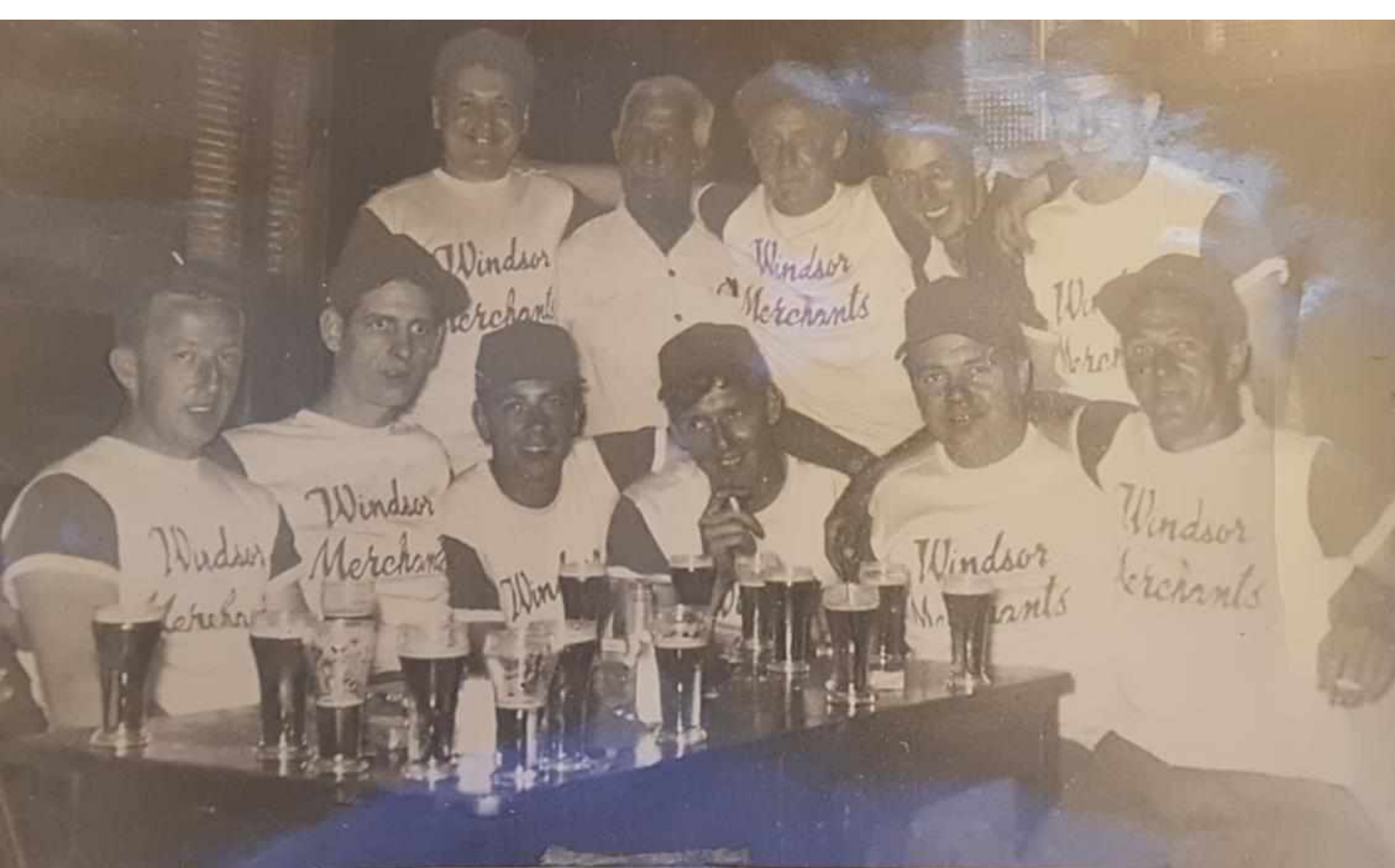

Six Teams Ready In Manufacturers' Softball Circuit

John Wyeth will play Canadian Bridge at 'Lanspeary Park. Duplate Glass will meet Colonial Tool at Wilson Park No. 1 and Canadian Bridge will tangle with Truscon Steel at Mitchell Park. All games are booked for 6 o'clock.

Wilfred Newman is back as president of the popular circuit with Joe Bucheski as vice-president and Ernie Reeves as secretary-treasurer.

Canadian Bridge rules as the defending champion and one new team will see action with Colonial Tool replacing Steelworkers.

Canadian Bridge opened its title defence in the Manufacturers' Softball League last night by registering an easy 10-4 victory over Truscon Steel at Mitchell Park. Firemen, Kane's Meet in Opener

Defending Champion Walkers Face Twist Drill Wednesday

The Windsor League, the city's top-ranking senior softball circuit, pries the lid off its 1955 season Tuesday evening when Fire Department entertains Len Kane's Clothes at Stodgell Park No. 1 starting at 5:45 o'clock.

The remainder of the teams in the six-team circuit will open their schedules on Wednesday evening with Hiram Walkers, the defending champions, facing Dominion Twist Drill at Lenspeary Park and Canadian Sirocco hooking up with St. Anne's at Wilson Park No. 1.

Each team will play 20 games, meeting each of its five rivals four times on a home-and-home basis. The entire 60-game slate will wind up on Monday, July 25, and the first four teams will qualify for the post-season playoffs.

A revamped executive will guide the destinies of the league. Gordon Fuller has taken over as president with Ken Fathers in the seat as vice-president. Jack Davenport continues as secretary-treasurer. Mayor Michael Patrick, a one-time softball pitching great in the area, and Archie Green serve on the board of directors.

Hiram Walkers, Dominion Twist Drill, Fire Department and Canadian Sirocco are hold-over teams from last year's Centennial League. The Kovak Bros. and Fraser Lumber teams have disbanded while West End, which lost out to Walkers in the championship series, has switched to Len Kane's Clothes livery. St. Anne's, an all-junior team featuring players under 21 years of age, fills out the league.

Following is a rundown on the six title hopefuls:

HIRAM WALKERS

Ross Newitt is back at the helm of last year's champions. He'll share catching honors with Ron Hunt while Don MacEwan, Ben Irimescu and Cal Pearson are booked for mound duty. The No. 1 infield will probably consist of Knobby Gilbert at first, Earl Smith at second, Bob Wylupek at shortstop and George Grant at third. Billy Boyce is available for utility duty. In the starting outfield, there'll be Bill Ritzer, "Lefty" Garant and Nick Sajatovich with Will Magone, Joe Ashley and Don Long on the reserve list.

DOMINION TWIST DRILL

Gerry Parent will pilot the Twist Drill team which won the 1954 Ontario Amateur Softball Association Senior "A" title. He'll alternate between the pitching mound and second base positions. George Fryer, Andy Valcke, Bill Chudyk and Wally Parent are also signed for mound duty with Leo Delorenzi and Wally Tonkins scheduled to share the catching chores. In the infield, Parent has such featured performers as Gus Angus (3b), Ossie Davies (ss), Don Penney (3b), Bobby Sawyer (2b), Bruno Casanova (ss) and Joe Fairhurst (1b) available for action. In the outer garden, Emil (Flash) Genga, Gord Waffle, Vic Camlin, Vince Cassidy and Don Rideout are battling it out for starting assignments.

FIRE DEPARTMENT

Not too many new faces are noticeable on the Fire Department team which will be bossed by Francis Langlois. Paul Langlois and Jack Gregg are likely to split the bulk of the pitching chores with the ever-reliable Norm Callery behind the bat. The starting infield will probably find Lorne Renaud at first base, Gerry Dawson at second, Harry Soumis at shortstop and Lawrence 'Hap' Reaume at third. Jack Pacey, Dan Danyluk and Chuck Maxim will patrol the outfield. Also, on the roster are Jim Schroll, Ed Semeniuk, Keith Johnson, Eddie Steele and Will Lauron.

CANADIAN SIROCCO

Manager Al Brightmoor has assembled a vastly improved team from the one which finished in last place one year ago. Harry Zalba and Nick Belchuk, two veterans, will do the pitching with Jim Mousseau and George Booth available behind the bat. The starting infield unit shapes up like Albert Deluca or Ted Zalba at first base, Eaton Jones at second, Carl Evon at shortstop and Earl Keyes, the

most valuable player in the Ford Office League last season, at third. Jock Papineau is Brightmoor's best utility infielder. Vieing for the three outfield berths are Andy Sokol, Steve Sobocan, Bill Bridgeman, Steve Pataky and Milt Spendlove. Frank Dikan and Mark Tourangeau have retired from active duty to handle the coaching reins.

KANE'S CLOTHES

Harry Dowhan will field a formidable outfit, headed by Gord (Wild Man) Haidy, the league's No. 1 pitcher last season. Ken Arrowsmith, former Twist Drill moundsman, is also available for full-time pitching duty and Walter Pawlyshyn is on the roster as a pitcher-outfielder. Dick Meloche will handle the catching duties. The No. 1 infield unit is expected to find Stan Pinkowski at first base, Norm Adam at second, Tommy Simpson at shortstop and Gordon Plenderleith at third. Lou Nadin, Mel Dunn and either Chris Artinian or Murray Cameron will patrol the outfield. Also signed up for the club for utility duty are Abbie Scott and Ken Brooks.

ST. ANNE'S

This all-junior outfit is coached by Adam Armbruster. Bob Deehan, Bob Reid and Harry Hawkins will pitch for the club with Lou Dunn behind the bat. Larry Parent (1b), Dick Renaud (2b), George Mahler (ss) and Bud Whealan (3b) will serve as the No. 1 infield quartet with the Church team while Al Alofs, Medo Martinello and George Scane will be in the outfield. Tom Couvineau and Gerry Bocchini are available for utility duty.

Twist Drill Pulls To First Place Tie By Dumping Sirocco, 11-7

Gord Haidy, trigger-tempered pitcher-catcher with Len Kane's Men's Wear, has been "indefinitely suspended" by the Windsor Softball League following his attack on George Grant, bespectacled Hiram Walker's third baseman, during last night's Kane's-Walkers' contest at Shore Acres Park.

Haidy attacked Grant after the Walker's player had bowled him over during a home-plate scramble in the sixth inning of the game. Grant's eye glasses were shattered during the scuffle but he suffered no serious injury. Haidy, mobbed by Grant's irate teammates for moments after the incident, was ejected from the game by Umpire Bert Upham.

The banishment results in an automatic one-game suspension for Haidy. The league executive will meet over the weekend to look further into the case and hand out additional punishment if it is deemed necessary.

Walkers, defending champions of the league, won the contest by a 6-2 margin to snap a five-game losing streak. The loss dropped Kane's into a first-place tie with Dominion Twist Drill which trimmed Canadian Sirocco, 11-7, at Wilson Park. Kane's and Twist Drill both boast 9-2 records to stand two games ahead of the third-place Sirocco squad. Walkers stands four games off the pace.

The Haidy-Grant hassle occurred in the last half of the sixth with the bases loaded and the score tied at 1-1.

Knobby Gilbert lifted a high fly ball to Lou Nadin in left field and Don MacEwan, Walkers' pitcher, scored after the catch. Grant, who was on second base at the time, moved over to third as Nadin fired the ball to Haidy, who was catching, in futile attempt to nail MacEwan.

When Grant ran past third base and threatened to break for the plate, Haidy snapped a throw to Third Baseman Gord Plenderleith. Grant, rather than retreat to the third sack, broke for the plate and bowled over Haidy who was taking the return throw from Plenderleith some six feet down the line.

The two players wound up in a wild tangle at home plate as the ball rolled away from Haidy. Haidy quickly turned to Grant and belted him in the face, shattering his glasses. Before any further blows were struck, the Hiram Walkers' bench emptied and Haidy was manhandled away from the plate. Umpire Upham, who had called Grant safe on the

play and viewed Haidy's attack from close range, promptly ordered him from the game.

The fired-up Walkers went on to score one more run before the inning ended, making it three runs in the inning, all told. They bolstered their lead with two more markers in the seventh.

Only one of the eight runs scored in the game was earned as MacEwan bested Ken Arrow-smith in a tight pitching duel. Each team collected seven hits, the longest of which were doubles from the bats of Haidy and Gilbert.

Dominion Twist Drill got a 4-1 jump on Sirocco in the first inning and never looked back. All told, the Twist Drillers pounded out 15 hits. Pitcher Bill Chudyk pacing his own victory with four singles in as many trips to the plate.

Gord Waffle and Joe Fairhurst tagged Nick Belchuk and Harry Zalba for three hits each. Home-runs were clouted by Mike Robert, Gus Angus and Fairhurst. Earl Keyes connected for three hits in four tries for Sirocco and Steve Sobocan hit a homerun in the losing cause.

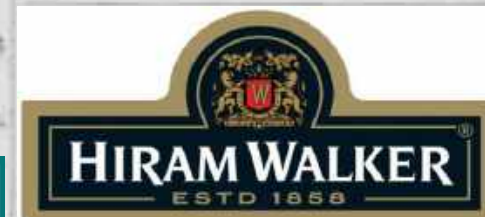

Haidy Banned Again, Six Games This Time

The Windsor Softball League has handed its "problem child," Gord Haidy, pitcher-catcher for Len Kane's Men's Wear, a stiff six-game suspension as an aftermath of Haidy's unprovoked attack on George Grant of Hiram Walkers during Friday's league fixture at Shore Acres Park between Kane's and Walkers.

The suspension becomes effective immediately and Haidy will sit out tonight's game between Kane's and Dominion Twist Drill at Lanspeary Park. He is also barred from sitting on his team's bench during its next six games and must not attempt to take even an indirect part in any of those games.

At the same time, the league executive issued a stern warning to Haidy that any further improper conduct following his scheduled return to action on Friday, July 15, will result in automatic banishment for the balance of the season, including playoffs.

The executive also decreed that Haidy's club must pay in full the cost of repairs to Grant's eye glasses which were shattered in the mix-up.

In addition to tonight's contest, Haidy will sit out the following games: Canadian Sirocco (July 6), Fire Department (July 7), Canadian Sirocco (July 8), St. Anne's (July 11) and Hiram Walkers (July 13).

In announcing Haidy's six-game ban, the league executive emphasized that there can be no appeal.

Evidence presented before the executive in special session yesterday afternoon proved that Haidy was guilty of a deliberate attack against Grant. It showed that Grant, trapped between

third and home on a hot-box play, had broken for the plate in an attempt to score and had run in to Haidy, who was catching at the time, about six feet from the plate.

Both players tumbled to the diamond and the ball, which Haidy had received from Third-baseman Gordon Plenderleith, rolled away from him. Then, while Haidy was getting to his feet, he intentionally kned Grant in the face and made an attempt to kick him.

Grant's glasses were shattered, but he suffered no serious physical injury. Haidy was mobbed by irate Hiram Walker players who left their bench, but the spontaneous outburst was quickly broken up by Umpires Bert Upham and Percy Godfrey and the rival managers, Harry Dowhan of Kane's and Ross Newitt of Walkers.

Dowhan and Newitt gave their versions of the incident at the meeting. The official reports of Umpires Upham and Godfrey were also heard. The executive was then closeted to rule on the case and the verdict was reached in less than 15 minutes.

President Gordon Fuller, in announcing the six-game suspension, commented:

"Haidy had been found guilty of deliberately attempting to injure another player, George Grant. The evidence proved this without a shadow of a doubt and we are suspending him for six games effective immediately. The league executive hopes this suspension will serve as a warning to Haidy and all other players in the league that we will not tolerate any disorderly conduct in any of its games.

Haidy's record in the Windsor League has been a bad one and we could possibly have suspended him for more than six games. However, taking his teammates into consideration and the fact that Haidy's absence will seriously hurt their bid for the league championship and a berth in the O.A.S.A. Senior "A" playoffs, it was decided that the six

game ban would be sufficient at this time.

"We are warning Haidy, however, that any further improper conduct in any league or playoff game will result in an automatic suspension for the balance of the season."

The suspension is Haidy's second of the season. He was ejected from his team's second game against Dominion Twist Drill for taking part in a brief fistie flare-up and drew the automatic one-game suspension at that time. He was suspended on two occasions last season, too, once for a period of five games.

Sirocco Keeps Pace With 8-2 Victory Over St. Anne's

Dominion Twist Drill, which relinquished first place in the Windsor Softball League to Len Kane's Men's Wear nine days ago, is back in the circuit's top spot.

10TH IN 12 TRIES

Last night at Lanspeary Park, Twist Drill avenged last week's 5-4 loss to Len Kane's nine by edging the Clothiers, 2-1, in a real thriller. It was the 10th triumph in 12 starts for the defending O.A.S.A. Senior "A" champions. Kane's has won nine of its 12 outings.

Third-place Canadian Sirocco kept pace with Twist Drill by trimming last-place St. Anne's, 8-2, at Shore Acres Park and fourth-place Hiram Walkers, the loop's defending champions, remained close at the heels of Sirocco by edging Fire Department, 1-0, at Stodgell Park.

Only four games separate the top four teams in the standing.

TODAY'S Windsor League standing finds Len Kane's in first place with a 13-4 record. Twist Drill, held to a 5-5 tie by Fire Department last night while Kane's was nipping Walkers, 3-1, stands half-a-game back of the Clothiers with a 12-4 mark.

Thus, the winner of tomorrow night's tussle will not only be in first place but also will win the district O.A.S.A. crown, if the first-place team declines the bid to go into the provincial championship chase, then the second-place team will get the nod.

We understand, however, that both Kane's and Twist Drill definitely intend to go O.A.S.A. if they qualify. So, tomorrow night's game should be a dandy.

HAIDY finds himself "on the spot" as he rejoins Kane's nine for his first action in 21 days. He's strictly on probation as far as President Gordon Fuller and the rest of the Windsor League executive are concerned. That group has warned him that any further improper conduct, resulting in his ejection from a game, will automatically bring on a further suspension for the balance of the season.

Sports Chatter

IT will be another couple of months or more before the various softball and baseball leagues in the district conclude their activities for the 1935 campaign. Even at this early date, however, followers of the diamond sports can't complain for any lack of "action."

By "action," of course, we are referring to the numerous protests, suspensions, shushes and zany plays which have cropped up in recent weeks.

For those readers who have overlooked some of the goings-on, here's a brief review of the "action."

Headline event on the softball front was the six-game suspension which the Windsor League handed to its problem child, Gord (Wild Man) Haldy, late last month after Haldy deliberately attacked George Grant of Hiram Walkers during a Walkers-Len Kane's Men's Wear fixture at Shore Acres Park.

Earlier, Haldy, along with teammate Dick Meloche and Vince Cassidy of Dominion Twist Drill had sat out one game each following a brief fistic flareup in a league game at the same diamond.

THEN, there was that one run which Dominion Twist Drill "lost" last week during a contest against Fire Department at Wilson Park. Twist Drill actually scored the run during a rare doubleplay situation, but Umpire Chuck King and Scorer Bob Butterfield didn't allow it to be counted.

Twist Drill immediately filed a protest and a couple of days later, the Windsor League executive gave back the run to the Drillers.

Still more recently, Canadian Sirocco, another Windsor League team, saw two would-be runs disappear from its record in a game against Len Kane's Men's Wear when Umpire Steve Sampson called a Sirocco base-runner out for leaving a base too soon after a pitch.

Here was a play that isn't called by an umpire more than once or twice during an entire season and usually has little effect on the outcome of a game. This time, however, it stirred up a hornet's nest of debate and Sirocco Pitcher Harry Zalba was thumbed out for at least a one-game suspension.
