

Gord Haidy Suspended Following Home-Plate Fracas from close range, promptly order-Geo. Grant Attacked

As Walkers Win, 6-2

Twist Drill Pulls To First Place Tie By Dumping Sirocco, 11-7







Senior "A" crown.

TODAY'S Windsor League standing finds Len Kane's in first place with a 13-4 record, Twist Drill, held to a 5-5 tie by Fire Department last night while Kane's was nipping Walkers, 3-1, stands half-a-game back of the Clothiers with a 12-4 mark.

Thus, the winner of tomorrow night's tussle will not only be in first place but also will win the district O.A.S.A. erown, if the first-place team declines the bid to go into the provincial championship chase, then the second-place team will get the nod.

We understand, however, that both Kane's and Twist Drill definitely intend to go O.A.S.A. if they qualify. So, tomorrow night's game should be a dandy.

LIAIDY finds himself "on the spot" as he rejoins Kane's nine for his first action in 21 days. He's strictly on probation as far as President Gordon Fuller and the rest of the Windsor League executive are concerned. That group has warned him that any further improper conduct, resulting in his ejection from a game, will automatically bring on a further suspension for the balance of the season.

With every other player in the league expected to "needle" him as soon as he returns to competition, Haidy faces a supreme test. He must keep out of serious trouble-or else-and for Haidy, who has long been noted as an athlete who just has to blow his top once in a while, this is going to take plenty of willpower.

We hope for the sake of the league, his team and sponsor, Len Kane, that the "Wild Man" can keep his nose clean for the balance of the schedule and playoffs. The Clothiers have an excellent chance of winning the championship but the loss of Haidy again would considerably dampen their ambitions.

IT'S interesting to note that the Kane's team didn't fare too badly while Haidy was sitting out his banishment. With Ken Arrowsmith pitching all the way in all six games, the present loop leaders won four games and lost two.

Arrowsmith, who must rate as one of the city's top peggers when he gets an opportunity to toe the rubber regularly, certainly didn't let his teammates down. In winming games from Canadian Sirocco, Fire Department, St. Anne's and Walkers, he yielded a total of only 15 hits-less than four kits per game. He was tagged for 10 safetics while dropping a 2-1 decision to Twist Drill and for 12 hits while bowing to Sirocco, 7-1.

That's only 37 hits in those six games-slightly more than six hits per game. He struck out 46 batters over that span and walked but 12.
