Sharing of the Peace

So, if you are offering your gift at the altar and there remember that your brother has something against you²⁴ leave your gift there before the altar and go. First be reconciled to your brother, and then come and offer your gift. - Matthew 5:23-24

It happens every Sunday. Just before we distribute holy communion, we have the “sharing of the peace.” Pastor always says, “greet one another with the ‘peace of the Lord’” and then . . . OFF WE GO! Some kids may go running to give

grandma a hug. Others may walk across the entire sanctuary to greet someone they haven't met in a week. Others may have a different reaction. Some think to themselves, "*here it comes the dreaded 'sharing of the peace' where I have to shake all these hands of people in the middle of flu season!*" Others may choose to just stand in place, keeping their heads bowed while they wait for these uncomfortable 30 seconds to end.

Does this sound familiar to you in one way or another?

As with all things in worship, it can be easy for us to forget why we do what we do. Take a second and re-read the Bible passage above. Matthew 5 gives a reason WHY people went to greet others BEFORE going to the altar. What reason does Jesus give in Matthew 5?

Before going to the altar to receive the Lord's Supper, we are to be reconciled with one another. This means old grudges with one another are to be verbally forgiven by each other. This happens during the sharing of the peace. If you have wronged someone in some way in word or deed, you are to go and ask for their forgiveness or give forgiveness before going to the Lord's Supper. This happens during the sharing of the peace.

Being reconciled with one another does not mean you try and tally up every wrong committed against each other over the decades; that would be painfully impossible for any of us to do! As with the confession of sins though, it would be enough to confess those sins to each other which "*we know and feel in our hearts.*" Primarily, the "*sharing of the peace*" is to be a time of reconciliation with one another. If there is no reconciliation needed, then it is proper and appropriate to simply greet one another by saying "*Peace be with you*" or "*the Peace of the Lord be with you*" as we remind one another that we all fall under the cross of Christ's mercy and come to the altar together as forgiven children of God. Truly, there is no greater peace for us to celebrate!

The peace of the Lord be with you always!

Committee Reports:

- Property- Gerry indicates a property meeting will be scheduled for next week. Weather stripping is needed for the wooden doors at the front of the church due to the draft coming through the doors. Gerry suggests replacing with other doors as wooden doors are not very energy efficient; this matter will require further discussion of the property committee.
- Worship & Music- Denise reports a healing service will be held on March 20 and the third Sunday of every month. Pastor Scott is away March 27. The organ restoration will be postponed for 2 years as the repairs required are not urgent; this postponement will give time to fund raise. The application for the service at the Pembroke Marina (June 19) will be submitted by Gayle. As copyright laws are getting stricter, services at the Marina and Camp Lutherlyn cannot be broadcast. The installation of church council will take place April 3.
- Social Ministry- meeting on March 15 for meal making for shut-in members.
- Pastoral Care-Karen indicated the Pastoral Care Group met on February 28; the group consists of Karen Gauthier, Sandra Graham, Erica Loevenmark, Martha McKibbon, Diane Rull, Cheryl Sack, and Ruth Thom. After discussion, group members were given a list of members to contact prior to the next meeting on April 4.

New business:

- **Staying Connected Program**-Karen received an email yesterday (March 7) that the application for funding of the Staying Connected Program has been approved through the New Horizons for Seniors Program. This means that once the agreement is signed,

we can purchase tablets/iPads and start organizing the who/what/when of the program. This program is aimed at supporting our shutin members by providing one on one teaching on how to use tablets/iPads, and be more comfortable navigating the web, in order to access our church's online Sunday services, the church website, and other desired activities.

- **Messy church-** Erica gave a report on the first Messy Church night held on March 7. Due to the snowy weather, there were not as many people as expected. There were 3 children and lots of helpers in the kitchen who did make it out. Erica reports it was a lot of fun; activities included a meal, fun prayers, games, pretzel making, and a child friendly worship service. Everyone helped out and overall the first Messy Church was a good experience and precursor for what is to come.
- **Masks-** Karen mentioned a concern brought to her attention regarding some members of Music Healing Vets not wearing masks when coming into the church. Pastor Scott will follow up.
- **Constitution-** Pastor Scott advised we look at adopting the new ELCIC model constitution, which was revised in 2017. It was mentioned that these changes had been discussed previously but had been placed on hold due to other issues.
- **LIT Program, Camp Lutherlyn-** there has been a request for financial support so that two of our younger members can participate in the Leaders in Training at Camp Lutherlyn this summer. The cost would be \$200.00/child. Council supported this request; it was suggested that the funds could come from the Good Shepherding account.
- **Transitions Retreat-** Pastor Scott will be attending the Transitions Retreat, on May 16-17 in Niagara Falls. The cost of this retreat is covered by each church as part of the contract for pastors accepting new calls. As lodging and meals are included in the retreat costs, Pastor Scott is only asking for coverage of his transportation costs. After discussion, a motion was drafted which reads "Church council supports Pastor Scott's travel expenses to the Transitions Retreat."

Committee Reports:

Pastor Scott:

- Plans for Palm Sunday, Maundy Thursday, Good Friday and Easter Sunday services are almost complete.
- Maundy Thursday's service will incorporate 'Laying on of Hands' similar to the healing service. People can come forward if they feel comfortable doing so.
- 'Living Stones' - The praise group is growing! Several congregational members have agreed to share their musical talents. For the time being, there will not be communion at the service. A basket will be set out to collect the offering. Those attending this service are encouraged to bring a donation for the food bank.
- Pastor Scott will be attending a retreat with synod on May 15th. A supply pastor will be contacted to do the service that Sunday.
- There have been several funerals during the past few weeks.

Blaine Sack: Church Musician

- The dolly for the grand piano on the stage in the Parish Hall was installed on March 31st.
- Both grand pianos have been tuned by Ottawa Pianos.
- The organ was tuned on March 24th. The technicians were able to fix one note that had been problematic for the past few years.
- The choirs will be singing on Palm Sunday and throughout the services during Holy Week.
- Choirs will sing every 2 weeks until the end of May
- On Pentecost Sunday both choirs will sing together.

- The ‘Holden Evening Prayer’ books have not arrived yet. Pastor Scott will follow up with the company.
- Blaine requested an additional copy of ‘All Creation Sings Accompaniment Edition’. Pastor Scott will order it.

- Representatives from the choir (presently included under music ministry), banners group and acolytes will be removed from the General Administration section.
- The new revision date will be April 5, 2022.

The Social Ministry Committee has some funds in our Good Shepherding Fund that we have earmarked to assist families by helping to send their kids to Camp Lutherlyn. Depending on the response will determine how much we can assist.

Worship Notes

The question was asked “why do we stay in our seats after the service is over?” We need to continue recording at the end of the service in order to post the credits at the end of the taping. The sounds made when the congregation is leaving were picked up on the recording. We ask that you take these few minutes to enjoy the postlude while the taping is finished. Thanks you for your understanding.

Organ Restoration

In 2017 after the first phase of our organ restoration was completed, Casavant recommended that the second phase of the restoration which involves replacing the “leathers” in all the pipes should be completed in 5 years, which brings us to 2022. The estimated cost for this work has gone up substantially from the initial estimate of approximately \$45,000.00 to \$65,000.00. Since we only have \$35,809.00 in the organ restoration fund, we do not have the funds to complete the required work this year. As a result, Casavant was contacted to see if this second phase could be put off for a year or two. Their response was this: “At this point in time the organ is working well with the leathers not appearing to be a concern, so we could potentially push this phase back two years. Bear in mind, folks, that in two year’s time, the cost will also be higher. Right now the organ valuation is \$1,200,000.00.” The Worship & Music Committee will keep you updated re - the growth in the organ restoration fund.

Worship and Music

Council has endorsed a recommendation from Worship and Music to add a second midweek service on the fourth Wednesday of the month at 10:30 A. M. This will be a trial for May and June.

So just for your info, the dates will be May 11th and 25th and June 8th and 22nd.

Pulse Ministry – The Living Stones Worship Service – Palm Sunday – April 10, 2022

This is part of one of the new ministries started at Zion - a Contemporary service - the first one of many to come. I attended this service along with several other people – parents with children, older people. We worshipped together the way it should be. The service was held in the parish hall at 12:30pm. Some members of Zion along with Pastor Sue on her guitar sang and played instruments and formed a band.

I really enjoyed this service. The songs that were sung were lighter Christian songs – different from the traditional hymns sung in church. They were action songs geared to any age group, but the songs also had meaning just like a traditional hymn, but in a way a child could understand.

Pastor Sue's sermon was about Palm Sunday. It was modern and easy to understand. The sermon was about Jesus riding into Jerusalem on a donkey, people waving palm branches, laying their cloaks on the road and shouting Hosannas. Pastor Sue also talked about Jesus being sentenced to death and his dying on the cross alongside two convicted criminals. Jesus told them they would join him in heaven that day. The one Roman soldier, after the death of Jesus, realized that Jesus was innocent of any crime.

People were asked to bring up their offering and lay palm leaves or cedar branches near the cross beside a stone-like tomb to represent the actual tomb of Jesus.

Several tables in the parish hall with the prayer stations. We were given 10 minutes to visit as many of the stations as we could. Each station contained a card to read and an activity to do.

The first station I visited showed several simple pictures and you were to draw one on a rock with a marker. I drew the hill and three crosses. The second station was set on a table along with a bowl of sand and a bowl of water. You were supposed to drag the shell across the sand and watch the mark you made in the sand disappear. Then you took the shell dipped it into the water and placed the water on your forehead. The third station I did was on a white shell shaped fabric print the name of someone who was a good influence in your life and glue the shell on one side of the white board on the other side of the board on a band aid you wrote with a marker the name or initials of someone who was grieving. The fourth station I did had a bread that was braided, baked and round, with toothpicks sticking out of the bread – this represented the crown of thorns Jesus wore. Then you took a toothpick out of the bread, broke it in half and placed it in the middle of the bread ring. The last station I was able to complete held one lighted tea candle and many unlit candles. You were to light a candle from the lit one and place it on the table and remember someone you knew who had passed. I believe I missed one station as my time had run out. Why do all of this you ask – to remind us of the sacrifice Jesus made for us all and all He endured before His death on the cross. For us to remember that by Jesus' actions that day, all our sins were washed away. Yes I would recommend coming out to this service. You will be glad you did. The worship leader put a lot of thought and work into this service, along with the people who played in the band. It was a simple but thought-provoking worship. The people of Zion and anyone in

our community have another form of worship to attend if they choose. The best of both worlds – contemporary and traditional worship services.

To Camp Lutherlyn Work Crews and others interested in Camp Work Days:

On this, the first day of spring (yeah!) I'm writing to let you know that this year's Spring Work Day at Camp Lutherlyn will be **Saturday May 28**. Plan to arrive by 10:00 a.m..

Lunch will be provided.

There's lots of work to be done this year including some grounds work cleaning up new trails after loggers thinned the woodlot and the arborist has done some work on clearing the trails. This work at the camp expands on opening up more of our now 150 acres to recreational use. In the fall of 2020, half of Hoffman Beach was cleaned up. Last year, a new fire-pit was built at Bancroft Beach. We'll have a picture posted over lunch of what's planned for this year for everyone to see.

Holding the work day at the end of May will be warmer weather, so some staining may be able to be done, but bring bug spray in case the pesky critters are out! We won't be cleaning inside cabins this year but will be raking the grounds and cleaning out eavestroughs as usual. The Kairos Blanket Exercise
to Zion on Wednesday, June 1, 2022 at 1:30 pm.

Developed in collaboration with Indigenous Elders, Knowledge Keepers and educators, the KAIROS Blanket Exercise (KBE) is an interactive and experiential teaching tool that explores the historic and contemporary relationship between Indigenous and non-Indigenous peoples in the land we now know as Canada. This workshop is designed for participants aged 14 and up.

During this 2 to 3-hour workshop, participants step on blankets representing the land and into the role of First Nations, Inuit and Métis peoples. They are guided by trained facilitators, including Indigenous Elders and Knowledge Keepers, who work from a script that covers pre-contact, treaty-making, colonization, resistance and much more. Participants read scrolls and respond to cues in the script. The KBE concludes with a debriefing, conducted as a talking circle, during which participants discuss the learning experience, process their feelings, ask questions, share insights, and deepen their understanding.

KAIROS Canada is an ecumenical movement for ecological justice and human rights around the globe.

Facilitators for this workshop are from The Circle of Turtle Lodge in Golden Lake. By engaging on an emotional and intellectual level, the Blanket Exercise effectively educates and increases empathy.

The workshop will be held on the lawn at Zion, or in the Parish Hall if the weather is not suitable.

A meal for participants in the parish hall will follow.
