

MST Outcomes for Troubled Adolescents and Their Families

Between January 1 and December 31, 2022, there were 15,201 young people referred for MST® or one of its treatment types. Outcome data was available on 13,280 (87.4%) * young people who had an opportunity for a full course of treatment (e.g., cases were clinically closed) and were discharged by August 17, 2023. This report focused on outcomes of 12,647** young people referred to MST, MST-ID, MST-PRV, MST-PSB, or MST-SA, treatment types with similar performance expectations. Adolescents referred to MST present with multiple problems (aggression, truancy, substance use, problem sexual behavior) and are frequently at risk of out of home placement.

MST programs continue to achieve outcomes like those reported in the research despite its wide dissemination in settings and cultures that are more diverse. Establishment of licensed, MST Network Partners who provide training and support to contracted programs in other countries have collaborated with MST Services to make the training of staff relevant to the local culture. In addition, MST therapists target the entire ecology of the family and strive to develop an understanding of the cultural factors contributing to the family's problems in addition to other factors in the family's ecology.

Diversity in Families Served by MST

Demographically, these young people were identified as White (36.2%), Black (25%), Hispanic/Latino (26.7%) or Other (12.2%). Their average age was 14.9 years, and the majority were male (64.7%). Of these cases, 33.6% (4,257) were served by non-US teams and 66.4% (8,404) received MST within the U.S. Sixteen different languages were identified as the caregivers' primary language with English spoken by 72% of caregivers, Spanish by 17.7% of caregivers and 7.5% of caregivers spoke one of the other fourteen languages identified.

Understanding Staffing Challenges

The 2022 MST Data Report highlighted the increase in therapist vacancies during the pandemic. In 2023, the rate had returned to pre-pandemic levels and dropped from an average of .74 FTE funded therapist positions not filled to an average of .59 in the summer of 2023. Of course, programs in the U.S., programs in rural areas or in competitive markets are likely to experience higher vacancy than the average. This year's focus on therapist turnover suggests that staffing challenges may be due more to recruitment barriers than turnover. The average annual rate of therapist turnover was 24% which is expected for the size of the team and opportunities for advancement. In addition, therapist retention across all teams averaged 2.8 years in 2023, an increase since last reported as 2.3 years in the 2014 MSTI Data Report. Recruitment has also resulted in some race/cultural diversity with MST therapists identified as White/Non-Hispanic (47.6%), Black (25.2%), Hispanic/Latino (16%) or Other (11.1%).

2023 Findings Compared to Previous Years

MST Performance Dashboard

Results from MST team performance measures^a demonstrate the effectiveness of MST teams worldwide. MST Performance Dashboard target scores, based on results from numerous clinical studies, set a standard that MST programs aim to meet despite implementation in a variety of settings that may differ from the controlled settings of the clinical studies.
