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INTRODUCTION ORDER OF SERVICE

Lent has traditionally been a time of repentance and renewal. In the early church, this was a time of preparation and instruction for those to be baptized at the Great Vigil of Easter on Holy Saturday. Later this idea of preparation and instruction was applied to baptized Christians as well. In our Lenten observance on these Wednesday evenings, we will concentrate on the five great themes of Luther's Small Catechism for our lessons and sermons. Our service order will be centered around the Ten Commandments as our guide and light to a life in loving response to the Gospel of our Lord.

EXHORTATION:

P: Brothers and sisters: We are created to experience joy in communion with God, to love one another, and to live in harmony with creation. But our sinful rebellion separates us from God, our neighbors, and creation, so that we do not enjoy the life our creator intended. As disciples of the Lord Jesus, we are called to struggle against everything that leads us away from love of God and neighbor. Repentance, fasting, prayer, and works of love --the discipline of Lent -- help us to wage our spiritual warfare.

Let us therefore turn to the Word of God this night. For the Word of God contains the Law and the Gospel and is the light before our eyes. The Gospel is God's gracious promise to us as his beloved children. It shows us all that He has done for us, in Israel and in Jesus Christ, for the forgiveness of sins and for newness of life. Christ makes us his own and heirs of his kingdom. The Law, on the other hand, represents what God expects of us in the response of our lives as we live in loving service to his will.

THE LESSONS**Romans 6:1-11,**

6 What then are we to say? Should we continue in sin in order that grace may abound? ² By no means! How can we who died to sin go on living in it? ³ Do you not know that all of us who have been baptized into Christ Jesus were baptized into his death? ⁴ Therefore we have been buried with him by baptism into death, so that, just as Christ was raised from the dead by the glory of the Father, so we too might walk in newness of life.

⁵ For if we have been united with him in a death like his, we will certainly be united with him in a resurrection like his. ⁶ We know that our old self was crucified with him so that the body of sin might be destroyed, and we might no longer be enslaved to sin. ⁷ For whoever has died is freed from sin. ⁸ But if we have died with Christ, we believe that we will also live with him. ⁹ We know that Christ, being raised from the dead, will never die again; death no longer has dominion over him. ¹⁰ The death he died, he died to sin, once for all; but the life he lives, he lives to God. ¹¹ So you also must consider yourselves dead to sin and alive to God in Christ Jesus.

John 3:1-17

SECOND READING

Now there was a Pharisee named Nicodemus, a leader of the Jews. ² He came to Jesus by night and said to him, “Rabbi, we know that you are a teacher who has come from God; for no one can do these signs that you do apart from the presence of God.” ³ Jesus answered him, “Very truly, I tell you, no one can see the kingdom of God without being born from above.” ⁴ Nicodemus said to him, “How can anyone be born after having grown old? Can one enter a second time into the mother’s womb and be born?” ⁵ Jesus answered, “Very truly, I tell you, no one can enter the kingdom of God without being born of water and Spirit. ⁶ What is born of the flesh is flesh, and what is born of the Spirit is spirit. ⁷ Do not be astonished that I said to you, ‘You must be born from above.’ ⁸ The wind blows where it chooses, and you hear the sound of it, but you do not know where it comes from or where it goes. So it is with everyone who is born of the Spirit.” ⁹ Nicodemus said to him, “How can these things be?” ¹⁰ Jesus answered him, “Are you a teacher of Israel, and yet you do not understand these things?

¹¹ “Very truly, I tell you, we speak of what we know and testify to what we have seen; yet you do not receive our testimony. ¹² If I have told you about earthly things and you do not believe; how can you believe if I tell you about heavenly things? ¹³ No one has ascended into heaven except the one who descended from heaven, the Son of Man. ¹⁴ And just as Moses lifted up the serpent in the wilderness, so must the Son of Man be lifted up, ¹⁵ that whoever believes in him may have eternal life.

¹⁶ “For God so loved the world that he gave his only Son, so that everyone who believes in him may not perish but may have eternal life.

¹⁷“Indeed, God did not send the Son into the world to condemn the world, but in order that the world might be saved through him.

SERMON Pastor Leena Jensen

Nicodemus was a Pharisee, an observant religious man, a member of the powerful Sanhedrin religious order. Something about Jesus was so intriguing to Nicodemus, that he was willing to take the risk of going to see this travelling preacher who was causing such a fuss among the people. But as impressed with Jesus as Nicodemus was, he took the precaution of coming to Jesus at night, maybe not to be seen by anyone else.

We learn that Nicodemus addressed Jesus with respect: "Rabbi" he said, "Teacher." Then Nicodemus discloses his own heart, when he says, "We know you are a teacher come from God, for no one can perform the signs and wonders that you do, unless by the power of God."

Seems to me that Nicodemus approached Jesus to find out for himself, who Jesus could really truly be.

First, let's look at who Nicodemus was. He is educated, he's part of an elite religious order, and well respected in the religious community and as a pharisee he had leadership authority and carried a lot of weight with the people, as to how to live a religious faith directed life. He is

curious about Jesus, he sees Jesus as someone who preaches, and teaches somewhat differently than the other rabbi's and yet is stirring some spiritual sense in him.

We here today, as we gather on this Wednesday of Lent, we want to get to know Jesus better as well. We are curious just like Nicodemus. We like Nicodemus are not strangers to the teachings in the bible, but we are certainly willing to grow in understanding and in relationship to God. I would imagine Jesus, was onto Nicodemus and his compliments and admiration for recognizing that Jesus is a teacher come from God. And as a wise teacher, Jesus pushes Nicodemus beyond his compliments and admiration to a vision of a life that is totally transformed. "The truth of the matter is, unless one is born from above, one cannot see the kingdom of God."

Nicodemus being a Pharisee, believed in the afterlife and they taught that the way to get there was by following the law. Righteousness was their focus.

Jesus continues to push Nicodemus, beyond his obsession of religious law and order, "Are you not a teacher of Israel and yet you do not understand these things." As to reinforce, "Listen to what I'm teaching Nicodemus," Jesus insists that, "whoever believes that God so loved the world as to send me, that one will not die but have eternal life." Jesus insists, yes, I come from God, but not to condemn or to judge but to tell you, that you will not die but have eternal life.

We today, like Nicodemus in the gospel are being urged to see beyond our own self absorbed limited thinking to open to the Good News that Jesus teaches. We get it when we are in church, acknowledging our faith in Jesus comes easy. Our worship liturgy guides us in our confession of faith, in listening to the word, coming forward for the holy meal. It is safe inside these walls, and there is no judgement, and we do our best to get closer to God. We acknowledge weekly that God is amongst us, and we feel better knowing that we are not alone when we are here together in worship. The last words in our liturgy is a sending, to go into the world and serve the Lord and to be like Christ to others.

Yet, we all live in the real world, away from the church sanctuary, places where we meet others, others of no faith, or refusal of faith, or different faith. It does not seem as comfy and cozy out in the world and specially to speak of Gods Kingdom and how we are saved through Grace, through God's love. Well, we are not alone, we all have our doubts and we certainly do not want to speak out of turn.

Father Henry Nouwen, a Dutch catholic priest and theologian reflects on the story of Nicodemus, he writes from his own context.

"I love Jesus but want to hold on to my own friends even when they do not lead me closer to Jesus.

I love Jesus but want to hold on to my own independence even when that independence brings me no real freedom.

I love Jesus but do not want to lose the respect of my professional colleagues, even though I know that their respect does not make me grow spiritually.

I love Jesus but do not want to give up my writing plans, travel plans, and speaking plans, even when these plans are often more to my glory than that to the glory of God."

Upon reflection Father Nouwen realizes that he is not all that different from Nicodemus. He writes, "So I am like Nicodemus, who came by night, and said safe things about Jesus to his colleagues."

There is an element of Nicodemus in all of us. It is always easier to play it safe and keep Jesus off in the distance rather than witness and share what we know with others.

It may be that today we are like Nicodemus, and we are standing within the shadowed doorway, seeking to move from what has been our style of living to a new way of life that Jesus describes

as the Kingdom of Heaven here on earth. When Jesus tells Nicodemus ⁵ “Very truly, I tell you, no one can enter the kingdom of God without being born of water and Spirit, to be born from above, that meaning shapes our lives now and for eternity.

"God so loved the world that he gave his only Son, that whoever believes in him should not perish but have eternal life."

That word to Nicodemus is shared with each one of us, to bless us, to save us. Amen.
