A Story About Our History

Walter Thomas Bailey was a Black American born in 1881 in Kewanee, Illinois. He became:

- the first Black American awarded a Bachelor of Science degree in architecture from the University of Illinois (1904);
- the first licensed Black American architect in Illinois (1905);
- the first Black American to receive a master's degree in architecture from the University of Illinois (1910);
- likely the first Black American architect in Memphis (1915);
- the first licensed Black American architect in Chicago (1924).

Mr. Bailey had an important connection to the beginning of our community. Here is a chapter about that connection from a recently published book, WALTER THOMAS BAILEY: STARING INTO THE YAWNING GULF OF ETER NITY. You can learn more about the book at www.waltertbailey.com.





at Sunset Hills for his heavyweight title bout with Jersey Joe Walcott. Charles won the National Boxing Association Heavyweight title when he defeated Walcott later that year at Comisky Park. But in the early 1960s, the club went under, and the course was purchased for housing development. The clubhouse was abandoned and then burned down on a Halloween night in the 1970s. But the land is now part of a Black American community named Sun River Terrace, incorporated in 1980. Once again, Bailey was instrumental in helping develop communities for fellow Black Americans.

Open Colored Country Club.

Memorial day peeches May 30, 1927, at the formal opening of the Sunset Hills Country club, the first completely developed Negro country club in the world. The membership is made up of Chicago colored people. The club is located tour miles southwest of Momence, Ill., and is being developed by Faulkner-Cook company, 127 East 47th street.

The Sunset Hills Country Club Clubhouse – Momence (IL).

The Jackson Park Golf Course in Chicago, just southeast of the developing Bronzeville district, was the first public nine-hole course west of the Alleghenies. It opened in 1899 and expanded to 18-holes in 1900.


But Black Americans were excluded from playing on the public facility.

A decade later, Black American golfer Walter Speedy settled a lawsuit brought by him and three others against the Chicago Park District, winning the right for Black people to play on the city's courses.

Golf was slow to take off among Black Americans, but by the mid-1920s, its popularity increased as access to courses grew.

Then in 1927, the opening of the Sunset Hills Country Club was announced. THE CHICAGO DAILY NEWS reported that it was "the first completely developed Negro country club in the world." The course was located four miles southwest of Momence, near Kankakee. It included a nine-hole golf course covering 40 acres. The membership was comprised of Black Americans from Chicago.

In early March 1928, THE DAILY NEWS announced that "[m]embers of Chicago's Negro Colony are establishing a country club on the banks of the Kankakee River near Momence. W. T. Bailey, architect, has prepared plans for the clubhouse, which is to be built this spring." THE JOURNAL OF NEGRO HISTORY reported that Bailey's Clubhouse would be completed at a cost of \$25,000.

In addition, an adjoining 250 acres was being developed as an exclusive Black American summer-home mecca. The two-story clubhouse included a dining room, barroom and clubroom on the first floor. The second floor held overnight accommodation for guests. The property had a shooting range and walking paths to the Kankakee River where members and guests could swim, fish and boat. Many of the club's members and friends traveled from Chicago for weekend get-aways. The club served exceptional Sunday dinners and held an annual wild game dinner.

In 1931, the course hosted a United Golfers Association tournament where Black American golf champion Edison Marshall won.

SUNSET HILLS COUNTRY CLUB, MOMENCE, III., Sept. 10—Edison Marshall of New Orleans, defending professional colored golf champion, won over Robert Ball of the Pioneer Golf Club of Chicago by six strokes to win the 1931 tournament of the United Golfers Association here Monday afternoon. Marshall's score was 307 strokes for the 72 holes. John Roux of New Orleans was third with 321 and Elmer Stout of Newark. N. J., was one stroke behind Roux. The cash prizes for the sixth annual tournament play was \$150 for first, \$100 for second, \$75 for third and \$50 for fourth. O. J. Clisby of Pasadena, Cal., Los Angeles public links champ, played in the open and finished with a total of \$25.
