection that there are things that we don't like about ourselves or perhaps might even feel shameful about before God. Lent isn't a time for us to beat ourselves up. It is a time to examine ourselves, to know God's forgiveness and grow. God wants us to love ourselves. God desires for us to love others. God sends his Son Jesus to show his love unconditionally.

The Body of Christ is alive. Like our own bodies the Body of Christ can at times experience cuts and bruises that take time to heal. I am reminded of a child who has an accident and falls on the sidewalk. The first reaction is to tear up and cry. They look to be comforted. Then they hold their knee or hand or whatever they fell on. Then they wait for two things, a band-aid and a kiss. Love.

Like a child who skins their knee we are looking for the pain to go away and for the scab to be no more. Slowly over time the skin underneath the scab grows back together. The scab at times cracks and may re-open and bleed some more. Underneath it all though there is a healing process at work and the skin underneath comes together to become one and the scab falls off.

The healing agent is Jesus.

The story of the blind man is one that speaks to us. The blind man was born without sight. The disciples direct him to Jesus. In no time Jesus spits on some mud and places it on his eyes. The man is instructed to go and wash. He is cleansed and able to see again.

Like the blind man we enter lent blinded by stuff in our lives both as individuals and the church. We are blinded because there are elements and situations that put roadblocks between us and our relationship with God. To summarize: we are all broken.

We may be broken people, both sinner and saint, but I remind you that we have been cleansed in the waters of baptism and made new. Baptism is cleansing. Baptism is forgiveness. Baptism is healing. Lent is a time for reflection and repentance (a time for change), forgiveness, and healing.

On Ash Wednesday may you begin your journey with an open heart. Forgive others. Allow God to wipe your slate clean. May the church start fresh. May we enter the season of lent on a healing journey to restoration and wholeness only found through Christ.

Pulse Ministry



A new ministry has started up again. The family and youth ministry. It also has a new name: ***PULSE MINISTRY***

PULSE MINISTRY will have three different entities which will be called by their names and every generation is invited to worship and to Messy Church: Messy Church, Youth Group, and worship. The worship Service will be called “Living Stones”.



Messy Church is another alternative, in addition to Sunday School, that is held in the evening once a month. It Includes Food, Crafts, Games, Faith Talk, and Fun! It is for Sunday School age children. First event is on **Monday, March 7th from 5:30pm to 7:30pm.**

Youth Group ages 12-16. If older kids show up we won't turn them away. We will be meeting once or twice a month. Our first meeting will be a **Movie and Pizza Night** on **Friday, March 25th** at 6:30pm until 9:00pm.



The first **“Living Stones”** worship will be **Sunday, April 10th at 12:30pm.** It is an intergenerational service for people 1 to 110 and will be held in the gym and will be led by a praise band. If you have musical gifts you would like to share please contact Pastor Scott or Pastor Sue. Those that want to come to worship can come early for coffee.

What Is Messy Church

Messy Church Is

- Messy Church is a form of church for children and adults that involves creativity, celebration and hospitality.
- It's primarily for people who don't already belong to another form of church
- It meets at a time (and sometimes in a place) that suits people who don't already belong to church.
- It typically includes a welcome, a long creative time to explore the biblical theme through getting messy, a short celebration time involving story, prayer, song, games and similar; and a sit-down meal together at tables. All elements are for, and should include, people of all ages, adults and children.
- It's fun.
- It's a church for people at all stages of their faith journey and of any age – a congregation that is as valuable and worthy of investment as any of your other congregations.
- It models and promotes good ways of growing as a family; a nuclear family, an extended family, and a global and local church family.
- Its aim is to introduce Jesus, to give an opportunity to encounter him and to grow closer to him.
- Messy Church is part of BRF which believes, with the historic churches, in one God, who is Father, Son and Holy Spirit.
- Messy Church is resourced, supported and enabled by BRF.
- Most Messy Churches meet once a month, although a few meet more frequently or more occasionally.

Messy Church Isn't

- Just for children – it's much easier to aim a Messy Church at one particular age group, but do stop and reflect on whether the non-verbal messages that this sends are what you want to say about God. If your Messy Church's teaching, crafts and food are all aimed just at the under-11s, think what message you're giving both children and adults: church is only relevant/fun/meaningful/interested in you until you're 12? God is for babies? No, Messy Church needs to be constantly creative in its thinking about how to involve very different people: young and old, families and single people, male and female, academic and practical, poor and rich.
- A club – The whole of Messy Church is about worshipping God, having fellowship, exploring faith matters. It welcomes everyone, involves everyone, values everyone, is always there for the outsider. It's a church.

- A way of getting people to come to church on Sunday – There are examples of people starting in Messy Church and deciding to join Sunday church as well but these are the exception rather than the rule. If people wanted to go to established church, they would be going by now. Messy Church is interdependent with established church, but will usually operate as a separate congregation or church.
- Just for church families – Anyone already belonging to church should be thinking about serving on the leadership team of Messy Church, however old or young they are, and helping others come to know Jesus.
- Just for families – All are welcome: single, widowed, childless, divorced. Church is inclusive, not exclusive.
- A quick fix – Growing disciples takes time. Messy Church has only been going a few years anywhere. It usually only meets once a month. Growth will probably be slow.
- An easy option – It takes money, time, prayer, commitment and energy from the church and leadership team.
- A drain on church resources – Yes, it will take money and time, effort and gifted people to run it, but it will give back in return a group of people who are fired up for mission, empowered by using their God-given gifts. It will spark off ideas and inspiration about what church is all about and will renew vision. It will grow goodwill in the neighbourhood towards the church and, most importantly, provide the opportunity to do effective mission in your own community.
- Set in stone – We're learning all the time. As the network of Messy Churches grows and develops, so the best ways of delivering Messy Church will develop and grow. BRF has deliberately chosen to have a “non-controlling”, “hands-off” approach in the way it promotes Messy Church in the hope that this will give God space to grow his church as he wants to, and that will give everyone encouragement to experiment and innovate.

Discussion on Covid protocols- a question was raised as to whether we should be checking vaccine passports and allowing more worship participants. Susan mentioned Worship and Music have been looking after worship protocols related to Covid practices to date. There have been no changes to protocols recently, but with an increase in cases noted in the province, changes may be coming. After some discussion, it was decided to suspend coffee hour and resume contact tracing. Social distancing will remain in effect. Christmas Eve services required pre-registration, and people will need to check in as they enter the church.

Correspondence:

- Christmas card received from Edie Brum expressing thanks and blessings to council for work done over the past year.
- Letter received from a group of congregants re office hours and if the church could go back to pre-Covid office hours of 9-2. This letter also outlined concerns with staff hours. Susan has met with one of the concerned members and discussed that extended office hours were trialled in the fall, and only one person came to the office after noon

during this trial. Pastor Scott is at the office until 2 or 3pm and answers the door and the phone when he is there. Office hours are posted.

Committee Reports:

- **Property-** no property report.
- **Worship & Music-** no worship and music report.
- **Social Ministry-**no social ministry report.

New Business:

- **Staying Connected Program-** Karen gave an overview of a funding program available to non-profit and charitable organizations through the federal government called the New Horizons for Seniors Program. An application is being prepared for funding for a proposed program called 'Staying Connected'; if the funding application is successful, 10 tablets will be purchased, and training and education in tablet use and digital technology will be provided by a team of volunteers to some of our home bound members, through the Social Ministry Group. Successful applicants to the New Horizons Program will be notified in March 2022. More information will be available as the New Year progresses.
- **Staff Christmas Bonus-** Susan recommends Christmas bonus to staff similar to previous years. Council members all in agreement.
- **Staff Christmas get together-** Susan discussed having a council potluck in January to celebrate the year that has passed and the New Year. A suggestion was made re donating money to Gifts from the Heart from council members. January 5 is set as the potential date for the potluck (subject to change due to the evolving Covid situation).

Ongoing business:

- **Foodbank discussion-** Gerry gave an update on the Foodbank discussions. Doug Maliff and Gerry met with JP Quintal re zoning and other matters. Zoning will need to be changed to institutional from residential. JP has suggested that an agreement is made that is conditional and suitable to both the church and the Foodbank; different scenarios to be included in the contract were discussed. The Foodbank and the church will share in snow removal costs; responsibility for lot repairs would have to be agreed upon and written into the contract as well. The final price will be decided upon as soon as Rivingtons has completed the appraisal. We would like to sell the property at a fair price to the Foodbank, knowing that they help so many people and families within our community. It has been decided the church will allow parking for the foodbank on Mondays in the hall parking lot, which would mean no funerals could be held on Mondays at the church. Susan and Gerry will meet with the foodbank reps on Thursday, December 16, 2021 to discuss these matters further.

Ongoing business:

- Review of goals set at council retreat- church council remains committed to the goals set at this past fall's retreat, which include the development of family ministry, mom and tot drop ins, and the Messy Church Program. The young family's ministry group will speak at the AGM to provide further information to the congregation and outline plans for development of these new programs.
- Update on Staying Connect Program- the application for funding for The Staying Connected Program was submitted December 21. Application approval/denial decisions will be coming in March. Karen will develop a needs assessment questionnaire in January as part of the initial plan.
- Letters of concern directed to council by a congregational group – letters have been received by council and were read at the meeting; a lengthy discussion followed. Council will prepare and send a letter to respond to the concerns; Pastor Scott will follow up with individuals.
- Foodbank-the preliminary agreement has been drafted based on the meeting held December 16. Our legal counsel, J. P. Quintal is doing this. It will presented for approval by the congregation at a called meeting. This agreement outlines the changes needed to zoning, parking contingencies, plans for lot C should either the church or foodbank cease to exist, and the sharing of snow removal costs. The property will be sold to the Foodbank for the suggested sum of\$240 000. Gerry indicated the Foodbank plans to demolish the building and build a new building if the deal is completed.

Welcome and Opening Devotions: Gayle welcomed everyone and thanked Denise for joining us. Pastor Scott opened the meeting with a prayer.

Committee reports:

Pastor Scott:

- Pastor Scott reviewed previous Christmas Eve services and his plan for this year is to do a service of lessons and carols with Holy Communion. He will meet with Blaine to discuss this further.
- Pastor Scott will be away on Dec. 26th. He will meet with Blaine to plan a suitable service that will not require a supply Pastor.
- Council met on retreat in November. They set new goals for 2022 with a direct mission from Matthew 28:18-20. "Then Jesus came to them and said, "All authority in heaven and on earth has been given to me. 19Therefore go and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit, 20and teaching them to obey everything I have commanded you. And surely I am with you always, to the very end of the age."
- When setting the goals they were considering the community and not just our current membership.
- New goals include :
 - Starting an intergenerational community gathering (Messy Church Program)
 - Starting a Mom/Dad and Tot group
 - Starting a contemporary worship service
- Pastor Scott shared that several people have already agreed to help with these new programs / services.
- More details will be shared during the January meeting about the Week of Prayer for Christian Unity.
- Holden Evening Prayer services are well attended. .
- Pastor Scott will order the *Evangelical Lutheran Worship Leaders Desk Edition* as a

resource for Blaine. It provides hymn suggestions and allows for better planning. The resource costs approximately \$70.00.

Blaine Sack: Church Musician

- The dolly for the grand piano in the Parish Hall has been ordered and will arrive sometime in the New Year. It will be delivered and installed by Ottawa Pianos. The cost with taxes is \$2,100.
- Blaine contacted Casavant to schedule an appointment. They will look at replacing the leathers and advise us on how best to deal with patch jobs that were done by non-Casavant firms.
- Now that the heat is on, the humidity in the church is in the critical zone on the gauges. This will cause havoc on the piano and organ. Blaine has been approved to purchase two humidifiers: one to be placed by the pulpit and one to be placed by the organ.
- The Worship Suggestion boxes can be used for more than hymn suggestions. They are in place to allow people to provide suggestions and feedback on any aspect of worship.
- The Worship and Music Committee has several vacancies. Anyone interested in joining the committee should reach out to Gayle for more details.

Christmas Eve Services:

- Gayle will check with Emma Rabishaw about ushers for the Christmas Eve services.
- Both real and battery operated candles will be used again this year.
- People are strongly encouraged to register for Christmas Eve Services. When attending the service, ushers will help you find your reserved spot.
- There will not be a service on Christmas day.

Communion Protocol:

- During communion a single line should be formed to allow for safe physical distancing.

Video Equipment:

- Ellen contacted Sean Benkhe about the cost of purchasing and installing a third camera. The quote was \$2,600.

Pastor Scott:

- Pastor Scott hopes to gather some individuals together in January to begin planning a contemporary service, recruiting musicians and promoting the service. The date of the first meeting is to be determined.
- The pulpit and lectern will be used equally for sermons from here on in.
- The bells will continue to be rung during communion.
- To evaluate the preferred type of bulletin to use, full bulletins and the current bulletins will both be offered. During February, we will evaluate which was the preferred type so we can be more efficient in the long run.
- Bulletins, with the full order of Service, the sermon and announcements will be emailed to everyone and posted on Facebook.
- Bulletins will be distributed to shut-ins.
- In order to better utilize the equipment we have, Pastor Scott will try to use brief multi-media clips during his sermons.

Blaine Sack: Church Musician

- The dolly for the grand piano in the Parish Hall is in at Ottawa Piano. Blaine will arrange for delivery and installation.
- Blaine is going to purchase humidity gauges for the organ and the two grand pianos as he is not sure if the ones in use now are accurate.
- Blaine received a quote from Casavant for the replacement of the organ leathers. Total cost for all labour, materials and transport both ways is \$64,906.00 + HST for a grand

total of \$73,344.00. Blaine has contacted Casavant to see if this quote includes any of the other repairs to be completed as this quote is 60% more than the quote from 2017. Blaine had received no response prior to the meeting. He has also inquired if this work can be put off for a year due to the high quote as there is only \$29,619.00 in the Organ Restoration fund.

Midweek Services:

- It was stressed that midweek services will be held on the second Wednesday morning of every month, except July and August.

Video Equipment:

- Ellen has contacted Shawn Behnke to move the second video camera to a better location. This will be assessed for viewing improvements.

Volunteers:

- Gayle will put a notice in the bulletin and Guiding Light regarding the need for volunteers for altar guild, including someone to head the altar guild, and also for ushers.


