The Aleutians Are Frigid, But the R. C. A. F. Men Up There Are Right Hot in Their Sports Fervor

AN ADVANCED R.C.A.F. BASE IN THE ALEUTIANS, June 26.—Sleet driven by a sharp north wind slashed at the faces of young Canadians on a bleak Aleutian island, but to the softball-playing members of an R.C.A.F. fighter squadron it was just another hazard in their game at one end of a runway.

Neither rain nor snow nor bitterly-cold wind stops the athletically-inclined airmen from sport after a hard day keeping their station in fighting trim for raids on the Japanese at Kiska.

Hockey in winter, softball in summer, and fishing and skiing the whole year are the chief sports for these young men helping drive the enemy from the Aleutians.

One station has a softball league with a team entered from each hut. Early in June several teams still were unbeaten. One officers' hut boasted the team favored to win the schedule, mainly because it had the best pitchers—Flight Lieut. D. W. (Duff) Wakeling of Brantford, Ont., and Flying Officer J. R. Irwin of Oakville, Ont.

The same station also sends all-star teams into international competition with teams from a nearby United States Army and Navy base. The Canadians won the first game 8-3 with Wakeling pitching, but the Americans sent a leading outfit into the second game and won 5-2. Both international and intersquadron games are expected to continue for the remainder of the summer.

At another station where an outdoor rink was set up last winter the R.C.A.F. team won the base hockey championship, unbeaten in a 20-game schedule.

Even in summer the water is too cold for swimming. An airman from one station located several hundred yards from the Bering Sea once tried the water there but got in only to the knees before his legs became numb. A couple of hardy men tried the North Pacific. Once was enough in the icy water.

Excellent skiing is possible all year on the snow-covered slopes of volcanic mountain cones ranging from one end of the Aleutians to the other. Skiers generally have to travel only a couple of miles from their stations.

The foremost skier is PO. Louis Cochand of Montreal, instructor before he enlisted, and winner of 45 trophies in slalom and downhill events in Eastern Canada and Europe. Cochand said conditions in the Aleutians are ideal because the weather results in snow of correct texture and there are no rocks or hidden obstacles on the treeless slopes.

Fishing is also popular among the Canadians. They reported that when the salmon are running they could be scooped out of streams by hand. At other times trout are caught with minnow bait. There never have been any insects on the island and the fish won't take flies. Catches range up to 14 in a couple of hours. Cpl. Bill Iles of Ottawa caught the biggest trout, a four-pounder. Some reported the fish are tasteless, but others said they are good eating if cooked correctly.

Several of the islands are stocked with caribou, but no hunting is allowed, since the animals are being protected as a possible food supply in an emergency. Alaskan bear can be shot in the mountains near one station, but the licence is \$50 and few of the boys are that enthusiastic. One airman told of a hunter sending 29 slugs from a high-powered rifle into one bear before bringing it down.

Because it is a wonder this particular type of mishap isn't more common, we're going to say a few words on the subject.

In the old—and best—days of softball around here, infielders whipped the ball around with a zeal and zest that would shame most of the present-day players, but never with reckless abandon. During the past three or four years, however, there has come into being a supposedly clever trick of looking in one direction and throwing the ball in another.

This is what happened last night: In the same Fraternity League where the kid got the 14-stitch gash, Swank Shop Owls were playing Stearns Chemists. After the usual between-inning warmup, the Owls started passing the ball around the infield. Gerry Beaudoin, the catcher, ran towards the pitcher's box expecting a throw from Gord Wilson, the third-baseman. He got it all right. Wilson grabbed the ball, then looked towards First-baseman Doug St. Dennis—but he threw straight at Beaudoin. The misleading glance, however, had thrown young Beaudoin off guard and just as Wilson let go he dropped his hands. The next thing you knew, the game little catcher was on the ground, the not-so-soft-ball having hit him right in the eye.

We are not blaming Wilson as Wilson, but as a representative of a very careless class of Smart Aleck. An easy-going guy, Gord would have been the first to regret his trick throw had it done serious damage. As it was, he and some of the other Owls seemed to think it quite a laugh. We didn't. We never have forgotten that a little girl we used to go to school with lost an eye through being hit by a really soft rubber ball, not one of the heavy, solid spheres we know as softballs.

Ninth-Inning Injury to Chapman Mars Otherwise Great Softball Show for Overseas Smokes Fund; Old-Timers Whip Fratters, Lead Fords-Chryslers

A great softball battle was left suspended in mid-air Saturday evening at Stoddard Park when a long delay following an injury to George Chapman eventually caused the umpires to call the game with two men out in the first of the ninth but the tying run on second-base. A rematch should be a natural.

GRIMLY HANGING ON

The battlers were Gerry Curley's Old-Timers and a combined all-star team from the Chrysler and Ford leagues. The Old-Timers—actually still playing regularly, but veterans of 12 years' top-flight experience—were in front, but hanging on grimly when the sad end came.

And sad it was. With one out and Bob Liles on first, Bill Hodgins flied to Jimmy Halsbeck in centre-field. It wasn't the sort of fly a fellow should take a chance on while carrying the winning run with two out in the last inning, but Liles lit out for second after the catch. The play was close. Bob ran in hunched up then went into a hook slide while George was still partly turned toward dead centre. Both boys went down in a heap and poor George went out of the park in an ambulance half an hour or so later, suffering from a displaced kneecap and torn ligaments that have definitely ended this ball season for him, at least.

What made the injury particularly ironical was that Chapman had just taken over second-base in the seventh after delivering a run-scoring pinch single in the sixth that might have made him the hero of the night instead of the victim. The program was a double-header, and in the first game George had played his regular position, third-base.

VETS PUT ON SWELL SHOW

Up to then it had been a great evening, with the so-called Old-Timers putting on a grand show in trouncing an all-star Fraternity League team 9-2 in the preliminary game and then showing up the Ford-Chrysler stars for seven innings of the nightcap. Moreover, it was a profitable evening not only for the fans but for the Overseas Smokes Fund, as proceeds are to go to that war charity from the crowd of approximately 500.

Gerry Curley, great pitcher of the past who sponsored the program, was almost the goat of the big game—which would have been a most distressing state of affairs. After showing dandy control all through his 1943 endeavors with Border Cities Industries in the Industrial League, Gerry

was probably more erratic than at any time in his career. The result was that he lost his team's shutout in the eighth, then was in danger of losing the game as well in the ninth until he wisely voted himself back to the bench and recalled Freddy Bolter to the box from right-field. With one run in, Liles on first and nobody out, Bolter seemed about to save the day, via Mike Patrick's pop fly to Catcher Herb Smith and Hodgins' fly to Halsbeck, when the issue was left in doubt for all time by the mishap to Chapman.

BREAKS EVEN UP FOR DICK

The first seven innings were definitely the Old-Timers' show, though Dick Nurse almost offset their efforts with one fell blow. With the bases full and nobody out in the seventh, Nurse hit a long fly to left that looked like a home-run—but wound up foul by six or seven feet. Curley then struck out Nurse and Liles and induced Patrick to force Al Genga at third on a hot grounder smartly snatched by Mickey McMillan, for the best bit of spot pitching of the entire evening.

Ironically, Nurse did get a home-run to open the eighth on a ball that wasn't nearly as well tagged. This was a hard-hit drive alright, but nothing more than a line single to left—until, with Roger Froulx all set, it took a wicked hop high over that worthy's head, permitting Nurse to circle the bases.

To begin at the beginning, though, the Old-Timers drew first blood by scoring off Fords' Don Bond in the second inning on Moe Beausoleil's error. Halsbeck's forceout and Willie Rogin's line single through short, the while Butch Collins, former London star, was holding the All-Stars to one hit in the first three rounds.

The lead was boosted to three in the fourth when, with Jimmy Hogan of Fords now pitching for the All-Stars, Rogin delivered an even more potent blow, a long home-run to left after Gil Burford's miff of a throwen ball had put Halsbeck on first. Hogan got by the next two rounds without additional scoring, but over the same stretch Bolter was doing even better, allowing only a double by Jack Ward.

Patrick took the hill for the Ford-Chrysler team in the seventh, and started shakily by pitching singles to Rogin, Bolter and Chapman, which, due to another booby by Beausoleil, were responsible for an unearned run. However, Slim looked good in the eighth while Curley begged down.

After Gerry had got out of the bad seventh-inning jam in great style fol-

lowing a pass to Beausoleil, a single by Genga and a pass to Burford, he got himself into trouble in the eighth by passing Hodgins and then Beausoleil after Steve Landry had sacrificed Bill to second. It looked like he might escape again when he got the dangerous Ward to ground out to Chapman, but young Genga crossed him up with a clean one-bagger to left to score both runners, before Burford flied to left to end the spree.

That put the All-Stars back in the ball game and they still were there, thanks to Nurse's freak homer and Liles' single to left, when Chapman was hurt and play ended.

Fine play it was, too, on the whole outdoing any game yet seen in the annual series between the Windsor League and Industrial all-stars. Besides brilliant pitching by Collins and Bolter and a nice effort by Bond, there was some sensational fielding by a couple of the Old-Timers. Harry Heydon covered the short field like a tent in making a couple of fine running catches, but the play of the night came in the fifth, when Chow Thorne, a terrific hitter, drove a fly far into centre-field. Halsbeck took one look at it, turned his back on the diamond and started running. Softball Has Improved Steadily Along Border

By LLOYD WILLSON

Back in the winter nights of 1923, and several years previous thereto, a very successful indoor baseball league was operating in the Windsor Armories and was composed of the following teams: 18th Battalion (Essex Scottish), Chrysler, Ford and Windsor Merchants, and some very fine hurling performances were turned in by such old-timers as Ray McKim, Ed Beaumont, Don Messenger and others. The ball used at that time was an 18-inch in-seam.

The following spring, Bill Campbell, well-known local wrestler, etc., was appointed director of recreation for the city of Windsor, and, among other things he did, he approached the officials of the above-mentioned indoor league with reference to the organization of a league of softball teams for outdoors. Softball at that time was in its infancy locally, the ball used was a 14-inch out-seam with rough cover and the team roster was of the same formation as indoor baseball.

A meeting was called in the Windsor Armories for the purpose of ascertaining what organizations would be interested in the formation of such a league. At this meeting were Bill Campbell, Bill Shaw, Ed Harding and this writer, and the net result of the calling of the meet-

ing was the appearance of one representative for Michigan Central Railroad. Despite this discouraging start, another meeting was called a week later, and this time four teams were represented, namely Michigan Central Railroad, Mohawks, 18th Battalion and Church of the Ascension, and that was the start of Windsor's first softball league.

The second year the league operated with eight teams and continued at that strength for a number of years thereafter. All games were played in open parks and on school diamonds, and the attendances grew to such large proportions that it became almost impossible to accommodate the crowds. During this period of softball's rapid progress such teams as Burnside Hardware and Chilver Coals could always be counted on to furnish

a top-notch exhibition of the then-new sport.

The following spring the Border Cities Amateur Athletic Federation was formed under the very capable presidency of Bernard G. Sparks of the old town of Sandwich, and the applications for entry into the federation were so numerous that it was decided to obtain a closed park and introduce Windsor's first softball under the floodlights. It was Kelary.

In the first year of operation the league was divided into groups, as follows: Six senior, eight intermediate, four junior, and the introduction of four girls' teams. This year, which was 1931, the Chilver club again won the senior division and entered provincial playoffs at the conclusion of the regular season, and as a result brought the first and only Senior A championship to Windsor, winning the Hamilton Herald Trophy, emblematic of the top rung of all softball in the Province of Ontario. This team was under the management of this historian, since retired, and was composed of the following players, many of whom are still playing a very capable brand of ball.

The following year the Federation operated with six senior teams, 14 intermediate teams, four junior teams and four girls' teams. This year the Dayus Roofers, under the management of Chris Bergoine, entered provincial competition in the junior division and brought the second provincial championship to Windsor.

By the end of this season softball had grown to such large proportions that it was found necessary to secure another closed park, and it was then that Kennedy Stadium was secured and games were played at both parks.

All divisions were entered in provincial competition each year, but it was not until 1936 that the Silverwood's girls' team, under the management of Hutch-Hutchison, brought another championship to Windsor after a thrilling playdown schedule with Chatham, Caledonia, Humberstone, Toronto and finally Sudbury, in order.

Since, softball has become highly industrialized, and the Industrial League, along with the Windsor League, form the backbone of local competition now, with the Fraternity League an ideal field for grooming the younger men.
