Mercury Sheet Metal Nine Folds; Circuit in Danger of Doing Same

The future of the Windsor Softball League is once again in jeopardy.

A proposed Mercury Sheet Metal entry in the city's only senior softball circuit suddenly folded up Thursday, leaving the league with just three entries for the 1957 season which was supposed to open on Friday night, May 24.

Although its entry fee was not paid at the league's May 1st meeting, Monty Reynolds, a representative of the Mercury Sheet Metal team, gave his assurance that his team would operate. Earlier, Len Kane's (the 1955 and 1956 champions), American Standard Products and Marcel's Service had paid their entry fees, and definitely joined the fold.

Reynolds, who contacted the league's Board of Governors Thursday afternoon, declared that Mercury Sheet Metal was not able to field a team because it was unable to line up any senior-calibre pitching. The team, featuring many well-known hockey players, including National Leaguers Glen Skov and Johnny Wilson and

The team, featuring many well-known hockey players, including National Leaguers Glen Skov and Johnny Wilson and several members of the Windsor Bulldogs, had been practicing twice a week since the end of April.

League officials maintain that the league will not operate with fewer than four teams. Russ Nantais, a member of the loop's Board of Governors, expressed doubt that any additional teams could be lured into the fold at this late date.

However, Nantais announced that he would still attempt to line up another team to replace the Mercurys. It is possible that Amherstburg, which showed earlier interest in the Windsor League, may be ap-

proached again about a possible entry.

Nantais, after a conference with other members of the Board of Governors, declared that the league will probably disband unless another team files an entry before next Wednesday night, May 15.

Prior to the withdrawal of the Mercury Sheet Metal entry,

league officials had obtained playing diamonds for the 1957 season and had drawn up a 42-game schedule, subject for approval at a scheduled May 15th meeting.

The Windsor League has operated since 1954. Earlier, the league was forced to disband in 1952 for two seasons because of a lack of entries.

Hiram Walkers will face John Wyeth at Lanspeary Park and Duplate will oppose Canadian Bridge at Wilson Park. Both games will start at 6 o'clock.

Peewee Softball League Expanded To Ten Outfits

Due to the number of boys wishing to play in the new branch 143 Canadian Legion Peewee Softball League, the circuit has been expanded to 10 teams.

The loop will operate on three Bridgeview Park diamonds, two at Prince of Wales School and one diamond at Prince Rd. and Wilson Parks.

All teams have filled their quota with boys 13 and under by June 30. Schedule will open June 11 and playoffs will start after August 16.

Teams and their coaches are as follows: Maple Leafs, Jim Moore; Royals, Fred Preston; Canadiens, George Lord; Bulldogs, George Ford; Bombers, Earl Butler; Flyers, Alex Dimitroff; Eskimos, Tom Abrash and Spitfires, Percy Logan. Beavers' and Rockets' coaches will be announced shortly as only last night was decision made to expand the loop to 10 clubs.

The ranks of the Manufacturers' League has been reduced to four teams this season. Six teams operated in the loop one year ago but Truscon Steel, Motor Products and Purity Dairies have withdrawn. Hiram Walkers, which performed in the Windsor League in '56, has entered the circuit as the only new team.

Joe Grondin's Duplate nine again looks like the team to beat. Last season, Duplate rolled to the championship by posting a terrific 24-1 record for all games, including the playoffs. The 1956 champions piled up 18 consecutive victories before tasting defeat.

Orvil Champagne will pilot the Hiram Walkers team, Pete Topolie will manage the John Wyeth entry and John Bucheski will be at the helm of Canadian Bridge.

The league is again operating in the expert hands of President Wilf Newman, Vice-President Merl Evon and Secretary Ernie Reeves.

Duplate Continues Where It Left Off

Manufacturers' Champs Triumph, 4-2, Over Bridge in Opener

Duplate, which piled up 24 victories in 25 games while winning the 1956 Manufacturers' Softball League championship, launched the 1957 campaign on a triumphant note last night at Wilson Park.

Joe Grondin's defending champions stopped Canadian Bridge, 4-2, in the only game on the inaugural program.

The scheduled fixture between Hiram Walkers and John Wyeth at Lanspeary Park had to be postponed because of wet grounds.

Don Renaud, backed by errorless fielding, hurled five-hit ball for Duplate, striking out seven and walking none. The Duplate team collected 10 safeties off Mel McCartney who fanned three and walked one.

Each team collected two runs in the third inning.

Mike Russ connected for a two-run double for Bridge to score McCartney and Ron Bell who had singled. In the last half of the same inning, Gene Renaud tripled, rode home on Medo Martinello's double but Martinello was thrown out trying to stretch the hit into a three-bagger. Don Ethier then socked a bases-empty homerun to tie the score.

After four and one-half scoreless innings, Duplate won the game with a pair of runs in the last half of the eighth.

Willie Ulicny tripled and scored on Gord Bacon's outfield fly. Al Zdonek took two bases on Joe Matz's error and scored on Ben Glaude's single.

Five Squads Enter City's Top League

Sheet Metal, 'Burg Softballers Save Loop From Disbanding

The Windsor Softball League is back in business again. Two last-minute entries by Mercury Sheet Metal and Amherstburg have swelled the league's enrollment to five teams, the same number of teams that performed in the circuit in 1956, and the schedule will open next Friday night, May 24, with a pair of games.

Len Kane's, the 1955 and 1956 champions, will face American Standard Products at Wilson Park No. 1 while Mercury Sheet Metal will oppose Marcel's Service at Lanspeary Park.

The following night, Kane's will visit Amherstburg for a flood-light fixture.

The city's only senior softball league was faced with the grim prospect of disbanding after a proposed entry by Mercury Sheet Metal folded up one week ago. The unexpected withdrawal, coming just after league officials had drawn up a 42-game schedule for four teams, left the loop with only three teams and it was decided to disband the circuit if another team wasn't found.

Amherstburg, which had approached the Windsor League earlier about a possibly entry, finally joined the fold and Mercury Sheet Metal also returned after receiving permission from the league's Board of Governors and rival managers to import a pitcher from Detroit.

The Mercury Sheet Metal team is composed almost entirely of amateur and professional hockey players from Windsor and district, including National Leaguers Glen Skov and Johnny Wilson and several Windsor Bulldogs.

A new schedule, which will call for each team to play 20 games, is now being drawn up. The league will operate locally every Monday, Wednesday and Friday evenings. Amherstburg

The schedule is expected to be completed by the end of July and the first four teams will qualify for the post-season playoffs. None of the Windsor League teams intend to enter the Ontario Amateur Softball Association playoffs this summer.

Duplicate, Bridge Grab Manufacturers' Wins

Defending champion Duplicate posted its second straight victory in Manufacturers' Softball League play Thursday night by edging John Wyeth, 7-5, at Lanspeak Park.

Canadian Bridge, which had dropped a 4-2 decision to Duplicate in the season's opener on Tuesday night, bounced back to blank the new Hiram Walkers entry, 3-0, at Wilson Park in last night's other fixture.

Second Baseman Gord Bacon delivered the big blow as Duplicate spoiled John Wyeth's debut. He connected for a long three-run homerun in the second inning to climax a four-run uprising. The circuit clout gave Duplicate a commanding 6-0 lead and the champions never relinquished their advantage although outhit and outscored through the final seven and one-half innings.

Don Renaud, pitching in relief of Herman Parent, posted his second mound win while Willie Magone was tagged with the defeat.

There were almost as many errors as base hits in the tight Walkers-Bridge game which was scoreless through the first six innings. The winning Bridge brigade collected six hits off Dick Ducharme and committed four errors while Walkers poked out five hits off Jack Westlake and had five boots.

Canadian Bridge broke the scoreless tie in the seventh inning when Joe Matz singled, moved to second when Nick Sajatovich walked and scored on Frank Souilliere's throwing error after putting out Stan Coughlin. The Bridgemen bunched together three singles and two infield outs to score their final two runs in the eighth.

City's Top Softball Loop Opens Friday With Pair of Games

With a powerful Len Kane's team shooting for its third consecutive championship, the popular Windsor Softball League will lift the lid on its 60-game 1957 schedule Friday night with a pair of contests.

Kane's, which ran roughshod past all competition last season, will square off with American Standard Products (formerly Canadian Sirocco) at Wilson Park No. 1 while Mercury Sheet Metal, one of two new entries, will play Marcel's Service (formerly Dominion Twist Drill) at Lanspeary Park.

Both games will start promptly at 6 o'clock.

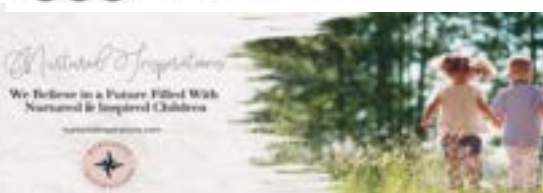
The all-star team which will face Eddie Feigner and his classy supporting cast has not yet been announced.

MSM to Protest Kane's Win

Officials of the Mercury Sheet Metal entry in the Windsor Softball League announced this morning that they are formally protesting Friday night's game against Lem Kane's at Lanspeary Park.

The protest was expected to be filed with league officials late this afternoon.

It is understood that the Mercury nine is protesting Umpire Alex Clark's decision on an appeal play in the ninth inning and the banishment of Shortstop Glen Skov by Umpire Norm Giroux following a

20-minute general melee later in the same inning.

Giroux promptly defended himself with his mask and the field was quickly jammed with players from both teams and spectators.

When order was finally restored about 20 minutes later, Glen Skov and Head were chased to the showers for their

part in the disorder. Len Parent promptly clouted a two-run home run to win the ball game for Kane's.

Earlier in the inning, before Fairhurst scored the run which tied the game at 3-3, Monty Reynolds, manager of the Mercury Sheet Metal team, was ejected from the premises for arguing too vehemently with Umpire Giroux.

League rules call for automatic one-game suspensions to be handed out to any players ejected from games. Additional penalties could be imposed if the official reports from the umpires warrant them. A special meeting of the league executive is expected early next week to rule on the protest.

Sports Chatter

AT the start of the current softball season, there was much comment about the sharp decline in the number of teams taking part in the popular summer-time diamond sport. Given as the major reason for the lesser number of teams was the lack of free-spending sponsors, individuals who would doll up their clubs in the swankiest of uniforms (including jackets and spikes), buy the best and mostest equipment and toss their money around at the slightest need.

A sponsor wasn't a "good" sponsor, especially when he was dealing with the so-called senior ball teams, unless he'd dole out at least \$750 and \$1,000 at the start of the season and guarantee to take care of any "extra expenses" which popped up as the campaign progressed.

Such sponsors were readily available for quite a few years during and after World War II. Most recently, however, the "squeeze" has been on and the wallets of these same individuals haven't been bulging with too many "loose" \$100 bills.

As a consequence, the "good" sponsors became more and more difficult to track down and the ranks of the softball teams became thinner and thinner. Virtually every league in the city started off the 1957 season with fewer teams than one year ago. That was one of the major reasons.

★ ★ ★ ★ ★

THE present standings of the Windsor League and Manufacturers' League, declared to be the city's two top softball circuits, offers another reason for the sudden acute shortage of teams. Certain teams have "loaded up" to the point where they are scaring most of the other clubs in their leagues right out of business.

In the Windsor League, for example, the mere presence of Gord Haidy on the pitching mound for Len Kane's came within an eyelash of putting the loop completely out of business. Haidy is far and away the best softball pecker this city has seen in the past decade and it's extremely difficult to lure new teams into the Windsor League to face him.

★ ★ ★ ★ ★

WHEN the Windsor League was reorganizing for the '57 season, Kane's was the only team to firmly state that it would enter the league. League officials sweated it out for over one month and had to resort to much begging and conniving before luring four hesitant rivals into the fold to face Mr. Haidy and Company.

Most of the would-be entries came up with the same old excuse: "We can't find any decent pitching." Of course, they all meant to say: "We can't find any pitching to compete with Gord Haidy."

Of course, it's still a free country and the Windsor League can't bar Haidy from its ranks. It's quite safe to say, however, that if Haidy wasn't pitching in the Windsor League, the league would have at least seven or eight entries, instead of the present five.

Kane's, today's standing shows, is undefeated in nine starts. There are many league observers who feel that the Haberdashers will roll through this season undefeated (unless something unexpected happens to their one and only mound star) and are a virtual shoo-in for a third straight league and playoff championship. They won 26 games and lost only five last season.

Marcel's Service is the only team topping the .500 mark in the Windsor League at this writing and the remaining three clubs are mired in the second division.

★ ★ ★ ★ ★

IT'S virtually the same story in the Manufacturers' League where Joe Grandin's Duplate team is running away from the pack. Despite a surprise loss to Canadian Bridge on Tuesday night, Duplate stands in a class by itself with 12 consecutive victories and that lone setback. In '56, this same team won 25 of 26 games as it steamrollered to the title.

The Bridge team is clinging to the .500 mark with a 5-5 record while two other teams aren't even in the .300 class.

Duplate, for our money, should be ready to jump into the Windsor League by next season and at least a couple of the Recreation League teams should follow suit. Of course, if Gord Haidy is still mowing down Windsor League batters in '58, they may think twice before leaving the cozy confines of their own circuits.

SPEAKING of the Recreation League, there's a softball circuit with a really red-hot pennant race and producing its share of top-calibre ball games, too. After the dust had settled on last night's action, just one game separated the top four teams in the standing. No other race in the city is as close.

Windsor Merchants, which pondered a Windsor League entry this season before returning to the Rec. loop, heads the tightly-bunched pack with a 9-3 record. St. Anne's stands in second position with an 8-3 mark while Embassy Hotel and Erie House, who are scheduled to tangle at Shore Acres Park tomorrow night, share third place with identical 8-4 records.

Erie House, like Len Kane's in the Windsor League, is gunning for a third straight title conquest, but the opposition is proving to be plenty rugged.

When the Recreation League was organized by Russ Nantals a couple of years ago, it was just as its name implies, a recreation league. By now, however, the circuit has gained stature and is threatening to succeed the Manufacturers' League as the No. 2 softball circuit in the city. In fact, some fans say that Rec. League has already advanced itself into that lofty position.

Having seen games in both circuits this season, all we can add is "could be."

DON MacEwan, who pitched with the Hiram Walkers entry in the Windsor Softball League during the 1954-55-56 seasons, attracted some ink for himself in the Toronto newspapers earlier this month.

It was brought to our attention by a friend of his that MacEwan hurled a no-run, no-hit game in the Davisville Senior Softball League, a circuit which operates in suburban Toronto. He hurled Circuline Metals to a 7-0 victory over Ticknor Volkswagen, striking out 16 batters and walking only two.

We know of two or three teams in this year's Windsor League scramble who wouldn't mind having MacEwan tossing strikes for them.

★ ★ ★ ★ ★

GORD Haidy isn't the only Windsor League pitcher with a perfect 1.000 percentage (nine victories and no defeats). It may have slipped by virtually unnoticed by some people but the veteran Gerry Parent has an unblemished 1-0 record with his Marcel's Service team.

Parent, who was a star Windsor League pecker some 10 years ago when Gord Haidy was just learning how to pitch a softball, was pressed into service last week when Andy Valche and Wally Parent, the two regular pitchers with the Marcel's Service crew, were not available for action.

"Old Man" Parent pitched Marcel's to a 5-2 victory over Anderdon Tavern of Amherstburg, allowing just eight well-scattered hits, walking only one and striking out none.

"There's some life in the old arm, yet," Parent kidded some of the Windsor League officials at a meeting last Friday night. "Maybe I'll even be a candidate for the league's best pitcher award when banquet time rolls around in the fall."

Larry Wilson Second;
Haidy Again Tops Moundsmen

Joe Fairhurst, slugging first baseman for Len Kane's, has captured the Windsor Softball League's individual batting championship for the second straight season.

And, it should come as no surprise that Gord Haidy, also of Kane's is the circuit's leading pitcher for the third straight term.

Czack led the league in total strike-outs with 243 and in bases on balls with 54. Haidy was runner-up to Czack in each department with 120 strike-outs and 42 bases on balls.

Kane's Prevails In 5th Game, 1-0

Gord Hurls One-Hitter, Facing 28, In Knockout Blow to Mercury

Gord Haidy and his hustling Len Kane's mates are still the king of Windsor League softball. Monday evening before an overflow gathering at Lanspeary Park, the Haberdashers nailed down their third consecutive Windsor League championship by shading Mercury Sheet Metal, 1-0.

Kane's captured the best-of-seven title series, 4-1, taking three straight games before the Mercurys salvaged a lone 2-1 decision in the fourth tussle.

Haidy, the mainstay of the Kane's club for the past three seasons, closed out the 1957 campaign with a masterful one-hit pitching performance. He recorded his fifth shutout in eight playoff decisions and yielded only four earned runs in the other three contests.

Don Head, Mercury Sheet Metal's notoriously weak-hitting right-fielder, robbed Haidy of a non-run, no-hit game when he led off the top half of the second inning with a clean, line-drive single into right field.

Haidy, who struck out six and didn't walk a man, faced only 28 batters. Head was erased by a double play. Jack Richards was the only other Sheet Metal player to reach first base, arriving there on Joe Fairhurst's third-inning error.

Haidy retired the last 21 batters he faced in one-two-three order. The losing pitcher was Ted Czak who yielded eight hits (his highest total since the playoffs started), struck out six and walked two. He was in trouble in five of the eight innings as his supporting cast made three errors behind him.

Czak was nicked for Kane's only run in the sixth inning but Kane's left nine runners stranded on the base paths.

In the sixth, "Flash" Genga led off with a walk. After Ken Brooks struck out, Len Parent lined out a sharp single to left, Genga stopping at second. Glen Skov fumbled the ball, however, and both runners moved up an extra base.

Earl Smith then came through with a single to left, scoring Genga but Parent was cut down at the plate on Skov's perfect throw to catcher Willie Ulicny. Dick Meloche flied out to end the inning.

Kane's stranded three runners in the first inning and two in each of the third, fifth and eighth innings.

Haidy himself was the only player on either team to collect more than one hit, going two-for-four, both singles. In fact, all nine hits in the game were for only one base.

Ulicny, a regular member of the American Standard Products team, worked behind the plate for Mercury Sheet Metal as an emergency replacement for Larry Wilson who departed for the professional hockey training camp of the Chicago Black Hawks.

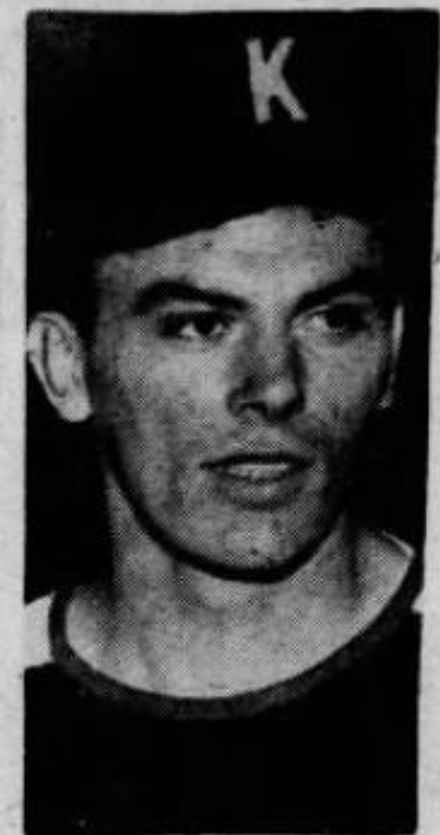

Glassmen Score By 7-2 Count

Point Anne Whipped Two Straight In Industrial 'A'

Duplate Glass captured the 1957 Ontario Amateur Softball Association Intermediate (Industrial) championship Saturday afternoon at Wilson Park by trimming Point Anne Cementmen, 7-2.

Victorious by a 6-1 score in the series opener at Point Anne last Sunday, Joe Grondin's Duplate nine scored a clean sweep in the best-of-three title series. Point Anne won the championship in both 1955 and 1956.

Duplate combined Don Renaud's steady four-hit pitching with a healthy 10-hit assault to register its title-clinching victory.

Two of the hits off Renaud, who struck out four and walked two, were of the scratch infield variety. Duplate's 10-hit attack against loser Pat Maracle was headed by Ken Brooks' two-run homerun in the seventh inning and doubles from the bats of Al Zdonek and Willie Ulicny.

Zdonek's double and a single by Ulicny vaulted Duplate into a 1-0 lead in the first inning. Then, singles by Don Ethier and Zdonek, a perfect sacrifice by Ben Glaude and a double by Ulicny upped Duplate's lead to 3-0 in the third.

Brooks' circuit clout highlighted a four-run uprising by Duplate in the seventh. Point Anne ruined Renaud's bid for a shutout by scoring its two runs in the top half of the ninth. A hit batsman, a sacrifice, an error by Zdonek and singles by Pete Green and Pat Gilmore produced these markers.

Zdonek and Ulicny were the big stick men for Duplate with three hits each in four trips. Brooks had three RBIs to his credit.

Ethier, playing first base for Duplate, turned in two sparkling fielding plays. He robbed Doug Hull of a hit in the sixth inning by making a diving pick-up of his line-drive down the first-base line and beating him to the bag. Later, in the eighth inning, he made a leaping catch of Maracle's liner and turned it into an unassisted double play.
