As a student, I had not shown much interest in school work, it was mostly sports and social life.



As luck would have it, soon after I arrived, Yonkers Teachers voted to strike. At the time, I was not a union member. I had no benefits and was being

Thanks to the commitment of our MVFT volunteers who made close to 1200 phone calls to NYSUT members who vote in Mount Vernon to get out the vote and support the proposed budget, the budget overwhelmingly passed! This year was also the first year the MVFT stood strongly behind a slate of Mount Vernon BOE Trustees and fully endorsed: Trustees Micah McOwen and Wanda White, as well as former trustee Darcy Miller. Their victory was a victory for all of us! The MVFT sent out 1200 postcards and followed up with a personalized automated phone call to the NYSUT voters in Mt. Vernon in support of the school budget and our endorsed candidates. The MVFT has proven again and again that when we stand together, we can accomplish anything!

paid as a per diem. The Principal, Sam Manello, needing bodies, offered higher pay and a position of teaching and coaching when I returned if I would come in during the strike. Never belonging to a union, and having bills to pay, that night I called my father who was a manager for the post office. I believe that short discussion with my father changed the direction of my career.

My Dad put it this way, "You have been on athletic teams all your life, is it not your intention to be part of a new team, a team of educators? If you were to go in, it would undermine their efforts for your own personal gain." My dad told me that it was up to me, but he knew what he would do. I understood; I didn't have to ask!

I later called the principal and thanked him for the opportunity, but said I would not cross the line.

When the strike ended, I began to sub again, and after a few weeks of traveling between the four other high schools, I was assigned to Gorton once again. When I entered the teachers' room, I was greeted by several teachers who thanked me for not crossing their line. I was unaware that the Assistant Principal, Roger Abate, had told them that I had turned down the principal's offer.

Later that same day, the principal called me in to his office. I had been there way too many times as a student; it felt much the same way. To my surprise, he asked if I would consider working as a leave replacement teaching science and math until the end of the year. He shook my hand and said that I was the type of person he wanted working for him. I learned many lessons that year!

I taught and coached in Yonkers for almost three years without a tenure slot because the city was under a hiring freeze. Seeing no change in sight, when offered a tenure track position in Mount Vernon, off I went. I've worked in Mount Vernon now for 38 years. I have been involved in the union for almost 37 years, holding the office of President for 22 years.

I am very thankful for that first lesson, and the many lessons learned along the way. I have had a chance to meet, work with and for so many interesting, exceptional people. I have had the opportunity all these years to be a member of a very special team. My time in education, Mount Vernon and the Mount Vernon Federation of Teachers has been time well spent.

STATE OF THE UNION AND NEW LEADERSHIP

As I write this article, as always, the ground beneath us keeps shifting. Having said that, the MVFT is solid, as are NYSUT and AFT as well. We are making headway on the APPR debacle and state aid has been increasing each year. Mount Vernon's school leadership has begun to shift in a direction that I believe will benefit us all when completed. There will be rough patches but we are accustomed to that and will find our way through.

Any day now, the Supreme Court will rule on the Janus case. How we respond to that ruling is up to us. This case, the next one, or the one after that, will challenge us, but if we stick together, we will remain strong.

Here in Mount Vernon, we will have a newly elected leadership team. All the

officers, many executive board members and building reps have experience in their roles. I believe Carene Domato, Jeanne Casino, Angelique Perez, and Anita Amieiro will serve you well. Our office team, Karen Molinaro and Claire DePaul will be able to help with a seamless transition of leadership.

The MVFT is financially sound and the Welfare Fund is as well. I am proud that we have run the MVFT without a dues increase for my 22 years. I would however, warn that it has become increasingly more difficult and that a small dues increase may be in order sooner rather than later.

I have to thank Dominick Ciccone for the huge role he played; Dom, Frank Pandolfo and Mike Mariani for getting it started...Rick Castellitto, Ken DeStefano and Marc Laffer for their amazing NYSUT guidance; Joe McLaughlin, Barry Friedman and Jeff Zuckerman for their friendship and leadership lessons; Carl Caprio, Cesar Matanzo, and Karen Wallace for their never ending support of me and the MVFT even into retirement; Karen Molinaro, the glue that has kept the office and union together for all these years; and certainly my wife, Maryellen, and my daughters, Beth and Katie, for putting up with the shortened vacations, phone interruptions and the many weekends and evenings forsaken for union work.

Last, but not least, I have to thank the Union leaders, the membership, and those who work at the board who have helped serve our members. For me, this was never a job, it was truly my pleasure.


GOING AN EXTRA MILE
