A.'s fifth season last night in a manner too disrespectful for words, a 10-2 pasting of the titleholders.

SAD BEGINNING

It was a sorry beginning for Art Ray who has taken over the position of manager of the champions in order to let Harold (Peanuts) Wilson, the lad who led them to the title, devote all his energy to playing.

Ray started Bob McMillan, one of the best pitchers in the Merchants League last year. It was his Industrial League debut. McMillan had a no-run, no-hit game last year for C. H. Smiths, but he wasn't anywhere close to that form last night. He started off splendidly, but was out of there before the finish, victim of seven runs and 12 hits in eight innings. Possibly he was not in the best of condition, for pre-season training has been greatly curtailed this spring because of bad weather.

Bad weather or good, however, there was nothing the matter with Mike (Shm) Patrick. Patrick was Cady's starting choice—and finishing choice. He allowed eight hits but kept them well scattered and was never in danger although he weakened momentarily in the sixth as the Specialists did their scoring.

Two runs in the fifth decided the issue. Charley Morgan was safe on Wilson's bad throw, came home on Norman Garant's double and saw Garant himself cross later on an infield out.

Next to Patrick's pitching, the outstanding feature probably was the Industrial League debut of Earl Groulx, left-handed slugger snatched by Youngs from the Windsor League. It was Groulx who opened the scoring when his drive got away from Vic Clark for a home run and before the game was over he had a double and single as well.

Windsor League Opens On Friday; Three New Teams

The second of Windsor's two major softball leagues gets underway tomorrow, with games at Kennedy Stadium and Chrysler Diamond.

The league referred to is the Windsor League, which is linked with the Industrial Senior League as the pick of the several circuits in this city.

10 TEAMS, ALL STRONG

Under several capable presidents but always with Lloyd Pollock more or less running things, and very efficiently, from his position of secretary-treasurer-publicity director, the Windsor League has grown by leaps and bounds, until no one can deny that it is the most fertile, most steadily improving of the lot herabouts.

This year again finds it with 10 teams, as in 1938. At first glance, this may seem like a step backward instead of forward, inasmuch as there were 12 teams in 1935, but such is not the case. Numerically the league is weaker, yes, but in calibre it is vastly stronger. Last year, you see, there were three teams that were quite definitely out of their class and two others that were only mediocre. Now, on the eve of another season, there doesn't appear to be a weak sister in the loop.

Joe Grondin's champion Bayer club is back and so is the other 1939 finalist, only the latter is known as Lazare's Pups this time instead of Equire Men's Shop. Moose Lodge and Elmwood West Ends, the other two semi-finalists, are in again, and so are the quarter-finalists, Chryslers and Dayus Roofers. The champs, runners-up, Moose and Elmwoods, are much the same as before except that Elmwoods have collared the great Fred Bolter and Moose expect to have Jim Radcliff, formerly of Dodge-Fargo, pitching and Ernest (Lefty) Trudell in the outfield. The Lodge and all the rest of the teams have several rookies, of course.

DODGE-FARGO REVAMPED

Seventh and last of the holdovers is Dodge-Fargo. This team is again under the management of Dave Kinghorn, but will be practically new except for the name. Chryslers and Dayus are greatly revamped, too, and will introduce a number of new faces besides those of veterans. On the Chrysler roster are the two players who were the most painful thorns in the side of the Chrysler firm's M-O hockey team during the past winter, Creighton Lowther and Pickles Mac-Nicol.

Chryslers' own hockey favorites Pat Gardner and Red McAfee are with Dodge-Fargo again, and so is Bill Woodward, the latest of the puck team's recruits from Stratford.

The three new teams in the league are Medial Arts Beauty Salon, which played exhibition games last year as Desjarlais Nine; Riverside A.C. and Harry's Munro.

Most notable of these three is Harry's Munro. Under that title you will find most of the starry aggregation that represented Hiram Walker & Sons last year in the Detroit Major League, plus a prospective pitching great in Bob Stinchcombe. On the roster are such well-known and brilliant performers as Stan Tranter, Elmer Bauer, Jack Smith and George Rasbeck.

RIVERSIDE BOASTS TITLE

Riverside's team is composed mostly of boys new to major competition here but they were good enough last year to win the championship of the National League, now defunct.

Medial Arts has strengthened the

old Desjarlais Nine, of course, for the step up to Windsor League play. Per pitchers it has Bill Guillen and his young brother, of the former Industrial League-champion Chemsals, and Jim Walker, formerly of Duplate. It also has Bill Moffat and Handley from Duplate and the Froulx brothers, George and Roger.

Tomorrow's opening program brings the strongest newcomer and the defending champion smack up against each other right off the reel, Bayer meeting Harry's Munro. In the other game Lazare's meet Chryslers. Lazare's and Chryslers will play on the Chrysler Diamond, Tecumseh road at Albert road, starting at 6:15. Bayer and Munro will play at Kennedy Stadium, starting at 6:30. This latter game will be half of a doubleheader, with an international girls' game as the nightcap.

GIRLS' BALL NINE OPENS

SILVERWOODS AGAIN IN INT'L LOOP

The men and boys play the better brand of ball, but they don't put any more spirit into it than the girls do. That's why, for many of the fans, Windsor's softball season won't really be considered open until tomorrow.

Then it is, at approximately 8 o'clock in the evening, that Jack Smith will introduce his 1940 edition of the Silverwood Dairy women's team. A rugged organization that has survived through the years as its intra-city rivals have dropped out one by one, the Silverwood club is again the city's lone standard-bearer of its kind. And again its competition will be found in the ranks of the Detroit Major League.

Again, too, Silverwoods will play their home games at Kennedy Stadium. Their schedule calls for two league games a week, one at home and one away. They will play their home games every Friday, in conjunction with the Harry's Munro team, which is also managed by Jack Smith. Harry's Munro will play a Windsor League game as half of a doubleheader, and Silverwoods a Major League game as the other half.

Each Tuesday, there will be a similar doubleheader, except that it will be of an exhibition nature, with the Munro outfit playing an Industrial Senior League Club and the girls the best team available, either from Detroit or some other city.

When a guy hits a softball for a percentage of .516 over a 25-game schedule, he deserves something, so nobody will begrudge Lefty Garant the batting championship of the Windsor Industrial Softball Association's Senior Division for 1940. In 91 times at bat for the L. A. Young team during the regular season, the left-handed centre-fielder—he throws left as well as bats left, incidentally—collected 47 hits, including three home-runs and 12 doubles.

Grant had a comfortable 51-point margin over Al Kirby, the Canadian Bridge all-rounder who finished as runner-up, but .455, the mark Kirby attained, is a lot of clubbing, just the same Al had 13 extra-base hits.

Third, 57 points behind Kirby, was Kirby's manager, George Chapman. The fact that Al and Chappy finished in order was fitting enough. They batted that way most of the season, Al leading off and Chappy right behind Kirby not only made 40 hits but drew 22 passes, making him far and away the best lead-off batter in the league. Steve Zepka of last-place Kelsey Wheel also drew 22 passes, but batted only 301.

Johnny King, left-handed Auto Specialties pitcher-outfielder, was the league's leading homer-hitter, socking six. King was at bat more than any of the other leading hitters, 120 times officially.

Johnny Kameski was second to King in the four-base department, with five round-trippers, but where this second Johnny K. really sparkled was behind the bat. He not only

But all four runs were wasted, as was Munro's last, which had crossed in the first half of the eighth on singles by Thomson, Rudel and Fiddes mixed with an error by Kennedy, who, probably for the first time in his life, found himself playing third-base as a consequence of Bauer's being lifted for a pinch-hitter.

THREE HITS FOR FIDDES

A quick look at the box-score will tell you that outstanding in this championship win, along with Stinchcombe, was Geordie Raisbeck, who made three hits and handled six chances at second-base without a slip. Rudel, like Raisbeck, a product of old Ford City, also shone. Besides having the night's top batting average and batting in a run, he handled six chances flawlessly at shortstop. Fiddes didn't hurt the cause any, either, with his three hits.

Taylor and Weir, on the strength of a brace of hits apiece, must be regarded as Elmwood's best in this closing game.

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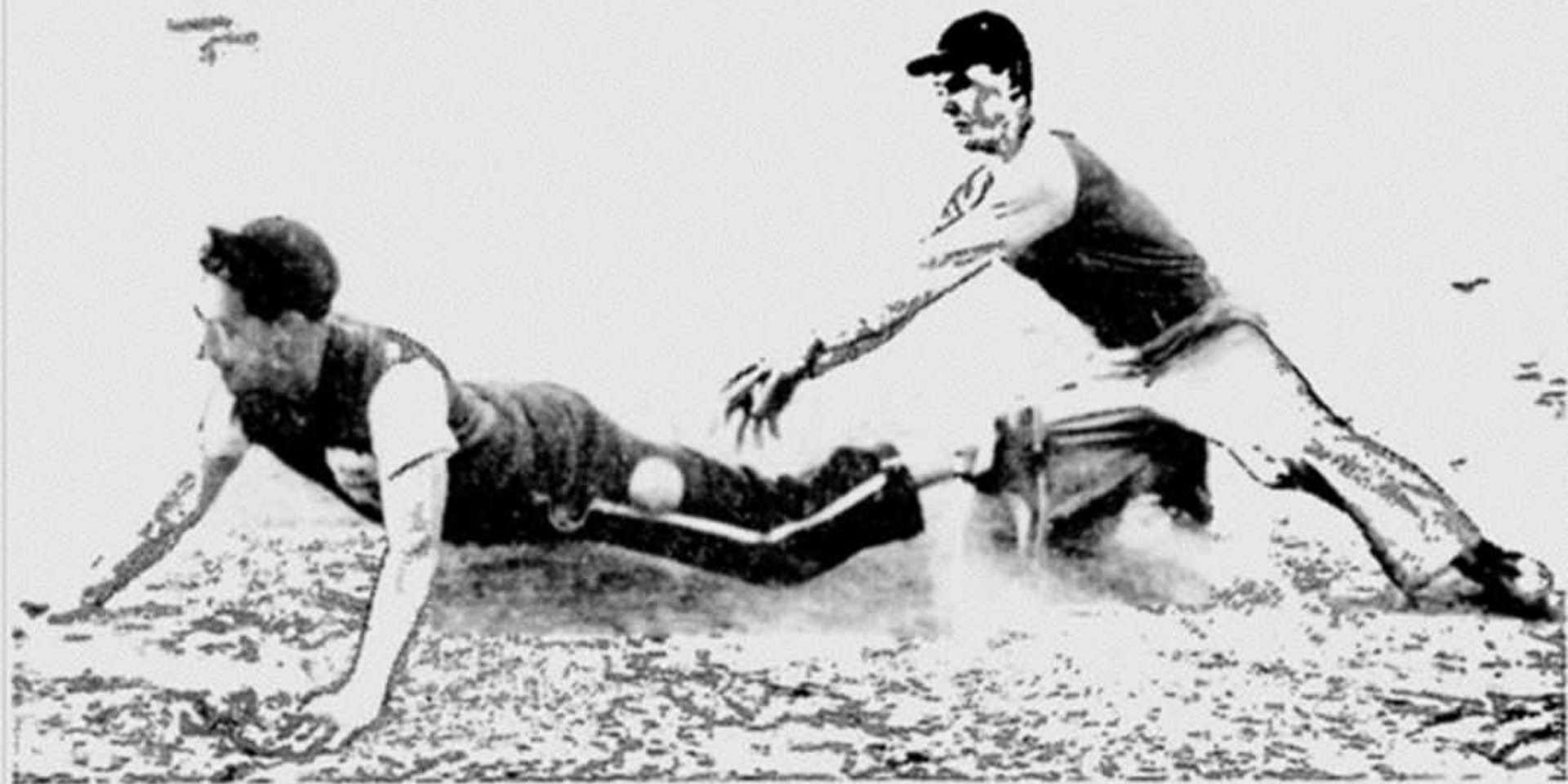

A Very Fast Fade-out

They began magnificently, but faded ingloriously—and with almost incredible suddenness. They did one of the quickest, and sorriest, about-faces in the history of the game here, and they were a thoroughly beaten team at the end of this particular afternoon (though before they're through they should go far. Manager Willy had them since they were midgets, he says, and all are eligible to play in junior competition again next year.
