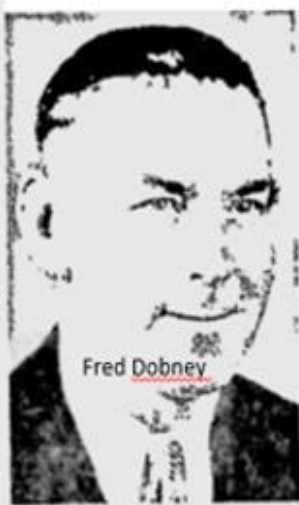

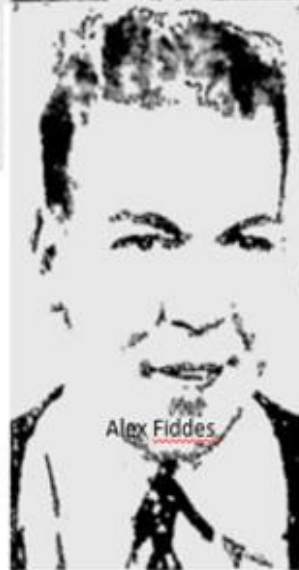

They got all seven of their runs in the fifth inning, when they routed Jimmy Hogan via a base on balls, a single, a double and a home-run, linked with two errors. Richards belted the homer and furnished off James, who gave way to his brother Eddie, making it the first senior league game in which the two brothers had appeared as team-mates.

Eddie, the younger brother, stopped the Aces cold, but too late, for Local 200 could do little against Gardener, who not only did a fine job of scattering 11 hits but also slapped the double that started the winning spree.

Stars of the losing cause also were three former Fraters, Eddie Hogan, Bud Sawyer and Leo DeLorenzi. Sawyer led all the hitters, connecting three times, and DeLorenzi clouted a two-run homer.

Altogether, the night was a great credit to Frank Neave's Frat loop.



First No-Run No-Hit Game here After Leading
Police to 11-0 Win Over Motor Lamp

no-hit game of 'he 1944 season either hardball or softball—came last night when Clement (Butch) Collins of the Windsor Police Association team held Canadian Motor Lamp hitless and runless for the full nine innings of an Industrial Softball League encounter at Asphalt Park. The Police scored 11 times.

HE'S PLENTY COLORFUL

Quite a ballplayer in this Collins with his only drawback the far: that he also is quite a character, albeit a colorful one.

Fiercely and temperamental in other respects too, Butch is as genial as can be sometimes yet at others he seems like the most ornery cuss in the world. Last year, for instance, he was captain of the Police team and life was pretty miserable at times. This year, however, they took his title away from him and made him just another player, with the result that he is a reformed character mildly reformed at any rate.

The change should do him good. His hot temper works more against him than for him, with the result that past seasons have seen him either blow up or give up, but when he concentrates and sticks strictly to business, instead of swaggering and raving, they still don't come much better despite his long career. Whether you like the guy or not, you have to admit he really can pitch when the mood suits him.

ISSUES ONLY TWO PASSES

Evidently the mood suited him last night, for the Motor Lamp batters never had a look-in. Three men reached base—two on passes and the other on Roy Bondy's mull of an easy infield fly—but not one of the three got past first-base Steve Clark came closest but was run down, George Souchuk to Neal (Pug) Harwood—second to first after Catcher Pete Tapak's throw to second. Incidentally this was Tapak's first game with the Police. He moved to London, where he stayed 12 years, and this is his third season in Windsor. He is now a regular member of the Windsor Police Department, as a patrolman, but began playing with the team as a member of the Ontario Provincial Police, who had transferred him here.

His first no-run no-hit game came in Woodstock, around 1929. He very nearly had one in London, too, in 1922, but lost it in the ninth inning.

Collins, who was here several times for Ontario playdowns, has never pitched for an Ontario championship winner, coming closest when the London Old Mill team dropped the deciding game to a Toronto outfit at Guelph in the best-of-three Senior B final of 1938, out his wife, the former Maude Glennie, played outfield with the great London Kelloggs when he won three Ontario senior women's titles.

MATT'S BACK HIM UP WELL

Collins got help from both sides in winning last night's games. Sluggish fielding by the Lamppens during the first four innings soon killed off any faint victory hopes that may still have entertained, while his fellow-Cops not only backed up Collins with good fielding but with a heavy t-k, making 14 hits. Bondy and Souchuk blazed the trail in this respect with three knockouts apiece, he former including a homer, but Collins himself also did well on the offensive, hitting a single and double driving in two runs and stealing two bases to make it an all-triumphant night.

ON THE REBOUND

ARRIVAL of Freddy Bolter et al in the Fraternity Softball League seems to be causing grave fears in some minds that Frank Neave's young circuit will suffer in consequence. On the other hand, with Bolter's loss leaving Morris Flowers with only one pitcher and other similar moves pending that are apt to hit other teams, some Windsor League fans are afraid their favorite loop is going to be hard hit, too, only in a different way. Instead of having packed teams, it may wind up with riddled teams, these latter fans think.

Personally, we think the Windsor League is not in too much danger, since very few players still left are likely to get calls to the Service. Nevertheless, we think both loops might run into a little trouble, hence we would like to make a few suggestions in case either or both find a crisis developing.

The Industrial League we would leave strictly as is. Fred Dobney's circuit has got along splendidly so far and probably can continue to do so. Dealing, therefore, only with the joint problem of the Windsor and Frat loops, we offer a possible solution to the situation; a solution that calls for these two organizations to help each other out.

IN the first place, the arrangement would be reciprocal. That is, the Fraternity League would not be able to borrow players from the Windsor or Industrial leagues unless it was willing to lend its own, and vice versa.

However, in both cases, the original league to which the player belonged would have first call on his services. For instance, if Russ Rudling of the Cardinals were borrowed by Morris Flowers and Morris Flowers and the Cardinals were playing on the same night Rudling would have to turn out with the Cardinals. But we mean **TURN OUT**. Then, just because Eddie Hogan figured it was not his turn to pitch for Kozak's Bedells, he would not be tempted to neglect Bedells and go off to pitch for the Junior Optimists instead. Should this procedure not be adhered to faithfully, the player would be suspended for the season **FROM BOTH LEAGUES**.

Players would be permitted to take part in only **TWO** leagues, as playing in **THREE** leagues at once would be altogether too confusing. This would bar players such as Steve Landry, who plays in the Ford League and for the Windsor League's Dayus Mac-Macs, or Basil Curley, who plays in the Chrysler League and for the Industrial League's Border Cities Industries team. This would still leave such players as Wally Renaud, Art Voyce et al available to the Fraternity League.

ALSO, it would be advisable to bar players who are with one softball team and one hardball team, as they too would be very questionable assets. For instance, when Essex County League and O.B.A. playdowns come around the hardball clubs will be practicing diligently, and the softballers will be expecting such and such a fellow to come out and bat cleanup for them, only to wait in vain and learn he was at Wyle Park getting in his licks for Ottawa Cartage in a practice game with a Detroit sandlot team. Even now, each Windsor hardball team is playing an average of one midweek game.

As to the distribution of these reinforcements among the Frat League teams, all players eligible and willing to help out could submit their names to President Frank Neave, which would be fairer to some of the teams not too familiar with the senior players. Players could be allotted to the teams by an impartial committee or else the teams could put in their bids for certain men. However, there might be some "flashing of demands" here. Perhaps it would be best to let the Fraternity League clubs go out and try to sign up what players they wanted once they looked over the entire list.

NATURALLY, the clubs would not be permitted to sign new men without limit. This would be fair neither to their rivals nor to the players who have enabled them to carry on thus far this season. The limit would be three to a team. Some of the stronger teams—such as Cheney's Mac-Kay's Master and Washing Well—would not be permitted to sign the full three reinforcements. Only the last six, say, would be permitted to sign pitchers. Teams from ninth to 16th would be allowed the full limit, three men, and teams from fifth to eighth, two men. The top four might be allowed one new man apiece.

AS for the Windsor League, each of these clubs would be allowed to use no more than two men from the Fraternity League, and of course, none from the Industrial League. Of course, the Industrial League's eligibility rules would remain exactly the same as they are now. The Windsor League which already has a name "rule" that permits the use of players by each club.

There would be no "flashing" concerning the Navy men, the forest strengthening and complicated materials, and other things. Although Fred Bolter, Red Thomson and L. J. Dowell were with Windsor League teams at the suggestion at the outset, the Windsor team has preference would be reversed in their case, because their first duty would be to the Service. The same would hold true for the Air Force team. Even at that, however, Morris Flowers would be delighted to have Bolter or, say, Dave Zakoor's Aces would be delighted to have Freddy Thomas, even for one of their two games a week.

Does it sound complicated? Yes, it does, we admit, but give it a little thought and you'll find it's not nearly as complicated as it appears. And we honestly think it would be helpful all around.

GORDON SOX, HENWOOD is just about the dean of baseball and softball umpires in these parts. He's been calling balls and strikes for 25 years that we can remember and we know that he was an arbiter even before that.

We encountered Sox along the sidelines at one of the Industrial Softball League games last evening. He was all steamed up—and it wasn't the weather that had him running a temperature.

"What the heck is the matter with the ball players of these days?" he wanted to know.

"Oh, don't be too critical Sox," we said. "After all, there is a war on and that's where the most

of them are.

"I don't mean that," said Henwood. "What gets me down is the lack of competitive fire shown by most of the fellows."

As he was speaking there was a close play at third base, just in front of us. The umpire, standing 15 feet away in the middle of the diamond, called the runner safe. The third baseman who had tagged his man as he slid into the bag, wore a look of pained surprise but never said a word. None of the other members of his team squawked either, or even appeared to have any interest in what had happened.

"SEE what I mean, now?" said Sox. "That was a close play but the umpire got away without a protest being registered. Just you think back to the days of the old Walkerville Chicks and fellows like Charley Gatecliffe, Al Edwards, Leo Poupard, Bill Jordan and Whitey Whiteside, and what they would have done and said on a play like that.

"Why, I can see Gatecliffe yet. He'd have stuck that square jaw of his out a foot and started bellowing at the top of his lungs even before the dust was settled."

While he was orating, the umpire was heard to bellow, "Strike three, you're out." The batter had heard the strike called without taking the hat off his shoulder. He never even glanced back at the man behind the plate as he tossed his war club away and shuffled back to sit down with his teammates.

"YOU SEE," said Henwood, "there's another example. Remember what Whitey Whiteside used to do when an umpire had the nerve to call him out on strikes! He'd take off his cap, scrub his hand through his hair—what there was of it—stomp and blow like a bull in a china shop, and nine times out of ten wind up by hurling his bat clear into the dugout or over the top of the grandstand."

Henwood paused for breath and then went on. "I don't recall Gatecliffe, Whiteside or any other ball player, for that matter, ever winning one of those arguments, but they never stopped trying. To me such incidents are a vital part of baseball and softball. They show that the ball players are really out there trying to win, that they are playing for keeps. They help to keep an umpire on his toes and alert to everything that is going on. But, most important of all, they make it interesting for the fans—afford them the chance to boo or applaud, depending with whom their sympathies happen to rest.

"I know some people will say that 'I'm getting old,' went on Sox, "and so just like to talk about the old days. But what do you think? Don't you agree with me that the baseball and softball played locally in the past few years is singularly lacking in color?"

It took Henwood to put his finger on it, but on being reminded we know now that that's what we've been missing. By golly, come to think of it, we haven't seen a real red hot argument between a player and an umpire, or a player and a manager, yet this year."

Maybe some of the fellows can oblige us with one before we go on our vacation next week.

THE FORGOTTEN MAN

At first Patrick had had to beg some of these veteran players to show up, but as the season progressed and the team improved in percentage, they began to show more interest. Eventually they were appearing regularly, and with that Handyman Moore began to disappear—first gradually and then almost out of sight. It didn't matter that they had their slumps, at bat or afield or both, and their fits of temperament. Whether Moore deserved it or not, he was again a bench-warmer.

But last night two of the men Patrick had had to wheedle into showing up at the start of the campaign, yet who have not ridden the bench a single inning, passed up the Dayus softballers' first playoff game for an exhibition hardball tilt, and Patrick and the Mic-Macs were on the spot. Re-enter Master Moore!

He was shoved into the important first-base position and conceded eighth place in the batting order at the expense of a weak-hitting pitcher. That pitcher was Ray Beauchesne, another man Patrick was glad to have around last night, because he rounded out the necessary nine.



last season and Rudling tried one game in the same loop this year. Step looked good, but Rudling was routed in five or six innings and did not try again.

Joe Fairhurst, a slugging first baseman, played in the same Windsor League game as Rudling but had no success, so also went back down. Joe Gleason, Carl Evon, Booby Sawyer, Leo DeLorenzi, Tonto Domengoni, and Ben Papineau are four of the new Dayus team's players who have been up in the tough Windsor League all season, with all looking good afield and little Sawyer also making a marked impression at bat. Incidentally, all of these kids played in the Frat loop last year.

Balance of the squad assembled by Robinson also are Frat League products, and are still in that company. They are Johnny Renaud, big and hard-hitting catcher; Hughie Cowan, midge; outfielder; Harry Butzer, another outfielder, and Daffy Davidson.

Manager Robinson lost a fine little pitcher—his best one—when Eddie Hogan was called to the Army, but he got a great break when Hank Step blew into town on a furlough from the Army and became eligible as a military replacement, although two outings here this week left some doubt as to whether or not big Hank is yet in shape.

Robinson is calling a final workout for tomorrow morning, at 9 o'clock, on the Wilson Park diamond where the game will be played, but he has already indicated that his probable starting lineup and batting order will be: Cowan, rf; Gleason or Evon, 2b; Domengoni, lf; Fairhurst, 1b; Sawyer 3b; Butzer, cf; DeLorenzi, c; Papineau, as Step, p.
