From the Pastor's Desk

What does an Anniversary mean to you?

One of the privileges of my calling is that as a pastor I get to listen to people's stories and histories. This week alone I was told by two couple that they were married for 62 and 66 years. I am just amazed when I hear that. Part of the reason people can celebrate this many years is that people are living much longer. During a marriage or lifetime of many memories are created that will last a lifetime. To give you an idea of what living committed in a marriage for such a long time let me share.

I once heard the story about how a war bride met her husband in England. The story of another two who were high school sweethearts. I have heard how another came across the ocean to get settled before bringing his wife and children to get settled. There are many more situations that I have been privy to also. There is one factor that always has played an important part in all of these marriages. All marriage vows were made before God vowing to be together "until death parts us." I insist that this is spoken by each bride and groom in every wedding service so couples think carefully about the lifetime vows they make.

This month we are celebrating 140 years as the congregation of Zion Evangelical Lutheran Church. We are not celebrating the anniversary of the church building because the congregation worshipped in a small church kitty-corner to where the current church stands.

Have you ever wondered what happens with your offering envelope after the worship service is over? You see the offering plate being brought up to the altar but where does it go from there?

After each worship service the head counter assigned to that Sunday takes the offering into the church office. Here they meet with 2 other volunteer counters. Each Sunday a team of 3 people work together. Other money received by mail or some that have been dropped into the office are amalgamated with the Sunday envelopes. The envelopes are sorted and each counter is responsible to open each envelope and ensure that the amount inside equals the amount written on the envelope. We thank everyone for not taping or stapling the envelopes closed. Once all envelopes are opened the counters must then balance the total of money they have to the total of the amounts written on the envelopes. This doesn't always happen on the first time and they must then determine where the error is. The head counter takes care of any envelopes that are "special", meaning the money has a specific designation and does not go into the general fund. Once everyone has balanced the money is combined and placed into the night deposit bag and all envelopes for the general account are placed in numerical order so that it is easier and quicker for June to enter the information into the computer program. The head counter then takes the deposit to the bank. This process can take up to I hour. Of course, on special occasions such as Easter and Christmas a counting team is required for each service. We would like to thank this dedicated group of volunteers who make sure this important work is completed.

Sunday October 22 Table Talks

The Table Talks were opened at 11:20 by Pastor Scott. Steve Boland gave a brief synopsis of the work of the Emergency Shelter task force established earlier this year. The task force has expanded to include members of different service agencies, members of the Pembroke and Area Clergy Association, and two physicians and is now called the Pembroke and Area Community Taskforce (PACT).

PACT made a presentation to Pembroke City Council earlier this month as they plan to establish a shelter for those living with homelessness; due to zoning issues, establishing a shelter is not possible for the upcoming winter. The alternative would be a warming center, which would provide a warm place for people to spend the cold winter nights. The plan is to provide recliner type chairs as providing beds or cots deems the center a shelter.

A tour of Zion was done, and PACT would like to use the basement under the parish hall as a short term, temporary warming center for the upcoming winter season. The plan is to operate the warming center from 10pm to 8am, with doors locked after 10pm. Personal belongings would be gathered at the door and placed in a secure location for the night. Security would be provided in the form of three security personnel. PACT plans to establish a permanent location for the 2024-2025 season thus Zion would only be committing to the 2023-2024 winter season as a temporary measure.

Those gathered for the Table Talks were asked to answer 3 questions in their groups. The following are the answers to those questions from the notes written by the groups.

1. What do you feel are some of the needs in the City of Pembroke?

Answers: Shelter for the homeless, physical and mental health supports, food for the needy, a Salvation Army, public transportation.

2. How would Jesus instruct us to act in faith to care for groups in need?

Answers: To pray for all, love all, be kind, be understanding, show compassion, treat each other as family and equals, show up, help the poor, do unto others as you would have them do unto you.

3. The need for the community to address homelessness especially during the winter months is great. How do you feel or what do you think about there being a temporary shelter at Zion this winter to provide a warm, safe place of refuge for the homeless?

Answers: Many felt it was a good idea and thought it was a good way to support our community. Questions to be asked later; those who struggle need love and support...we welcome everyone else here for various reasons (most groups come from financial security); we are supportive, it is our calling to reach out and help others in our community, but have questions re security/locks, supervision, # of people, power outages; good thing but have concerns re damage to property, if neighbors will be informed, our programs during the day, if there are too many problems is there a way out; the need is great, we need to step up but we are afraid as we hear horror stories; the details need to be worked out.

Steve provided answers to some questions following the discussions. PACT is awaiting support of both Renfrew County Council and Pembroke City Council; without their support, the warming center will not be able to proceed. Pastor Scott thanked those who attended and encouraged them to attend the congregational meeting to vote on whether the temporary warming center at Zion will be held on November 5 following worship. Only the congregation will decide whether this proposal will go through. The meeting ended at 12:05pm with The Lord's Prayer.

June 13, 2023

2.Approval of Agenda: The agenda was reviewed. Additions: no additions. Motion to approve agenda: Jamie MacKinnon Seconded: Denise Schizkoske.

3.Approval of Minutes: The previous council meeting minutes of May were reviewed previously via email. Motion to approve minutes: Jill Kellough. Seconded: Michael Lange

4.Church: Moved by: Jill Kellough. Seconded by: Denise Schizkoske. Motion approved unanimously by Council.

5.**Finance Report:** From the comparative income statement and comparative balance sheet, treasurer Gerry Vandersleen highlighted: regular offerings are down slightly, gas expenses are significantly higher, church insurance is up \$2300, and office supply expenses are up. At present, the higher deficit is primarily due to increases in both office expenses and the price of natural gas. By paying the insurance in the amount of \$20,987.64 early in the year it will take a few more months of offerings to balance this out. Our PAR offerings help to keep a consistent amount coming into the budget each month regardless of attendance. This is very helpful when bills are consistent each month.

Continuing Education

I have now graduated a yearlong Mentorship Program and will be receiving a designation in Backstory Preaching (BsP). I was away for a continuing education event called the Festival of Homiletics May14-19. It

takes place in Minneapolis but was live streamed to me in Canada and around the world for a nominal fee of \$100.

Holidays

I will be away July 31 until August 27 (4 Sundays). The Worship and Music Committee is looking for supply clergy. For the moment I will provide sermons from the ELCIC Summer Sermon Series when I am away and when clergy are unable to supply. Service of the Word will be used for these services. Pastor Lena Jensen will be on call when I am away.

I am having dental surgery on June 13 and will be out of commission for the week for services so Pastor Sue will be covering for me.

7.**Correspondence:** A letter was received Carefor regarding a fundraising event that will take place on Saturday, September 16, 2023. The funds from this event, called The Grand Parade, will go to offering services to Ottawa Valley seniors by ensuring the monthly rents at their retirement homes stay within reach of all seniors, to their transportation program to help seniors get to essential medical appointments, and to ensuring their meal delivery program keeps our seniors fed and healthy. The letter will be included in the next Guiding Light and a poster has been placed on the bulletin board by the main entrance.

8.Committee Reports:

Property-We will be putting our new shed in place this coming Friday. It will be placed adjacent to the fence between our parking lot and the Miller St home next to us. We will still be able to park in front of the shed. **Worship and Music**: Michael reported that Blaine will be attending the Summer Institute of Church Music Conference this year from July 9 to 13.

Blaine also shared that due to more complicated music being requested at funerals that his fee to play at the funeral will be increased to \$175.00Discussion at the Worship and Music meeting was held regarding the organ restoration. The time to complete the work is approximately 3 months. There is approximately \$10,000 needed for this work. A proposal was made that the organ restoration account be closed and a new 140 Anniversary account be opened. This account can be used for events and other needs such as the organ restoration. Susan will contact Gayle to put together an announcement with more details.

140th Anniversary: Lorraine MacKenzie, Kathy Nieman and Blaine Sack will be working on plans for this years anniversary celebrations. A dinner when the Bishop is here in November along with a banner are planned at this time. More volunteers would be welcomed.

Cemetery: Jamie reported that cemetery fees are being reviewed and will be increasing. More detail will be shared in the fall

9.New Business: We received a request from Joanne Bymm to have her membership transferred back to Zion. The request was approved.

We have had 3 requests from different organizations to rent our parish hall. After discussion by the group it was agreed that Susan will speak to each group to get more information from them before final decisions will be made. Our parish hall is becoming very busy and we want to ensure that make sure we have available time open for our own growing requirements.

4.**Finance Report:** From the comparative income statement and comparative balance sheet, treasurer Gerry Vandersleen highlighted: Offerings are down \$4000.00 from the same period last year. Overall income from other sources is up about \$2000.00 from the same period last year. Benevolence is the same, but gas and hydro are up \$2400.00. Church insurance is up as well. The church's present deficit is -\$35 463.01. This information will be placed in Sunday's bulletin with a request for support of the church's general fund.

5.**Pastors Report:** Council Report September/23 : There have been 7 deaths since June, with 4 of those deaths occurring in the past week. As it is September, activities in the church are resuming. Messy Church was held last night, there is a confirmation meeting on Sunday, September 17, Confirmation Sunday is October 29, midweek services and retirement home services are resuming.

6.**Correspondence:** Bernadette McCann House- a thank you note has been received from the Bernadette McCann House for the donation received from the Annual General Meeting (from the endowment fund).

7.Committee Reports

•Worship and Music- Susan gave a brief update received from Gayle. The video equipment upgrade cost is approximately \$4500; we presently have approximately \$3500. Discussion amongst council members. Jamie motioned that we use money from the Dorothy Witt account to make up the difference. Seconded by Denise Schizkoske. Unanimously supported by council. All Creation Sings hymn books- \$860.00 has been received to date. The total cost required for the order is approximately \$1300.00. Council gave the go ahead for Pastor Scott to purchase as some people/groups have plans to purchase but haven't as of yet. The organ restoration account is at \$59 823.09.

Cemetery price increases- Jamie reviewed the suggested cemetery price increases and the reasoning behind the increases. If accepted by both our church and St Timothy's, the changes would take effect immediately. Some discussion amongst council members. Motion to accept the price increases on cemetery costs was moved by Jill Kellough and seconded by Karen Gauthier. The motion was accepted unanimously by council.

8.Ongoing Business

Back in June, a proposal was made that the organ restoration account be closed and a new 140 Anniversary account be opened. This account can be used for events and other needs such as the organ restoration. After discussion it was decided to leave things as they are right now. Once the organ restoration account gets closer to its goal, we will discuss how best to work with it. We will again encourage members to continue directing their funds to the general account.

Parish Hall rental- there are numerous organizations interested in using the Parish Hall. The Tai chi club continues to rent the hall on Tuesday and Thursday. A group organizing pickleball is inquiring re the hall rental. The Scottish dancers will be renting the hall in the evenings, the specifics of which need to be worked out.
ZLW is requesting the loose offering on Sunday, September 24 be designated for the Fellowship of the Least Coin. Unanimously accepted by council.

9.New Business

Karen provided a brief report on the Special Convention of the ELCIC held in June in Calgary. Attention was brought to the various task forces and their reports and recommendations, all of which were voted on and passed by convention delegates. Karen will meet with Pastor Scott to discuss these reports further. •Kathy provided an update on the 140th anniversary committee activities. The celebration will take place on November 26 at 3:00pm. Tickets will be available for purchase. A special anniversary organ concert will be held Nov 5, at the costs of \$20/ticket...more details will follow.

•Nominating committee for new council members- 5 council members will be leaving council next year. People are needed to sit on council to replace these vacancies. A council term is 2 years. Council members will follow up with individuals who they feel may be interested in sitting on council.

•Stewardship- Pastor Scott suggested a stewardship committee be formed to discuss how we use our gifts in the church. Pastor Scott will look in to this further with discussion planned for the next council meeting. •Going forward...the need to address our plans. Susan led a discussion on the changes we are seeing in the church and the future of the church. Different scenarios were discussed, and the need for congregational input was stressed. It is important to start these discussions now. More information will be available as we move through this process, which could take up to 5 years.
