## Silverwoods Win Opener

### Defeat McCreery Girls 8 to 6 in Playoff Contest

Silverwoods have drawn first blood in their battle with McCreerys for the girls' softball championship of the Border Cities. They performed the operation at Kennedy Stadium last night by emerging victorious, 8-6, from the opening set-to of the three-out-of-five-game series. They will attempt to prolong the Jeweler's discomfort when the war is resumed at Kennedy Monday.

### GIVEN REAL BATTLE

Mindful of what happened last year when, after leading the league all season, they were quickly upset and eliminated from the playoff picture, Silverwoods went into last night's game with less over-confidence than they did at a similar stage of the 1934 campaign. It was lucky they did, for McCreerys played a "bang up" game and on more than one occasion threatened to treat the Dairymaids in the same way Shines treated them a year ago.

As it was the Jewellers both out-hit and out-fielded their opponents but two timely home runs and ability to make the most of their opportunities brought Silverwoods the victory. A near-homer threatened to save the game for McCreerys but Mary Goswick saw that it didn't. With Mary Locke on first base after forcing Pinch-hitter Smith, who had singled with one down, Vera Charley stepped to the plate and made a bid for a round-tripper. It was not to be, though, for Goswick hauled down her drive to centre to end the game with a great catch.

At the outset McCreerys gave every indication of chalking up a big score, tallying three times in the first inning on two hits, a base on balls, two errors and a wild pitch. From then on, however, Greta Kain pitched superbly, scattering ten hits and walking not a single batter.

### SAPERGO HITS HOMER

Tenle Sapergo first gave Silverwoods the lead when she belted a home run in the third to chase home Stella Krol, who had singled, and Rena Dominato, who had doubled. In the very next session Willa Hyttenrauch also clouted a home run, this one driving home Isabel Buchanan, who had reached first when Gault dropped a third strike. Things began to look black for McCreerys, and as a matter of fact they were black, for Hyttenrauch's homer later proved to be the winning run. Until the last out, however, McCreerys were never definitely beaten.

Mabel Ramsay courageously overcame a bad spell between the second and fourth frames and finished in great style. Unfortunately, Kain proved more than equal to the two really serious problems that rose in the last eight innings. Despite Kain's good work in the pinches, though, Ramsay showed the best bit of mound artistry of the night when she struck out Hyttenrauch, Krol and Dominato in succession after Ada Allen had opened the first inning with a triple. All told, Ramsay fanned ten and did not issue a base on balls at any time. Kain dismissed eight opponents by the strike-out route and walked one.

### FIELDING HIGHLIGHT

Goswick's catch of Charley's drive in the ninth was, of course, the fielding highlight but apart from that defensive honors went to McCreerys, for whom Rosella Ratsbeck, Jean Brown and Valeria McWilliams each made an excellent catch.

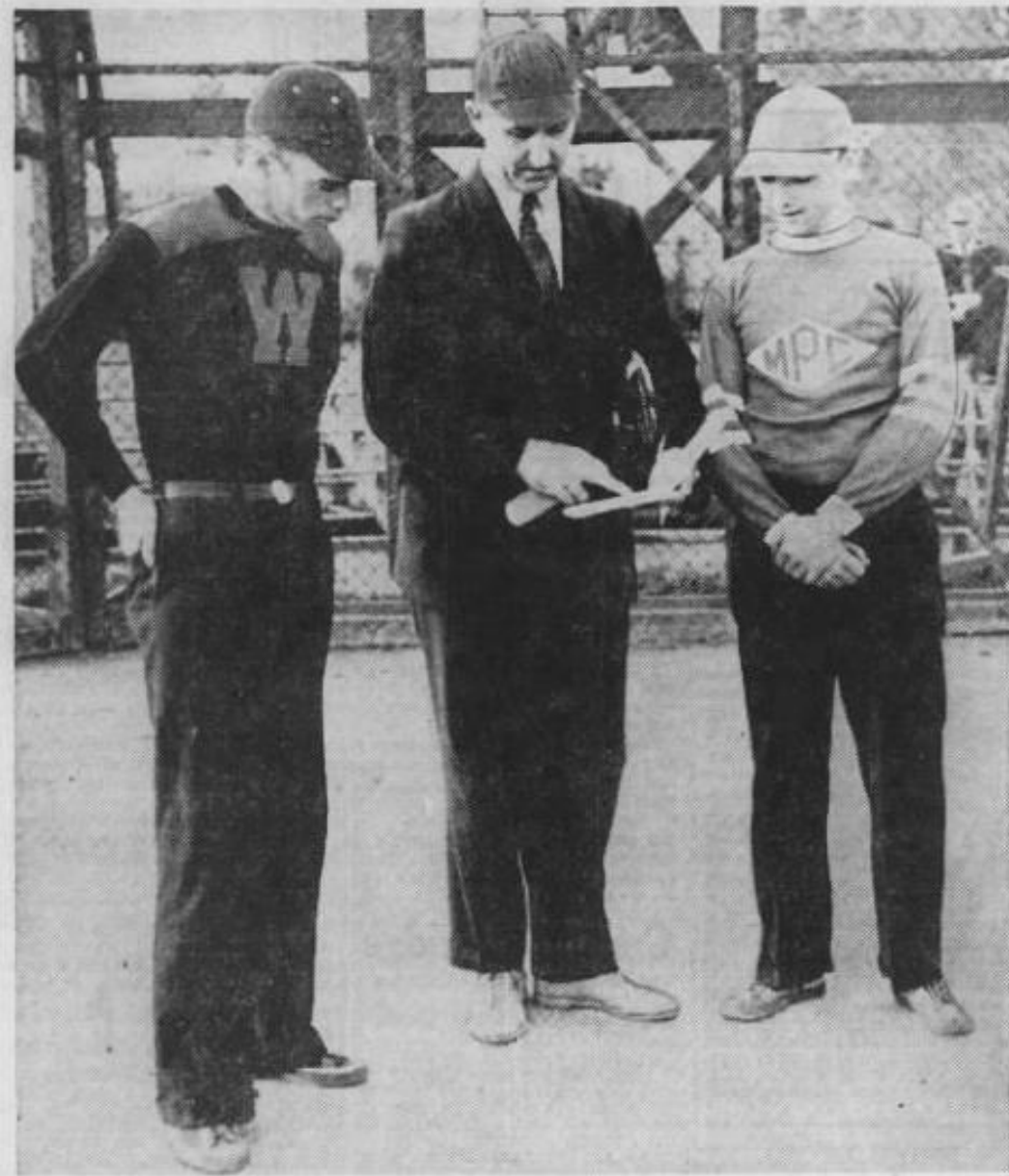

# Two Bendix Teams Clash

Border Squad Is Much  
Stronger Than Last  
Season

Starts at 8.30

Two Local Girl Clubs  
Slated to Meet In  
Preliminary

When the American Bendix softballers of South Bend, Ind., take on the Canadian Bendix softballers of Walkerville, Ont., in the second game of an exhibition doubleheader at Kennedy Stadium here tonight, they will find themselves up against a much stronger team than the one they trimmed at South Bend last year.

## ROGIN BEHIND PLATE

In 1934 the local Bendix outfit was a member of the Border Cities Industrial League and, as industrial teams go, had a powerful aggregation. With all fairness to last year's players, however, the 1934 team could hardly compare with the 1935 edition.

Carl Blonde is again managing the team and as coach Bendix has Slim Hole, undoubtedly one of the best leaders, if not the peer of them all, in local softball.

Willie Rogin, adept in the pitcher's box, at first base or in the outfield, has now developed into a fine catcher, and has a capable understudy in Harry Heydon, the 1934 backstop.

Clarence Bruggeman, probably the outstanding first baseman in the district at this time, is looking after the initial hassock for Bendix this season, and Charley Minello, last year's first-backer, is a capable substitute.

With Mickey McMillan at shortstop and George Chapman at second, the team has a fine duo around the mid-station, and Turch Evon is a peppery little third baseman with a wicked arm.

Red Wiseman and Red Nantais, a pair of sluggers, and Heydon, when he is not catching, give the team a trio of formidable outfielders. Wiseman seems likely to switch with Chapman, however, Red taking a turn at second as "Chappie" moves out to the garden.

## CAPABLE SUBSTITUTE

Jimmy Keenan, peppery Scot, is an able performer in the infield or outfield, and though not as hard a hitter as some of the others, can take good care of himself at the plate. Charley Mephan, who, with Keenan, was a member of last year's Bendix team, should see action as an outfielder, and Minello may, too, though the latter is better at first.

In Fred Bolter and Russ Evon, Bendix has two of the Border Cities' outstanding pitchers, and both may get a chance to breeze their fast balls past the American invaders tonight.

The South Bend outfit is practically the same as last year, which means that it is strong enough to give its Canadian rival a real battle. They will swing into action at 8:30, with two girls' teams opening the twin bill at 7 o'clock. Silverwoods, perennial contenders for Border Cities honors, will oppose the strong McCreery's diamonds outfit in this attractive curtain-raiser.

The Kiwanis Boys' Band will be in attendance to help the affair along, and gate prizes will be awarded.



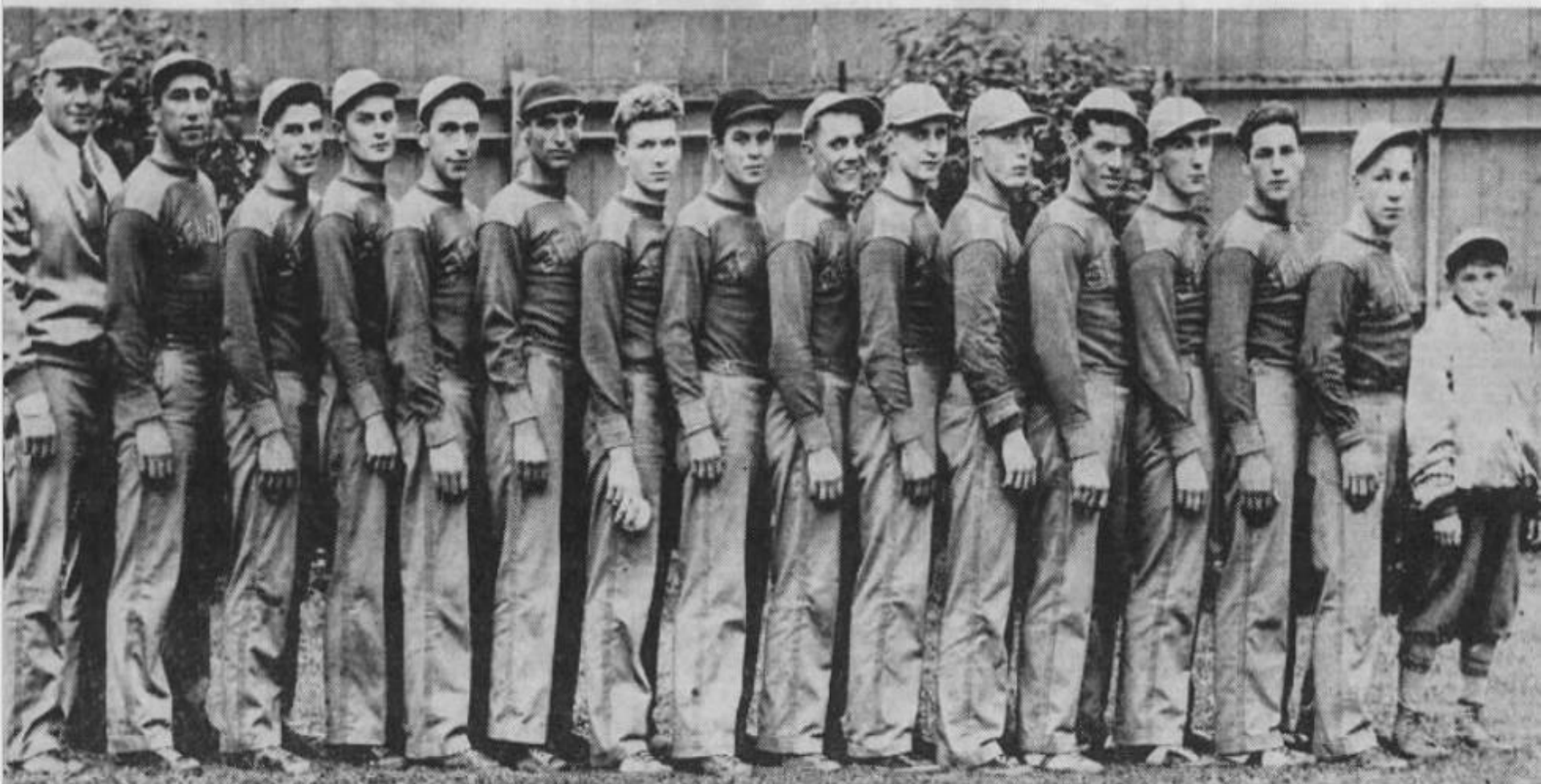
