9:15 - 10:30 AM	Breakout #1	Patrick Patterson	Engaging Head Start Fathers in Rural and Frontier Communities - 5 Proven Strategies	Engaging Head Start fathers in rural and frontier communities requires strategies that recognize the unique strengths and challenges of serving families across large geographic areas. Transportation barriers, limited services, workforce demands, isolation, and smaller community networks can make traditional father engagement approaches less effective. This interactive workshop will explore practical strategies for recruiting, engaging, and retaining Head Start fathers in rural and frontier communities. Participants will learn how to leverage trusted community partners, meet fathers where they are, use technology and flexible service delivery, and build stronger connections with fathers who may be difficult to reach. Participants will leave with practical ideas they can immediately apply to strengthen father engagement and expand the reach of their programs.
	Breakout #1	Melissa Hamilton	Before Kindergarten: Coaching Head Start Families to Deliver the Science of Reading at Home	Head Start programs invest deeply in school readiness. But the research is clear: the phonological awareness, print knowledge, and oral language that predict reading success are built most powerfully at home — before a child ever enters a classroom. Most family engagement programs encourage parents to be involved. This session shows what happens when parents are explicitly prepared to deliver Science of Reading instruction at home. Using three evidence pillars — NELP's six foundational skill domains, Sénéchal's finding that explicitly taught parents produce outcomes six times stronger than informal encouragement, and Joyce and Showers' transfer research — attendees will walk through a live coaching model that prepares every adult in a child's ecosystem. Participants will leave with a concrete framework for extending Head Start's reach into the home and a clear picture of what family preparation looks like when it is grounded in the science.

The other 160+ hours belong to the family. Research is clear on what happens in those hours — and who determines whether they compound or evaporate. Sénéchal & LeFevre (2002) found that parents explicitly coached to support foundational literacy skills produced outcomes six times stronger than parents who received encouragement alone. That gap — between a parent who cheers and a parent who knows exactly what to practice — is the home visitor's highest-leverage opportunity. This session teaches home visitors how to shift from delivering content to coaching parents, using the National Early Literacy Panel's six foundational skill domains as the framework. Participants will leave with a structured conversation guide for closing every home visit with one specific, research-grounded practice commitment — and a simple tracking tool for monitoring family follow-through between visits. The result: a home visit model that doesn't end when you walk out the door.

Many cannot find it, and many who find it are not actually getting consultation. Across a national scan spanning 31 states and more than 500 interviews, the Center of Excellence heard the same pattern: programs contract with licensed clinicians who arrive expecting to treat a child, when what the program needs is someone who can work through the adults in the room. This session reviews what the evidence says about consultation, argues that the field has indexed on credential where it should be indexing on competence, and shares what we learned building a competency-based certificate for nearly 300 candidates across 41 states, most from early childhood education background.

In this closing keynote, we'll explore how collective efficacy can become the quiet engine behind meaningful change in early childhood settings. Blending research with real-life stories from the field, this keynote will highlight how a shared sense of purpose and belief has led to powerful culture shifts and noticeable reductions in challenging behaviors. Participants will walk away with practical, realistic strategies to strengthen collective efficacy within their own teams, no overhaul required, just intentional steps that build positivity, trust, consistency, and shared ownership. When adults move in sync, something remarkable happens: classrooms become calmer, connections grow stronger, and outcomes for our littlest learners expand in big, lasting ways.

Learn how risky play promotes physical confidence and refined motor skills that actually decrease the risk of future injuries. Explore how it supports emotional regulation, reduces anxiety and elevated behaviors, increases social connections, and enhances conflict resolution skills. Traditional prevention strategies aren't working. Drawing from research in stress science and emotional agility, Melissa challenges five dangerous myths that trap helping professionals in exhaustion cycles, teaching evidence-based techniques that actually complete the stress cycle.
