Homily

Palm Sunday, with its celebration of the entry of Jesus into Jerusalem, marks the beginning of Holy Week and the story of Christ's death and his resurrection on Easter morning.

This year, the Gospel is from St. Matthew. As the writer of Matthew's Gospel tells the story, he is careful to show us how the entry of Jesus into Jerusalem on Palm Sunday was the fulfillment of Hebrew scripture. This was very important to the writer of Matthew's Gospel, which was written primarily for Jewish Christians.

Jesus is the one who was spoken of through the prophets; he is the promised one. As he enters Jerusalem, the words of the prophet Zechariah come to mind and God's promises are fulfilled in Jesus the Christ.

Jesus is greatly honoured as he enters Jerusalem and is called the son of David, which is a great title indeed for the Jewish people. In their joy, they cry out, "Hosanna" which roughly translates as "deliver us". In Matthew's Gospel, there is some confusion about who Jesus is as they welcome him. He is greatly honoured by the title 'Son of David', and yet the people still ask, "Who is he?"

The words of Zechariah the prophet is the key to understanding who Jesus is for us – "a humble king…he shall command peace to the nations".

Jesus was not what many were looking for. They wanted someone to help them overthrow the Romans and restore Israel to greatness.

Many people would soon flee from Jesus when they saw him on the cross. But some would return, and to others Jesus himself would return, and in our Lord they would find the path of life... the path that leads from death to life...the true source of our hope and peace, which passes all understanding.

We, who welcome Jesus as he comes to us, have the joy of knowing who he is and what he has done for us – so our hearts welcome him with joy and gratitude. And we will see his journey to the cross not as a great tragedy; but as a glorious triumph over the power of evil and the sting of death in our world. It is with this knowledge that we sing out this day, "Hosanna. Blessed is he who comes in the name of the Lord". Amen
