“I Just Felt Like I Belonged to Them”: Women’s Industrial Softball, London, Ontario, 1923-1935

By the mid 1920s, company-sponsored sport leagues for women were well established in Canadian cities such as London, Ontario, Canada. As both an act of welfarism and convenient brand-identification advertising, London companies such as Kellogg’s, Silverwood Dairy, Smallman & Ingram, and Gorman Eckerts sponsored, and in some cases organized, women’s industrial softball teams for workers from 1923 until 1935. As a part of corporate welfarism, employers viewed team sports as activities that would encourage and develop a sense of cooperation, team spirit, and loyalty among employees—characteristics that employers hoped would transfer to the production line. From the narratives of three women who worked and played for various London companies, I consider the constructions of meaning that shape our understanding of the leisure time pursuits of working women in the city and the meaning it has for them decades later. The narratives and industrial sport experiences of these three women suggest that gender hierarchies and competing (sometimes conflicting) loyalties were at the foundation of how they negotiated belonging to company sports teams, related work and educational opportunities, and the eventual changes in their recreation practices that came with marriage and childbirth.



Warning Issued



Explaining Softball Finances

William Y. "Bill" Shaw, president of the Border Cities Softball Federation, on behalf of that organization, has submitted the following to correct impressions with respect to its operation, and to outline in brief detail its financial arrangements:

"The Border Cities Softball Federation was formed in the Spring of 1928 for the purpose of fostering amateur sport in the Border Cities, and softball in particular. In the inaugural year the entry fee was \$37.50 for senior, \$35 for intermediate and \$5 for junior. The funds thus derived, were needed for the operation of the league. There was no refund to the teams at the end of the season, but the league had a surplus to carry over as a reserve fund for the next season. All games were played in open parks. The revenue was by collection. All collections went to the league, which used same to defray expenses of official umpires and scorers.

"The profits were approximately \$200.

"The entry fee for 1929 was a flat rate of \$35 for senior and intermediate teams and the juniors, \$5, the same as in 1928. Open playing fields were used again, with collections taken at each game. The league handled all funds and took care of umpires and scorers as in the previous year. At the end of the season there was a small surplus, approximately \$30. The teams waived any split of this surplus, voting it back to the treasury.

"In 1930 the entrance fee for senior and intermediate girls' clubs was reduced to \$25, with the juniors still at \$5. The clubs this season took their own collections and paid their own officials. The Federation operated on a paying basis but did not show as much profit as in previous years.

"In 1931 the entry fee was \$35 for senior and intermediate clubs, and \$5 for the juniors. The Federation returned to its original operating system, namely, handling all receipts and paying all officials. The Federation moved to closed parks for the first time. The financial arrangement called for a split of a third of the net receipts to each home club and one-third to the Federation, participating in local playoffs split the net receipts. The Federation did not share in the playoff money. There was a refund of \$7 to each of the senior and intermediate clubs. Three clubs participating in the Senior B playoffs divided approximately \$325 between them. The Federation finished the season with \$66 profit. The accumulated profits at the time of the general meeting this past spring amounted to \$306.

"In 1932 the entry fee for senior, intermediate and junior clubs remained the same as the previous year.

The girls' division was added to the Federation again, after an absence of one year. The entry fee was \$25 per club. The total revenue from entry fees amounted to \$365. Of this sum approximately \$330 has either already been absorbed or will be absorbed in operating expenses. Of these operating expenses, only one item is for salary, and that to the secretary. According to the Federation's contract with the clubs \$7 must be returned to each of the clubs paying the \$25 entry fee, provided of course, that the clubs complete the schedule. There are 13 clubs eligible for this \$7 refund, amounting to \$91. One club has failed to complete its schedule. The junior clubs do not come under the refund contract inasmuch as their entry fee was only \$5.

"With respect to the Church League, the arrangements as set down by the O.A.B.A. required that its championship club in each division affiliate direct with the Federation, paying an entry fee of \$25 for each club. The Church League entered its junior and intermediate representatives under these conditions. This entitles them to playoff with Federation junior and intermediate champions, for provincial playdowns.

"It can easily be seen by the foregoing statement of financial affairs that the Federation has no such sum as \$800 on hand, nor has it any prospect of having any such sum at the end of the current season. The desire of the Federation is to accommodate as many teams within its fold as possible. On the number of teams in the Federation depends the cost of affiliation. That is, the more teams, the lower the entry fee.

"The executive members of the Federation hope that this detailed survey will serve to clear any misunderstanding as to its financial status and as to its aims and purposes."

Chalk Up Second Victory Over Church Nine

Sacred Heart passed from the intermediate softball picture for this year by dropping the second straight game to Riverside last night at Kelsey, 10-9. By virtue of their win last night the Brewers qualified to meet Central United Church in the district finals.

Superior slugging gave Riverside the verdict; Peltier not only pitched good ball but did some heavy hitting. Sacred Heart pulled four fine fielding plays; Briscoe robbed Hawken and Westland of home-runs, and Sabine made a great play on Oliver's drive; Dupuis contributed a great catch for Brewers.
