# The Power of Thanks-giving

When we truly understand what is behind living a life of thanksgiving there is a power released for us to enjoy. If you did a quick Google search on 'gratitude' or 'being thankful' you will discover various health sites providing medical proof that thankful people are healthier people. These benefits include: the ability to cope with stress, more mentally alert, a greater optimism about the future, overall improved physical health and a higher likability factor resulting in a wholesome social life. A few keys to remember this Thanksgiving are:

#### 1. Thanksgiving is GIVING THANKS.

It is intentionally releasing something we possess with a cheerful heart. The word thanks is an adverb that describes HOW we give. willingly give, if we are ungrateful we take.

#### 2. Giving thanks means we have to THINK.

It's interesting to note that "think" and "thank" come from same Anglo-Saxon root word. It has been proven if a person takes time each day to write out 20 things they are thankful for, it will have a profound affect on their mental stability and release anxiety. This takes significant thought, but the rewards are amazing.

#### **3. Giving thanks takes EFFORT.**

Complaining requires no training, but to develop an attitude of gratitude takes work. As a child when someone gave us a gift, most of our parents looked at us and said: "What do you say?" It takes effort to think about God's goodness and thank Him, or to think what someone has done for us and sincerely thank that person. A simple thank you note requires we sacrifice some time and a few dollars, but the benefits are huge.

#### 4. Giving thanks means leaving the MOAN ZONE for the BLESSING ZONE.

#### 5. Giving thanks yields a heart of CONTENTMENT.

Paul writes in 1 Timothy 6:6,7: "But godliness with contentment is great gain. For we brought nothing into the world, and we can take nothing out of it." The secret to being content in a world that offers so many amazing technological breakthroughs, is to simply step back and start giving thanks.

#### 6. "Thanks" is your PASSWORD to log into God's presence.

We all are familiar with using a password to gain access to an account or a website. Similarly, to gain access into God's presence, the Psalmist instructs us: "Let us come before His presence with thanksgiving". Not only does it make a difference on the way we enter into God's presence, it makes a huge impact when we enter the presence or our spouse, family, friends, employer in that manner.

#### 7. Thankfulness is a GIFT that has a powerful affect on our faith.

Giving thanks is meant to be a way of life, not just a celebration once a year. The apostle Paul put it this way: in everything give thanks; for this is the will of God in Christ Jesus for you.

Hearts	Church Council Meeting Minutes June 14, 2021	

Present: Chair Susan Dupuis, Pastor Scott Schellenberger

Special guest: Doug Maliff (representing St. Joseph's Foodbank).

**Opening:** The meeting was opened at 7:00pm by Susan Dupuis. Opening devotions were given by Jill Kellough. Susan introduced our new pastor, Pastor Scott Schellenberger and council members were introduced.

**Approval of Agenda:** The agenda was reviewed. No additions/changes. Motion to approve agenda: Denise Schizkoske. Seconded: Scott Lange.

**Approval of Minutes:** The previous council meeting minutes of May 10,2021 were reviewed. Motion to approve minutes: Jill Kellough. Seconded:Patty Wegner.

**Special Request: Food Bank.** Gerry indicated that there has been a request for Zion to partner with St. Joseph's Foodbank with a building on the church's vacant property; the proposal is to place the building beside the community garden. Another proposal is for the sale of one of the rental properties to the Food Bank. According to Zion's legal counsel, there is a requirement for a severance of the property prior to construction of the building. Doug Maliff from the Foodbank states on average 400 families access the Foodbank every month and the need continues to increase. Doug indicates that the Foodbank would be responsible for hydro, sewer, and water costs, in addition to the building, contents, insurance, and taxes. The foodbank is open Monday mornings at present.

Discussion was held around snow removal; snow removal costs would need to be discussed as the building would take away some of our snow storage area. Providing such a space would provide a much needed service and work within our community. Susan presented a motion: "We so move that we support the request from the St. Josephs Foodbank to further investigate having the foodbank building on Zion's church property." Moved: Scott Lange. Seconded: Denise Schizkoske. Unanimously supported by council.

Finance Report: Gerry Vandersleen gave the finance report. Gerry reviewed the comparative

balance sheet and brought attention to some items for Pastor Scott's benefit. From the comparative income statement, Gerry noted that regular offerings are up slightly, global hunger is down, and the total revenue is down.

Pastor's Report: Pastor Scott gave the following report.

"Blessings it is great to finally be in Pembroke and to be so busy. **Statistical facts**: I buried Conrad Plath and Myrtle Lanthier within the last week at Zion. **5 weddings** coming between now and October 2. All have family connections or were confirmed at the church.

**1 baptism** July 25, 2021. Brynlee Mae Wileland-Bourgeois, mother Bailey Wileland, I spoke with her about numbers. She figures there would be 26 people present. I told her that going into July 25, we should be in phase 2 and may be able to accommodate. But if we are in phase 1 we will have to talk numbers.

**Worship-** This coming Sunday we will be celebrating World Refugee Sunday and National Indigenous People's Day which is June 21. The service will feature some different musical elements and spoken liturgy. If you can't be there in person please catch it online. Holy Communion- We will celebrate Holy Communion whenever possible on Sunday mornings during in person worship.

**Camp Lutherlyn-**I feel strongly that I should every year spend one week at the camp as a camp chaplain. Many of our people servce on the board and are committed to seeing it succeed. The history also is such that the camp was started by the pastor of Zion at that time.

#### Synod Assembly- Online June 25-26.

**RETREAT post Covid- Where do we go from here?** I would like to spend a day at Four Seasons lodge at Camp Lutherlyn to retreat as a council to address these questions as well as do some team building. Where do we go from here? What are the gifts we currently have at our disposal? Can we use them? How will we carry out ministry?

A bigger question I want us to think about is: What type of church do we want to develop? A traditional church or an attractional church? What is the difference? I believe we all know what a traditional church is: worship Sunday morning, give to keep the building going and pay the pastor, and a Sunday school. Well we know how that is working for us.

What is an attractional church? There is a movement from the Church of England called Fresh Expressions. Fresh Expressions argues that the church needs to constantly be changing and part ways with stuffy same old same old. Instead they are to meet people where they are at. So for example let me share a few examples: In Peterborough, my experience was such that there was a member who had contacts at the one roof diner a place where hot meals were served twice daily. She rounded up some members and before we knew it they were cooking a meal for 150 people every two months to take somewhere else. Another great example I heard about was a couple of guys who were apt with bicycles set up a free bike repair shop so that anyone could get some help. I think they just did it on their front lawn. I could go on and on but I won't here tonight. What I would like is your permission to book Four Seasons for a fall retreat with the understanding there will be some cost to the church. Also, I would like to bring in a facilitator (so I an listen to different group work) whom we should probably give an honourarium to. Lastly, I think it would also be important to ask Blaine and Jean and Kevin to join us as they

have their feet to the ground in different areas.

**Holidays:** I know that I just started but I am asking for permission to take two weeks off this summer. We take possession of our house on July 15. I would appreciate having the following Sunday off and the rest of the week beginning Monday July 12. This will give us a chance to see kids and parents in Kitchener which we haven't really seen in a year for longer than twenty minutes. The other week I am hoping to take is in August. It could be possible to conduct worship on the following Sunday. I am sure there are other thing to think about, but we'll get to that."

- Follow up on request for pension information- an email was received from Brian Gollinger with thanks for support of the retirement pension resolution. The resolution will be brought to the floor at Synod this summer.
- Jean's vacation- Jean will be away June 21-25, July 5-9, and possibly a few days in August. As coverage is uncertain, a message will be left on the answering machine to contact Pastor Scott with any issues. Volunteers may be present to answer phones for pre-registration for church services. Gerry will be off the last week of July and first Sunday in August.
- Membership transfer- Beatrice Biederman wishes to be transferred to Grace Lutheran. Transfer approved by council.
- YouTube terms of service-change in terms of service. Susan discussed if these changes mean anything. At this point there is no concern for the way the church uses the YouTube platform.
- Pastor Scott...expectations and plans. Susan suggested that the retreat may be a good avenue to explore this further. Susan admits the technological aspect is something that is a struggle so any help in this area is appreciated. Pastor Scott is preparing to call members on the membership list.

Adjournment: The meeting adjourned at8:45pm. Motion to adjourn: Scott Lange. Seconded: Patty Wegner. The next Church Council Meeting will be scheduled inSeptember (date to be determined).

## Why do we do a Land Acknowledgement in Worship?

It's a tradition that has dated back centuries for Indigenous people, but for many non-Indigenous Canadians, officially recognizing the territory or lands we stand on is a fairly new concept.

#### What is a territorial or land acknowledgement?

A territorial or land acknowledgement is an act of reconciliation that involves making a statement recognizing the traditional territory of the Indigenous people who called the land home before the arrival of settlers, and in many cases still do call it home.

#### What is its purpose?

"Its purpose is to recognize that we, as settlers and as people who are not part of First Nations or Indigenous groups, are here on their land," said Alison Norman, a research adviser in the Ontario Ministry of Indigenous Relations and Reconciliation and a researcher at Trent University.

Norman says land acknowledgements have become increasingly common in non-Indigenous spaces in the last few years, especially since the Truth and Reconciliation Commission (TRC) on residential schools released its 94 calls to action in 2015.

"Many organizations, libraries, governments and school boards are all thinking about what we need to do to respond to the TRC," she said. "It's about thinking about what happened in the past and what changes can be made going forward in order to further the reconciliation process."

A lot of people are unaware of Canada's actual history and this gets people talking and conversations starting.

#### How long have territorial acknowledgements existed?

Territorial acknowledgements have existed for hundreds of years as part of many Indigenous cultures.

"When we talk about the newness of territorial acknowledgements, these aren't new. Acknowledging relationships to space and place is an ancient Indigenous practice that flows into the future. What we see as concrete, what we see as city halls, as buildings, these are all places that have been prayed for, that have been gathering places for ceremonies.

What does the acknowledgement mean to Indigenous people and communities? It reminds us we are accountable to these relationships and to remind us every day, for example in school systems, of the accountability that everybody has to listen to the concerns of the community and how we can align to our [Indigenous] community.

#### What does the acknowledgement mean to non-Indigenous communities?

Land acknowledgement should lead to more questions about who the people listed in the acknowledgement are and how their land came to be possessed by settlers and how we can build relationships with our indigenous neighbours.

# 2021-2022 Confirmation Classes Year 1

Confirmation is going to look a whole lot different at Zion this year. In years past there has always been a lot of memorization and many years ago people were even tested in worship. That will not happen while I am pastor of Zion. Think about it? Would you want to be tested before the parish?

The confirmation program I have developed for this year focuses on building relationships with one another and the church. We will cover the traditional topics like learning the small catechism and bible stories. To give you an idea of the plan here is a brief description of our program:

#### **PROGRAM OVERVIEW**

#### SCHEDULE

6:15pm-7:30pm one hour class and time for snacks We meet the first THREE Wednesday of the month unless there is no school.

This year's confirmation class will gather for fellowship, games, and group activities that focus on building relationship with one another.

#### **EXPECTATIONS**

#### Worship Involvement

- Attend worship regularly turning in 5 worship reflections
- Acolyte or be involved in another capacity, like ushering, assisting the bell ringer, help with the technology and recording, or reading the lessons.

#### **Congregation Involvement**

- Participate in 6 EPIC events over two years (Experiential, Participatory, Interactive, Conversational)

#### What are Epic Events?

Experience is where our faith is put into practice.

Participation is how a person's faith identity is formed.

Interaction with others helps shift information from short-term to long-term memory. Conversation helps students apply what they have learned to their lives by listening to others as well as sharing their own story.

These events are your opportunity to grow closer to members of the congregation that you may otherwise not have the chance to get to know, as well as begin to understand the responsibilities of active members of the church.

#### EPIC Events scheduled or to be scheduled

- Garage Sale in October
- Come to assist and bring your own pets to a Pet Blessing October 17<sup>th</sup> at 3pm
- Possible Midweek Lenten Services with Soup and Sandwiches

For the most part any ministry event and Bible Study gathering can be considered an EPIC event. Suggested EPIC events are: attend Church Council Meeting, service

events, any ministry event of our congregation.

#### **Confirmation Camp July 3-8 2022**

- Each year will culminate with a week of Confirmation Camp at Camp Lutherlyn. We will complete this year from July 3-8 2022.
