Vientos Bajos Update—The Virus Continues—and continues—and continues. Another month, and the virus continues to dominate the local, regional, national, and global news. Here at Vientos Bajos, as we enter September, Costa Rica has accepted an average of almost 1,000 cases daily. With this acceptance, Costa Rica has now opened up the Juan Santamaria International Airport to returning expat residents and tourists from many areas. The restrictions have been reduced, although not lifted, for those in most areas of the country. It looks as though, over the next month, Costa Rica will continue to relax its restrictions, inviting tourists, as well as residents and citizens, to return. Bottom line: Although we're cautiously optimistic, until a vaccine is available to the general public, we highly recommend caution. Continue to social distance, wear masks when going out, and guard your bubble. Inside that bubble, Vientos Bajos is beginning small-group, spaced rehearsals for the Christmas Madrigal.

So, What's Happening at VB?

1. Activities.

- a. **Pickleball:** We continue to offer space for two pickleball groups, one a more competitive group, the second a leisure group. Days and times vary, so if you're interested, please contact us to get on the WhatsApp list. Both groups continue to protect their bubble, playing with people with whom they've been playing for months, if not years.
- b. **Poker:** On Friday afternoons, we continue our small group for penny-ante poker. Again, this small bubble is about eight in size. If interested in either of these groups/activities, please contact us.

c. Music practices:

- i. **Low Brass.** Weekly. Calling all B-flat instrument players! We have both treble and bass clef sheet music and have just begun practice for *TubaChristmas* and the madrigal. If you play or have played and are interested in joining us, please contact us.
- ii. **Recorder Ensemble.** You remember the fourth grade—yes, they're the same instruments you learned way back then—although we've added alto, tenor, and bass recorders to flesh out our ensemble. If you've played any instrument and can read music, you're invited! We can definitely put an instrument in your hands. Again, contact us if interested.

As all of you who have attended one or more of our seven consecutive annual Christmas Madrigal Dinners know, the annual Dinner is the Vientos Bajos major event of the year and a major undertaking with LOTS of moving parts. Our usual complement of those bringing you the show and meal is 30 to 40 people. We need you!

If you would like to participate in any capacity as part of the court/cast (skirts, readings, storytelling, musical instrument, vocal, directing, sound & lights), or

behind-the scenes coordination (decorating, set-up and break-down, serving, preparing, parking, seating, table hosting, marketing, sales)—let us know. 3. Landscaping the New Entrance and Parking Lot.

Now, four months along in the process, we have finished the off-road parking lot for about 15 cars. Within the month of September, we plan to finish the service road to the four residences on the upper part of Jardin La Torre. These units will be accessible by golf cart, scooter, or ATV. Asphalt for the entrance was laid in July. We hope to have hung our new decorative, secure gate by the end of October. Linear gardens are being planted, and garden paths developed.



4. Roadwork.

By mid-July, the municipality completed the initial work leading up to asphaltting the roadway that collapsed just beyond Vientos Bajos for the past two years. Due to the exploding costs triggered by the virus and now faced by Costa Rica, the national government pulled back funds from major municipalities which had been earmarked for road work, as well as other projects. That left the impending roadwork without financial support.

The expat community came through! We’re still accepting donations, but the good news is that the asphalt repair work is now in place.

5. Activities Room, Vientos Bajos.

There is no change in converting the upper pickleball court to an activities room yet. The workers continue with the landscaping of the new acquisition and completion of the master suites in “Rana” and “Colibri” (see below).

6. Computers and printers for Kids.



This past month I was talking with our Ana and Claudia, our two cleaning ladies for the past six years, who are sisters and grandmothers. We were talking about the status of schooling for their grandkids. I recently was told that most CR schools won't open for attendance until after January 1, 2021, but lessons are being offered online.

And there's the rub: Ana and Claudia informed me that each have a grandchild whose parents cannot afford a computer or printer. Printers aren't mandatory, but if the students don't have printers, they need to download the homework, get it printed in town, and get it back to the teachers. Yeah—a bit old-fashioned.

So, what to do? If you have a computer, printer, or component that works but is no longer being used that you would like to donate to “the cause,” I'll make sure it/they get into the hands of students whose families don't have the wherewithal to buy even a used machine. This includes the paraphernalia that goes with—mice, keyboards, and monitors.

Caveat: We don't want to be in the “business” of collecting funds, picking up computers, scheduling repairs, etc. IF you have a computer, printer, or component that you would like to donate, I can make a point of picking it up if you can't drop it off.
