Manufacturers' League Opens Tuesday Evening

The Manufacturers' Softball League, embracing only four teams for the second straight year, will open its 36-game 1958 schedule Tuesday evening with a pair of games on the program.

Duplate, 1956 and 1957 champions of the circuit, will entertain Brunner Mond of Amherstburg at Lanspeary Park while Hiram Walkers will play John Wyeth at Wilson Park No. 1. Both games will start at 6 o'clock sharp.

Brunner Mond is a new team in the league this season, succeeding Canadian Bridge. Canadian Bridge, a long-time contender for

industrial softball laurels in the city, was unable to round up enough players to field a team this term.

The Manufacturers' League will play each Tuesday and Thursday evening for 18 weeks. All games, except Amherstburg's nine home dates, will be played at either Lanspeary or Wilson Parks.

Merle Evon is president of this league this season, succeeding Ernie Reeves. Orval Champagne is vice-president, succeeding John Bucheski, while Pete Topolie has taken over the post of secretary-treasurer, succeeding Wilf Newman.

Topolie, with John Wyeth, is the only holdover manager. Willie Ulicny has replaced Joe Grondin at Duplate. Pete Merschback has succeeded Orval Champagne at Walkers and Austin Jones is the pilot of Brunner Mond.

Brunner Mond of Amherstburg and John Wyeth stepped out in the right direction Tuesday night with opening night victories in the Manufacturers' Softball League.

Brunner Mond, supported by the seven-hit pitching of Gord Beetham and some big stick work by Bob Thrasher, defeated Duplate, the 1957 champion, 6-4 at Lanspeary Park.

Thrasher drove in four runs, three of them with a homer in the fourth inning. He had three hits in four trips.

Everybody Tied Up In Manufacturers'

Four Manufacturers' Softball League teams have played to a stalemate in this first week of the 1958 season.

After Hiram Walkers nosed out Brunner Mond, 6-4, at Amherstburg and Duplate drubbed John Wyeth, 10-1, at Wilson Park Thursday evening, all four clubs were left with identical 1-1 records in the standing.

All the scoring was concentrated in the last three innings of the Walkers-Brunner Mond game at Town Park in the 'Burg. Sam Sisco of the Distillers and Norm "Porky" Jones of Brunner Mond were locked in a scoreless pitching duel until the top half of the seventh inning when Walkers broke loose for three big runs.

Brunner Mond countered with two runs in its half of the seventh when Lloyd Jones unloaded a two-run homerun but Walkers increased its lead to 5-3 in the eighth and each team counted one run in the ninth.

Ron Wilson, Pete Merschback, Kiel Nantau and Sisco collected two hits each as Walkers unleashed a 10-hit attack. Six errors hurt the Brunner Mond cause but the Jones boys, Garnet and Lloyd, gave all-out efforts as they rapped two hits each in four at-bats.

Errors severely handicapped John Wyeth in its game against the defending champion Duplate nine. The Pharmacists committed seven misplays which produced eight unearned runs and the outcome was never in doubt after Duplate scored three unearned runs in the first inning.

Duplate got only eight hits off two Wyeth pitchers, Jack Gaunt showing the way with three singles in five trips.

Bill Chalmers, the losing pitcher, picked up two singles off Medo Martinello who yielded only five safeties in the entire game. Don Ethier, Duplate's lead-off batter, walked four times, scored four runs and had a bases-empty homerun in one official at-bat.

Civic League With 8 Clubs Goes Tuesday

The Civic League, the largest (excluding the Senior Church League) and oldest softball circuit in the city, will launch its 1958 season on Tuesday evening when Windsor Police play Union Gas at Stodgell Park No. 2 and City Hall squares off against Windsor Mail at Rossini Park, both games starting at 6 o'clock.

Gerry Gilbert, commencing his sixth consecutive term as president, has announced that eight teams—one more than 1957—will campaign for the title honors which were won last year by Police.

In addition to the four teams involved in opening-night play, other clubs are Silverwood's Dairy, Windsor Utilities Commission, City Merchants and Local 82.

City Hall is a new entry and competed in the Civic League several seasons ago.

At least one game will be played every night of the week and each team will play 21 games, including two games each week.

City's Top League Rec Softball Circuit Opens Play Wednesday

The Recreation League, which has suddenly blossomed into the city's No. 1 softball league since the disbanding of the Windsor League, has three games scheduled for next Wednesday evening to officially open the 1956 season.

American Standard Products will play Bali-Hi at Lanspeary Park, CKLW will oppose Embassy Hotel at Shore Acres Park and Essex Cabinet Makers will hook up with Veteran's Cabs at Stodgell Park No. 2.

Anderdon Tavern of Amherstburg, the league's seventh entry, will enjoy an open date.

President Russ Nantais has announced that each team will play a 30-game schedule and it is probable that the top four teams in the final standing will qualify for the playoffs.

At least two league games will be played locally on Monday, Wednesday and Friday evenings (three games on each of these evenings every other week). Anderdon Tavern will play its home games in the 'Burg on Saturday nights under the floodlights at Town Park.

All of the teams, with the exception of Anderdon Tavern, have picked up players from the defunct Windsor League.

American Standard Products is basically the same team which played in the Windsor League last season with Al Brightmore as manager and Jack Gregg as the team's No. 1 pitcher.

Bali-Hi, piloted by Harold Morency and George Deane, is composed of the best players from the Erie House and St. Anne's teams from the '57 Recreation League. Metro Szeryk and Dick Hames will be pitching for this club.

CKLW has picked up pitcher Gord Haidy and shortstop Len Parent from last year's title-winning Len Kane's team in the Windsor League. The bulk of the team will feature personnel from the radio station with Orville Perreault in charge of operations.

Embassy Hotel is another star-studded Rec. League hold-over, piloted by Jim Mousseau with Jim Millman and Mel McCartney available for pitching duty.

Essex Cabinet Makers formerly operated in the Rec. League under the "Windsor Merchants" banner. Nick Kaschak is running the club and he has Ken Arrow-smith on the firing line.

Veteran's Cabs, featuring most of last year's Marcel's Service players from the Windsor League, is being run by Andy Valche and Gerry Parent. Valche and Jack Krutsch will do the pitching for this club.

Al Zdonek Out for Season After Striking Umpire Koski

Rose Suspended

Could Be Appealed

Year's Suspension For Embassy's Al Zdonek

Bill Andrews, president of the Windsor Umpires' Association, announced Tuesday night that "pending a personal appeal, Al Zdonek, outfielder for the Embassy Hotel team in the Recreation Softball League, has been suspended until August 12th, 1959."

Zdonek deliberately attacked umpire Tony Koski during the ninth inning of Monday night's Bali-Hi Motor Hotel—Embassy Hotel game at Wilson Park and Recreation League President Russ Nantais announced Tuesday morning that the player had been suspended for the balance of the 1958 season.

Andrews, in a statement to the Star last night, said:

"As far as the Windsor Umpires' Association is concerned, Zdonek is automatically suspended for one year in accordance with Clause VIII of our contract with the Recreation Softball League. If he wishes to play any organized ball in the city dur-

ing the next year, he must appeal in person to a four-man board from the Windsor Umpires' Association and a four-man board representing the league involved."

"To my knowledge, the player has not stated that he intends to appeal his present suspension. So as far as we're concerned, he's suspended for the next 12 months."

A personal appeal by Zdonek could, according to Andrews, result in a more severe penalty for him or a lesser penalty. "The one-year suspension clause has been inserted into our contract with every league in the district for our own protection," said Andrews.

Game time for the seven-inning match is 8:15 p.m. Feigner, star of the quartet which includes first baseman Jerry Jones, shortstop Mike Mellicke and catcher Meade Kinzer, will pitch one inning blindfolded, and other from second base.

The first four-man game came about this way. Feigner's team had been whacking all teams in a local industrial league at Walla Walla, Wash., by scores such as 33-0. After one such game, Eddie boasted to the manager of the team they had just beaten that he could have done as well with only four players. The reason four was decided on was that, with the bases loaded there would still be a man at bat.

The following week a four-man game was arranged and Feigner pitched a shutout, striking out 19 and walking none. Two batters did hit the ball, one a pop fly to first, the other a grounder to short that Mellicke fielded and threw to first for the putout to preserve Feigner's perfect no-hit, no-run (21 men up and down) game. Each of the four-man team's batters hit one homerun. The final score was 7-0.

From 1946 through 1957, the King and His Court have won 1,147 games out of 1,267 played, attracting six million fans. After the exhibition game, the Court will give a shadow ball display and Feigner a pitching demonstration.

Bali-Hi Ousted in O.A.S.A. Final

Senior 'A' Crown To Oshawa, 4-3

Errors in Ninth By Windsor Club Clinch Victory

Oshawa Tony's, erupting for three runs in the top half of the ninth inning to break a 1-1 tie, won the Ontario Amateur Softball Association Senior "A" championship Saturday afternoon at wind-blown Lanspeary Park by edging Windsor Bali-Hi Motor Hotel, 4-3.

There was no further scoring until the top half of the ninth when an error by Bali-Hi first baseman Clayton Tourangeau on Marty Jordan's grounder got Oshawa away to a three-run inning. Szeryk struck out Bagnell but singles by Jim Loreno and Jim Jordan, plus an error by Genga, sent three Oshawa runs scampering across the plate.

Bali-Hi fought back gamely in its half of the ninth when back-to-back doubles by Genga and Joe Fairhurst, plus errors by Jim Jordan and Mick Mroczek, scored one run, placed Fairhurst at third base and sent Bagnell to the showers in favor of Justice.

Czack's Hurling Wins Rec. Title

Cabinetmen Take Pair By 5-0, 4-0

Champs Overcame
3-0 Series Lead
Owned by Bali-Hi

Essex Cabinet Makers, with Ted Czack pitching a pair of shutouts, won the 1958 Recreation League championship over the weekend to climax one of the most hectic—almost fantastic—softball series ever played locally.

After blanking the favored Bali-Hi Motor Hotel nine by a 5-0 score on Saturday afternoon to deadlock their so-called best-of-seven series at 3-3, the Cabinet Makers struck back Sunday to again whitewash Bali-Hi by a 4-0 score.

Both games were played before large crowds at Lanspeary Park.

Essex Cabinet Makers won the series, 4-3, but it took a total of 10 games before the new champions were crowned. Three other contests resulted in ties, including a 16-inning marathon which produced a 1-1 deadlock 12 days ago.

Czack's pitching in this series was terrific, particularly after Bali-Hi posted successive 2-0, 3-1 and 1-0 victories to take a commanding 3-0 lead in the round.

In the next seven games, climaxed by yesterday's title contest, Czack shut out Bali-Hi six times. In 67 innings of pitching, he yielded just one run—that tally coming in the very first inning of their 16-inning game. He didn't allow a run in the final 33 innings of the series.

After the first three games of the series, Essex Cabinet struck back for successive 1-0 and 3-0 shutouts. Then followed the three ties—0-0 in eight innings, 0-0 in seven innings and 1-1 in 16 innings. Czack's latest pair of shutouts then clinched the series for the Cabinet Makers.

Saturday, Czack gave up only two hits (singles by Joe Fairhurst and Metro Szeryk), struck out 13 and walked none. Sunday, he yielded only three hits (singles by Arnie McCallum, Earl Smith and Don Cameron), struck out nine and walked one.
