**Opening:** The meeting was opened by chair, Susan Dupuis. Opening devotions were given by Wilmer Verch.

**Minutes:** The previous council meeting minutes of April 9, 2019 were reviewed.

**Finance Report:** Gerry Vandersleen brought attention to the following items from the comparative income statement and balance statement:

- Offerings are down, expenses are up
- Total equity is in a deficit position compared to this time last year
- Benevolence offerings may have to wait until later in the year due to present deficit
- Susan will prepare a submission for the Guiding Light regarding pre-authorized remittances (PAR)
- Based on church energy usage, money can be saved by signing up with Ontario Wholesale Energy for energy costs, lots of small businesses are on board

Motion to convert to OWE for energy costs: Wilmer Verch

Seconded: whole council

**Property Report:** Given by Wilmer Verch

- Gerry Vandersleen has resigned as chairperson; rather than appointing a chairperson,

duties of the chairperson will be shared by all committee members

- The snowstops on roof on parking lot sideneed to be replaced, quotes are being sought
- Ideas are being generated on emergency responses on rental properties
- Heating pipe leak has been repaired temporarily
- The quote for the roof and ceiling repair in the entrance is in process
- Two stained glass windows are scheduled for refinishing in June
- Sand clean-up in the parking lot needs to be completed

### **Pastor's Report:**

- Spring burials have begun. The first was one at Perreton United Church for Cecil Dayment. Today there was interment for Delbert "Bud" Miller in Eganville. Thursday this week there will be interment for Edna Hoelke and Viola Antler with others to take place after I return from holidays. Most of those will be the interment of cremains.
- We are prepared for the celebration of Confirmation for Nadia MacKinnon. One question comes from this preparation is that in the past we were able to give crosses to the confirmands from Faith Life. They no longer provide them. Next year there will be 9 confirmands. If we are to share a gift with them we need to have someone budget for them in their committee. If so, I suggest it could be shared by Education and Worship/Music. Another would be from Council perhaps using some funds from the Miscellaneous fund.
- We have received a notice from the city that the site at the marina will not be ready for our June 16<sup>th</sup> worship service due to flooding.
- One of our families, Dean and Roxanne Landon, have lost their home due to flooding. The good shepherding fund has given them \$250 in a Walmart gift card for their immediate needs. They are staying with Roxanne's parents at this time. If you know of anyone else in need please share it with me, Jean Rutz or Ellen Vandersleen to share our gifts with those in need.
- As I was listening to Debbie Wegner's report this Sunday from the call committee, I began thinking about interim ministry, and in particular worship on Saturdays. When you recruit an interim pastor you may not be able to provide all regular worship opportunities that happen with a called pastor. There may also be other ministries that will need to be shared or taken up by members of the congregation. One might be confirmation instruction.
- Pastor Bruce Thompson has been asked to perform a Marriage for Jenn Hein and Glenn Goetz on September 7. Jenn is a member of Augsburg Lutheran Church in Eganville. Approved by council.
- I will be on holidays May 21-June 4. Pastor Bruce Thompson will be providing pastoral care during that time.
- ZLW will present their Pentecost program on June 5

### **Correspondence:**

- How to find and apply for Grants- local, provincial, national organizations at the both governmental and non-governmental levels. Susan presented information on an

upcoming workshop on this topic.

**Committee Reports:** Given by Dan Dole.

- **Cemetery-** A meeting was held May 7. The cemetery committee executive remains the same. Six spring burials will take place this year. The ledger for the cemetery account was presented; Ron Reiche will meet with Gerry Vandersleen to discuss changing to a financial report rather than a ledger report. The list of approved service suppliers was edited and will be sent to area funeral homes and monument companies. New business includes: obtaining quotes for fence painting at Indsdale cemetery; inspection of trees in both cemeteries; preparation of a list of available graves at Indsdale; drawing up a new map of Indsdale to show available plots; items discussed but not being addressed at present include plans for additional graves at Indsdale and the entrances to the Indsdale cemetery. With respect to plots at Indsdale, Pastor Paul suggested using the Synod office to obtain the names of the relatives of the people who are buried at Indsdale and have plots remaining on their sites.

**Ongoing Business:**

- Update on council terms- Susan updated council terms with council members present.
- Camp cleanup went well and included raking and cleaning of Zion's cabin. Lots of clean up was required as the fall clean-up was not done thoroughly due to lack of volunteers. Zion has not historically been involved in the fall cleanup; Susan has been in contact with Susan Autio re the fall cleanup.
- Off-site liability. A certificate of liability from the insurer can be obtained for any off-site activities that Zion is involved in.
- Sharing the Guiding Light. An email from Synod office was received to share congregation newsletters with Synod. Pastor Paul indicates that this is already being done.
- A request was received from Holly Wagner regarding the use of the kitchen to prepare meals for people with diabetes or cancer patients. Holly is a Canadian Keto Coach, and hopes to work in conjunction with the Lavallee Center and patients with diabetes or cancer. Holly would require a stove-top, counter space, and temporary freezer space. Public Health would need to inspect the kitchen, and there may be issues with CRA and our charitable status. Feeling from council is that this is not appropriate at this time.
- May 11 workshop presented by Rev. Lori Pilatzke titled Who Is My Neighbor? Was attended by Ellen, Debbie Wegner and Susan. This workshop outlined an approach of going out into the community to do mission work and involves working with marginalized populations and those who would not normally be welcome and accepted in traditional church settings. There was a bible study presented on the Good Samaritan which was interesting. Council members discussed ways in which this type of ministry could be incorporated into Zion's ministry. One example was The Grind, which has a program where churches can volunteer and serve a meal on one Sunday/month; this might be a way to provide an introduction to Zion and its ministry. Another example was the Boys and Girls club meals which are already being provided by the church and maybe we consider serving the meal as well. Pastor Paul

suggested the people attending Music Healing Vets may benefit from our services. Susan suggested we need to increase our exposure in the community to the good deeds that the congregation is doing.

- Pembroke Community Kitchen. Email request from early April due to closing of Salvation Army. The Grind has been accepting hot lunches (for 50 people) from organizations to be served to the people who attend the Grind. Where does Zion fit into the new community kitchen? It is important for us to be involved to some extent. Susan will be looking into this issue further and will come back to council for further consultation.
- Zion's current Website. Few people look at our present website. There's a cost to the website (currently \$150/year being paid by Doug Maliff). Question of the need for an IT person to look after both the website and our Facebook page was raised by Susan. Susan has the name of a person in the local area who could assist in this endeavour; council in agreement with Susan speaking to this individual about the services they offer.
- Taping of services for Cogeco. Ellen has spoken with Richard Kramer at St. John's. They have an HD camera and a regular camera which they use to tape services. They record 5 copies onto DVD's for their shut-ins and burn their service taping onto a USB for Cogeco to broadcast. Costs for HD cameras may not be as high as originally anticipated. Ellen will share with worship and music for further consideration.
- ELCIC website information for Zion, Pembroke required updating. Changes were suggested and noted.
- Healthy Behaviour and Practices Workshop. Workshop on conflict resolution to be offered in the fall to Council, tailored to the needs of the council (1/2 or full day). Saturday September 21, Saturday October 5, or Saturday October 26 are suggested as potential dates.
- Empty lot. Some previous discussion centered on a community garden. Wilmer gave input from the property committee re the present community garden at the Mother Hill which no one looks after anymore. Good use as a parking lot, with a sitting area and flower boxes. Future needs re this property were also discussed (palliative hospice, supported/affordable living apartments).

**Blaine Sack: Church Musician**

## July 2019 – Human Trafficking

### July 30, International Day against Trafficking in Persons

*“Those who oppress the poor insult their Maker, but those who are kind to the needy honour him.”  
(Proverbs 14:31, NRSV.)*

Human trafficking is the recruitment and control of a person for the purpose of sexual exploitation, forced labour, or debt bondage. Human trafficking deprives people of their rights, freedom, independence, and self-respect. Indeed, their very humanity is stolen.

In 1990, twenty-two people who were committed to ending the sexual exploitation of children met in Thailand. After 5 days of deliberation, End Child Prostitution in Asian Tourism (ECPAT) was created. Twenty-eight years later, ECPAT has expanded into a network of 104 member organizations in 93 countries to protect and support children who are vulnerable to, caught in, and survivors of sex trafficking. However, the demand for sex trafficking has also expanded. It is now an industry that exploits 21 million people (mostly women and girls) and generates \$15.2 billion in illegal profits.

I recently met Timea Nagy, a survivor of human trafficking and the keynote speaker at an ECPAT conference in Winnipeg. Timea was a teenager when she emigrated from Hungary. She was promised \$1000 a month to work as a nanny. However, when she arrived, she was forced into sex work. Eventually she was able to escape. She now works with law enforcement officers to stop others from being trafficked.

*God of compassion, we pray for all of the women and children who have been trafficked and are vulnerable to being trafficked. May they have protection, support, and wholeness. May they regain their voices and their lives. God of justice, we also pray for those who prey on vulnerable people, and exploit and deny them their freedom. We pray for those who buy and demand sex from trafficked persons. May their hearts be truly changed and their eyes opened. May they repent for the pain, trauma, and loss that they have caused. May your justice and healing flow. In your name, we pray for the millions of people deeply affected by human trafficking. Amen.*

# Lenten Supper Group 2019

To our members of Zion who have once again supported our Lenten suppers by coming out and enjoying our meals and perhaps brought friends along, thank you. Some of our meals need extra preparation so to those people who were able to help us and to the unexpected donations of food thank you. We would also be lost without the assistance of our many volunteers for the clean up part of our suppers, and other facets of these meals so to these persons, THANK YOU.

During the six years of doing these suppers, people often ask us questions like would we share our recipes which we do. We also are asked do we get a special cut on our groceries, we do not. We do send out 10 shut in meals after our meal is finished for our guests and we do offer up to 10 tickets for our less fortunate every meal. Our newest question is how much food do we use for our five meals, so in the spirit of being transparent we have gathered some of our different foods together to give you a picture of quantities we use.

Turkeys - 144 lbs	Roast beef - 77 lbs	Ground beef - 60 lbs
Hams - 77 lbs	Eggs - 38 ½ dozen	Potatoes - 285 lbs
Carrots - 97 lbs	Milk - 13 - 4 litre bags	Butter - 30 lbs
Cabbage - 22 large heads	Turnips - 21	Jello - 69 pkgs (85 gram boxes)
Romaine Lettuce - 57 heads	Peas - 22 lbs	Onions - 30 lbs
Can milk - 24 tins	Cream cheese - 13 pkgs	Lemon pies - 25
Pumpkin Pies - 20	Carrot Cakes - 10	

This is by no means a total of everything but it does give you an idea of the amounts we do go through.

We were amazed that once again we surpassed last year's total of monies raised. This year our profits after everything was paid off was \$8,400.00. The majority of this will be going to the property committee with a small amount going to the kitchen fund. We have a small core of people who work on these meals all year watching for the best prices as well as being there from the beginning to the end of the meals, you know who you are, thank you.

If you ever find winter never ends believe us when we say when you are involved with these suppers for five weeks time just disappears and spring is here ALMOST!

# CLWR Kits for Children

Once again members of the Social Ministry Committee will be gathering items for Canadian Lutheran World Relief's "We Care" Children's Learning and Living Kits. The kits are distributed to children in refugee camps and remote villages around the world. Kits, kit items and donations will be collected, as in past years, in November. Many of the items in the kit are school supplies. Here is the list of kit items for members wishing to take advantage of the "Back to School" sales in late summer:

- 3 lined notebooks
- 10 unsharpened pencils with erasers
- 1 metric ruler (30 cm), 1 pencil sharpener and 1 eraser
- 1 pack of crayons (or pencil crayons)
- 1 small and simple toy (new and not requiring batteries, examples: doll, truck, ball, stuffed toy)
- 1 bar of soap and 1 toothbrush (new and wrapped)
- 1 tube of toothpaste (expiration date no earlier than one year)

\*\*\* Please wait until November to hand in your kit items.

These kits make a real difference in the lives of children. Last year, thanks to the generosity of Zion members, 105 kits were completed. Since 2002 we have shipped 1,318 Learning and Living Kits to CLWR. You can read more about the "We Care" program at [www.clwr.org](http://www.clwr.org).


# From the Heart – *The 23<sup>rd</sup> Psalm For Busy People*
