TORONTO — Pete Glen, outfielder-manager who has been around sandlots long enough to know, doesn't think a Canadian team ever will win the world's softball championship.

## NEVER AGAIN

One of the best mushballers ever developed in the Dominion, Pete thinks Canada had its chances but "muffed 'em." Now managing People's entry in the Beaches Fastball League, Canada's premier softball setup, he doesn't think Dominion challengers to United States supremacy will ever have similar opportunities again.

About the only chance a Canadian team had in the past, thinks the veteran Glen, would have been to line up pitchers Cam Ecclestone, Russ Johnston and Bill Durnan "in their prime" and send them down as a unit with "one of our good hitting teams."

"Now the American teams get to our type of pitching faster than we can catch on to theirs," said Pete. "They even had one team at the tournament last year who carried a Canadian-type pitcher for batting practice so that if they came up against us in the world tournament, they wouldn't be too confused."

## TWO TOGETHER

As Pete watches the thousands of Kew Beach fans defy cold Lake Ontario breezes these nights to watch his club and others in action, he finds Ecclestone and Johnston both chucking for Tip Tops, Johnston being imported from Hamilton this year. Durnan did his throwing last year for Montreal Canadiens, his hockey employers during winter months.

Major difference in American and Canadian pitching is the style of delivery and when Tip Tops introduced a Yank moundsman, Bob McCowan, last year, fans and opposition players alike continually howled that his offerings were illegal. But Bob still throws his slants the American way, even though he switched affiliation to Peoples this year.

In recent years, in world tournaments and exhibition matches, Canadian batsmen have proved almost helpless against American-style pitching, a sidearm motion as com-

pared with the regulation underhand delivery of Canadian chuckers. After a few innings U.S. teams usually find offerings of Canadian pitchers moderately easy to hit.

Most of the current crop of top flight pitchers in Toronto have been performing in senior company for 15 years or more and can hardly be rated as in their prime. There are a number of good youngsters coming up, including McCowan and Bowles' Murray Dowe, but unless the American-style of pitching is adopted, trips to world tournaments will probably continue to be just a "joyride."

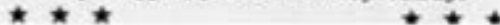
