Hillier Appointed Manager of Fastball Roofers Nine New Pep by Jeff Is Hope of Dayus

Jesse Corona Resigns After Club Wins Three in 10 Starts

Jeff Hillier has been appointed manager of Dayus Roofers, local entry in the National Fastball League.

Veteran 31-year-old shortstop with Frank Dayus' fast-ball crew succeeds Jesse Corona who tendered his resignation as Windsor pilot at a meeting of club officials last night.

BACK IN FIGHT

Dayus, in making the announcement, told The Star that he thinks that Hillier will get the Roofers back in the thick of the fight for the National Fastball League championship.

(Dayus club has won only three games in ten starts this season and stand in the league cellar).

"Hillier will give our club some class and a lot more hustle," Dayus said last night. "We've lacked fight right from the start. This has shown up in all of our games. We lost some games that we could easily have won with a little more hustle."

"I figure that Jeff (Hillier) will keep the boys on their toes. He's a great ball player and in the past has proven first class as a softball manager."

Dayus went on to pay tribute to Jesse Corona who took over the managership of the local club at the start of this season.

"DIDN'T FIT"

"Jesse is a fine fellow, a good manager. For some reason, however, he didn't fit in just right with our club. He couldn't get the boys pepped up for the job that has to be done. I don't like to change managers during the middle of the season, but this change had to be made. I think that we'll get rolling now."

Hillier is rated as one of the best softball and baseball players in the city. He's been probably the best shortstop Windsor has seen for many years.

He played baseball with Royal Windsor Garage before the war, and returned after four years in the Canadian Army to Russ Nantais' American Auto Wreckers club.

FORMER RYANCRETE

He last played baseball with Ryancretes when that team won the Detroit Amateur Baseball Federation Class "A" championship in 1948.

As a softball player, Hillier first gained prominence when he patrolled shortstop for the old Bayer Aspirin team in the Windsor Softball League.

After the war, he played with T. W. Savill in the Windsor League.

In 1948, he was player-manager of Union Men's Shop club in the Windsor League. He guided that team to the league championship.

Last year, he started the season with Union Men's Shop, but joined the Windsor Jets at mid-season.

BEST IN LEAGUE

National League officials rate Hillier one of the best shortstops in the league and one of the most dangerous hitters in the circuit.

In ten games played by the current edition of the Windsor team, Hillier has been a standout, both afield and at the plate.

Hillier told The Star last night that he hoped he could get the Roofers back in winning form.

"We've lacked hustle in our games to date and dropped some tough ball games. With a couple of breaks, we might have won three or four of the seven games we lost. I think that the Windsor team, as it stands right now, will win a lot of ball games this year and will be right in the thick of the fight for league championship."

When asked about any possible player changes, Hillier said.

THOMAS TO OUTFIELD

"I think that I'll shift Freddie Thomas to the outfield and bring in Gord Haidy to play first base. The shift will make better ball players out of both of them. I also plan to use Haidy as a pitcher again. He can win some games for us like he did last year."

Hillier also announced that he plans to scout around the various softball leagues in the city for some "new finds."

"I think that there are one or two kids around town right now who would fit into the fastball picture perfectly. I have a couple of players in mind right now, and will ask them to come out for the club shortly."

AT DETROIT TONIGHT

Hillier will pilot Roofers this evening when they meet Detroit Jerry Lynch in a doubleheader program at Vlasic Park in the Motor City.

Next home games for Roofers will be against Midland Dow Chemical Friday evening.

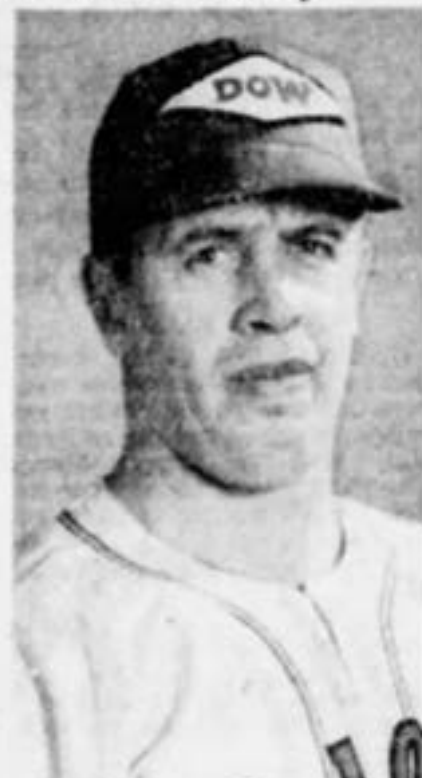

Ed Harrison made a beautiful running catch of George Grant's line drive to left centre field in the seventh inning.

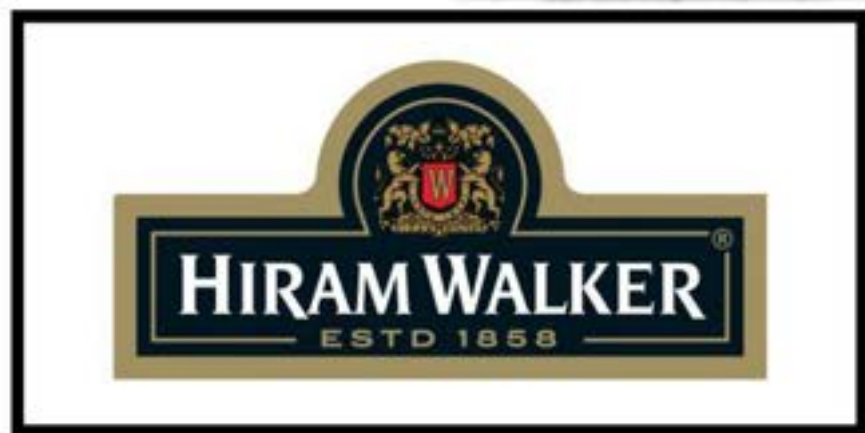

INCREASE PROMISED

Yankee Scout Roy Meyers inked Casanova to a pact which the hard-hitting centrefielder said was "excellent" and which contained arrangements for better educational facilities than were set up in offers from several other major league organizations.

Bonus limit for signing a triple "A" contract is \$6,000. Casanova admitted that he received the limit with an agreement for "wonderful salary increase the following year."

Signing of the Patterson High School youth climaxed a two-year-period of speculation as to his pro baseball career which became open to bidding in June when Willie completed high school education. Major league representatives are not permitted to approach high school athletes.

Since that time, Casanova had received offers in addition to the Yankees, from Detroit Tigers, Cleveland Indians, Boston Red Sox, Philadelphia Phillies, St. Louis Cardinals and both Chicago clubs.

Casanova said that the Boston and Cleveland offers were more tempting financially than New York's, but that they did not fit in with his plans for higher education. Casanova is anxious to obtain a physical education degree at Ontario College. His immediate plans are aimed at entrance to Assumption College for a general course and B.A.

Reason for delay in signing a major league contract hinged on obtaining of guardianship permission from Casanova's brother, Bruno, who currently is in the hire of the St. Louis' Cardinal organization at Duluth, Minn. Willie will be 20 in November.

OTHER SPORTS BARRED

Asked whether the contract would curtail his activities in

other sports, Casanova said, "It sure will. I guess football is out for good. I'm not supposed to play basketball either, but would certainly like to do a little next winter."

Casanova made the All-City football squad in 1947 and 1948 as a triple threat backfielder with Patterson. Playing only a fraction of the 1949 season, he was ineligible for All-City nomination. He played one year junior and two years senior with Patterson's basketball crew at a guard position.

GOOD WEIGHT MAN

Willie's endeavors in field competition brought him Ontario and WOSSA intermediate discus records—a heave of 121'4", in the provincial and a mark that still stands. That was in his first year at Patterson. He also won awards in the shot put and javelin divisions.

Patterson Athletic Director Ed Dawson contends that Casanova is the greatest all 'round athlete ever to wear Panther colors.

Casanova started his baseball activities in the Mic Mac Baseball League. After two seasons in the Mic Macs and one in softball, he played for Windsor Cardinals provincial junior "A" O.B.A. champions in 1948 under Murray Bearhope and Ross Newitt and last year joined Gerry Schiller's Sterlings. A powerful homerun slugger, Willie posted a .390 batting mark with Cardinals. He hit .355 last year. When statistics were last compiled for Sterling player three weeks ago, Casanova topped the list with an average in excess of .400.

ATTENDED CAMP

Casanova attended a Yankee tryout camp at Pontiac, Mich., several weeks ago. Since then, his performance with Sterlings in D.A.B.F. competition both in Windsor and Detroit has been under close examination by Meyers and Scout Tom Greenway, the latter from New York.

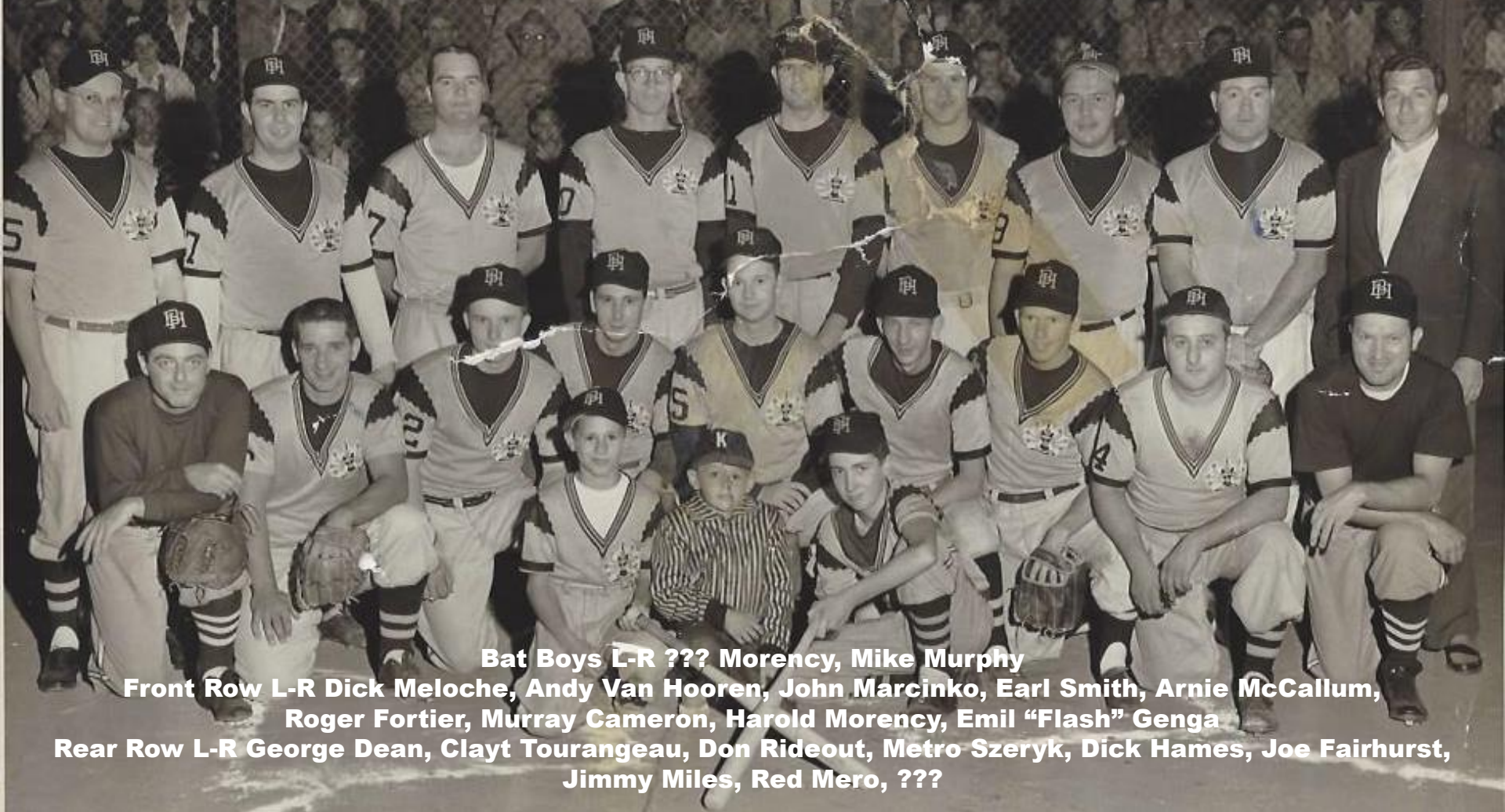
