SOFTBALL TO LEAD OFF ON TRIPLE FRONT

Six Teams to See Action Tonight in Windsor's Top Circuit

This city's major softball circuit, the Windsor League, officially opens its 1948 season tonight with a full schedule of three games slated to get under way at 6:30 o'clock sharp.

FACES DAYUS

Branch 12 will face Dayus Roofers at Mitchell Park. Birks Jewelers will meet Union Men's Shop at Wilson Park, and Meretsky and Gitlin will clash with Grayson Jewelers at Lanspary Park No. 2 to pry the lid off the new season, a season which promises to be the biggest and best in recent years.

The Windsor League this year had as its president a man who needs no introduction to local sport fans, Murrel (Eagle) Reid. The vice-president is Gordon (Sox) Henwood, while the secretary-treasurer is the ever-capable Howard Campbell.

Reid is taking over the guiding reins of the league this year after several years on coaching the Meretsky and Gitlin club in the loop.

Six teams compose this year's loop, namely, Branch 12, Dayus Roofers, Birks Jewelers, Union Men's Shop, Grayson Jewelers, and Meretsky and Gitlin. Two of the clubs, Branch 12 and Union Men's Shop are new to the league, but the other four were on hand during last year's title chase.

Birks Jewelers, last year's champion, is again managed by Don McDonald who has a number of players from his 1947 squad on hand, including the star pitcher, Gerry Parent.

WATKINS AT HELM

Dayus Roofers is managed by Pat Watkins, and Meretsky and Gitlin by Joe Grondin, both clubs also having a number of holdover players from last year.

Grayson Jewelers is this year managed by "Boots" Gibbs who played with Birks last year. He has assembled what is recognized as "the team to beat" with the majority of his players coming from the Industrial League. Harry Zalba, Steve Zepka and Alex Clark are three of his star performers with Zalba and Zepka members of last year's Long Manufacturing championship team of the Industrial League and Alex Clark, former Bendix star and the Industrial League's batting champion for 1947.

Don Dwelska, star pitcher for Meretsky and Gitlin last year and one of the leading Windsor League moundsmen, is also with the club. Union Men's Shop is being handled by Jeff Hillier, another softballer who needs no introduction locally.

DOUBLED UP

His team features the combined squads of Savill Frigidaires and Windsor Merchants who operated as separate Windsor League teams last year.

Branch 12 fills out the list of clubs.

This team won the Canadian Legion Softball League title for the past two seasons and with the announcement that the Legion League had folded up, immediately joined the ranks of the Windsor League.

Jimmy Farmer, Freddie Bolter and Walter Lake are the pitching stars of this club which again is being managed by Elmer Bauer.

Over all, the league is balanced better than it had been since before the last war.

Two other of the city's leading softball loops, the Industrial League and Fraternity League, are expected to open later this week.

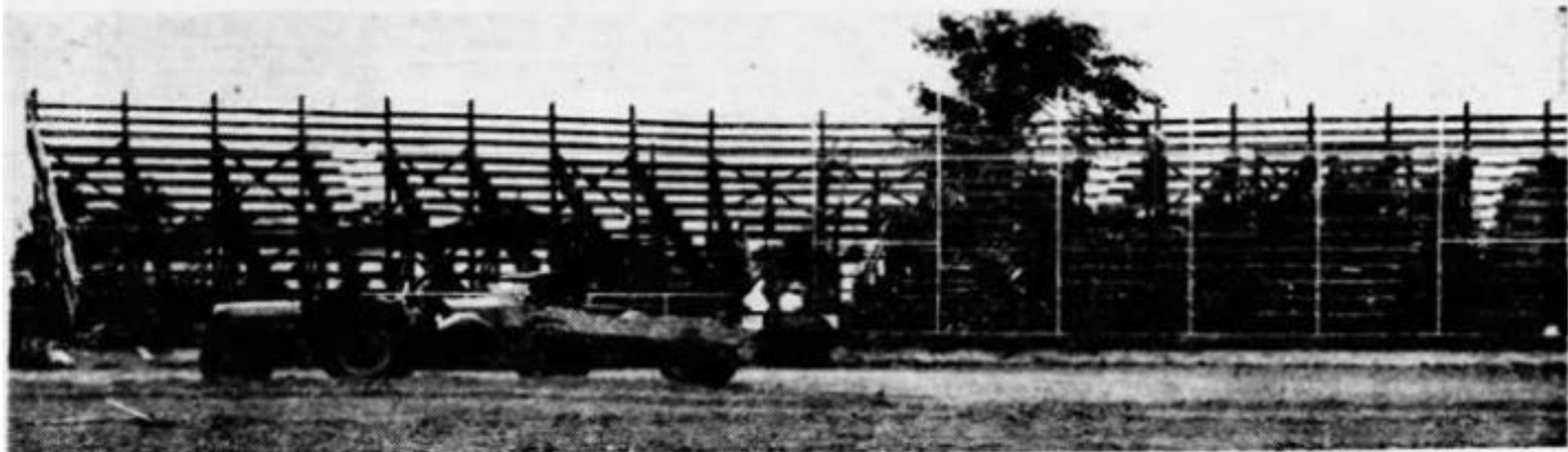

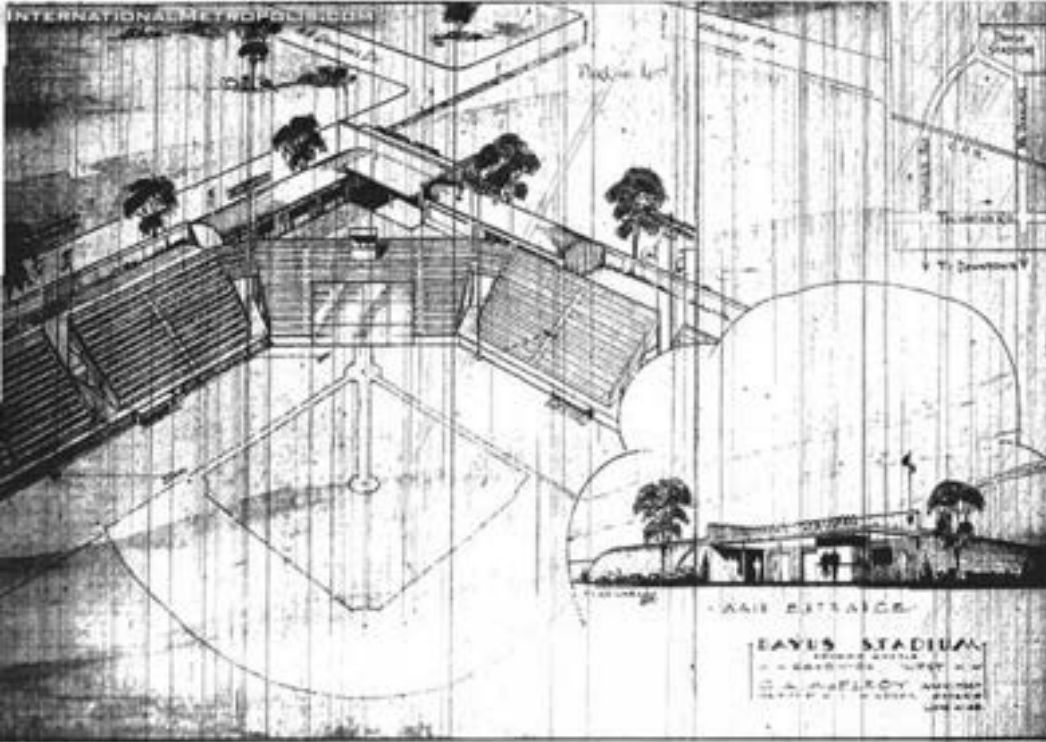
