

Soup And Sandwich Luncheon



Minutes

ZION EVANGELICAL LUTHERAN CHURCH Council Meeting September 14, 2022

Present: Susan Dupuis, Karen Gauthier, Jill Kellough, Michael Lange, Jamie MacKinnon, Kathy Nieman, Pastor Scott Schellenberger, Denise Schizkoske, Gerry Vandersleen (treasurer), Patricia Wegner **Excused:** Erica Deloughery, Diana Wegner

- **1. Opening:** The meeting was opened at 7:00pmby Susan Dupuis. An opening prayer was given by Pastor Scott.
- Approval of Agenda: The agenda was reviewed. Additions: under committee reports- Learning, Pastoral Care. Motion to approve agenda:Kathy Nieman. Seconded: Denise Schizkoske.
- Approval of Minutes: The previous council meeting minutes of June were reviewed. Motion to approve minutes: Jill Kellough. Seconded: Jamie MacKinnon.

Guest Sandra Sell. Sandra Sell was welcomed to the council meeting to discuss three of her concerns, which include the plans with the Food Bank, the quorum at the congregational meeting on the vote for the sale of property to the Food Bank, and the church website. Council clarified and provided answers to Sandra's concerns, including:

The Food Bank- Sandra is concerned with the Food Bank being next door to the church, with the size of the proposed building, with parking spaces being lost and

with the operation of the Food Bank potentially impacting the church's operations in the future. Sandra is also concerned that snow removal and parking lot maintenance are the responsibility of the church so is liability going to fall on the church as well? Gerry indicated that if more parking spaces are needed, the parking lot could be expanded into the lot where the community garden is (the garden will remain as is), and that snow removal and parking lot maintenance will be prorated between the church and the Food Bank. As the Food Bank is only open on Mondays, there should be little impact on the operations of the church and there have been multiple opportunities for questions to be asked given the past meetings on the issue. Most comments heard have been positive and in favour of the Food Bank development to date. **Quorum:** Sandra questioned the number for guorum and why a secret ballot was not part of the voting process. Susan indicated the quorum number of 50 has been part of the church's constitution since 1972 and acknowledged that in the future, a secret ballot would be the preferred way to hold a vote. Website: Sandra mentioned some issues with information on the website. The website is under plans to be revamped but in the meantime, Pastor Scott will follow up with Doug to make corrections.

4. Finance Report: Gerry gave the finance report. In comparison with the previous year, offerings are down slightly, but offerings to global hunger and the Food Bank are up. The church's total revenue is essentially the same; utility costs, insurance costs, and operating expenses are all up. Pay roll, benefit expenses, and total expenses are all up compared to last year.

Internet in Gym - needs to be made stronger

7. Committee Reports

• Property- Gerry gave the property report. A property meeting was held on September 12. First General will begin cleanup this week on the Miller Street property. The Miller Street

property has over \$6000 in rent owing, over \$800 in utilities owing and the previous tenant's Cogeco bill remains outstanding. Susan will look into recouping some of these costs through Ontario Works. A discussion around the 442 Miller property was held and the potential change to using the property as a temporary emergency shelter due to new information available. Further details will be worked out by the property committee and then brought to council. Trimming along the fence line between the church and Miller Street property needs to be done (Kevin, AI, and Peter). Rezoning of the Food Bank to institutional/residential will have to begin (Gerry will follow up). Roof repairs are required; lan Schwantz has agreed to do the repairs. Snow removal-Gerry will approach Shane Lehman to see if he will be doing the yard once again. If not then guotes from others will be required. Recent fridge repairs should be covered under warranty (Al will follow up). Shed - Barry has prices from Old Hickory. Wayne will also look into Algonquin College making a shed for us. Doorbell- Don is looking into wireless doorbells through Amazon as an option. Pianos still need to be removed. Organ filter- Don will check with Allister or Murray to see about replacing the organ filter in the downstairs room. Sanctuary doors-Kevin and Wayne will look into the best option to reseal the sanctuary doors.

- W & M- Sunday school started on Sunday Sept 11. Additional teachers have been added so there will be a rotation of 5 teachers. Midweek services will be held twice/month (Wednesdays @ 10:30).
- Social Ministry-Denise said the church garage sale will be held October 22.
- Pulse Ministries-Pastor Scott states that the Youth Group has begun, and Living Stones Worship will be held the third Sunday of the month. Messy church was held September 12 with approximately 8-12 children in attendance.
- Learning- Sunday School and Youth Group.
- Pastoral Care-Karen said the first meeting after the summer of the Pastoral Care Group was held September 12. One member has resigned from the committee. There are presently 45 members on the call list who the group reaches

out to once/month either by phone or visit.

8. Ongoing Business

- Food Bank Update- preliminary drawings of the proposed building were viewed with all attempts to make the building fit into the neighbourhood. Some fundraising has been started by the Food Bank, with plans to open it up to the general public in the future.
- Congregational meeting re Constitution- a motion was passed in May by council which states "Church council recommends the replacement of our present constitution and bylaws with the Model Constitution and Bylaws for congregations which was created and approved by the National Church Council in September 2017". After discussing dates and timelines, October 16 is set as the date for the congregational meeting. There will be no coffee hour after the meeting.
- Hiring replacement for Jean-Personnel committee will meet next week with Jean and Pastor Scott to discuss hiring a replacement for Jean. Pam Duplessis will be involved in the hiring process, along with the personnel committee of Michael Lange (council representative), Allan Rose, and Kathy Godin. The position will be posted both internally and externally.
- Building Community Workshop June 4- Ottawa Valley Ministry Area Team met on June 4. Discussions were held around volunteers, socializing, technology, and looking to the future. The minutes from this meeting will be printed in the October issue of the Guiding Light.

9. New Business

- Upgrading of recording equipment-TV Ministry Long Term Mission Grant. The computer software being used in the balcony needs to be upgraded. Pastor Scott has spoken to Synod and Synod Mission Grants may be available to help cover the costs. Pastor Scott will look in to this further.
- Picture of Queen- located at the back door of the Parish Hall. Will remain in place at present.
- Workspace for Blaine- there are several empty rooms on

the second floor in the office which might work.
