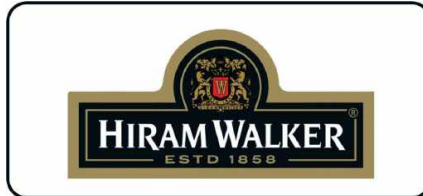

The Shamrocks have a number of players who shone brilliantly in Saturday's contests against the Londoners but the performance of Mary Lyons, diminutive left fielder, was probably the most outstanding. Fielding sensationally in both games, the Shamrock star treated the fans to some of the finest catches ever seen in girls' softball ranks along the Border.

The keystone combination of the Cutcher sisters, Alice at short and Margaret at second, for the Shamrocks, bids fair to develop into one of the best in the province, when they gain a little more experience. Between them they handled 21 chances in the two games, accepting anything and everything that was anywhere within range. The display of Edith Spindelman, who caught both contests for the locals is also worthy of praise. She turned in a creditable game behind the plate and showed an arm for which the visitors showed due respect after the first few innings of the first game in which three of the Londoners were tossed out at second on heaves by the Shamrock catcher.

No higher praise can be given to the Oke Leafs than to say that they functioned like a well-oiled machine. They have a good infield, an outer defense of real, fly-hawks and an offensive strength which will carry them to many a victory.

CLEVER CATCHER

P. Armstrong, behind the plate for the London squad, exhibited about the best all-around performance for the visitors. She gave a great defensive display in both games, connecting for three singles out of four times to bat in the opener and hit a homer and a double in five attempts in the second game. H. Aitken, billed as the "home-run queen" of girl softballers clearly demonstrated her right to the title in the opening contest when she came to bat in the first innings with the bases loaded and poled out a prodigious clout to clear the sacks.

Maybe it was stage fright, or maybe it was just sheer inability on the part of "Jackie" Showman on the mound for the Shamrocks to find the plate which gave the Londoners four runs, three of which were unearned in the opening frame of the first game on Saturday. The first two batters to face the local hurler walked. M. McLeish scratched a single past second filling the bases and with the stage all set for her little act Hazel Aitken came to bat and poled one of Miss Showman's slants far to left field for a home-run. The Irish lassies settled down after that and retired the side in order but the damage had been done and the Londoners were off to a start which proved a little too much for the Shamrocks to overcome.

After scoring a run in the second and another in the fifth the local nine all but drew up on even terms with Teddy Oke's squad in the next frame when Mary Lyons drove a homer with one of her mates on the sacks to score two more counters and bring the locals' total up to four runs. 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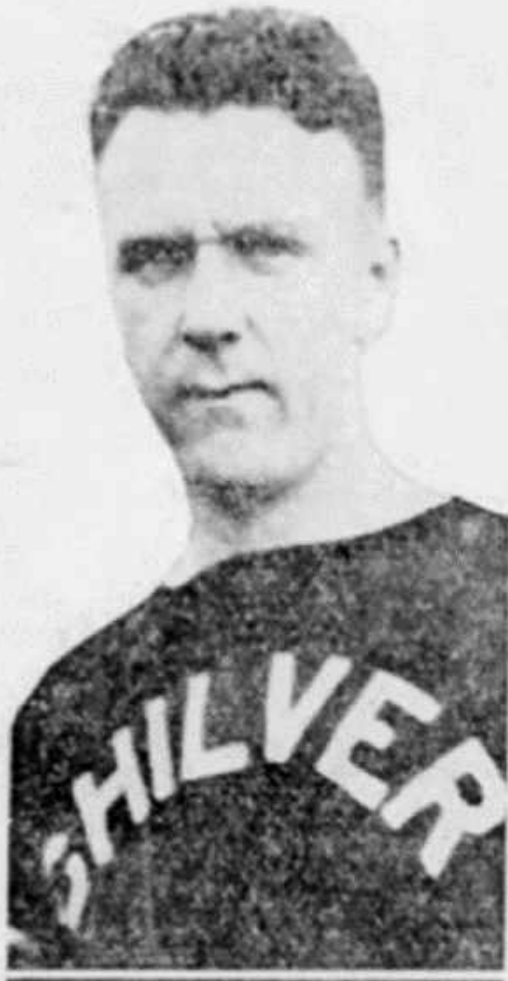

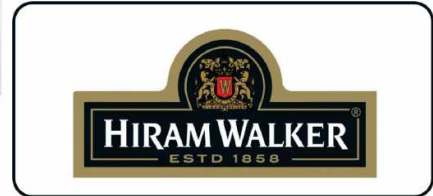

Despite his wildness, "Hank" Pacey, Chilvers' star speed-ball artist, retained sufficient of his old time form to hurl his mates to a 7 to 6 verdict over Burnsides in the first game of the play-off series for the senior softball championship of the Border Cities at the Central Collegiate grounds last night.

PITCHES AND REFEREES

Battling courageously against a team that has overwhelmed them almost at will on practically every occasion on which they have met this season, Burnsides gave Chilvers one of the stiffest battles they have experienced before finally conceding defeat. "Robbie" Robson raised a spark of hope in the breasts of the Hardware team's supporters for a split second in the last inning, when he raised a long fly to Poupard in left field. The next two men were retired in order and the game was over.

Pacey except for his lack of control, pitched an almost airtight brand of ball. He walked the first three men to face him in the opening frame and then to make matters worse, proceeded to tell the officials how the game should be handled instead of attending strictly to his knitting and let the umpires do the officiating. After the first two frames, during which he apparently discovered to his own satisfaction at least the futility of arguing with the umpires, he fared much better and outside of the sixth inning in which a fluke homer by Robson accounted for three of the losers runs, he had the opposing nine eating out of his hand.

PITCHERS HIT HOMERS

Both pitchers besides turning in a nice article of ball, figured prominently in the offensive efforts of their respective clubs. 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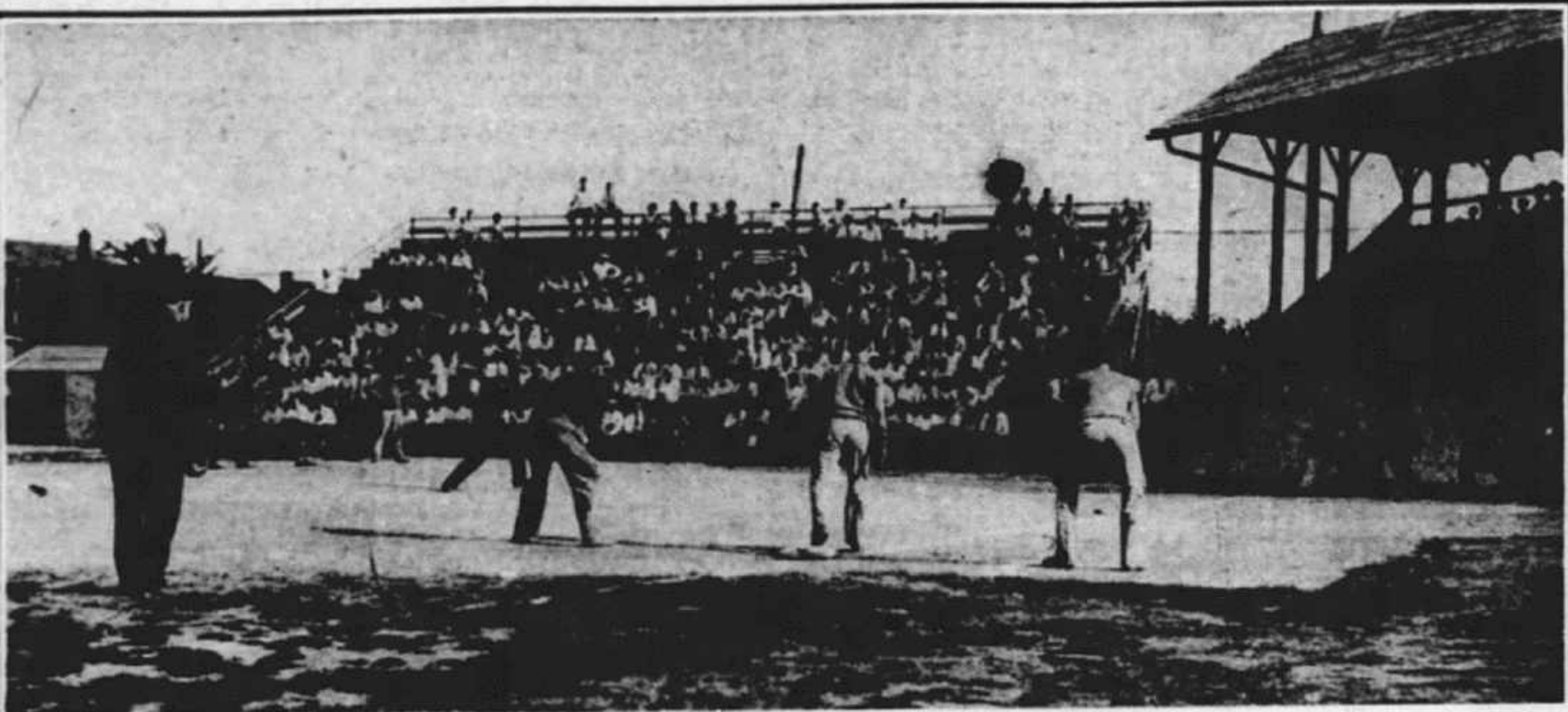

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
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London Greys Earn Verdict
