have eaten sour grapes, and the children's teeth are set on edge"? ³As I live, says the Lord GOD, this proverb shall no more be used by you in Israel. ⁴Know that all lives are mine; the life of the parent as well as the life of the child is mine: it is only the person who sins that shall die. ²⁵Yet you say, "The way of the Lord is unfair." Hear now, O house of Israel: Is my way unfair? Is it not your ways that are unfair? ²⁶When the righteous turn away from their righteousness and commit iniquity, they shall die for it; for the iniquity that they have committed they shall die. ²⁷Again, when the wicked turn away from the wickedness they have committed and do what is lawful and right, they shall save their life. ²⁸Because they considered and turned away from all the transgressions that they had committed, they shall surely live; they shall not die. ²⁹Yet the house of Israel says, "The way of the Lord is unfair." O house of Israel, are my ways unfair? Is it not your ways that are unfair? ³⁰Therefore I will judge you, O house of Israel, all of you according to your ways, says the Lord GOD. Repent and turn from all your transgressions; otherwise iniquity will be your ruin. ³¹Cast away from you all the transgressions that you have committed against me, and get yourselves a new heart and a new spirit! Why will you die, O house of Israel? ³²For I have no pleasure in the death of anyone, says the Lord GOD. Turn, then, and live.

Second Reading: Philippians 2: 1 – 13

A reading from Philippians.

¹If then there is any encouragement in Christ, any consolation from love, any sharing in the Spirit, any compassion and

sympathy, ²make my joy complete: be of the same mind, having the same love, being in full accord and of one mind. ³Do nothing from selfish ambition or conceit, but in humility regard others as better than yourselves. ⁴Let each of you look not to your own interests, but to the interests of others. ⁵Let the same mind be in you that was in Christ Jesus, ⁶who, though he was in the form of God, did not regard equality with God as something to be exploited, ⁷but emptied himself, taking the form of a slave, being born in human likeness. And being found in human form, ⁸he humbled himself and became obedient to the point of death—even death on a cross. ⁹Therefore God also highly exalted him and gave him the name that is above every name, ¹⁰so that at the name of Jesus every knee should bend, in heaven and on earth and under the earth, ¹¹and every tongue should confess that Jesus Christ is Lord, to the glory of God the Father. ¹²Therefore, my beloved, just as you have always obeyed me, not only in my presence, but much more now in my absence, work out your own salvation with fear and trembling; ¹³for it is God who is at work in you, enabling you both to will and to work for his good pleasure.

Gospel: Matthew 21: 23 – 32

²³When [Jesus] entered the temple, the chief priests and the elders of the people came to him as he was teaching, and said, “By what authority are you doing these things, and who gave you this authority?” ²⁴Jesus said to them, “I will also ask you one question; if you tell me the answer, then I will also tell you by what authority I do these things. ²⁵Did the baptism of John come from

heaven, or was it of human origin?" And they argued with one another, "If we say, 'From heaven,' he will say to us, 'Why then did you not believe him?' ²⁶But if we say, 'Of human origin,' we are afraid of the crowd; for all regard John as a prophet." ²⁷So they answered Jesus, "We do not know." And he said to them, "Neither will I tell you by what authority I am doing these things. ²⁸"What do you think? A man had two sons; he went to the first and said, 'Son, go and work in the vineyard today.' ²⁹He answered, 'I will not'; but later he changed his mind and went. ³⁰The father went to the second and said the same; and he answered, 'I go, sir'; but he did not go. ³¹Which of the two did the will of his father?" They said, "The first." Jesus said to them, "Truly I tell you, the tax collectors and the prostitutes are going into the kingdom of God ahead of you. ³²For John came to you in the way of righteousness and you did not believe him, but the tax collectors and the prostitutes believed him; and even after you saw it, you did not change your minds and believe him."

Homily: I was listening to CBC radio one day on a rather long car ride, when I heard something that belonged to the "now I have heard everything category." The interviewer was speaking to someone who had started a Church for people who did not want to worship.

"We just gather for good coffee and conversation on Sunday morning. Sometimes it is spiritual, but we try not to talk about God or use any God language," they said.

At first, I thought that meant they did not speak German...silly me. Everyone knows God's first recorded words were in German - God's favourite language: "Adam, Wo bist du?" I learned that in Confirmation class. Who said no one ever remembers anything from confirmation class...especially things you should probably not remember...like getting kicked out of class for misbehaving,

which was a fairly common occurrence in this parish in times past and one of my accomplishments as well. Actually, I got kicked out of confirmation class for unappreciated sarcasm and for ruthlessly teasing my sister.

My first thought was that this would have made a really great Monty Python sketch...a Church that only gathers for coffee. I guess that if the coffee had been bad, and the congregation poor conversationalists, there would have been no reason to gather.

While a good cup of coffee is very close to a religious experience for me, this was a little more than my Lutheran brain could handle in one afternoon and the writer of Philippians would have had a meltdown if he had heard what was being said that day.

It is easy to laugh about a Church where no one believes in God and Jesus is just a very nice man that you would like for a neighbour...a place where you can get a really good cup of coffee and catch up on the gossip. What can I say...it's probably cheaper than Starbucks and there is probably less politics and hockey talk than Tim Hortons.

In our reading from Philippians today, the writer proclaims that every knee shall bow and every tongue proclaim that Jesus is Lord. Worship and adoration of God in Jesus the Christ is not an option for us, nor should we ever want it to be an option. The only acceptable reaction to the tender-hearted loving-kindness of God, seen in the life, death and resurrection of Jesus, is worship...and it is the only thing we can offer for all that God has done for us ...our joyful sacrifice of praise and thanksgiving, our eucharist. Love and adoration of Christ our Lord should be as important to us as breathing and as necessary as breathing. We all know what happens to us when we stop breathing. The same thing can

be said about us when we stop worshipping God in thanksgiving for the life of Christ.

Think about what happens every Sunday when we gather. God comes and puts our Lord into our hands as a gift. In receiving him we become what we receive, the very Body of Christ – filled with his endless life, joined with him in a journey from death to life. We eat the very bread of heaven, the bread of life, and we receive all the strength we shall need for our journey on the Path of Life as a wonderful gift we could never earn.

So we gather together on Sunday, which is the first day of the week, the day of our Lord's resurrection – each Sunday a little Easter. Sunday is not the Sabbath, because it is way more important to us as Christians than the Sabbath, which starts Friday evening and ends on Saturday evening. Sunday, our little Easter, is a reminder that we live by gospel and not by law, so celebrating resurrection is even more important to us than observing the Sabbath. Christianity is not about observing Laws and even Holy Commandments, it is about living in God's grace and sharing the life of the Risen One.

We gather in humble and joyful adoration on Sundays to hear God's living Word speak to our hearts and minds and we are gathered around Christ's holy table, where we receive nothing less than the very life of God. Here, every knee shall bow and every tongue confess that Jesus is Lord and here we join all heaven and earth in praise of the Risen One, in whom we place all our trust and hope and who does not disappoint us.

We mirror that love for us in our lives, sometimes with astounding success and sometimes with resounding failure. Without God's great love for us we would have no reason to exist as the church and nothing much to celebrate. But because God has shown

such great love for us in Jesus the Christ we can gather with joy on Sunday, with praise and adoration, rejoicing in the life that is ours, rejoicing in Christ's victory over death that we have come to share, forever rejoicing in the Amazing Grace of God.

May this be always be our way of life as the church. **Amen.**
