FROM THE PASTOR'S DESK

What is Pentecost?

Pentecost Sunday is just around the corner – May 28 2023.

But what is Pentecost?

It's not like Pentecost is a word that we use much outside of church. Unlike some other Christian holy days, it hasn't leaked into popular culture. You don't find new stories about the "War on Pentecost" – there's no tradition of gift giving (and the accompanying sales) around Pentecost. You aren't even likely to find an increase in chocolate sales to go with the holiday.

So what is Pentecost ... and why should we care?

The Basics of Pentecost

Pentecost Sunday is the day when Christians around the world celebrate the gift of the Holy Spirit.

On Christmas, Christians celebrate the Incarnation – the idea that God became human in the person of Jesus Christ.

On Easter, Christians celebrate the Resurrection – the belief that Jesus rose from the dead, a sign of the promise of resurrection given to all God's people.

And on Pentecost, we celebrate the Holy Spirit – the gift of God's comfort, power, and strength given to God's people.

The History of Pentecost

In the Hebrew Scripture, the Jewish people celebrated a holiday known as the "Festival of Weeks" (see Exodus 32 and Deuteronomy 16).

From The Pastor's Desk (cont'd)

This was a harvest festival, a time when the Israelites celebrate the generosity of God, shown in a successful harvest of grain.

While the Temple stood in Jerusalem, each farmer would bring their first fruits – the first ripe samples from their fields – and give them as an offering of thanksgiving in the Temple. This meant that many Jews from all across the countryside would gather in Jerusalem in order to present their offering at the Temple.

The Festival of Weeks happened fifty days after the Passover. For this reason, the Greek-speaking Jews of the first century called the festival "Pentecost" – from the Greek word meaning "fiftieth day."

It was during the Festival of Weeks, fifty days after Passover, that the disciples of Jesus were gathered in Jerusalem. They had spent the last fifty days making sense of their experiences of the resurrection of their teacher, Jesus, and the fact that he had just ascended into heaven (for this whole account, see the book of Acts, chapters 1 and 2).

While the disciples were gathered, the Holy Spirit filled them. They began to tell to the pilgrims who were gathered in Jerusalem about Jesus. As they preached, they were amazed to discover that all the pilgrims – regardless of what language they spoke – were able to understand them.

So What

The Christian holiday of Pentecost is rooted in this historical event – an event sometimes called the "birthday of the church" because it marks the day that Jesus' disciples began to share the story of Jesus and invite others to share in their faith in Jesus as the Son of God.

But Pentecost is more than just remembering a historical event.

On Pentecost, we invite the same Spirit that filled the disciples that day to transform our lives. Even more important than looking backward and remembering what God did two thousand years ago, we look forward and invite the Spirit to pull us into the future.

The Holy Spirit has a way of turning things upside down. The story of Acts is all about how the lives of the disciples got turned upside down – and by extension, how the world turned upside down by this new, Spirit-filled faith.

On Pentecost we invite this disruptive presence of God into our own lives.

The fruit of the Spirit, says Paul, is love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, generosity, faithfulness, gentleness, and self-control. These are what we seek to live into, how we seek to transform the world, and the evidence of the Spirit at work in our lives and in the world.

Pastor Scott away May 14th – 19th to attend the Festival of Homiletics

What does Pastor Scott study while at the Festival of Homiletics?

The Festival of Homiletics takes place yearly and is presented by Luther Seminary in Minneapolis. The Festival prior to Covid was an in-person event held in Colorado or New Orleans. It has about 2000 people attend in person. During Covid they like many realized they needed to offer an on-line learning component which is wonderful for us in Canada.

Daily from Sunday to Friday from morning to evening there are several preaching professors from several institutions who present workshops based on everything from "preaching trauma" to "preaching transformation to small parishes" to "Revelation: Apocalyptic or a book of grace?" It is one of the best academic continuing ed events for the cost that is incurred.

THANK YOU!

Each Sunday and on other special occasions, weddings, funerals and special services it is the duty of our sextons to ensure that the church is open and ready to welcome the people. When all is over, they make sure that everything is back in its place and locked up. But they do so much more. They make sure that water is available in the sacristy and pulpit. They ring the bells at the appropriate times and make sure that we have communion assistants. It is also the sexton that takes the count of the number of people attending the services. Once the service is over, they make sure all candles are extinguished, water glass's emptied, collection plates are in their proper place, lights off and the doors are locked. During the summer we often open the windows. The sextons will do this and ensure that they are closed again. When there is a wedding or funeral taking place in the church, they are required to be available to complete many of the same duties. They work quietly behind the scenes to ensure that we can immerse ourselves in the worship of our Lord. A huge thank you for your service in this important ministry at Zion.

Little Ones and Caregivers Playgroup



The first time leaving your home environment to attend a playgroup can be a nervous and challenging experience for any parent and their child, especially if it is your first child, but the benefits far outweigh any negatives. Here are five reasons why attending playgroups should become an important part of your schedule.

1. Develops Social Skills and Confidence

Experts agree that children begin to develop their social skills between the ages of four months to three years. In a playgroup setting, children learn to negotiate with others, take turns, share, and resolve conflict. In a playgroup, they can do this while still being supported by their parent or main caregiver which gives them a much-needed safety net to develop at their own pace.

2. Encourages Physical Activity

From the time a child starts to become mobile, keeping them entertained can be difficult! Playgroups provide well thought out, age-appropriate activities for children that often focus on developing their gross and fine motor skills. The use of indoor and outdoor spaces offers lots of opportunities for running, jumping and climbing alongside cutting, gluing, painting and moulding. Occupational therapists advise parents to offer many opportunities for physical movement. Every good playgroup should provide these!

3. Elicits creativity and fosters their imagination

Eighty percent of all brain development occurs in the first few years of life and exposure to creative environments can only enhance their development. Having the opportunity to play using open-ended resources allow children to begin to think creatively, develop their own ideas and explore. This also aids speech development as they learn to describe the world around them.

4. Builds Resilience and Prepares For 'Big' School

Attending a playgroup can enable children to cope with new situations, manage stress and adapt to change. Research has shown that separation from a parent or main caregiver when starting school can be a stress-inducing. However, at a playgroup, children get to test separation from their parent over time, which builds their confidence and encourages them to be independent from an early age. This will support them emotionally when they go to school on a daily-basis.

5. Opportunities to strengthen the bond between parent and child and make new friends too! Spending time at a playgroup strengthens the relationship between the child and parent because it creates a shared experience. Parents enjoy seeing their child grow and develop more inconfidence as they become more familiar in the playgroup setting.

BONUS

Playgroups are also fantastic places for parents and caregivers to meet other parents and caregivers. To know you are not alone, but instead have a network of people to talk to, ask advice and make friends with can be hugely comforting. Building a community as an adult in a parenting situation can be challenging as day-today activities can often feel so unfamiliar. Playgroups also allow adults to come together in a supportive community, have a coffee, share ideals and resources, celebrate milestones, commiserate over disappointments and make friends.


We are excited to once again run this campaign from Mother's Day to Father's Day. Supporters have the opportunity to donate in a variety of ways listed in this letter.

Please prayerfully consider supporting the work of the Center through this easy and fun initiative and encourage your church or circle of influence to promote and participate in this important fundraising event.



Present: Karen Gauthier, Jill Kellough, Michael Lange, Jamie MacKinnon, Kathy Nieman, Pastor Scott Schellenberger, Denise Schizkoske, Gerry Vandersleen (treasurer), (Erica Deloughery)

Excused: Susan Dupuis

- **I. Opening:** The meeting was opened at 7:00pm by Pastor Scott. The opening devotion was given by Karen Gauthier.
- 2. Pastor Scott asked re nominations for chairperson. Michael Lange nominated Susan Dupuis for chairperson. Council members in agreement with the nomination. Susan Dupuis was approved as chairperson. Pastor Scott then asked for nominations for vice chair. Kathy Nieman nominated Denise Schizkoske for vice chair. Denise, and council, agreed with the nomination. Denise Schizkoske was approved as vice chairperson. Pastor Scott asked for nominations for secretary; Denise Schizkoske nominated Karen Gauthier. Karen Gauthier, and council, agreed with the nomination. Karen Gauthier was approved as council secretary.
- **3. Confidentiality and conflict of interest agreements-** deferred to next meeting as forms unavailable for this meeting.
- **4. Approval of Agenda:** The agenda was reviewed. Additions- Ongoing business: Staying Connected Program. New business: emergency plan; emergency response.

Motion to approve agenda: Karen Gauthier. Seconded: Denise Schizkoske.

5. Approval of Minutes: The previous council meeting minutes of February were reviewed previously via email.

Motion to approve minutes: Michael Lange. Seconded: Karen Gauthier.

- **6. Finance Report:** Gerry Vandersleen reported offerings are up compared to the same period last year. Benevolence is the same as last year and the first payment has been made. Both income and expenses are up compared to the same period last year.
- 7. Pastors Report: No report due to Pastor Scott's busy schedule this past month.
- 8. Correspondence: nil.
- 9. Committee Reports
- **Property-** Gerry is presently in negotiations for the sale of the 442 Miller Street house. More info will be available once the sale is underway. Council in agreement with proceeding with negotiations (the sale of the house had been approved by the congregation at a congregational meeting on November 21, 2021). Repairs are required of the boilers and condensate tank, at an approximate cost of \$15 000.00. An electrician will install a direct line from the breaker box to the balcony for the sound system and the projector.

- Worship and Music- from the W & M meeting, two waterfront services will be booked in the spring and fall. There was discussion about pre-service hymn sings and other suggestions from the Table Talks, which are being implemented slowly. A contemporary service will be held this Sunday. Holy week services will be held: Maundy Thursday at 7pm; Good Friday at 10am; and Easter worship at 8am and 10am. Jamie discussed the Living Stones worship and the low attendance. Council discussed different options (potentially hold it at the same time, in the Parish Hall, as the regular worship service at 10:00am; or potentially in place of the regular worship service). It was agreed the Living Stones Worship would be held at the same time as our regular worship (10am in the Parish Hall) for the next few months to determine if this is a more suitable time.
- Social Ministry- Denise reported from the Social Ministry meeting last week. Karen gave an update on the Staying Connected Program. The Coldest Night of the Year Team raised over \$3 080.00 for The Grind. April 19 will be preparation and delivery of spring meals to those on the Care List. May 7 we will host a potluck meal after the service; there will be a basket for donations to the Good Shepherding Program (which is a fund set up for members of the congregation who find themselves in need). The annual garage sale will be held October 21, with proceeds going to the Food Bank.
- **Learning** Pastor Scott reports the confirmation class has been really helping out with Lenten supper clean up.

10. Ongoing Business

• Staying connected program update. Karen reports the Staying Connected program will conclude on March 27, with the final report to be submitted within a month. The program goal of increasing digital literacy amongst the participants was reached. There were numerous visits to participants in their homes with one-on-one instruction, with an emphasis on teaching internet safety. The other program goal of helping seniors feel more connected with family, friends, and community, was also achieved, although not the same extent as digital literacy. Overall, participants were very appreciative of the program.

II.New Business

- Council members' donations: Council members are reminded to bring their donations to the next council next meeting if they have not already done so.
- Second defibrillator and training- Pastor Scott suggests a second defibrillator should be placed in the hallway to the parish hall. Gerry suggested moving the unit we do have to the hall, but mentioned we will have to discuss with the Tai Chi Club as they were the ones who originally purchased the unit.
- Emergency plan- there was some discussion around how to handle emergency situations in the future. Some suggestions were new signage to indicate the location of the main entrance, and the establishment of an emergency plan (a volunteer has stepped forward to assist in this process).
- Emergency response- the first meeting of the emergency response committee, which was raised by Steve Boland at the annual meeting, will be held Thursday evening. So far, the committee has 3 members: Steve Boland, Krista Grosskleg, and Al Kellough. Pastor Scott is also planning on attending the meeting.

Motion to adjourn: The meeting adjourned at 8:05 pm with The Lord's Prayer.

Committee Reports

Pastor Scott:

Easter weekend services are planned.

Both Blaine and Pastor Scott will be taking holidays in April. Therefore, there will NOT be anyWednesday morning services for this month. Services will resume on May 3rd with only one service in May.

- Contemporary services will occur every 6 7 weeks. A lot of preparation is required to put these worship services together and we recognize that those involved also have other commitments. We appreciate the time they give to this ministry.
- The church council has decided that the Living Stones worship will be held on the 3rd week of the month and is scheduled for 10:00 am in the Parish Hall. This will be on a trial basis and will be revaluated after a few months. The hope is that by giving people a choice between our traditional service and the Living Stones service, attendance will increase.
- During Blaine's holidays, hymns will be sung with guitar music.

Blaine Sack: Church Musician

- During the trial period, when both traditional and the Living Stones services occur at the same time, it will be important to gather stats to inform future decision making.
- Contemporary service dates need to be planned and should be put in the bulletin and/or Guiding Light to keep the congregation informed.
- The organ tuning will occur on April 5th. Blaine has compiled a list of questions for the tuners and will
 update the committee at the next meeting.
- The grand piano will be tuned next. Blaine will check to see if there is someone in the area that can do the job. If so, this will decrease travel costs for the tuner and help support local business.
- Blaine will be away on April 23rd.
- Blaine shared that the Psalm resource he mentioned at the last meeting is reasonably priced and contains contemporary pieces. He would like to start using this resource in May.
- The duet by Sandra Allen and Blaine was well received. She was very appreciative of the honorarium. In addition, Blaine sent a thank you note and candle as an expression of thanks.
- Blaine has reconnected with Maria Merridew and plans for a musical offering are in the works.

Waterfront Service

- The waterfront service is scheduled for Sunday, June 18th at 11:00 am. The committee will discuss details at the next meeting.
- A second service is tentatively scheduled for September 10th with more details to follow.

Technology:

- Diane spoke with Wilmer Verch and an electrician has been contacted to fix the electrical issues affecting the technology. Pastor Scott will get an estimate from Gerry Vandersleen so he can include the cost in the grant application which is due at the end of April.
- Diane will reach out to Mike Montaigne once the electrician has been in to check the sound system in the kitchen.
- Ellen explained that connectivity issues on Sunday, April 2nd prevented the complete taping of the service.
- A few suggestions for improving the taped services were discussed. It was decided that the prayer of the day as well as the opening, closing and hymn of the day should be projected so viewers can follow along.
- Overall, the feedback from people accessing the services online has been very positive. Comments about how professional the records look have been received. We thank all those involved in this outreach ministry. Well done!
