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# Now Just One Club Unbeaten

## ESSEX WIRE NOT ONLY SMASHES CLEAN SLATE OF BENDIX OUTFIT, BUT DISPLACES IT AS INDUSTRIAL LEAGUE LEADER

The Windsor Industrial Softball Association's two remaining undefeated teams met for the first time last night, so one of them had to bite the dust. That one was Bendix, with the triumphant one Essex Wire. The outcome put the Wire atop the 14-team ladder with six wins in as many starts, with Bendix dropping back to the second rung after opening its campaign with seven victories.

### Best Program of Year

This contest, a thriller all the way, was but one of two such at Kennedy Stadium last night as the W.I.S.A. came up with by far its best program of the season—two games of which any ball league might well be proud.

The other participants in the deluxe bill besides Essex Wire and Bendix were the Windsor Police Association and Canadian Motor Lamp. The Police won this affair, 5-4.

Essex Wire and Bendix played under natural light; Police and Motor Lamp finished under the floodlights.

By coincidence, two of the teams on this twin bill, Wire and Lamp, met in the championship series of last year's Intermediate Division. On that occasion, however, it was the Lamp team that won while the Wire team lost.

### Seventh Frame Tells Tale

Last night, after Bendix jumped off to a two-run lead in the first inning, Wire tied it up with singletons in the third and fourth, then when Bendix scored its third run in the first half of the seventh inning Wire scored its third in the last half of the same frame.

The last half of the eighth saw the issue decided. Stuebing walked and took second on a wild pitch, Davies singled him home and went all the way around himself when Nerts Parent let the ball go through him. Essex Wire had two more runs and the lead for the first time. It was well guarded during Bendix's one remaining turn at bat.

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# VOTERS SEE MOST STARS IN SAME WAY

Everyone Names Evon; Fiddes, G. Raisbeck, Cox Also Popular

The Windsor Softball League today named its team for the fourth annual All-Star Game with the Windsor Industrial Softball Association, to be played at Wigle Park this Sunday afternoon as part of an all-star double-header from which all proceeds go to the Queen's Fund.

## EXPERIMENTAL BALLOT

Perhaps it would be more correct to say that the Windsor League okayed the choice of its fans—or those of them who were interested enough to send in votes in the contest conducted by the league for the first time. These numbered 70, a disappointing response in one way yet not too bad, considering that this was the first time anything of this kind had been tried in Windsor. To those who didn't vote simply and wholly through laziness or disinterest, however, let it be said that never again, if they are in the habit of doing so, should they stand on the sidelines and second-guess. They had their chance and missed it.

As to those who did vote, and the players they voted for, here is the team:

Of course, more than those will play, for out of the vote came the following players as reserves: Ray Urbanski (Harry Munro's), catch; Buzz Nolan (Men's Apparel), pitch; Red Kennedy (Morris Flowers), first-base; Clayt Randall (Harry's Munro), second-base and shortstop.

But that's the way the team will be at the start of the game. The league will stick by its voters and start the nine men they selected, and at those positions.

## JUST A NICE-SIZED SQUAD

This gives the Windsor League a far more workable squad than it has had in the previous three years, when the league officials and managers themselves chose it under orders to have each team represented. There were as many as 12 teams one year, and the result was close to 30 ballplayers out there. With only 15, this year's board of strategy can concentrate on playing the game instead of parading the players.

Getting back to the actual vote, the first thing noted was that Russ Evon, without a doubt, is the No. 1 soft-baller in the league, in the opinion of fans as well as officials and players. He, and he alone, was on every one of the 70 ballots. In fact he did even better than that. One voter, overlooking the rules, made Evon both the pitcher and utility infielder on his team. He didn't say who would pitch if Evon should be in the infield.

Most of Evon's votes, however, were at shortstop, where he started oftenest. He got 57. He got 10 as the pitcher and four as the utility infielder, making an impossible total of 71—out of a possible 70.

Most of the positions were decided quite clearly, with the notable exception being that of catcher, where Jack Ward of Men's Apparel nosed out Ray Urbanski of Harry's Munro by one vote, 27 to 26.

Other standouts besides Evon were Alex Fiddes of Harry's Munro, who polled 62 votes for right-field, three for left, two for centre and one for utility outfield; Des Cox of Men's Apparel, who got 43 for first-base and one for utility infield, and George Raisbeck, Morris Flowers handyman who has played shortstop, second-base, third-base and outfield. Geordie got 46 all told, 23 as the utility infielder, 22 as the third-baseman and two as the left-fielder.

## BOLTER'S THE PITCHER

Freddie Bolter easily was named pitcher, beating out Buzz Nolan by 18 votes.

Some players profited by the fact that their teams made the playoffs while others didn't. Chief beneficiary in this respect was Bert Upham, Men's Apparel outfielder, who batted only .221 during the regular season, but has been going like a house afire in the playoffs and still is, in the championship series. Upham got 20 votes as the utility outfielder, two votes for left-field, four for centre and three for right.

Chief victim probably was Bill Hodgins, who polled three for utility outfield duty, five for left and 13 for centre despite the fact that he and his fellow-Dayus Roofers were never in the running for a playoff berth.

## A BIT TOUGH ON TOMMY

There was proof, too, that the fans who voted are the sort to appreciate an outfielder's defensive ability as well as his wallop. Tommy Kavanaugh of Men's Apparel failed to make the

grade despite the fact that he led his team with a batting average of .395. Handicapped by a rheumatic leg, Tom, never exactly a gazelle out there, was embarrassed plenty by inability to reach drives, though statistically he had only two errors. Kavanaugh was the No. 6 outfielder, with two votes less than Hodgins.

The outfielders' votes, by the way, were pooled for all positions when it came to deciding on the team. For example, Fiddes' total, by the league's reckoning, was 68, not 62. Happily, this made no difference in the final standings as to who should be on the team.

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# On the Rebound

FOR YEARS, almost as long as we have travelled the highways and byways of sport, we have known a rotund individual who, to our knowledge never did anything more in the way of athletic competition than lend a helping hand. But that helping hand has meant a great deal more to sport in the border area than any of the feats performed by our best athletes. Down through the years he has been a tireless worker in the organization, promotion and operation of many of our most successful leagues. Personally, as a friend and aide he holds a spot that we will never be able to fill. We refer to one Lloyd Pollock.

It was our intention today to write a piece about Lloyd. In fact we had started to do so when Joe (Our Man Friday) Burns tossed the following, which expresses the sentiments of both of us about a grand guy as well as lets you know something about what he has done for border sport.

"WELL, BOSS, the war really came to Windsor sport this past week or so. Oh, I know plenty of the fellows had already gone—lan Allison, George Weese, Stan Tranter, Freddy Doe, Jimmy Farmer, Bill Hudson et al—but we'd managed to struggle along. Now, though, we're beginning to feel it, with the boys going away with distressing regularity, softball teams riddled by draft calls and enlistments, some even forced to default at this most crucial stage of the season.

Yet the athletes themselves aren't the only ones who are going. For instance, there's one fellow going into the St. Luke Hood barracks tomorrow who won't be missed out there on a diamond, or a football field, or a hockey rink, yet at certain times in certain places he'll be missed more than any of them. You know who I mean, Boss—Lloyd T. Pollock.

YEP, OUR OLD FRIEND—and I know you won't mind when I call him, too, our "Joe-worker"—has been signed up by His Majesty. Which is bad news indeed for the Windsor Softball League and the City Hockey League.

REMEMBER back in 1934, when the latter organization started up? The kids used to have to play any old time they could get the ice; usually at the most ungodly hours. And in the emptiest of empty arenas. But, with Brother Pollock, as secretary-treasurer and jack-of-all-trades (and, let me remind you, master of many), and fellows like Ross Groh and Stu Knox and that celebrated King's Counsellor, Gerry McElhugh in there pitching with him, the league grew—and grew; until, you recall, it boasted an all-time high of 16 clubs in the season of 1938-9. And the attendance soared from an approximate zero to last year's 12,400.

Unfortunately, before the 1939-40 season came around war had broken out and things were beginning to change, with the result that the entries began to fall off. But the City League will be back, never fear. And again it will produce teams such as Windsor Ice & Coal, Motor Products and Colonial Tool, that have represented Windsor in intermediate O.H.A. play, and commendably.

ENTRIES have dropped off in the Windsor Softball League, too, because of the war's drain on talent, but interest has lagged none, and today you'll find the boys taking in anywhere from \$40 to \$70 a game by passing the hat at their playoffs.

Think of that as you look back to 1934, when this organization, too, had its beginning—with Brother Pollock as one of the instigators.

They called it the Bank League then and Pollock's co-worker, Groh, had a finger in that, too. In 1935 it was the same Bank League, then in 1936 Lloyd talked Matt Currie of the Royal Bank into taking over the presidency. Lloyd, Matt and a few others like Harry (Pop) Gunther decided to let in outside teams and change the name to the Windsor League, and it has been growing by leaps and bounds ever since—in quantity, quality and interest—until, as already said, war hit it so hard this year by taking so many players.

AND YOU REMEMBER, BOSS, the good deeds these two leagues have already done, with men like Lloyd Pollock around the committee rooms to sow the seed.

It was he and Bill Judd who approached the Industrial League last year with the idea of turning the proceeds from the softball All-Star Game into sports equipment for the armed services and, with the two leagues co-operating beautifully, the sum of \$350 was spent on various athletic goods that were divided equally three ways between the Army, Navy and Air Force.

Too, the same Windsor League, with Judd as president and Red Wilson, Bill Hadley and Pollock as the executive and Harry Slobasky, sponsor of the Munro team, helping a great deal, again hooked up with the Industrial League to stage, for the first time, the City Series. The first game was played in closed Kennedy Stadium for the Windsor Police Spitfire Fund and the second in open Stodgell Park, where a collection netted \$91 for the Queen's Fund.

And, the City Hockey League put on a Red Cross Night in 1940, then, last winter, with the co-operation of the old Mic Mac club, put on a night for the Smokes Fund and raised \$125.

DON'T TELL ME, BOSS, that Windsor sport isn't going to miss a fellow who played such a major role in promotions like that.

IT BET the Canadian Pacific misses him too, by the way. I know of several instances, for example, where his connections alone have thrown business the firm's way—and there must be plenty more instances of his value as a member of Jovial Jim Lynch's crew.

BUT the City's loss is the Army's gain. I'm sure there must be some job with the Services that Lloyd is cut out for. For instance, they're talking about de-emphasizing athletic competition between Service teams and civilian teams and concentrating on intra-camp or inter-regimental competition. Boy, with an organizer like Pollock on your side you'd have two strikes on the rival camps before you started!

Moreover, think of the publicity the guy would get his buddies. You and I know how well he's covered the City Hockey League games for The Star throughout the league's existence, and how he did most of the coverage for the softball league for its first few seasons. You can bet his regiment, or camp, would be one that the public press wouldn't have much chance of overlooking.

BUT COME WHAT MAY, whether Lloyd winds up toting a gun, dish-ing out the stew or keeping accounts (and, incidentally, he's good at that, too, they tell me), you can bet he'll hat 1,000."

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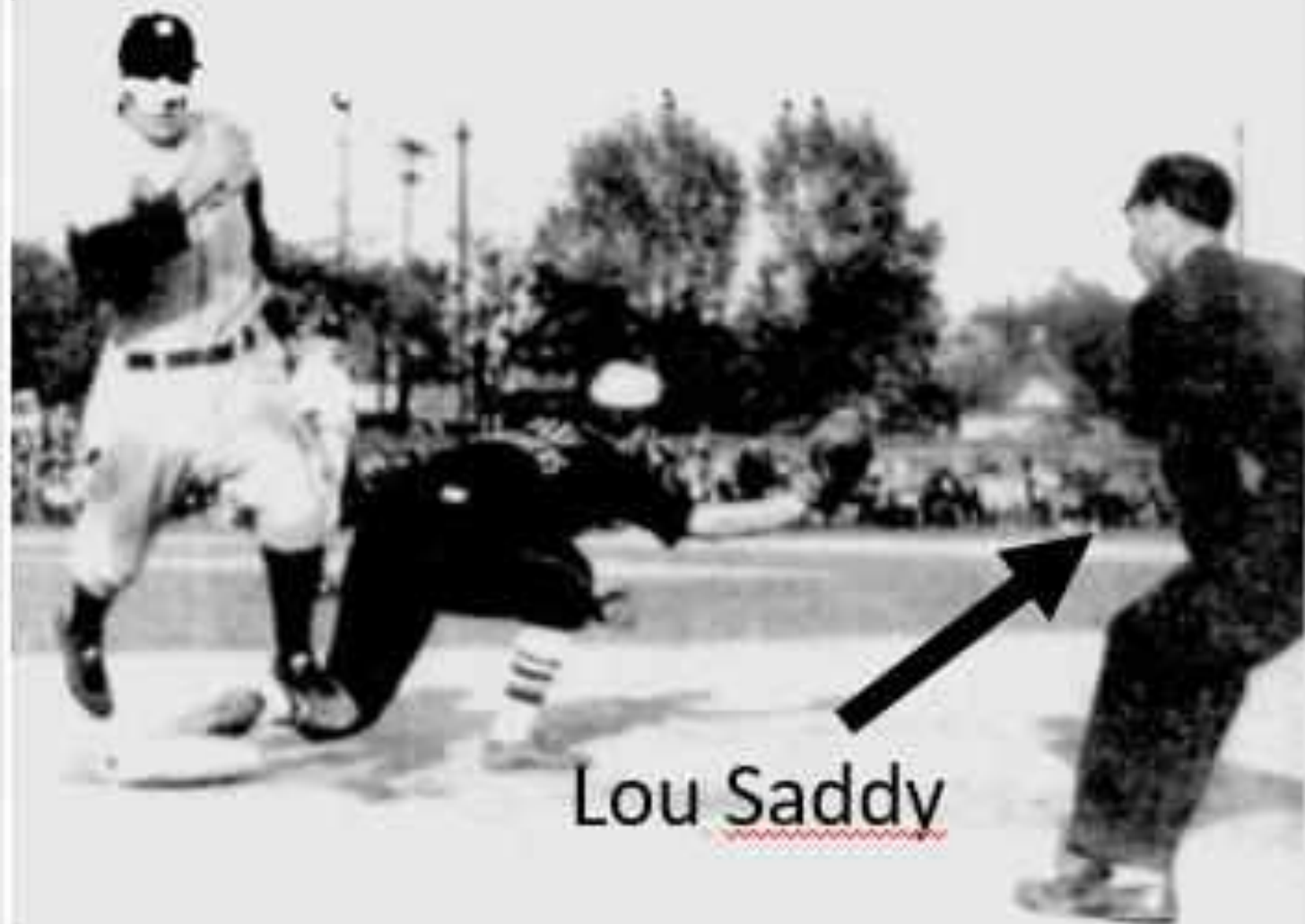

# MARKS SETTLE OLD DISPUTE

## Ford Softball League Is Not as Tough as Windsor Loop

There are a few stubborn people who will try to tell you that the Ford Motor Softball League is as good as the Windsor League, but they're way off. Because many players perform in both these leagues, the records offer an excellent comparison, and this year's bears out as past years have, that the Windsor League is definitely superior, and by a wide margin.

### FIDDES AN EXAMPLE

The case of Alex Fiddes, for instance, is a choice example. Fiddes, admittedly a superb ballplayer, socked Ford League pitching for an average of 545, yet in the Windsor League, playing with the two-time champions, Harry's Munro, he hit a comparatively modest 217.

Two other choice examples are Bill Tidman and Bert Upham. Third and fourth, respectively, in the Ford League, they whacked the ball at 450 and 433 slugs; in the Windsor League, Tidman hit 233 and Upham 221. Neither got a single home-run in the Windsor League. Harold Jackson and George Rabbeek, a couple of 400 hitters in the Ford League, didn't hit 300 in the Windsor League, nor did Bobby Hales, a 389 man in the Ford League.

There were, however, two notable exceptions, namely Russ Evon and Tommy Kavanaugh. With Kavanaugh was at the reverse, of the players already mentioned, for he hit 395 for the Windsor League's Men's Apparels team while the best he could do for Ford Brakes was 304, with Evon, it was a case of "You can't keep a good man down" or "Class will tell."

Evon, who hit 431 for runner-up honors in the Ford League, hit a major league 313 in the Windsor League to take the championship, for the second straight year.

### WINDSOR'S WILLIAMS

Evon was not the Windsor League what Ted Williams was to the majors—only more so, because Williams didn't pitch. Besides winning the batting crown, Evon led in home-runs, with nine in triples, with four tied with Fiddes in total hits, with 39, made only two errors in 52 chances, and, finally, as a pitcher, led the league in earned runs, was second in wins and winning percentage had the best hit average per inning and was tied in strikeouts.

And all this despite the fact that Evon had the added burden of managing the team he played for, Dave Zakoor's Aces.

Second to Evon in the batting race was the veteran Bobby Weir of Morris Flowers, who besides batting 409, had the distinction of going to bat 88 times during the schedule yet not once striking out. Evon fanned on his 76th, and last, trip to the plate to spoil his perfect record.

Chief reason for the difference noted in the batting in the Windsor and Ford leagues was the fact that, in the Windsor you were meeting pretty good teams all the time, whereas, in the Ford you bumped into several soft ones. It was in these games, against weak pitchers and slow fielders, that some Ford batters boosted their averages. Fellows like Evon and Kavanaugh, on the other hand, hit everybody with consistency and impartiality.

### FRED BOLTER TOPS

The top pitchers were just about identical in the two circuits, with Morris Flowers, Freddy Bolter topping the Windsor just as he did the Ford. However, he suffered one defeat in the Windsor against victories, while he was unbeaten during the Ford schedule. Like Evon, he, too had a big year at the plate as well as in the box hitting .302, the best figure of his career.

Strike out ace of the pitchers was Garnet Chow. Thorne of Men's Apparel, who also was a workhorse of the league, as he has been two or three times in the past. Thorne fanned 104 batters and pitched 133 1/3 innings. He also walked the most men—85. Jimmy Heenan of Harry's Munro, third in the Windsor League as he was in the Ford League, had the best control walking only 18 men in 76 innings.

Other offensive leaders were Jack Smith and Lyle Dowell of Harry's Munro, each of whom scored 26 runs, and a couple of redheads, Thomson

of Zakoor's Aces and Kennedy of Morris Flowers, who tied in doubles with 11.

One or two others belong to the upper bracket, but the rest are only fair. As a team, however, they are an entirely different proposition, as they proved last night.

Slugged into defeat in the series' third game after winning the first two, the Bendix boys came back so brilliantly last night on the same Stodgell Park diamond that it was all over after one round. In the first half of the first inning they scored eight runs.

### Parent Is Too Tough

Alex Clark, Kelsey's great playing-manager put forth a magnificent effort as a relief pitcher in the last eight innings, but to no avail. Parent was doing the pitching for Bendix and evidently grimly determined to make up for the thumping he had taken Wednesday and, also, to prove why he was the top pitcher in the league this year. Parent gave up only seven hits and one base on balls. Moreover, his mates responded accordingly and made only one error in a fine fielding comeback. They had made 10 in Wednesday's game.

All in all then, since the fine pitching and fielding was combined with an 11-hit attack, it was a fine victory all around, and a most worthy one.

## Industrial Group Mound Star Also Champion Batter Now

Ever since he made his debut in the Windsor Industrial Softball Association, long, blond Don Dweliska has been one of its top pitchers, but this year he was more than that. He also was its top batter, not one of its top batters, mind you, but the top batter.

### AVERAGE OF .415

Yes, official figures received from Statistician Blaine Doxandus of the Western Ontario Seniors Association, show that the 1942 batting champion is Essex Wire's Dweliska. In 82 official trips to the plate he made 40 hits for an average of .415.

Bob Liles of Trucon Steel was the wildest walking 113 men in 104<sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub> innings. Liles also made 81 wild pitches, as did Eddie Hogan of DeVilbiss.

Getting back to the offensive side, Zepka was the home-run king, with 18, and shared, with Bundy, the distinction of making the most hits, 49.

### OTHER LEADERS

Clark scored the most runs 48. McGregor of Canadian Motor Lamp drew the most passes 28. Vic Heathcott of Essex Wire made the most sacrifices, eight. Bernard (Nerts) Parent of Bendix made the most triples, seven. Doug Sabone of Purity Dairies made the most doubles, 17, and the Police team's Speedy Stannard proved his nickname was more fitting than his ponderous build implies by stealing six bases for homers in that department.

Bernie Hogan was the most frequent victim of desertion, being left on base 31 times, and Mitchell of Hiram Walkers had the unenviable distinction of striking out oftenest, also 31 times.

### EVON VS. PARENT

With it, he sparred his league's champion Inspection team to the championship of the city, via a 15-4 rout of the Industrial League's newly crowned monarch, the Bendix club.

The No. 1 Ford Leasur was Russ Evon, of course; the No. 1 Industrial Leasur was Gerry Parent. There may be those who question Parent's right to that rating, but he certainly was the player of the year in his league, from the standpoint of all-around efficiency. None can question Evon's right to No. 1 rating.

Least of all will Parent question it today, not if he's as smart off the ballfield as on.

Both are good shortstops. And both are good hitters and good baserunners. Evon, at bat, is better than good, he's colossal.

### ALL THE DETAILS

Here is what happened:

Evon pitched four innings, during which time he gave up not a run, nor a hit, nor a base on balls; Parent pitched eight innings during which he gave up 10 runs, an even dozen hits and six bases on balls. In his four innings, Evon struck out seven men; in his eight, Parent struck out six.

On offense, Evon was up five times officially and slammed three doubles and a single; Parent was up four times and had to settle for a lone double. Evon also stole a base.

In the field, Evon had three put-outs and one assist. Parent went him one better with no putouts but five assists. But the Ford team pulled off two snappy double plays and Evon was on the end of the first and in the middle of the second.

The story of the two players just about tells the story of the game. Parent was Bendix's hope; he had to be hot for Jimmy Keenan's gang to rate a chance. Inspection, on the other hand, could figure that if Evon was hot the rest would take care of itself. It did.

Inspection gave Evon fine support, both in the field and at bat. The Automen made only two errors and whacked out 17 hits all told, with Red Thomson socking two home-runs and a double and Jimmy Hogan a third home-run. Only Eddie Morley failed to get a hit. The five hits and five runs were made in one inning, off Ron Pinnegar, who is an outfielder or infielder but no pitcher.

## But Twist Drill Team Collects Most Individual Laurels From Fraternity League Softball

James (Lefty) Dimitroff and Stanley Beauvais were the principal cogs in the Swank Shop Owls' capture of the Fraternity Softball League championship, judging by the figures released today by the Western Ontario Scorer's Association. Dimitroff was the leading pitcher in the league, on the percentage basis, while Beauvais was the team's leading hitter, with a mark of .399.

There were two other Owls who hit more than Beauvais but they were not at bat the 75 official times needed to qualify for inclusion in the list of regulars. This was particularly rough on Harry Soumis, who was up only 70 times officially because he drew 29 bases on balls. Soumis hit .400, the best Swank Shop effort.

### GOGGINS IS BATTING KING

Soumis was far back of the leading hitter in the league, however. This was Alan Goggins, pepper-pot catcher of the Dominion Twist Drill team that was the league's strongest outfit through the 22-game schedule. Goggins hit a colossal .515, finishing up in a blaze of glory by getting 14 hits in his last 15 times at bat to place second in the league in total hits, with 51. He also led the leading regular batters defensively, fielding .971. Between the final game of the schedule and the opening game of the playoffs, however, Goggins got his call from the Air Force and was shipped off to Hamilton.

Goggins' lofty status and untimely departure is but one point in favor of the Drill club's argument that the playoffs would have produced a much different story had the team been able to remain intact.

### DUNN ALL-AROUND ACE

Other points in the same argument: Melvin (Snowball) Dunn was runner-

up to Goggins for the batting crown, with an average of .471; led the league in home-runs, with eight, and in doubles, with 18; was tied for second in triples; was third in hits, with 40, and, playing all his games in the outfield, had the remarkable total of 14 assists. Jimmy Radcliffe, who pitched most of Drill's games, was the league's "winningest" pitcher, with 11 on the credit side, was second in percentages, with .846, and was tied in strikeouts, with 91. Al Langlois not only batted .360, hit five home-runs for a second-place tie and tied for second in doubles, with 11, but was far and away the outstanding third-baseman. All three of these boys were posted to out-of-town Army training-camps immediately after the last game of the schedule, and so missed the playoffs.

A pair of Omegas, Stan Coughlin and George Grant, ran 3-4 in the batting race, with .469 and .404 respectively, rounding out the group of .400 hitters who were up 75 times or more and Grant's 11 doubles gave him a tie for second in that department. The Omegas were also out of luck in the playoffs, as they had Coughlin for only part of the three games they played in losing out in the quarter-finals.

Apart from the Dominion Twist Drill standouts mentioned, however, the outstanding player was the aforementioned Soumis of Swank Shop. He led the league in bases on balls, with 29 and in runs scored, with 43. Afield, his .942 mark was well up there. He played second-base.

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champion-in-reverse. Bill Jupp struck out 22 times, tying Strain of Loblaw Beavers for the questionable distinction. Other firsts on offence were: Coughlin's 111 times up; the same player's 52 hits, Dunn's 18 doubles, as already mentioned; four triples each by Gordie Wilson of Bayer and John Maxwell of Swank Shop. Dunn's eight homers, as mentioned; Basil Morris' 11 stolen bases for Gelatin Products. Goggins was left on base most often, 29 times. Dunn and Langlois struck out least often, five times each in 85 and 86 times up, respectively, though Coughlin whiffed only six out of his 111.

### DIMITROFF TOPS HURLERS

Dimitroff, to top the pitching percentages, won six games while losing only one. He joined the team in mid-season. The other half of Swank Shop's ace pitching pair, little Dickie Burns, won seven and lost two and was second in the league in earned runs, with an average of only 3.85. Oddly, first place in the earned-runs column went to another Burns, but

no relation to Dick-Joe, of Dominion Twist Drill, whose mark was 2.64. Lloyd Storie of Loblaw Beavers, who signed a pro hockey contract with the Cleveland Barons the week before last, was the league's strikeout specialist, setting down 127 to beat out big Hank Steppe of the Barons, who had 115. The same two finished in the same order in the bases on balls column, with 106 and 102 and Radcliffe was third to them, as he was in strikeouts. Steppe, Radcliffe and Storie finished in that order in the matter of innings pitched, with Hank working 130.
