RACQUETTE RIVER TRIP

Early an Nanday morning, July 22, Cabin Eight and Nine (Stephen Balog, Chris Dalton, Jim Hessberg, Jahn Humphrey, Narc Navon, Brian Rush, Richard Bierau, Doug Flagle, Mitchell Goldberg, Jon Kennedy, James King, Phil Oppenheim, and Peter Sorensen) headed for the depths of the New York Adirondack Lake Region. Putting in an Blue Mountain Lake, the five-day, eighty-three mile paddle was underway. The first day's paddle through Blue Mountain, Eagle, and Utowana Lakes, aver a halfmile portage and up the Marion River to Big Island an Racquette Lake, was challenging as strang headwinds raised white caps on each of the lakes. Tuesday saw the traversing of Racquette Lake, another short carry to Farked Lake, the traversing of Forked Lake, a truck portage into Long Lake, and paddling of the first six miles af Lang Lake. Wednesday covered only twelve miles, finishing Long Lake and commencing Racquette River, but included a rugged ride and a quarter-mile partage. A hard push an Thursday cavered the remaining twenty-faur miles af Racquette River, Simon Pond, and a six-mile paddle across Tupper Lake ta a picturesque campsite, camplete with waterfall shawers, far a day and a half of relaxation and recreation befare a final three-mile paddle Saturday on Tupper Lake to aur pickup point. The boys who made the trip praved to be both excellent canoers and campers. Not anly did the trip provide a chance to visit same of the most beautiful country in the Northeast; the demands of such an outing supplied an opportunity for many of the boys to discover the extent of their own stamina and resources.
