Young vs. Motor Products, at King George School; Kelsey Wheel vs. Chemsals, at Shore Acres, all starting at 6:30.

There are two other teams in the league, Auto Specialties and Canadian Automotive Trim. Automotive Trim is a new entry, as is Motor Lamp. Duplate returns after a year's absence.

Two more Windsor athletic organizations get their 1939 seasons under way Monday, both softball leagues, the Windsor League and the Merchants League.

In the Windsor League, the old A.K.O. team has changed its name to Esquire Men's Shop, the Maroons are now Malone Flowers, Ottawa A.C. is Dacotahs, and there are five new entries, Dodge-Fargo, Elmwood West Ends, Dayus Roofers, Junior Optimists and Essex Scottish are the newcomers. Four teams have retained their 1938 names, Banks, Bayer, Chrysler and Moose Lodge. The 12-team make-up establishes the Windsor League as the city's biggest.

A single game will open the season in this loop. It brings together Bayer and Elmwood West Ends, on the Elmwood diamond, starting at 6:15.

A power in senior Ontario Amateur Softball Association ranks not so very long ago, the old West End club began its comeback last night—on the wrong foot. Now known as Elmwood West Ends, Hank Pacey, Herb Smith and Company made their debut in the Windsor League by dropping a 6-5 decision to the Bayer entry on their own diamond.

HILLIER'S HIT WINS

The game marked the opening of the 12-team Windsor League's season, and was the only one scheduled. It was a good game, and apparently Elmwoods' until half of the eight innings played before darkness set in had been completed.

At the end of the fourth Elmwoods had a 5-1 lead, but then Pacey and the rest of the once mighty West End crew began to wilt and Bayer began to collect dividends. Pecking away steadily at Hank's offerings through the fifth, sixth and seventh innings, the Aspirin Boys drew level at 5-all in the last of these three heats, then won out in the eighth when Bob Weir's error put Cowan on first-base and young Jeff Hillier promptly brought him home with a three-base knock to left.

LONG DON STOPS 'EM

Long Don Dywelska did Bayer's pitching and got better as he went along, with the climax of his performance coming in the last half inning of the contest. After the first batter had been retired, Jack Douglas doubled, Feet Taylor singled and Bob Weir was safe on Dywelska's own error to fill the bases with just one man out and Red Kennedy and Herb Smith. In the old days the mere picking up of a bat by either of those two warriors in a spot like that might easily have scared a pitcher into blowing up, but not so this time. Kennedy forced Douglas at the plate and Smith grounded out to Dywelska to end the game.

The stocky little Hillier not only delivered the winning hit but also banged out a two-bagger to establish himself as the best hitter on view on this night's showing, at least.

Pitcher Dywelska, with two singles, was the only other winner to connect twice, while the last two men in the batting order, Douglas and Feet Taylor, were the Elmwood team's only two-hit men.

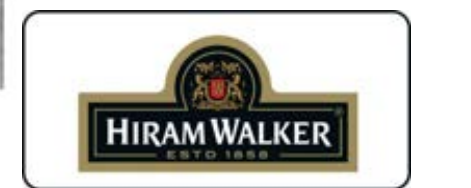

SOFTBALL PITCHER KILLED IN GAME

Batted Ball Strikes Him

Ace of Toronto Dairy Team Succumbs to Internal Hurts

Unique Occurrence

Fatality Is Believed First in History of Game; No Inquest

TORONTO, June 7.—In what was believed to be the first fatal accident in the history of softball, Bill Forsyth died here last night of injuries received when struck by a hard-hit ball. The 25-year-old ace pitcher of a dairy team was

hit in the stomach by a line-drive before he had time to recover from his pitching stance after delivering the ball. Doctors said shock and internal injuries caused death in an ambulance while he was being taken to hospital.

Following a practise here in recent years regarding sports accidents, no inquest will be held, Dr. Smirle Lawson said.

Forsyth had been a prominent figure in Toronto softball for 10 years. Two years ago he pitched Brigdens to a city championship.

Surviving are his widow and son, Ronnie, aged four.

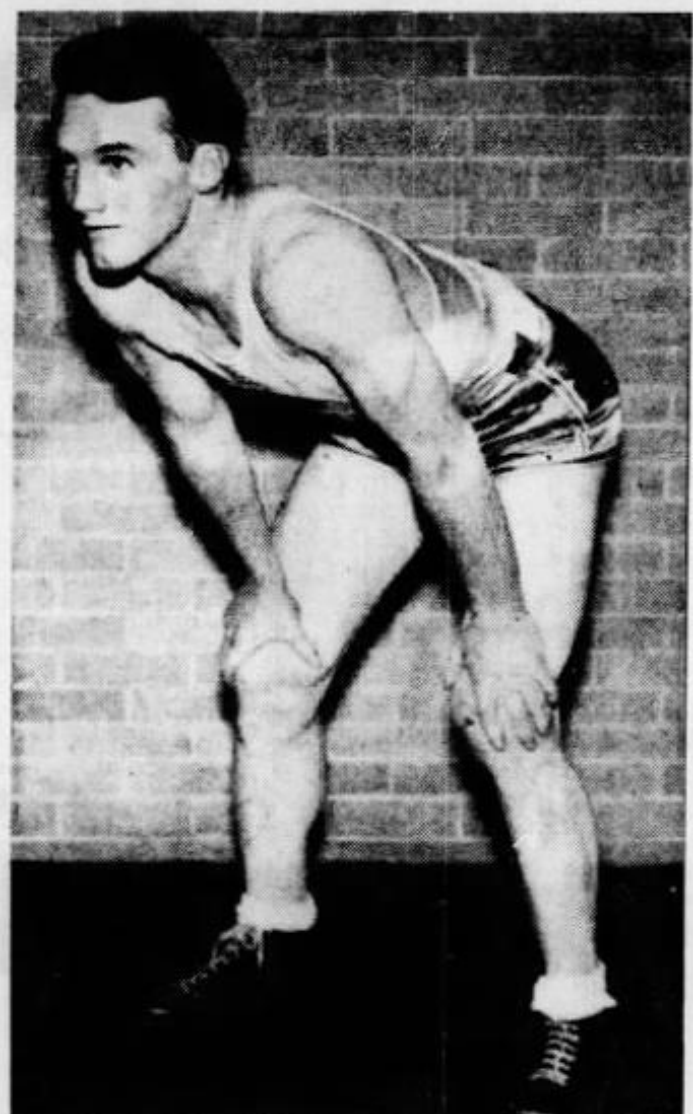

INDUSTRIALS DO IT AGAIN

Twenty-Two of Them Go Down on Strikes But They Win, 7-6

Fred Dobney is laughing. Fred Chambers is laughing. Slim Hole is laughing, the whole Windsor Industrial Softball League is laughing. Why? Because the Industrial League again beat the Windsor League last night in the All-Star Game that has become a fixed preliminary to the annual Umpires-Scorers frolic. The score was 7-6, the margin thus being the same as in the initial game, last year. The score then was 5-4.

DUFOUR HAS A POSSIBLE

You can't blame Messrs. Dobney, Chambers and Hole and their associates for sticking out their chests today, but even they must admit that it looked bad for them for five innings of this star-studded contest that, together with the frolic that served as a nightcap, drew over 1,000 fans to floodlit Kennedy Stadium. They knew they were in a ball game all the way.

It was a pitchers' game, and a game which probably made the vaunted Industrial League sluggers mighty happy that they didn't have to face such tough pitching in their loop. Between them, the three hurlers used by the Windsor League compiled 22 strikeouts. Little Raymond (Bussy) Dufour, the starter, and Garnet (Chow) Thorne, his immediate successor, had possibles, Dufour whiffing nine men in three innings and Thorne 12 in four. One of Dufour's victims reached first base when Scotty Myles dropped a third strike. Incidentally, Dufour was the only pitcher of the six used who did not issue a pass. He allowed one hit.

COME FROM FAR BACK

But they pay off on runs, not strikeouts, and the Industrials had the Windsors there. Under the able handling of Manager Chambers and Coach Hole, and the anxious eye of League President Dobney, the Industrials showed remarkable recuperative powers, wiped out a 6-0 deficit and then held it behind the superb chucking of Mike (Slim) Patrick. The Windsors had had considerable success at the expense of Tom Dowdell and had also done well against Bill Cullen before he settled down, but Patrick, with his unfamiliar windmill motion, had them buffaloed, with the assistance of a snappy unassisted double play by Doug Sabine.

Perhaps the most remarkable thing about the unusually remarkable pitching was that all except Thorne and Patrick either pitched earlier in the evening or have been overworked lately. Dowdell and Cullen faced each other for a couple of innings or so in an exhibition game an hour earlier. Dufour had pitched two full games and part of a third within the preceding four days and Farmer came to the All-Star Game directly after pitching a nine-inning playoff game.

Odd part of it was that Thorne, the one with the most rest, was the least successful. He was reached for all seven of the winners' runs and could place the responsibility on nothing but his own wildness.

If the victory had an offensive hero it was the veteran Jimmy Raisbeck, who, up for the first time, came through with a timely single to drive in the two runs that tied the score at 6-6, then scooted the rest of the way on a passed ball and a wild pitch. However, Ray Urbanski can't be overlooked. Only at bat twice officially, he delivered hits both times just when they were most needed to keep his league's two rallies going. First he delivered a two-run double with three men on base, then a single. Both hits went exactly the same place, on the ground just inside first-base.

Numerically, the leading hitters were the Industrial's Alex Clark, whose single in the third was the first Industrial hit and who got two more before he was through, and the Windsor's Jeff Hillier, who singled on both his first two appearances.

THEY CAN SLUG, TOO

Yet, the mightiest hitters on view were the knockout experts of the pitcher's box, Dufour and Thorne. They hit the game's only home-runs. The little fellow hit one past the running track in right-centre with none aboard in the third and Thorne hit one over the same spot, only farther, when he broke into the game as a pinch-hitter for Dufour in the fourth. Dufour's came with the bases empty, off Dowdell, and Thorne's with one on, off Cullen.
