The most common issues come from tiles that absorb water, grout that molds, or silicone that blackens after iust a few months.

Choose non-slip floor tiles, high-quality glazed wall tiles, epoxy grout, sanitary-grade silicone for wet zones, and professional-grade adhesive.

Avoid using unsealed MDF or particleboard (PAL) in cabinetry — look for moisture-resistant panels instead. Be cautious with "promotional" or budget products if you don't have solid guarantees about their durability. While a low-quality material can deteriorate in just 1-2 years, a well-executed system using the right products can keep your bathroom flawless for over a decade.

Moisture doesn't forgive — make smart choices from the start, and you won't have to fix things later.

What to Avoid When Choosing Bathroom Materials

Standard cement-based grout in wet areas

Stains easily, washes away over time, grows mold, and tends to crumble.

Cheap, universal silicone

Turns black quickly, peels off due to steam, and often leaves a bad odor.

Glossy floor tiles

Very slippery and dangerous when wet — especially in the shower area.

Unprotected MDF or particleboard (PAL) for furniture

Swells, cracks, and absorbs odors when exposed to constant moisture.

Porous (unglazed) ceramic tiles

Absorb water and dirt, become hard to clean, and stain permanently.

General-purpose construction adhesive (not designed for bathrooms)

You don't know how they'll hold up — some aren't even made for bathrooms at all.

✓ How to Identify High-Quality Materials

- · They have clear specifications on the label or packaging
- - e.g., "Moisture-resistant," "Indoor/Outdoor," or "For Wet Areas."
- · They are certified or made by reputable brands · - Come with a technical data sheet, warranty, and positive reviews.
- . They feel solid and well-finished to the touch
- No sharp edges, uneven textures, or strong chemical smells.
- · They are heavier, denser, and more uniform
- Waterproof wood panels, high-quality tiles, and professional adhesives are not porous
 They quickly degrade when exposed to water or steam or brittle
- · They cost more, but the price reflects durability
- · Cheap materials rarely stand up to steam, water, or daily wear and tear.

Q What to Look for on the Label (Quick Checklist):

- "Porcelain" not basic ceramic
- "Non-slip" + slip resistance rating R9-R12 (for floors) ✓ Class 5 - for abrasion and moisture resistance
- ✓ Rectified perfectly cut edges (allows for narrow grout lines) ✓ Usage information - clearly states if it's for bathroom, floor, or wall use
- Warranty and reputable manufacturer

X How to Spot Low-Quality or Problematic Materials

- . No technical specs or sold as "on sale" with missing details
- No brand, no warranty, no clear usage instructions
- . They're light, porous, or brittle
- Scratch or crack easily especially low-grade tiles or cheap MDF boards.
- · Inconsistent color or thickness
- A sign of poor manufacturing or improper storage
- Cabinets swell, grout cracks, silicone blackens. . Offered as "the cheapest option" by installers with no explanation
- A low price often hides poor quality not a real bargain.

▲ Label Red Flags to Watch Out For:

- X Doesn't specify if it's porcelain or water-resistant
- > May absorb moisture and crack over time
- Missing technical specs (R-rating, PEI, wear class, etc.)
- You have no idea how durable it really is
- X Unknown or missing manufacturer
- → No warranty, no quality control standards. X No clear indication whether it's for floor or wall use
- You might install it in the wrong place without knowing.
- X Very low price without clear reason or real discount
- → Often low-grade materials sold in bulk, with no proper testing.

Invest in Quality Installations

Pipes, drains, faucets, and fittings are the things you won't see once the bathroom is finished — but they're the very things that can ruin everything if not chosen wisely or installed correctly. Don't cut corners on plumbing pipes, floor drains, shut-off valves, or angle stops. A poor-quality drain or a pipe that cracks inside the wall can destroy your entire bathroom.

Choose high-quality multilayer or PEX pipes, professionally pressed fittings, and brass faucets, not painted plastic ones.

Make sure the floor drain is removable, the sink waste valve is easy to clean, and the faucet comes with a real warranty — not just a one-year sticker.

Any professional will tell you: most bathroom repairs happen because of cheap materials and poor installation.

Make smart choices from the start and you'll avoid water leaks, bad odors, weak water pressure, or faucets that fail after just six months.

What's hidden behind the walls should be even better than what's visible.

Stainless steel braided flexible connectors with double protection

🧗 Resistant to vibrations and pressure — no sudden failures after 6 months.

X Examples of Common Mistakes (to Avoid):

White PVC pipes glued with universal adhesive

OCracked inside the wall within 3 months. Everything had to be torn out and redone.

No-name Chinese faucet bought "on sale" for 59 lei

🕆 Leaked at the base after one month. No spare parts available.

Floor drain without an odor trap — just a basic cap

Client called after one week — bathroom smelled like a sewer.

Cheap plastic connectors, misaligned under the sink

Slow leak caused swelling of the cabinet and stained the tile.

No pressure test after installation

Hidden crack in the pipe caused the plaster to swell 2 weeks after completion.

Choose Skilled Professionals

No matter how good the materials are, 90% of the final result depends on the execution.

The handyman who "does a bit of everything" for a low price usually leaves behind crooked tiles, uneven grout lines, dripping faucets, misaligned drains, or furniture that simply doesn't fit.

A true professional will charge a fair price, but also explain what they do, why they do it, what warranty they provide, and stick to agreed deadlines.

Always ask for a portfolio of recent work, and if possible, visit a project in progress.

Don't choose in a rush or based on vague recommendations.

Remember: a good craftsman doesn't fix mistakes — he avoids them from the start.

XWhat to Avoid When Choosing a Contractor:

No portfolio or refuses to show past work

If they can't prove their experience, they may be new to the trade — or trying to hide past unsatisfied clients.

Promises "fast and cheap" completion

Quality takes time and care. An offer that sounds too quick or cheap usually means rushed, careless, or unreliable work.
 Works messy, without protection or organization

• If they don't respect your space or their tools, your project won't be treated with care either.

Uses leftover materials "from previous jobs"

• This may mean low-quality, incomplete, or non-guaranteed materials.

Invest in people, not just in tiles.

A skilled professional may cost more upfront, but they give you peace of mind for years.

- X Yellow lights (2700K) distort skin tone and make the space look aged.

Ensure Proper Ventilation

Ventilation is one of the most overlooked, yet most critical aspects for both your bathroom's health and your own.

A bathroom without proper airflow quickly develops mold, bad odors, steam buildup that damages furniture and fixtures, and over time, it can even affect your plumbing. If your bathroom has no window, install an electric exhaust fan with a humidity sensor or timer. Choose quiet models(under 30 dB) with a backdraft flap to prevent air from flowing back in. Mount it as high as possible, ideally on an exterior wall or connected to a ventilation shaft. A well-ventilated bathroom dries quickly after showers, smells fresh, and maintains a clean look

Even a low-cost fan can save you from thousands in future repairs.

Practical Tips for Effective Bathroom Ventilation

Choose a fan with a humidity sensor or timer

- Automatically turns on when steam increases, and shuts off by itself.
- Ideal if you often forget to turn it on manually.

Install it high on the wall or ceiling

- Steam rises that's where it needs to be extracted.
- If you have a ventilation shaft, connect it there.

Add a backdraft flap

- Prevents odors from returning through shared vents or neighboring bathrooms.
- ✓ Clean the vent grill every 3-6 months
- Dust and lint block airflow and reduce performance.

Use natural ventilation if you have a window

- Prepare a cleaning guide with safe products for your finishes avoiding damage caused by harsh or wrong cleaners.
