2. Observance of Trial in two cases, one Civil and one Criminal : 30 Marks

The same team of evaluation constituted for evaluation of this paper will evaluate the report focusing on the noting and reporting of the following in the report:

Facts of Cases, Witness Examination, Cross-Examination, Legal Arguments, Judge's Instructions, verdict or sentencing.

3. Interviewing Techniques and Pre-Trial Preparations and Internship Diary : 30 Marks

In this part each eligible student will have to do following tasks:

e) Interviewing Techniques : 15 Marks

To undergo a total internship for four weeks compulsorily during their Semesters VI, VII, VIII, IX, and X at any Court/Firm/Institutions/NGOs as per the list may be published by the center of studies, from time to time and obtain a CERTIFICATE OF COMPLETION OF INTERNSHIP from authority concerned, to be submitted along with the related project reports for evaluation. During the period of internship, they will observe minimum two interviewing sessions of clients at the Lawyer's Office / Legal Aid Office/ Law Firms/ NGO Office etc. They will maintain a diary and enter the various steps observed during their attendance on different days in the and submit the same in the form of a project report before the evaluation team after being verified by the guide teacher.

f) Pre-Tria Preparations: 15 Marks

Each student will further observe the preparation of documents and court papers by the Advocate and the procedure for the filing of the suit/petition. This will be recorded in the diary, which will carry 15 marks. They will maintain a diary and enter the various steps observed during their attendance on different days in the preparation of cases and to submit the same in the same project report of interviewing techniques before the evaluation team after being verified by the guide teacher. The same team of evaluation constituted for evaluation of this paper will evaluate the report focusing on the following:

Observation of Client Interviews, Documents and Court Paper Preparations, Participation in Counselling and Noting, Maintenance of Internship Diary.

4. Viva Voce : 10 Marks

Note:

Students will have to put in Four weeks of Internship compulsorily in each of the Semesters VI, VII, VIII, IX and X and obtain a certificate of Internship without which the Bar Council may not enroll them.
