WELCOME BACK! I hope you all had the opportunity to enjoy your summer, and most importantly your family and friends.





I'M STICKING WITH MY UNION

On June 27, 2018, the US Supreme Court decision in Janus v. AFSCME overturned a 41-year old legal precedent that preserved a union's right to collect fair share "agency fee" from non-members. The wealthy special interests who funded this case are the same special interests who have been attacking unions and working families for years.

Immediately following this decision, all MVFT agency fee members were classified as non-dues paying members. All newly hired teachers, teaching assistants and security guards would have to be enrolled in the MVFT before they would be



considered dues paying members. Payroll was alerted that our dues could not be deducted from potential MVFT members

without proof of official enrollment provided by the MVFT.


We have been diligent in our efforts to enroll ALL prior agency fee paying members, as well as all new hires. Proudly, our agency fee payers signed up in July. At the New Teacher Orientation in August, MVFT Officers successfully enrolled 39 out of 39 teachers present at orientation.

On our first day back to school, at Convocation, we enrolled 10 new members, and to date payroll will be deducting dues for all new members thanks to the continued efforts of our executive board and building delegates.

The MVFT also launched a Re-Commitment Campaign at the end of last year, asking all of our 1100 members to re-enroll in our union. By the end of June,

95% of our MVFT members signed on, making it clear that they were "Sticking with Their UNION". We will not stop until 100% of our members re-commit!

We need each and every one of our members to be a champion for our union. Defending our union means preserving our voice, standing up for our values, and protecting everything we fought for.

WHY DOES MY CREDIT APPROVAL FORM KEEP COMING BACK TO ME???

We ask our students to read carefully and follow directions but some of us forget to practice what we



preach. So here are some guidelines for getting your courses approved:

- Make sure you are submitting the **pre-approval** form **before** the course begins (at least 2-4 weeks before).
- Forms must be submitted to Human Resource Office at the Education Center and time stamped. You can bring your own copy to be time stamped as HR will not make copies for you.
- Fill out the **pre-approval** form completely and remember to press hard as it is a triplicate form (if you have a copy of the form please submit 3 copies).
- Print or make a copy of the **official course description** for each course including the name of the institution granting the credit.
- The official course description must include the dates, times, and total hours or credits being issued (you cannot just hand write the dates and times).
- If it is an on-line course, make sure to include start date and end date of course or the time frame in which the course must be completed.


KEEPING HEALTHY PAYS OFF!

Congratulations to our MVFT members who received the newly negotiated sick incentive stipend this summer. The MVFT is proud to announce that a total of 580 teachers, teaching assistants, and security guards stayed healthy enough during the 2017-2018 school year, and were awarded a \$500 stipend this summer.

For those of us hoping to stay healthy this year and having it literally pay off in the summer, the **sick/personal leave incentive** states:

"Effective July 1, 2017, in the event a unit member uses 7 or less personal and/or sick days in a year (9/1-6/30) said unit member shall be eligible for a payment in the amount of \$500 at the conclusion of each qualifying school year. Unit members must work a full school year in order to be eligible for said payment. Those on unpaid leave of absence for any period of time shall be ineligible for said payment."




TO ALL MVFT RETIREE MEMBERS OF THE WELFARE FUND:

There will be a RETIREE TRUSTEE vacancy on the Mount Vernon Federation of Teachers Welfare Fund Board as of November 1, 2018. All retirees who wish to apply must be a retired member of the MVFT in good standing and a current member of the Welfare Fund.

The retiree trustee will be voted in by the MVFT Executive Board at the November 6, 2018 meeting. The term of service is November 1, 2018- October 31, 2022. The trustees meet at the Union/Welfare Fund office at least four times during the school year and are responsible to oversee the administration of the fund.



Please be aware that the district will be relying on the daily attendance roll sent in by your building attendance secretary. The district management system, AESOP/Frontline, will **not** be used to

determine who is eligible to receive the incentive. The MVFT reminds you how important it is to keep records of your absences/personal days. We recommend using the Leave Record in the back of the NYSUT Planning Calendar. Wishing all of our MVFT members a healthy, germ-free school year.

HEALTH & SAFETY

Colleagues!!! Welcome back to the beginning of the school year. Hopefully all of you have had a wonderful summer. During the summer months there was extensive repair work done at each building. Also, many construction projects are being completed now. From time to time health and safety issues may arise. Please remember that all staff and students have the right to working conditions that are healthy and safe. Many health and safety issues can be rectified just by simply letting your administrator or custodial staff member know about the problem. However, there are times when a health and safety issue is very complex and time is needed to develop appropriate solutions to the issue. When this is the case, please follow these steps to ensure that the matter is remedied as efficiently as possible:

- Notify administration in person verbally about the nature of the problem.
- Follow-up with a written e-mail to administration confirming your verbal conversation and describing the issue/problem.
- Give a reasonable amount of time for the issue to be resolved.
- If you get no response from administration after step #3 or you feel that the health & safety matter has not been resolved adequately, then contact your building representative. Your building rep will then refer the matter to the MVFT Health & Safety Committee.



WHY THE EMBARGO?

As many of you may already know, the 2018 state examination scores for grades 3-8 have been embargoed. Each student's scores on the math and English examination in grades 3-8 were sent to schools the last week in August. "According to a letter from SED Deputy Commissioner Angélica Infante-Green to principals and superintendents prior to the private release on August 27, the information is not to be published in any format to anyone outside of the school officials and personnel who need to know and use the data for programmatic planning, scheduling, and other preparation for the upcoming school year until the public news release." The State Education Department intends on releasing the scores during late September.

Traditionally scores have been released, to schools and the public, in late August along with itemized data. The state attributes this change to the number of days the test was given (from 3 to 2 days). This change in practice has led to speculations on why the state has chosen to change their past practices. Jonathan Burman, a spokesperson for the state said, "releasing them at the same time as school wide and statewide data will give families "a reference" to put them in context."

Although we do not encourage using the state exams as a singular view of a student's capability, it is a resource in identifying areas of need within a class, grade level and school building. Furthermore, there is a high expectation for educators to use data driven instruction. Any delay in analyzing data increases the amount of pressure which already exists in closing the performance gap for each student. Let's all hope that the data is released in its entirety for us to perform at the standards in which we are held accountable.

CHECK YOUR PAY STUBS

As always, it is important to check your pay stubs. It is always possible that an error was made, and you are the best person to identify any discrepancies with your pay. If you do find anything incorrect on your pay stub, notify payroll immediately. Make sure to pay close attention to:
