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# It'll Be a Tough League, Will the Windsor

Local Softball Season Opens Monday With a Seven-Team Race in Which Three Doesn't Appear to Be a Single Weakling; Outstanding New Players Include Nerts Parent, Mike Patrick, Kavanaugh, Bob McMillan

EACH of the seven teams in the strong Windsor Softball League, which gets its season underway Monday evening, is represented in the above layout by one of its outstanding players. 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The four teams who will participate in the Windsor Softball League's opening two-game program Monday evening of next week are the only ones who have been in the organization for more than a year, and they have been outstanding since they entered. Don't kid yourself, though, that in looking over the inaugural offering you'll have seen what is unquestionably the cream of the crop. On the contrary, it figures to be a real dog-fight in the Windsor League this year.

For that matter, it's been pretty much of a dog-fight for the past three years. You remember when no less than six teams ended the schedule in a tie for second place, and again, last year, when no less than three teams finished in a tie for first place and an extra sudden-death game had to be played by the next two for the fourth and last playoff spot? It's liable to be just as close this time.

Only seven teams are in the fold for 1941, as compared to 1940's 10, but what the league has lost in quantity it most certainly has gained in quality.

Take the three teams who still have to show their wares after Monday:

### BEAUTICIANS REVAMPED

Medical Arts Beauty Salon, for instance. Only the fact that loss of

players has caused a wholesale re-vamping cautions one not to rank the Beauticians right up there again. There is actually no proof that they don't belong there. They've lost Russ Evon, shortstop; Bob Srigley, outfielder; Bill Cullen, pitcher, and Bill Moffat, outfielder-pitcher, but on the other hand they have picked up Pitchers Tom Kavanaugh and Don Ward, and Nerts Parent, shortstop-catcher.

If there is an irreparable loss, it is that of Don Desjarlais. Ironically, Don is the son of the team's sponsor and manager, Harris (Pop) Desjarlais. Happily for Don, but unhappily for the team, the long lad who at one time was one of the finest athletes ever turned out by Assumption College, has himself a new job with the Sandwich, Windsor & Amherstburg Railway, and will do his 1941 ball-playing for the people with whom he makes his living. It would be plain silly to say he will not be missed. Called on at various times last year to take over the duties at first-base second-base, shortstop or behind the bat, Don came through every test with flying colors, a grand fielder and a grand hitter, one of the two or three top players in the league.

Pilot Pop still has two of his sons left, Keith and Ken, and they're nice

ballplayers, even if they aren't quite in the same class as older brother Don. Walter, fourth and oldest of the sons who played for Pop last season, has moved out of town, but that is hardly a calamity. Walter was fair but not a sensation.

Best known of the Beauticians' newcomers is Parent. Former O. A. S. A. and International League star (with Hiram Walkers), Nerts is back in the old home-town after several years up North.

### NEW PITCHING STAFF

More likely to affect the fate of the team, however, are Kavanaugh and Ward, the new pitchers. Kavanaugh is the tricky bird who pitched J. T. Wing to two successive Merchants League championships, while young Ward was formerly a klagpin in the Fraternity League. They will find the competition a lot tougher in the Windsor League. Ward, however, has had a brief taste of it already, finishing up last season with the Bayer Aspirin club. Kavanaugh is a Windsor League freshman, though he's been pitching around these parts for over a decade.

Kavanaugh brings with him his battery-mate and pal, Johnny Locke. Tommy Horsburgh, who plays first or catches, has been secured from the Chrysler club that dropped out this year for the first time since the league's inception.

Bert Upham, from the rival Dayus Roofers, and Bill Tidman, Windsor Leaguer of three seasons ago but an Industrial Leaguer the past two years, are the new outfielders. Outfielder Roger Proulx, First-baseman Charley Spencer and Third-baseman Don Raymond are capable holdovers.

The really new team in the league is Men's Apparel Shop. It will be no innocent infant in the hands of the old guard, however. Instead, it figures to be a very tough nut to crack.

### OLD FAVORITES RETURN

A completely new organization, it nevertheless boasts plenty of established stars. It features three former Windsor League players who left the fold to become headliners in the Industrial League. Pitcher Jimmy Hogan, Outfielder Earl Groulx and Shortstop Al Kirby, kingpin of the Industrial League's champion Canadian Bridge team of 1940. It is a tossup as to whether Kirby or the rival Munro Hotel's Russ Evon is the best all-around softballer in the city. You couldn't go far wrong voting for either.

Principal Windsor League acquisition in the Men's Apparel Shop lineup is Mike (Slim) Patrick, Industrial League pitching star with L. A. Young. Slim is new to the loop.

Colin (Scotty) Myles and Lorne Edmunds, catcher, return after interludes in the Fraternity and Industrial, respectively, and Jack Heydon, infielder, outfielder or pitcher, is a valuable ex-Windsor Leaguer retrieved from the Merchants League.

Heavy-hitting, ham-handed Jack Thompson, Windsor League all-star third-sacker in 1939, is also back, after a season up North, and other veteran Windsor League favorites are Handy-man Moffat, of 1940's Medical Arts, and Outfielders Lefty Trudell, Leon Morneau and Harold Bullard.

### DARK-HORSE OF THE RACE

Essex House A. C., managed by Moe Gleason, is the loop's dark-horse, but isn't quite so new as Men's Apparel, its nucleus being the outstanding players of the late lamented Merchants League's C. H. Smith club. These include Bob McMillan, no-hit pitcher who was with the Industrial's Auto Specialties last year; Art LaChien, snappy third-sacker, and Catcher Ken Storey.

The "name" player on Gleason's roster is Bill Hudson, slugging outfielder and still a wily pitcher, who is a Windsor League fixture. He was with Lanare's Furs last year.

Des Cox, who played first for Dayus in 1939 and caught last year when that team won the Ontario junior championship, should prove a big help, and so should veteran Freddy Anderson, who used to shine in the now defunct Border Independent League.

Johnny Russ, hard-hitting shortstop from the Frat loop; Joe Rubimaki, from the Windsor League's Riverside A. C., and Eric Price, pitcher from the Merchants League's Geo. H. Wilkinson club, are the pick of the rest.

Windsor's softball season opened Monday evening—with one good game and one bad one. Both were Windsor League contests. It's no use trying to fool people: the Windsor Industrial Softball Association's senior league isn't going to be nearly as strong this year as it was last. On the other hand, however, there is no cause for tears. The popular organization again stands to do itself proud.

### THEY OPEN UP MONDAY

In case you've forgotten, Monday is Opening Day for the W.I.S.A. That means Open Day for a five-team senior loop and for no fewer than 11 (yes, eleven) count 'em) intermediate teams.

It's this Intermediate League that's going to take up a lot of the slack brought about this year by the city's employment boom and the reversal of the Association to the old system of having ALL its teams composed 100 per cent. of bona fide employees.

The switch back to the full team of full-time employees is the big reason for the more or less restrained outlook on behalf of the Association's senior league. Even allowing for the movement of men to better jobs elsewhere, the league could have stuck pretty close to the old standard by continuing with the rule that permitted the signing of three outside players by each club. However, this being wartime, with its countless new problems, and workers flocked to get the chance of the excellent relaxation offered by softball, it was felt that a return to the original idea would be advisable. The Association began strictly as a recreational outlet, rather than a competitive organization.

### COMPETITIVE SPIRIT HIGH

Competition, though, still is the spice of life, and even though there will be only five teams instead of six, and the teams won't be quite so tough, the Senior League should furnish an excellent sample of that spice.

As for the Intermediate League, this will be the second year of its existence. If it's anywhere near as successful as the first year, it will do. As a matter of fact, though, it figures to be even more successful. All of last year's favorites are back, along with several new teams, the newest being DeVilbiss Manufacturing Company, which came in at the last minute but was so anxious to get in that it was willing to take its chance in the Senior League if that was the last resort.

It may be recalled what a hectic rate the intermediates had last year. How the teams jockeyed, and how Walker Metal Products, after setting the pace most of the race, was an early victim in the playoffs.

Now, softball fans, stick to the Industrial Association and you'll again get a run for your money.

When the Windsor Industrial Softball Association launches its sixth season tomorrow, it will be doing so not only with a bigger enrolment but with bigger playing-field. There will not only be more diamonds kept busy, but there will also be more to those diamonds. In keeping with the change made by the Ontario Amateur Softball Association, the W. I. S. A. will increase the length of its pitching distance to 40 feet and the distance between its bases to 55 feet. The W.I.S.A. is not affiliated with the O.A.S.A., but uses O.A.S.A. rules.

Senior League players will be permitted to wear the short steel spikes, but Intermediate Leaguers must wear only regulation rubber softball spikes or rubber-soled shoes.

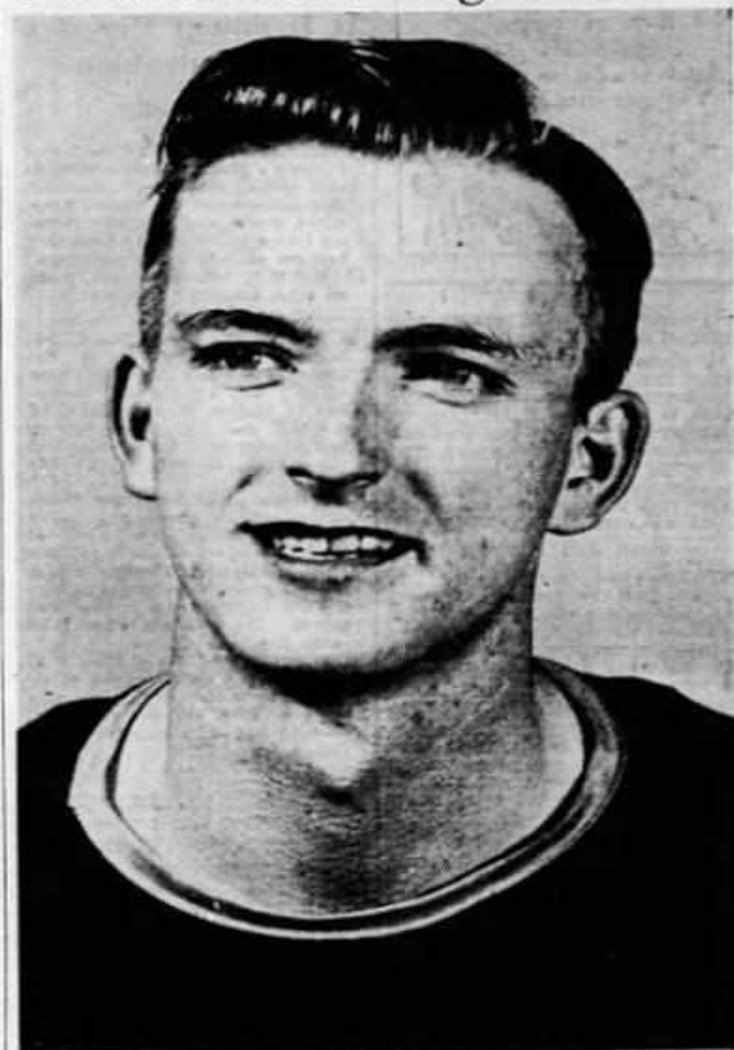


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# ERROR IN LAST INNING DEPRIVES DON DWELSKA OF NO-HITTER

Don underwent the acid test last night when an error cost him a no-run, no-hit game—and in the last inning, at that. He passed the test. He left the field happy over a 6-1 victory that was Essex Wire's eighth in eight starts this season. The victim was Walker Metal Products and the occasion an intermediate Windsor Industrial Softball Association go at Stodgell Park.

## TWO MEN OUT WHEN WRIGHT SLAPS SINGLE

### Muff Also Costs Mound Ace His Shutout, But Wire Wins, 6 to 1

How would you like to pitch a no-run, no-hit game until the last inning and then have an error cost you both your no-hitter and your shut-out? That's the experience Don Dwelska had yesterday evening.

#### HE TAKES IT IN STRIDE

Dwelska is the long, blond ace of Ossie Soucie's Essex Wire team of the Windsor Industrial Softball Association, and one of the big reasons why the Wiremen are flying high atop the association's Intermediate Division, with the association's only perfect record. Monday's victory—over Walker Metal Products, 6-1—made it 8 and 0 for Os and his gang.

If Dwelska was disappointed at the vexing turn of Fate, he gave no hint of it when interviewed a couple of hours or so after the game. He seemed satisfied enough to have managed a one-hitter, and another victory.

Since the Products' Shortstop Bob Wright made the lone hit that marred Dwelska's masterpiece, he must be regarded as the villain of the piece, but actually the responsibility rests on the shoulders of stocky, chesty little Orley McDougall, red-headed left-fielder of the Wire team who stands somewhere around five feet—in his shoes. Here's why:

#### WAS RED'S FACE RED?

Joe Homick opened the last of the seventh (the Industrial's intermediate games are seven-inning affairs) with a pop-up to Pitcher Dwelska. Then, however, Bob Walker sent a fly to left-field, fairly well back, and McDougall dropped it. Harry Morgan, the Products' colored and dangerous clean-up man, fell a strike-out victim, and that should have been the third out. But McDougall's misplay gave Wright another chance at bat and that worthy (or unworthy, in this case) hit a ball that scooted just out of reach of his shortstopping rival, Ossie Davies, for a base-hit. Dwelska then struck out Robinson to end the game, but the damage was done.

As said before, Dwelska had no complaints, and about all you could get out of him regarding the fatal fly was that "it was a long one alright." He had to admit, though, that McDougall got his hands on it.

It was really a grand effort the Dwelska boy turned in. Though he won't be 21 until August, he has been pitching for several years, in tougher leagues and with marked success, and last year, in the first game of the season, he pitched a no-hitter for the Wire, but it's doubtful if he ever had a better game than this one last night. He did not walk a man, struck out 11 and faced only 24 batters in the seven innings.

It was, however, a lucky achievement—if you take Don's word for it, "I had my good-luck charm there," he said. And thereby hangs a tale:

#### THE SECRET OF HIS SUCCESS

Up to and including last year, for a period of several years, Don had been accompanied to the game by a cute little girl who came up to about the chest of her better-than-six-foot hero. Her name was Laura Beuglet. On September 11 last year, just after the season's close, Laura Beuglet became Mrs. Don Dwelska.

Came spring of 1940, and a surprise. Laura, the ball fan, was no more. Now the home-loving little wife, she wasn't at all anxious for her new hubby to play this year. However, when his employers decided to continue in softball—and Don summoned up his most persuasive words—she relented.

Maybe she didn't do a 100 percent job of relenting, however, for she stopped going to the games—until last night. Last night, for the first time, little Laura popped up at a game as Mrs. Dwelska. She looked her usual diminutive self, sitting there in a corner of the Stodgell Park grandstand, but the spell she cast over that Walker Metal team was simply devastating. In fact, at last reports, Manager Jimmy Walker of the Products was contemplating petitioning the association to, henceforth and forever run Mrs. Don Dwelska out of the park on sight.

## Bayer Beaten In Wild Game

**CHOW THORNE PUNCHES UMPIRE BILL MELOCHE IN NEAR FREE-FOR-ALL; PACEY PROVES JUST TOO GOOD**

They did it! Herb Smith and his Esquire Men's Shop softballers moved into the Windsor League's final and championship playoff round last night, taking the rubber game of their two-out-of-three series with Bayer Aspirin, 8 to 2. Winner over Bayer just once in 12 meetings over a three-year period prior to this series and beaten again in the series opener, Esquire came through with two straight when it counted most.

**Interference?**

These are the bare facts of what transpired at Stodgell Park last night, but it was a thrilling, hotly-fought battle that kept on edge one of the biggest crowds to watch a league game here in years—and kept a goodly portion of it milling around the diamond half an hour after it was over.

The milling was a sequel to a seventh-inning flareup that saw Garnet (Chow) Thorne, ace pitcher of the Bayer club, lose a punch at Umpire Bill Meloche and tear loose from as many as three team-mates at a time in a burning desire to toss more, and that saw Umpire Bill Meloche square up to him ready to do a little tossing on his own account if necessary. Players, coaches and more than a few fans thronged on the diamond in the excitement. Nobody, however, tried to do any scrapping but Thorne and

Meloche, and they didn't get far. Team-mates kept Thorne pretty well under control, while Esquire players grabbed Meloche. It all came about when Joe Grondin, Bayer catcher, claimed Elmer Bauer had interfered with Thorne as the pitcher went after the rebound of a wild fourth ball to Elmer. Bill Semeniuk, not Meloche, was the plate umpire, but when Semeniuk wouldn't heed Grondin's feverish claim, Joe appealed to Meloche, and so did Thorne. Meloche aided with his fellow-umpire, however. Then it was that Thorne really got hot. He swore at Meloche, and Meloche ordered him from the game. Thorne exploded at that, and threw a right hand at Meloche, as the two stood near the

pitcher's box. He hit the ump on the left forearm, knocking the spare ball out of his hand, but before any more blows could be struck the two had been dragged to opposite sides of the infield. It took ten minutes or so to get the game going again.

The whole incident, though exciting, was distressing and quite useless. Bayer was a well-beaten team when it happened, and Thorne a well beaten pitcher.

It was Esquire's night and Esquire's game from the moment Geordie Raisbeck raced home with the first run, in the first half of the fourth inning.

### Raisbeck Starts It

Three innings had gone by without a score when Raisbeck looped a fly about halfway between centre-field and second-base, directly on a line with the bag. Ken Chesney, Bayer centre-fielder, didn't start for the ball until it was well on its way to the ground and then he pulled up to let it drop and take it on the bounce, rather than try for a shoestring catch and perhaps have the ball get away for extra bases. This latter was a good idea, except that it looked like Chesney should have had the ball in the first place. He looked bad on it.

Thorne was visibly rattled. He walked Mickey McMillan. And when Herb Smith, gray-haired Esquire manager, looped a fly almost identical with Raisbeck's and that, too, fell in short centre, between Chesney and Shortstop Crawford Stewart, for a single scoring Raisbeck with the first run. Thorne not only looked rattled but disgusted. Right then, Chow was through.

Never much of a fellow to pitch over errors, Thorne was a soft touch in the fifth. Bob Weir doubled, Red Kennedy beat out a perfect bunt, Red Wiseman floated a lazy liner over Jeff Hillier's head for a single scoring Weir, Thorne threw two wild pitches that sent Kennedy and Wiseman to third and second, respectively, and then Hank Pacey, Esquire's stalwart, veteran pitcher, slapped a single through the box to score both runners. By that hit, as things turned out, Hank won his own game.

### Misses a Shutout

An inning later Hank lost his shut-out, when Red McCall singled and Hillier lined the ball between the Esquire right- and centre-fielders for a home-run, but Esquire came right back with a four-run spree in the stormy seventh.

Kennedy started this rally, by drawing a pass. Wiseman singled him to third. Again Pacey came through with

a timely hit, singling in Kennedy, then Raisbeck singled to score Wiseman. McMillan forced Pacey at third and Smith was thrown out by Thorne, but both runners advanced on this latter out. Then it was that Thorne walked Bauer with the wild fourth ball that caused the controversy and the fight. As the ball got away from Catcher Grondin, Raisbeck raced home and McMillan took third, and then when Grondin threw high over McCall's head into left-field trying to get McMillan at third, Mickey also ran home. The argument came after this.

### Pacey's Grand Effort

# Two Wild "Pitches" Give Inspection Jump on Brakes in Ford Semi-Final

Advice to ballplayers: If you MUST throw stuff on the ball, take up pitching.

More than one Windsor ballplayer at a position other than pitcher is in the habit of putting stuff on the ball. Sometimes you'll see an outfielder curve one in; sometimes you'll see an infielder hook one. In the case of lefthanders, it's more or less of a natural phenomenon; in the case of a righthander, however, it's not so easily excusable.

Take, for instance, last night's opening game of the two-out-of-three Ford Softball League semi-final between Inspection and Brakes. It was decided by, of all things, an infielder's lack of a straight ball—or, at any rate, his lack of a straight ball at the right moment.

## STUFF ON BALL

The infielder was Herman Landry. That was unfortunate, because it was Herman's home-run that gave Brakes the first run of the game. Nevertheless, there is no gainsaying the fact that it was Herman's "pitching" that gave Inspection the fifth run of the game—and the victory.

That fifth run came in the eighth inning, to break a 2-2 tie, and it was a big one, for at the end of the eighth the game was called because of darkness.

Here is what happened: After Jeff Hillier had grounded out to open the eighth, Russ Evon hit to Landry. It was a hopper on which Herman made a nice play—until he threw. He got his throw away fast, and he had to, and it was quite good enough—until within two feet of the bag. Then it dropped, as prettily as Al Benton's sinker. It didn't drop so much that First-baseman Kemp didn't get his hands on it about six inches from the ground, but it dropped quite enough to take Kemp unawares and pop from his glove, permitting Evon to get on base. Neil McMillan then hit a slow roller to Landry that was good for a single, but Landry again made a hurried throw and this one went into the dirt a foot or so in front of Kemp and

ricocheted into the crowd. Evon took third and McMillan second. Thus put in scoring position, Evon scooted home on Herb Smith's fly to Ralph Cudmore in left-field, and that was the ballgame.

## IT'S A GOOD GAME

Thus was the die cast in a swell contest featuring the fine pitching of Evon and Earl Meloche. The formidable Inspection batting front got but five hits and two bases on balls off the left-handed ace of the Brakes team. Evon was almost as good, allowing only seven hits and three bases on balls.

As said before, Landry opened the scoring when he hit for a home-run. That was in the third inning. It wasn't much of a homer, though. A single at best, probably, it took a nasty hop past Centre-fielder Ed Morley that made it good for the circuit.

An unearned run in the fourth made it 2-0, when Neil McMillan dropped Cudmore's fly and Jack Ward doubled.

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# A Lengthy Wait Is Rewarded

Stan Bobbis, a "Find" of Half a Dozen Years Ago, Comes Up With a No-Run, No-Hit Game as Bayer's Fraternity League Team Begins Playoffs

The equipment purchased was presented on condition that it remain permanent at the various barracks, regardless of changes in personnel there. Also, no one league played any bigger part in the successful show than the other. This is the combined effort of four leagues, the Windsor Industrial, the Windsor Fraternity and Civic, and every player and official in each is entitled to a share of the glory.

Each took part in 26 games—and this despite the fact that the complete schedule comprised only 24. Equine, however, played two tie games, and they were replayed, and Kennedy and Raibeck were in every game the team had, ties and all.

He pitched three and two-thirds innings of relief ball in which he allowed only three hits and not one base on balls, and struck out five men. That would have been enough for most guys, but not for Richard. Came the last half of the last inning, and the score was tied at 6-6. The Spitfires got the winning run on third. Up came Burns. A pinch-hitter was indicated, you'd think, but none appeared. Instead, Burns batted for himself. And how he batted! With his one good arm, he swung sharply and hit a long ball over the centre-fielder's head to win the ballgame. Ordinarily, it would not only have been a hit but an easy home-run, but Dick merely jogged to first.

Burns' great performance stole the

thunder of Stan Bobbis' first appearance since his no-run, no-hit game. Bobbis, the Bayer pitcher, was good again, giving up only six hits in six innings, but errors let him down. The Spitfires got three runs on a lone hit in the third inning and came right back with three more on another lone hit in the fourth. Thus did Bobbis meet the fate that usually befalls a no-run, no-hit hurler on his next outing.

Jack Higgins was Bayer's batting star, getting two doubles and a single for a perfect night at bat and stealing a base. Team-mate Cliff Olbie also made three hits, but in four times up, while Soumia of the Spitfires had two for four.

Last night's Industrial tilt was the tighter-scoring. The teams matched single runs in the first inning, but they managed to push over only two more between then and the sixth, inclusive. Both of those went to Auto Specialties, giving Harold Wilson's team a 3-1 lead.

In the seventh, Pitcher Buzz Nolan clinched his own game by slamming a double after Ray Urbanski had singled, Hank Biasatti had doubled and Vic Clark had walked. All this happened with none out, so when Bill Hood also walked after Manager Wilson had been retired, Waffer Lake got the hook.

Kelsey's relief pitcher turned out to be Harry McRae, a young man who sometimes is on first-base, sometimes on the picket line and sometimes on the bench. So far as is known, nobody ever heard of him as a pitcher. That was borne out later. ## Heavy Hospital List

Jack Smith, Munro manager and heavy-hitting first-baseman, did not start the game because of a nasty accident during infield practice. Smith had stepped away from the bag to give his lineup to the scorer, when Third-baseman Thomson cut loose with a throw that the pilot never saw. It smashed Smith's glasses and cut his face. Later he put on a pair lent him by a fan, Bill McLaughlin, inserted himself as a pinch-hitter and drove in his team's fourth run with a long fly to left.

Esquire's Red Kennedy, also a hard-hitting first-baseman, didn't finish the game. He sprained a muscle in his side going for Fiddes' grounder in the sixth, and had to retire.

Altogether, it was a devastating night. In the third, King, hard-swinging Munro outfielder, let the bat slip from his hand and it whirled into the stand, along first-base, hitting no less than five onlookers, including The Star's representative. It merely flied the latter's right ear lobe, but League President Bill Judd and Francis Langlois, a spectator two rows behind Judd, were less fortunate. 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# FIDDES' SUPER CATCH ASSURES MUNRO SECOND TITLE IN ROW

## OUTFIELDER'S GRAB OF HOME-RUN DRIVE IS CLIMAX OF WINDSOR LEAGUE'S GREAT CHAMPIONSHIP SERIES

**WANTED**—for "grand larceny":—Alexander Leslie Fiddes, alias Alex the Acrobat. Description:

Age, 24; height, 5 feet 11 inches; weight, 170 pounds; complexion, fair; hair, light brown; eyes, blue. Members of the Esquire Men's Shop softball team and its supporters are entitled to shoot this man on sight.

Yes, it was robbery, and nothing less, that the innocent-looking young Mr. Fiddes committed at Stodgell Park last night to assure Harry's Munro a 6-5 victory over Esquire and a second successive Windsor Softball League championship.

### Kennedy the Victim

It was the ninth inning of the seventh and deciding game of what had started out as one of those three-out-of-five affairs. Esquire was at bat and no one was out. The batter was Alex (Red) Kennedy, the league's 1940 batting champion and home-run king, but a fellow who had been having a tough time in this year's playoffs. On his past 14 trips to the plate he had gone hitless.

Pitcher George (Boots) Gibbs went through his windmill windup, threw a called strike. The next one was around Red's shoulders and he fouled it on to the screen, for a count of two strikes and no balls. The next one was right in there, and Kennedy swung. A solid line drive.

"There it goes!" exclaimed the thousand-or-so fans, as one man.

It looked like a sure home-run, and while it would merely have tied the score, it would have been of such psychological importance that it might well have won the series.

But the fans, and Kennedy and his jubilant team-mates, reckoned without Fiddes. Alex was too shallow to catch the hit where he was standing, but he backed up, the while keeping his eyes glued on the ball. At the precise moment he leaped into the air. He leaped as high as he could go, and slightly to his right. A two-handed catch was out of the question, so he thrust out one. He crashed to the ground, rolled over. But as he rolled he stuck up his hand for all to see, and there was the ball—and the ball-game. A split second's difference in his timing and . . .

### Double Play Winds It Up

It mattered little that Jack Douglas, the next man, singled. After that catch, the Hotelmen couldn't miss, and Gibbs, who had changed places with Shortstop Russ Evon after Douglas' hit, made a falling stop of Freddy Bolter's rap to turn it into a double play to end the game and the series.

That it should be Fiddes who came up with this greatest play of one of the greatest series Windsor has ever seen, was only poetic justice. Alex is one of those fellows who goes on hitting 'em and goes on grabbing 'em game in and game out without attracting any attention. Somebody else always seems to come up with something sensational, and Alex's remarkable steadiness is overlooked completely. He is probably the most under-rated ballplayer in the city.

But last night was Alex's night. Many of the fans who saw his marvellous catch didn't even know his name, but when he made it they got to their feet and gave him an ovation the like of which this observer has not heard in many and many a moon.

After the game, friend, foe and fan mobbed him, shook him by the hand. Kids asked him for his autograph.

The unobtrusive Mr. Fiddes had come into his own.

### Thomson Makes a Grab

The game was not all Fiddes, however. There was Gibbs, the winning pitcher, who, after unsuccessfully trying to throw the ball past the Esquire sluggers in the first two innings, suddenly got loxy and started feeding them a soft one that stopped them with a splendid two-hit performance over the last seven frames. There was Harold Jackson, who hit a tremendous home-run to the fence in left-centre. There was Oliver (Red) Thomson, who batted down Jim Taylor's ground smash in the first inning and turned a run-making hit into a double-play chance to snuff out Esquire's first uprising. There was Russ Evon, playing hang-up ball at shortstop, his two errors notwithstanding, and then going to the box to pitch Bolter the double-play ball that ended the series. And there were four other fellows out there helping prove that, despite the veteran Esquires' grand effort, the Munro's were the stronger outfit after all.

Esquires were pretty well overhadowed last night, except for Mickey McMillan, who turned in a peach of a game at third-base, and for one brief interlude in the seventh, when they turned in a lightning-fast and unique double play to kill Munro's last rally. Kennedy grabbing Thomson's grounder and starting a twin-killing that went from first to catcher to second to third to nip Vince Dunn and Gibbs. Hank Pacey, Esquire's starting pitcher, put forth his usual gallant effort, but this was one time the Munro batters were not to be denied.

### Gibbs Hits Well, Too

Gibbs himself drove in what proved to be the winning run, when he tripled behind a pass to Bob Srigley in the seventh, though Esquire never caught up after Jackson's homer. Boots also

knocked in one in the third, and was one of five Munro players to get two hits.

Only Pacey got two for Esquire.

At work yesterday afternoon, Bauer advised Fellow-worker Blaise Desjardins that the evening's big game would see Mr. Bauer have himself a perfect night with the stick. He did. Furthermore, he enlarged upon the matter of prophesy that he would go four-for-four. He did.

The payoff came in the seventh inning, last turn at bat for Elmer the Prophet. Instead of merely hoping he could preserve his perfect record, Bauer got downright cocky, walked over to Desjardins and told

him he would hit to right-field for a home-run. He did.

That, ladies and gents, is really calling your shots!

Desjardins wouldn't have believed it

but for the testimony of his own ears and eyes.

Incidentally, Bauer's dramatic seventh-inning homer was his second of the game. His first, coming with Herb Smith on base in the third inning, accounted for the two runs that clinched the game and the title. Altogether, therefore, you can see that Elmer had an evening that was, to put it mildly, slightly colossal.

His performance was so outstanding that the other aspirants to hero roles finished nowhere.

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# LAMP BRIGADE TAKES TITLE

## Beats Essex Wire, 6 to 5, for Intermediate Loop Crown

New champion of the Windsor Industrial Softball Association's Intermediate Division is not the Essex Wire team that led the league from start to finish of the regular season, but the Canadian Motor Lamp team that was formed only this year. A good champion it is, too!

### KEEN, CLEAN CONTEST

In a keenly, cleanly played contest at Canadian Bridge Park last night, the Lampmen twice came from behind to earn and achieve a 6-5 victory over the Wiremen in the third and rubber game of their final playoff.

As cheery little Orley McDougall hit an easy grounder to Shortstop Jim Cipparone for the final out of the series, supporters in high glee jumped from the sidelines to greet the victors with words of praise richly deserved. Over on the other side of the diamond Essex Wire's supporters were a saddened lot, stunned, almost, that their team, after being top-dog all year, should find itself the under-dog when it counted most.

Don't assume that there was bitterness, however. On the night's play, it undoubtedly was the better team that won, and the Wiremen seemed to realize that. They took what must have been a heart-breaking defeat in good grace.

That didn't stop young Vic Heathcote from self-condemnation, however. The Essex Wire centre-fielder must have been just about the unhappiest person in all Windsor at precisely 6:44 yesterday evening. It was his muff of a flyball that let in the last two runs of the ballgame, and turned victory for the Wire into defeat. Boy, did he feel bad!

Heathcote need not feel too badly. True enough, he really booted one at the crucial moment, but two earlier boos were what made it so crucial.

With all due credit to John Strahl and his men, particularly to Strahl's younger brother, Frank, for fine pitching and to sturdy Bill Russ for a three-run homer, the game was lost, rather than won. Errors unquestionably decided the issue.

But that's baseball, and fielding is as much a part of the game as batting and pitching. That's why we said earlier that the Lamp's victory was earned.

Mike Salahub made the first miscue, when he threw the ball away to let Phillips score all the way from second after taking Pitcher Don Dweliska's throw on Gefucia's sacrifice bunt. That was in the first inning.

No less a person than the Wire's manager, veteran Ossie Soucie, made the second, and perhaps the most damaging of all. He muffed Peter Mufry's double play ball in the second inning and set the stage for Russ to blast the ball over Centre-fielder Heathcote's head for four bases and three tallies.

### BAD TIME TO MUFF ONE

Heathcote's came in the fifth, and seemed so bad because it let in the last two runs of the game, the two that turned victory into defeat. Phillips and Gefucia were on third and second, respectively, as the result of successive passes and a passed ball, and Jim Cipparone was up. Dweliska had dug himself out of a 3-and-0 hole to a count of 3 and 2 when Cippy hit an easy fly to right-centre. Heathcote gave chase, made a moderate run—and dropped it. By the time he picked the ball up and threw desperately in the general direction of the plate, Cipparone was on third, both runners were home and the title was lost.

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Thus errors figured in all six Lamp runs, not exactly a heartening state of affairs for Dweliska, who pitched three-hit ball.

Just as good as Dweliska, though, was Strahl. He allowed two more hits, but he pitched one more inning, and in five innings just three Wiremen got to the plate. Soucie and Dweliska were the only ones to bother him. If Ossie must be criticized for a three-run error, he must also be lauded for a mighty first-inning home-run to deep left with two men on base that suggested, at the moment, that the Wiremen were going to walk away with the title. As for Dweliska, he got a two-run homer when Jack Harding slightly misjudged his smashing line-drive as it shot over his head in the haze of dead centre-field, but that was a well tagged ball just the same.

Defensively, the Lampmen were brilliant, while George Symonds' running catch of Frank Strahl's fly to right in the third was the Wire's best fielding play.

The victory gave the Lamp firm a championship in its third year of softball sponsorship and its second in this intermediate loop. Two years ago, in 1939, it had a team in the Industrial Association's senior division.

Under the circumstances, the job he did was rather remarkable. And don't think the Kelsey supporters didn't appreciate the fact. When the game ended, they rushed on the field and carried him off shoulder-high. That's what they thought of their Mr. Lake!

Lake richly deserved to win, and so did his team. After a big third inning in which 11 men batted for five runs, the Specialties never gave the impression of being in the picture, whereas the Wheelmen looked as though nothing would, or could, stop them. Their ace pitcher, Buzz Nolan, batted from pillar to post, the Specialties were as groggy toward the end that Harold Wilson, their manager, and a smart ballplayer, opened the ninth with a lucky single only to be thrown out by yards stretching it into a double. Leastways, that's the way things have turned out in all-star games played at the stadium these past four years. There have been unusually large numbers of strikeouts, but in between there have been plenty of solid hits and runs.

If the fans are looking for lots of hitting tonight, the rival lineups offer just the men to oblige. No less than three batting champions will be in the game. Harold Jackson and Russ Evon of Harry's Munro tied for the Windsor League title, while Kelsey Wheel's Alex Clark topped the Industrial Association's Senior Division. This attitude on the part of the Kelsey club, that it should win on its own merits, is admirable, but not at all essential in view of the circumstances.

It may be even a trifle foolhardy to be so gallant. In Harry's Munro, Kelsey is meeting a team much stronger than any it had to contend with in its own league—and Kelsey merely finished second to Auto Specialties. The Munro club is no closed organization for employes, such as Kelsey is. On the contrary, it is hand-picked from the best Windsor softball players who are not tied up by the Industrial Association. Even the lesser-lights among the Hotelmen—fellows like Bob Srigley, Vince Dunn and Johnny King—are stars, little mentioned only because they play alongside such colorful performers as Jackson and the remarkable Evon. Kelsey's name players, on the other hand, are few. Apart from Clark, Zepka and Lake, only Lefty Garant, Industrial Senior batting champion of 1940, is what you could call a celebrity.

Just the same, the other Wheelmen have their points, notably a splendid spirit.

Game No. 2 will be played Sunday, at Stodgell at an hour not yet set.

Proceeds of the entire Series, of course, will go to war benefits, tonight's proceeds to the Overseas Smokes Fund and the remainder to the Queen's Canadian Fund.

Tonight's program is a doubleheader under the sponsorship of the Windsor Police Association, and the Police softball team will play Chatham Police at 7 o'clock. These two teams drew 2,500 fans at Chatham last week.

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# MUNRO TAKES FIRST, BUT FINDS KELSEY NO SOFT TOUCH

## Lake Whiffs 12 of Them

500 BRAVE BAD NIGHT TO SEE CITY SERIES, AID SMOKE FUND; WINDSORS ARE IN FRONT THROUGHOUT, BUT ERRORS HELP

Kelsey Wheel is no pushover. Harry's Munro found that out last night. The entire Munro team, the Munro supporters, the Windsor League supporters and those fickle Industrial Association fans who had decided that Windsor softball's first City Series would be no contest, found it out too.

Oh, Munro won alright, as the teams met under the Kennedy Stadium floodlights in the opening game of the two-out-of-three series, but not by much. The score was 5 to 3.

### First of Its Kind

Five hundred real, dyed-in-the-wool softball fans braved a bad night to watch the champions of the city's two top leagues get together officially for the first time in history—and, incidentally, to contribute two-bits a head to the Overseas Smokes Fund. With a break in the weather, at least as many more again should be at Stoddell Park on Sunday afternoon to see the series' second game. In view of the fine exhibition the boys put on last night under such trying conditions, a joust on a sunny afternoon should be very worthwhile indeed.

Besides, the remainder of the series—one or two games, as the case may be—will be played for the benefit of the Queen's Canadian Fund, cause enough in itself to draw a record crowd to Stoddell on Sunday.

There might have been a record crowd at the Stadium last night, but for the raw night that threatened to end up in rain. While the attendance was only around 500, well over 1,000 tickets were disposed of by advance sale as the Windsor Police Association, sponsor of the game, peddled pasteboards at every opportunity. Constable Otto Lesperance, alone, sold over 500 tickets.

But getting back to the 500 who made use of their tickets, and what they saw:

### Pitchers Hold Sway

They saw, as The Star had suggested they might see, a dandy pitchers' battle, studded with strikeouts. And again, as had been suggested, they saw the unfamiliar lights lead to errors that made the score about normal in spite of the number of players who whiffed. The only thing in which they were let down was in hitting. It had been expected that, with so many tough cookies in the rival batting fronts, when any of the boys did get hold of one it would go for a long, long ride. As things turned out, each team made only seven hits all told and of the 14, one, and one only, was an extra-base hit. And that was the rankest kind of fluke.

Maybe the batters should not be looked upon as disappointments, however. After all, when gents like Walter Lake and Russ Evon are out there on the rubber, solid socks are apt to be at a premium, and last night Messrs. Lake and Evon were in their element. Particularly was this true of Walter. The atmosphere may have been cold, but the guy with the specs was decidedly warm. You might, in fact, come right out and say that Mr. Lake was red-hot.

### 25 Strikeouts All Told

Fourteen times a Munro batter went back to the bench for the long drink, and Lake played no favorites. He struck out every one of the Windsor Leaguers at least once except Harold Jackson. Jack Smith, the Munro manager, was his choicest dish. Smith, apparently rattled by the fact that the crowd was on him from the game's start, struck out three times, and wearily, at that.

Evon fanned 11, including two pinch-hitters. Lefty Garant, once, was the only victim he bagged from among the first five Kelsey swingers, however. He got Joe Hodare the first three times up and Harry McRae the first two. On the other hand, only two of the outs recorded against the first five were made in the outfield, so that they at least weren't getting hold of many Evon pitches.

Lake put himself in a hole in the first half of the first inning and, despite a valiant effort, never got out of it. He walked Oliver (Red) Thomson, the game's opening batter, wild pitched him to second and saw him score on Steve Zepka's passed ball after Evon had singled him to third. Kelsey never did catch up.

### Lake's Support Weak

A pass to Smith, another wild pitch and Johnny King's single gave Munro another run in the fourth, then a single by Thomson, two wild pitches, a pass to Fidden, a single by Evon and a single by Jackson brought in three in the fifth to complete the Munro scoring before Kelsey even broke its goose-egg. Thus, in each of its scoring innings, Munro matched every hit with a run.

Evon, given excellent support, particularly by Bob Srigley, at second, had been having it easy while wobbly Kelsey infield work had been forcing Lake deeper into trouble, instead of pulling him out, but the tide turned in the seventh.

In this frame, with two men out and only one on base, Smith dropped Mikey Rude's throw on Mike Ferlicki for what should have been the third out. The best cost Evon his shutout and three runs, for, encouraged by the break, Lake, Johnny Querin and Alex Clark hit successive singles. Ferlicki and Lake following home Harry McRae, who had started the rally with a single.

Each pitcher struck out the side once. Evon in the fifth, 1-2-3, and Lake in the seventh, when he did a grand job by setting down Srigley, Rude and Dunn after a pop fly from the first batter, Jackson, had fallen in the midst of four Kelsey batters, Querin, Clark, Laforet and Garant, for the

game's only extra base. Each pitcher also was his team's best hitter, both Evon and Lake getting a pair of solid singles.

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# MUNRO EASILY TAKES SERIES

## Clean Sweep as Gibbs, Evon Go to Town in 14-to-5 Triumph

Maybe Kelsey Wheel isn't a pushover — not consistently, that is—but it was yesterday. It was no trouble at all for Harry's Munro to knock off the Wheelmen a second straight time, score a clean sweep in the City Series and thus alleviate, to a certain extent, the humiliation the Windsor Softball League has undergone in losing all four All-Star Games played with the Windsor Industrial Softball Association.

### KELSEY'S BRIEF MOMENT

The Windsor League will always be able to point to the fact that it won the first City Series ever played in softball here. It will be able, too, to point to the convincing manner in which it was done. The score was 14 to 5, and it was just that easy. Easier, even.

After two were out in the first inning, Russ Evon muffed Lefty Garant's pop fly, whereupon the Wheelmen began to tee off on Boots Gibbs. Steve Zepka, Paul Laforet and Harry McRae hit successive singles for two runs, and it looked like Gibbs was due for an early departure.

In the last of the first, however, after Red Thomson and Alex Fiddes had led with successive singles, Evon promptly atoned for his error by hitting a three-run homer to right. Munro never looked back.

### GIBBS PITCHES SPLENDIDLY

From the second on, Gibbs pitched a really fine game. Over the last eight innings he gave up only six hits (five of them singles) and three bases on balls. He even had eight strikeouts over those eight innings, bringing his total for the game to nine. For Boots, that was exceptional. During the Windsor League season he barely averaged two a game.

As for Evon, the Industrials had him stopped in this year's All-Star Game, but he showed them a thing or three yesterday, and today they have deep sympathy for pitchers in his own league who have to face him time and again.

After Russ had hit his homer in the first, Right-fielder Wilbur Keyes played him as deeply as he would have done a left-handed slugger, but Evon merely put a little more oomph into his swing and hit the ball about six feet directly above Keyes' head. This was in the fourth, after Russell had drawn a pass in the third.

In the fifth, up came Mr. Evon again. This time he raised a high fly destined to drop about six feet behind the second-baseman's normal position—and drop it did. Ron Elliot, who had just been inserted at second-base for Kelsey at the inning's outset, staggered under it as it came down in the twisting wind; it fell just beyond his out-stretched fingers. By the time this pop fly had been picked up, Evon was on third.

### HE'S NEVER SATISFIED

You'd thing even the hustling Evon would have been content to call it a day after running three bases on that one, but he still had another time at bat, so . . . When Russ stepped up in the seventh, the Kelsey outfielders were playing about the same as you generally see an outfield playing for an average hardball hitter around town. He didn't disappoint them. This time he hit a line-drive that never was more than six feet off the ground but one that shot past Centre-fielder Garant so fast that Lefty never had a chance, though the ball passed only a few feet to his right.

The victims of this Evon demonstration? Well, the first homer was off Waller Lake, the other two off Gerry Parent, Kelsey's emergency pitcher. Lake, who had fanned 14 Munro batters under the Kennedy Stadium lights Thursday, fanned only one this time, and lasted but two and one-third innings, during which he gave up 10 hits and eight runs. Parent was a little better.

Kelsey looked woeful at times around second base. Shaky Johnny Querin was yanked from the shortstop post in favor of Paul Laforet, who had been looking just as ineffective at second, then in to play went Elliot, who looked the worst of the lot, and struck out twice to boot.

### CAN'T BLAME GARANT

Lefty Garant came up with a real effort, however, fielding well and getting three hits and Alex Clark and Steve Zepka were dependable as usual.

As for Munro, the whole team looked as good as it was supposed to look. Bob Srigley turned in another bang-up game at second-base, hard-working Vince Dunn handled Gibbs excellently.

Batting seems to play a big part in the destinies of Windsor Industrial Softball Association teams. Kelsey Wheel had the two leading batters in the Association's Senior Division this year and Kelsey Wheel won the Senior championship. Canadian Motor Lamp won the Intermediate championship and it turns out that the Lamp had the Intermediate Division's two leading batters.

Frank Strahl was head man among W. I. S. A. hitters over the regular season of 1941, according to figures released by the Western Ontario Scorers Association through Roy Burns. Strahl pounded the ball for a terrific .525 average in 80 times at bat. He was almost a hundred points ahead of Team-mate Jim Cipparone, who nosed out Ossie Soucie, playing-manager of Essex Wire, for runner-up honors by the narrowest of margins, one point. Cipparone hit .438.

Strahl was his team's ace pitcher but also played one or two other positions when the occasion demanded. Naturally, his manager—who also happened to be his brother, John—kept him somewhere in the lineup at all times, because of his hitting.

Strahl was co-winner of home-run honors. He and Bob Liles, hustling Truscon Steel pitcher-outfielder hit for the circuit seven times.

Intermediate W. I. S. A. pitching being none too tricky, Strahl had the unusual distinction of striking out only once in his 80 times at bat. Don Desjarlais of Sandwich, Windsor & Amherstburg Railway, struck out once in 66. Among the league's first 14 batters, only one had a strike-out total in double figures.

Three men, Doug Sabine of Purity Dairies, Orville Nantais of Gotfredson and Manager Soucie of Essex Wire, who, despite being left-handed, did most of his playing at second-base, had perfect pitching records, but won only three games. The real pitching champion was Essex Wire's Don Dweliska, with 16 and 2, while the same Frank Strahl who won the batting title was the runner-up for pitching honors and was the hardest man to hit on the basis of hits allowed. Soucie had the best strike-out average, but Bernard Ribbany of Gotfredson was the leader among the regular peggers.
