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SOFTBALLERS READY TO GO

Industrial Association to Launch Season On Monday

With a new president, a new vice-president, two brand new teams, two more returning to competition after a lapse of several years and four from last year, the Windsor Industrial Softball Association will launch its 1945 season Monday with a three-game program.

SABINE NEW PRESIDENT

The circuit's new president is Doug Sabine, for years a star performer with various clubs in the Industrial League. He replaces Fred (Stogie) Dobney, who served eight seasons at the helm and played a big part in making the loop one of the most popular in the district. The new vice-president is another Industrial veteran player and manager, Ossie Soucie. Rounding out the league's official family will be Harold Enright, who has been secretary-treasurer of the organization since its formation.

New entries in the league are Aircraft Hydraulic, which will be managed by Johnny Querin and Long Manufacturing, which will be piloted by Harry Zalba.

The two teams which have returned to the fold are Essex Wire, which will have Vice-President Soucie directing traffic and Motor Products with Soaries as manager.

COLONIAL TOOL OUT

These teams will replace five from last year which have dropped out, including the classy Colonial Tool team which won the league championship. The others which will be missed are Canadian Motor Lamp, Walker Metal Products, Kelsey Wheel and Border Cities Industries.

The four teams which will again set out in pursuit of titular honors include Police, Purity Dairies, Auto Specialties and C.P.R. Recreation. The latter club won the Intermediate Division championship last season.

Monday's inaugural program calls for Essex Wire to play the Police at Lanspeary Park; Purity Dairies and Aircraft Hydraulic to clash at Stodgell Park, No. 3 diamond and Auto Specialties and Motor Products to meet at King George School.

As in past years the league will play its games on Monday, Wednesday and Friday evenings. All games will start at 6:30.

POLICE BEAT WIRE NINE IN OPENING GAME

Specialties, Dairy Club Are Easy Winners in Other Tilts

Indications that Butch Collins and the rest of his "gang" are going to prove mighty tough hombres to handle in local softball competition this season was given last night as the Windsor Industrial Association launched its season with a three game program which saw Windsor Police—meaning Collins and his "gang"—wrest an 8-4 decision from Essex Wire, Purity Dairies trounce Aircraft Hydraulic, 15-2 and Auto Specialties slaughter Motor Products, 37-5.

MUCH THE BEST

Measured by any sort of yardstick, the Police-Essex Wire game was by far the best of the opening day menu. In fact, for seven innings it was just about as nifty a battle as you'd care to see with the vitriolic Mr. Collins and Joe Homick hooking up in a real pitcher's battle.

Going into that fatal seventh, the Police team was leading, 3-1 but the Wiremen—back in the league after an absence of several years—rallied for three runs and a 4-3 margin which, at that stage looked mighty good in view of the way Homick had been going.

However, in the Police team's turn at bat in their half of the same frame Homick was betrayed by his supporting cast and chiefly, of all people, by his manager and first baseman, Ossie Soucie. This is how it happened. There were two out and a runner on second base when Bondy, third sacker for the Men in Blue, dumped the ball in front of the plate. Catcher Lorney Edmunds was on it like a flash and threw a perfect strike to first base for what should have been the third out of the inning. However, Soucie let the ball slide through his glove and all hands were safe. Heartened by that break the Police sluggers came through with a single, triple and base on balls which netted them four unearned runs which was more than enough to bring them victory.

Both Homick and Collins were in fine fettle for early in the season with the Police moundsman fanning 11 and Homick eight.

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Windsor, Frat Softball Leagues To Open Monday

The last two of this city's major softball circuits will launch their 1945 campaigns Monday night with the opening of Bill Hadley's Windsor League and Frank Neave's thriving Fraternity League.

FIVE TEAMS THIS YEAR

After surviving a stormy season last summer, the Windsor League this year will operate as a compact loop of five teams. While nearly all of the players will be familiar to veteran fans who have long looked to this league to offer the best brand of softball in the city, only two of the clubs will carry the same names as last season. They are Kozak Beddells, which will be managed by George Proulx, who last year piloted the Colonial Tool team to the Industrial Association championship, and Frank Dayus's Dayus Roofers. The newcomers include Cook Bros., an all-star colored team which will perform under the leadership of Bart Simons; Butcher's Engineering, which will be handled by George Chapman and the Meretsky and Gitlin club—rated one of the most powerful aggregations to be assembled locally in recent years—which will be piloted by Eagle Reid.

As in the past, the Windsor League will play its games on Monday, Wednesday and Friday evenings. In the lone game scheduled for Monday evening's inaugural, Butcher's Engineering will tangle with Dayus Roofers at Wilson Park starting at 6:30.

BIGGEST LEAGUE IN CITY

As for the Fraternity League it will once again be the biggest in the city, in the point of numerical strength, of course, with 12 teams, including the championship H.M.C.S. Hunter of last year. As a matter of fact the Navy nine will not only have Freddie Bolter, who was the mainstay of their pitching staff in 1944 but also Jimmy Farmer, who local fans will remember as one of Windsor's best all-around athletes of pre-

war days. Farmer is slated to play third base for the Hunter club.

As has always been the case in this circuit with each succeeding year, there will be many new clubs as well as many new faces but there will also be a number of both teams and players that will be familiar from other years.

A GAME EVERY NIGHT

According to the schedule there will be at least one game on tap for followers of this league on every night from Monday through to Friday.

Monday's opening night program calls for Windsor Spitfires—a team which, incidentally, is made up largely of fellows who played for the Spitfires junior hockey team which made such a big hit with local fans last winter—to clash with Slovak Terriers at Stodgell Park; Windsor Merchants to test their strength against the title-holding H.M.C.S. Hunter gang at Prince Edward School diamond and Arcade club to play St. Therese at Dugal diamond.

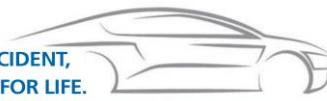

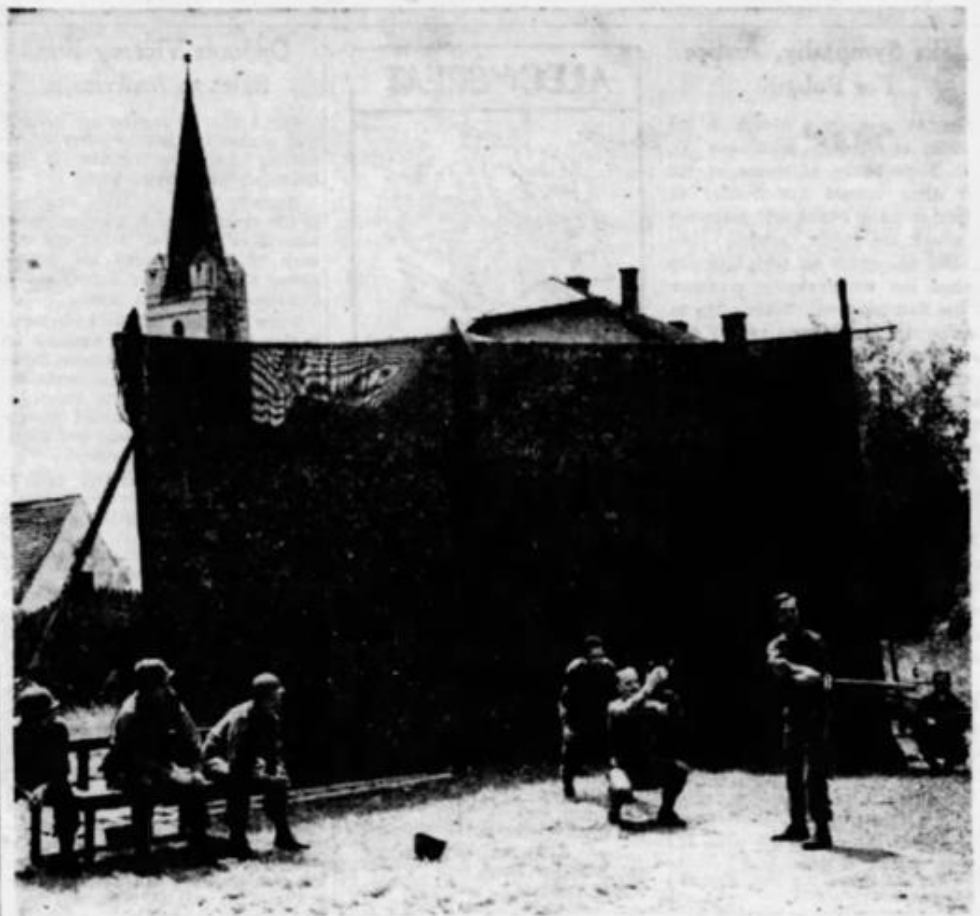

Next in line, is Bernard Steer, of the Immaculate Conception Baseball team, hitting a long one out while Catcher Dewey Grant of the Jackson Park

team wins at the blow. Insert is Ray Ryan, a leading hurler in the Baseball League, who throws a hard, fast one for Jackson Park. Note the follow through. Back to the Midgets again, Jimmy McGarvey, looking like a big leaguer, watches the flight of a solid hit just before dropping his hat to run round the bases. Behind the mask is Bill McLean of the Wilson Park team. The umpire is Doug Turner, one of the Playground Association's supervisors.



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Playground League Plays Big Part In Boy's Life

He couldn't have measured any more than 45 inches from the soles of his "sneakers" to the top of the baseball cap which crowned his shock of red hair. When he spotted The Star's photographer and reporter, his freckled face pouted.

"We came here to play ball," he grumbled, sticking out his lower lip. "Come on!" he hollered to the pitcher. "Strike him out. He can't hit."

This young member of the Windsor Playground Association's Midget Softball League was obviously much too busy to waste his time on such foolishness as taking pictures. And the same can be said for the others, who showed definitely more interest in their game than in having their pictures taken.

The Windsor Playground Association, which has been operating ever since 1937, has four ball leagues under its guidance now. This year, there is a five-team girls' softball league, an eight-team junior boys' softball league, a nine-team junior boys' baseball league, and a ten-team midget boys' softball league. Juniors are 16 or under, while midgets go by height, 58 inches or under.

The schedule, which has been going since July 10, is a heavy one. In the past week, for instance, 32 games were played. The regular schedule will be completed August 17. On August 20, the semi-final begins in each group. This will consist of sudden-death games between pairs of the top four teams. The final in each group will be played August 23 in conjunction with the annual field day and exhibition at Jackson Park. Crests will be awarded the winning teams.

There are seven boys who supervise the work in each of the city's seven large parks. They are: Jack Parry at Prince Road, E. Davis at Wilson, Doug Turner at Jackson, Ronald Weston at Memorial, Douglas Bell at Stodgell, Bill Goffield at Rossini and Bob Whitty at Lanspeary.

Baseball and softball, of course, are not the only sports that come under the Association. Horseshoe pitching, volley ball, croquet, swimming activities, track and field events, along with arts and crafts, play a big part in the work of the 23 supervisors, both boys and girls. However, the ball leagues do attract between 640 and 768 competitors.
